The housing units, one block West of Market Street, are soon to be completed. The 10 units started in 1967, have done much to dress up that section of the city, as the building has progressed through the past months.

The attