Fair Trade Bill Signed By President

Reluctance Voiced Due to Belief It May Raise Prices

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18 (AP).—President Roosevelt signed today, with expressed reluctance, the bill designed to eliminate price cutting of nationally advertised products. The measure, attached to the District of Columbia tax bill, effectuates "fair trade" acts in force in forty-two states.

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 18 (AP).—Three men were reported killed when a steam line of the United States destroyer Cassin exploded today in a navy yard here. Several were taken to a hospital suffering from burns. A board of inquiry will be immediately named to determine the cause.

Clipper Lands Today At Horta, Azores

PORT WASHINGTON, N. Y., Aug. 18 (AP).—The Pan-American Clipper III landed at Horta, Azores, at 4:45 a. m. (CST) today after a flight from Bermuda.

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Out of a murky, smoke laden sky misdirected bombs of Chinese aviators, unexpectedly aroused to attack invading Japanese forces, dealt death to nearly 600 persons, including three prominent Americans. Seen from the air above is the area involved in the bombing: (1) the Japanese consulate, in front of which the Cruiser Idzumo, target of the attack, was moored; (2) wharves of the NYK, damaged by bombs; (3) the American consulate; (4) and (5) German and Soviet consulates; (6) the Broadway Mansion; (7) Garden Bridge across Soochow Creek; (8) Capital Theater building, and (9) British consulate. Beyond the latter building are the Cathay and Palace Hotels, scene of many deaths.

YOUTH INTERNATIONAL

Because they were boys, the Jamboree was peaceful, happy and friendly. Austrian scouts admired the American Indian regalia of the United States' contingent. English lads camped by Italian boys with no hint in international ill feeling. Throughout the encampment there wasn't a single dispute over tent stake lines, or precedence at the mess hall.

The boys will grow up in a few years and then it will all be changed. They'll become statesmen, grocers, brokers, plumbers, bankers and soldiers. Personal interests and race prejudice will claim them, along with distrust. That shouldn't happen, but it almost always has. Boys can take things at face value. Men, it seems, can not.

REALISTIC COURT REFORM

Hidden by the smoke of the court change battle in Congress, but significant nevertheless, is a little incident from a Brooklyn court. At the robbery trial of a man who had been arrested seven times since 1918, Judge Peter Brancato interrupted proceedings and said:

"If you want to be bull-headed and go through with this trial, the burden is yours. You are very foolish if you think anyone will believe the story you just told. If you are convicted of this charge, I'll give you the limit of 10 years. Now I'll give you a chance to think it over."

The prisoner did think it over, then entered a guilty plea to a slightly lesser charge which still involved a good stretch in prison.

Until concerted action is taken on a national scale to wipe out miles of red tape, close loopholes and prevent delays which too often allow justice to miscarry, sensible procedure will have to depend largely on the initiative of the judges. Judge Brancato has provided a valuable example of just what can be done on that line.

SW Labor Converges At Pan American

DALLAS, Texas. — Southwestern labor will converge upon the Pan American Exposition in Dallas for the nation's outstanding celebration of Labor Day, September 4, 5 and 6. Announcement comes from Washington that William Green, President of the American Federation of Labor, has accepted an invitation to be guest of honor and principal speaker. Green's visit to Texas will mark the first visit by an A. F. of L. chief since Samuel Gompers came to the Lone Star state in 1918.

President Green's acceptance follows a series of invitations extended by prominent Dallas and Texas citizens, Exposition officials and the Dallas Central Labor body.

Climax of the three-day celebration will take place Monday at the Pan American Exposition when Mr. Green will make the principal address at 2 p. m. Tentative plans call for a nation-wide broadcast of the ceremonies.

Activities begin with a gigantic downtown parade, Dallas' 10,000 union labor members of A. F. of L. to be swelled by unionists visiting from all over the Southwest. Following the parade, a gigantic barbecue will be held for members at the Exposition. Of his choice of Dallas for his Labor Day address, Mr. Green explained he had not been in Texas since becoming president of the A. F. of L. and that he chose Dallas because it appeared quite proper he should honor the labor movement of this section.

Expected to participate in Labor Day activities with President Green are many high officers of the various national and international unions and Congressman Hatton Summers, Senator Morris Sheppard and Attorney General of Texas, William McCraw.

Northeast Texas Is Cooled by Showers

DALLAS, Aug. 13. (U.P.) — Showers put an end to August's excessive heat in a strip through northeast Texas and the rest of the state relished a slight break in the high temperatures of the past three weeks.

An inch of rain broke a six-week drought in the Winnsboro section and stopped premature opening of cotton. The rain was general over Wood county, reports were.

In Harrison county and Marshall good showers broke the heat and helped crops, gardens and other vegetation. Mt. Vernon's first big rain in nearly three months aided crops and pastures.

Hoff Discusses Music Condition

Carl Hoff, now sojourning in Hollywood between his Ford Dealers' "Watch the Fun Go By" programs, heard over Columbia at 9 p. m. (EDST) took an hour after last Tuesday night's broadcast to discuss the condition of music and musicians from coast to coast. Having conducted 23 different orchestras in as many cities on his transcontinental tour with Al Pearce's Gang, Carl's opinion may conceivably carry some weight.

"It was surprising," he said, "how good the bands were in the communities we visited. Naturally, there were some which were outstanding, and of these I would rate the Chicago group 'tops.' As a close second, though, Seattle provided us with a fine aggregation of musicians. I found some of the Seattle musicians so accomplished that I asked them why they didn't head for New York or Chicago. They replied that they considered living conditions in Seattle ideal, and would rather stay there than go to a larger city. They preferred the boating, fishing and country life to what they expected to find in New York or Chicago."

Asked what instrumentalists were hardest to locate for his hometown talent orchestras, Carl laughed. "To answer that in another way," he said, "I can readily say that saxophonists were not hard to get—and good saxophonists. They were very plentiful and the weakest instruments were trombones and drums. This condition existed in every city except Seattle. I will say that what many musicians in the smaller cities lacked in experience and musicianship they more than compensated for in their enthusiasm and willingness to cooperate. Especially in the West."

The best individual musician encountered on the trip, according to the maestro, was a girl in Seattle. When he walked out on the stage to meet the band and start rehearsal, he said, he was disappointed and a bit annoyed to find that he was expected to use a girl pianist. But to his surprise the young lady turned out to be the finest musician he had worked with on the entire tour. "There is just one thing I'd like to add," said Carl in conclusion, "and that is that no one section of the country has a monopoly on good musicians. I was amazed at the high standard of musicianship I found throughout the country, though when I started on the tour I was a bit apprehensive at the idea

Although the weather is sultry, the students work diligently at their lessons, eagerness to learn being one of their characteristics.

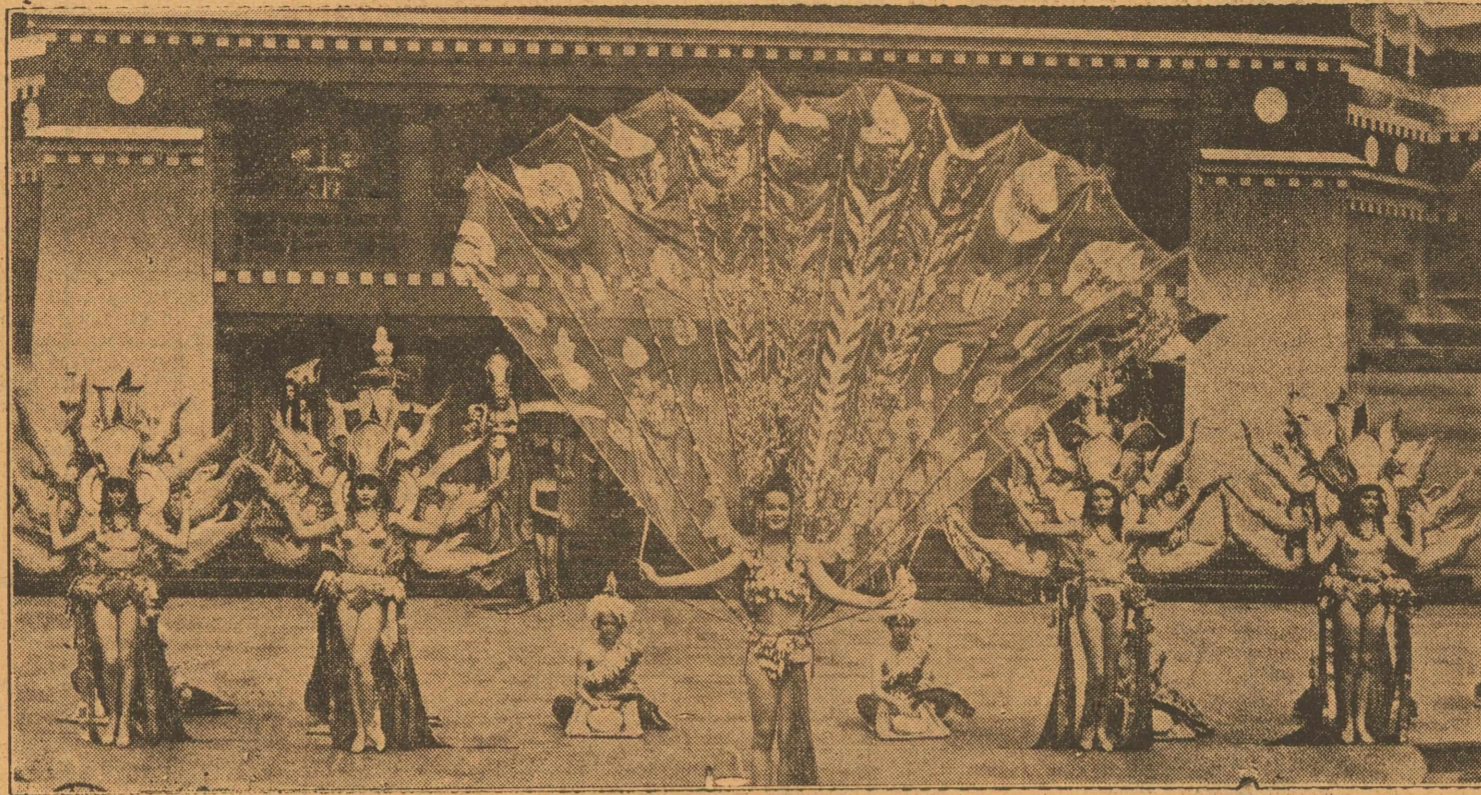

A Book A Day

Study of a Big Man, Living in a Big Age

Until John T. Flynn wrote "God's Gold," the story of the late John D. Rockefeller had not been really handled as a definitive biography. But "God's Gold" was written while the great financier still lived. Now comes "John D. Rockefeller" (Winston, \$1.50), to deal in retrospect with the life of the richest man of modern time.

And B. F. Winkelman, the author, has done a notable job. Author of "Carnegie," "Frick" and other biographies of these times, this Philadelphia lawyer portrays Rockefeller as "a big man in a big age."

The century through which Rockefeller lived was not an ordinary century. When he was born in 1839, people were just beginning to experiment with machinery. He saw the coming of electric power, the telephone, the gas engine, the motion picture, the radio, airplane and other inventions.

He saw all this—and outlived his generation. Hill, Harriman, Morgan, Frick, Carnegie, Flagler, Rogers, Andrews, Brewster, Archbold.

Toys Do Work In Miniature Logging Camp

STEVENS POINT, Wis. (U.P.)—From pieces of scrap iron and steel Eric Kedrowicz has constructed a miniature sawmill complete with steam engine, logging sleighs, flat cars, and miniature pine trees.

Kedrowicz, a barber by trade, has placed his miniature sawmill on a wooden platform 14 feet long and 4 feet wide.

Most interesting of the miniature logging operations carried on in Kedrowicz's "camp" is the sawmill itself. It is operated by a home-made steam engine which drives the saw along a two-foot carriage.

The camp railroad was built entirely out of scrap steel except for the freight engine's four drive wheels, which were cast of babbitt. The engine is 32 inches long, is operated by steam, and will run for three hours unattended. A blow torch generates the steam in the miniature boiler.

When Kedrowicz sets the sawmill in motion 20 iron men operated by steam go through the motions of their jobs. Woodchoppers hack away at the trees, a man fishes in a pond, two men operate a cross-cut saw, a man sharpens an axe on a grindstone, and a horse swishes its tail.

It took four years of work after the barber shop was closed for Kedrowicz to complete the sawmill. The steam engine was the

Other investigations by Schlotz revealed effects of Norway's nutrition efforts. Prolonged inquiries in Oslo schools showed that since 1920 average heights jumped from 1 3/4 to 2 1/4 inches and average weights increased by more than 4 pounds. Experts say it is all due to the Oslo diet.

Netherlands nutritionists cite equally good results. Similar investigations have shown that Holland's modern youngsters grow faster, the average child being a year ahead in weight and height.

Norway Children's Diet Gains Praise

GENEVA (U.P.)—The report of the child nutrition experts, which is published in the League's health bulletin, cites Norway's "Oslo breakfast" as a factor in producing healthy youngsters. It forms part of the Norwegian nutrition campaign.

The breakfast, a hundred per cent vitamin meal provided for poor children, consists of milk, rusks, cheese, whole meal bread, butter, oranges and apples or raw carrots. In recent experiments the vitamin breakfast of "protective foods" triumphs over the old system of hot lunches.

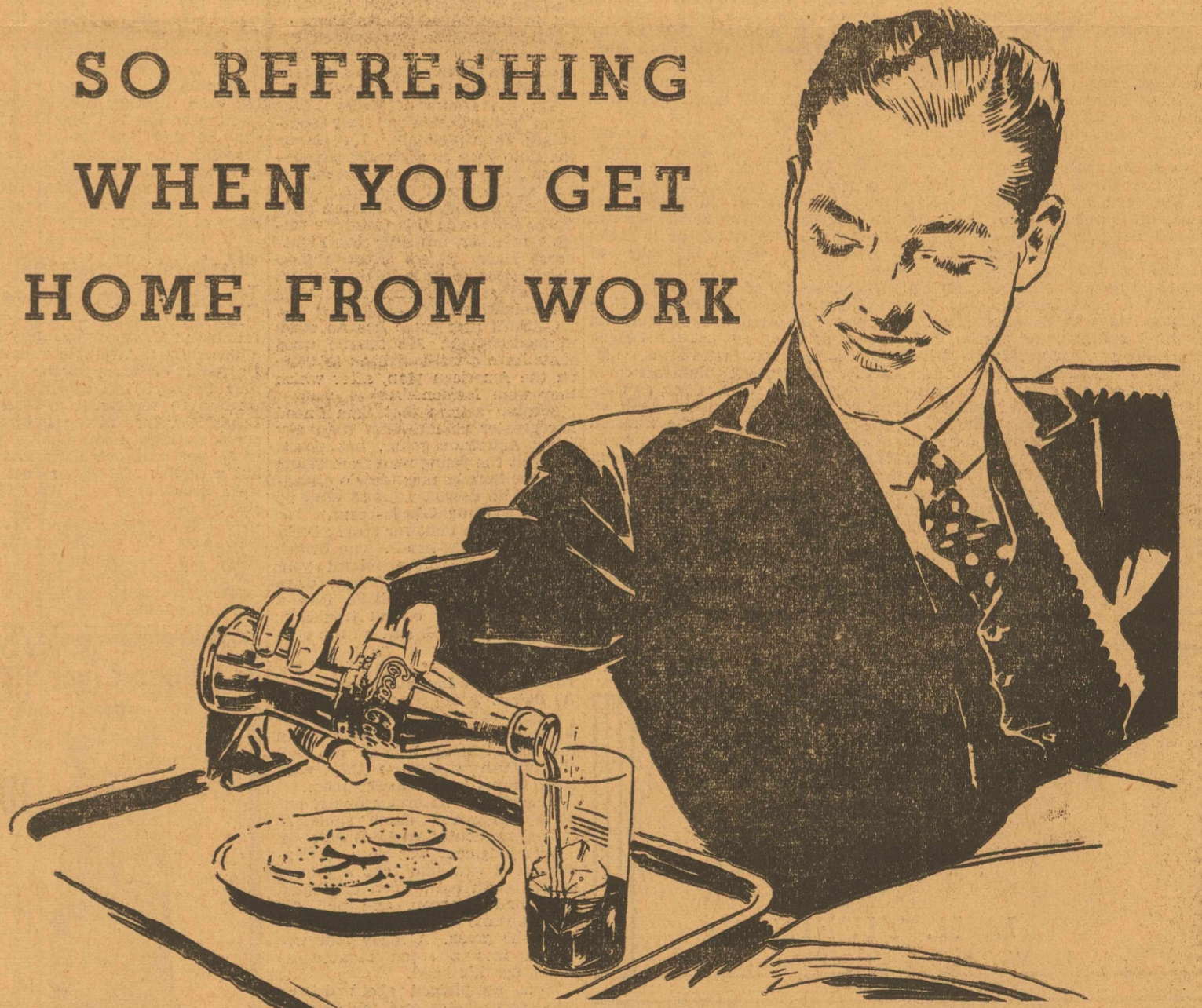

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Spain's Fate Feared by Czechoslovakia As Nazis Make Civil War Sparks Fly

LONDON, Aug. 18—Will the republic of Czechoslovakia—an island of democracy in the heart of Europe and one of the best results of the world war and its following peace treaties—be made into a second Spain by the machinations of Nazi Germany?

That is the question which is agitating more than one Foreign Office in this inflammatory Europe, and the answer to which may bear within it the seeds of peace or war in the next few years.

European diplomats are not unaware of the lessons the Spanish events may teach them. It is by now

pretty well established that General Franco and the other army officers, traitors to their own government, before they made up their minds to start a civil war, got assurances of help from Germany and Italy. Under the excuse that the Franco rebels were fighting Bolshevism and that they could not afford to see a Red regime established in Spain, military help in fullest measure has been forthcoming.

Starting War From Within
On the surface there are indications that Germany may seek the same method to destroy Czechoslovakia. At one time, it was feared the Nazified state might

confining to Czechoslovakia, there was no occasion for any alarm. But soon the servile press of Germany began a thumping campaign on behalf of the Sudeten Germans and a bitter campaign of hatred against the Czech government.

The Czech treaty of friendship with Soviet Russia was written down as a treaty to make of Czech territory a springboard from which Soviet armies could jump into Germany. As Rumania and Poland separate Czechoslovakia from Russia, they did not point out how this could be done. Czech airdromes were dubbed real Soviet airdromes by the Nazi sheeps.

Lately the campaign against Czechoslovakia has been intensified. It has dwelt on the Red influence in the country and depicted this land as a second Spain. This has seriously disturbed the Czechs. If the Nazis want to, the material for a second Spain is ready at hand.

Within Reach of Nazi Arms
Suppose some of the Sudeten Germans were persuaded to start an armed rebellion against the Prague government. German arms, airplanes, cannon, and volunteers could easily slip over the frontier, as Germany borders the country both on the west and north. The Sudeten rebels could thus be helped, just as the Franco rebels were and much easier.

Not meaning to be taken unawares, the Czech government has taken steps to strengthen its defenses. A big national defense loan has been floated and large subscriptions from all classes of the loyal population have been received. Moreover, under the national defense act a decree has been issued giving the military authorities special powers in the frontier regions.

Serious Joe Louis Prepares for Farr's Mauling

NEW YORK, Aug. 18.—Gene Sarazen considers Ralph Guldahl's 281 in the United States Open at Oakland Hills the greatest golf exploit of the year—more impressive even than Henry Cotton's 290 in the British Open at Carnoustie.

Yet the Squire of Valley Ridge Farm calls Cotton a finer shotmaker than Guldahl. He classes the Chicagoan as a streaky player—doesn't like the way he loosens his grip at the top of his swing.

Like everybody else, Sarazen rates Harry Cooper as this country's finest shotmaker, but says that Light-house Harry is less effective than Cotton because he lacks the Briton's physical strength and unwavering determination.

Cotton's long game has no equal in modern golf. His terrific wood shots have a tail-end hook to them on the American plan, after which they were fashioned.

Sarazen asserts that Sam Snead has greater potentialities than any other American golfer, but points out that the young man from White Sulphur Springs must develop headwork if he doesn't want to wind up among the might-have-beens.

Courses are built for strong backs and thoughtless heads. The British contend that you've missed your shot if you hit a 240-yard drive straight down the middle into a bunker. Keeping out of trouble is known as strategic golf on the other side.

Headwork as Important As Power
Many of the so-called second-flighters hit the ball better than the top-flighters, but do not win championships because they park their brains in the locker room.

"Snead is a natural swinger, but plays too many dumb shots at critical moments," explains Sarazen. "His judgment was poor at Carnoustie. I saw him take a brassie on the sixth hole, when he should have had a spoon, and pull the ball 70 yards off line and well beyond the green. A likely four was turned into a seven because he didn't use his head."

"Sam complained about driving into cross-ditches and mid-fairway traps, but the hazards could be seen plainly from the tees. None of the Carnoustie holes are blind."

Sarazen still can't figure how anybody could annihilate Oakland Hills as did Guldahl in the National Open.

Again comparing Guldahl with Cotton, Sarazen sees the latter's grip the much more secure. The hands of the one-time darling of Eton School are snugly interlaced throughout the swing. They never slacken or come apart. That is why Cotton is the more consistent score player.

Champion Will Box 80 Rounds Getting Ready for Briton

POMPTON LAKES, N. J., Aug. 18.—There is no way of telling precisely what thoughts, if any, churn beneath the kinky locks of Joe Louis, but from the sweaty surface it seems as though Mistuh Joe is not making the same mistake he made the last time he fought an important battler.

You remember, of course, what happened that last time. Poor old Max Schmeling was mercilessly tossed into the bloody battle pit to be lapped up by the Tan Tigah, but Der Maxie proceeded to bat the surprised Mistuh Joe around and about the premises as though he was a Philadelphia pitcher.

Mistuh Joe had failed to take the fight seriously, and then had forgotten to duck.

It is all still very fresh in Mistuh Joe's memory and he ain't gwine to tek no chances no how wit dis Fah fellah from Inglin'.

Or, at least, so he says. And so it appears from the hustle and bustle and seriousness of the heavy-weight champion's camp pitched here in the rolling country across Harry Hudson's crick from New York.

From the training schedule, you would think that Mistuh Joe was getting ready to fight the whole regiment of the Welsh Fusiliers, instead of just one rather mediocre-looking chap who ought to be allowed to carry a gun into the ring to make things even.

Another Soft Touch For Joe—Maybe
Of course, deep down beneath that shiny brown skin, Mistuh Joe may be thinking what a soft touch this is going to be.

But, whatever his thoughts, there he is, Mistuh Joe, the world heavy-weight champion (all rights but the German reserved), a-sweatin' and a-tollin' in the shimmering heat for his bout Aug. 26 in Yankee Stadium with the Welshman who rules all Britain.

"Joe, you might say," says John Roxborough, his smooth-skinned, smooth-talking co-manager, "has been training all summer for this fight. You see, he never really broke training after the Braddock battle. He spent only a comparatively few days at home and with his softball team to keep from going stale, and then he went right up to Julian Black's camp in Michigan. From there, he came here—hard, fresh, feeling good down inside."

And Mistuh Joe has worked since he has been here. He fights either four or six rounds daily every day except Monday when he usually goes for a tramp in the woods. He will have hacked away at sparring partners for a total of 80 rounds when the timekeeper kicks the gong around on the night of Aug. 26.

"The Schmeling fight taught Joe and all of us a lesson," says Roxborough. "No five-day, 40-hour week for Joe. He's not only got to fight often, but he's got to train hard for each fight."

Toward this end, Mistuh Joe's handlers have either shooed away or finally placed on a pension those feeble fellows who have been his sparring partners for too long and have hired new, comparatively young and

brisk human punching bags.

One of the new sparring partners, Marty Gallagher of Washington, was brought here for a purpose. Gallagher is neither a boxer nor a puncher, just one of those fellows who works his way inside and cuffs and hauls and shoves and leans and holds and pushes and, all in all, musses up a man considerably.

Be Careful in the Clinch, Joe!
This is the style of fight they expect from Squire Thomas Farr and it is hoped that Gallagher's presence will enable Mistuh Joe to get used to this sort of stuff.

The precaution is rather unnecessary. It was as far back as the Carnera fight that Mistuh Joe proved he could take care of himself in a tuffy pull, hug-and-maul, or bar-room brawl.

If you will recall, Carnera, a mighty man was he, tried to show Mistuh Joe who was the boss by attempting to spin him in a clinch. Poor Primo had hardly started to throw Joe around when he went spinning himself from a savage left hook that made the gore gush from his mouth.

After that, Carnera didn't try to demonstrate who was the boss man.

Farr is not, by any means, the first mauler Joe has fought. There was Natie Brown, for instance, and also Al Ettore, to name a couple. And their mauling, judging from the historical data available, didn't stand them in very good stead.

Oh, yes, and another thing... Mistuh Joe's handlers are trying to impress on him the importance of taking a count if, perchance, the bully boy from Britain drops him in the dust.

When Jimmy Braddock dumped Joe in the first round in Chicago, the Bomber scrambled to his feet before he had regained complete control of his bearings. Such a move against a faster, younger man with better timing than Braddock might prove fatal.

Of course, Squire Thomas Farr doesn't appear to be worthy of causing any such fears, but... "After Schmeling," says Roxborough with a smile, "we're not taking any chances."
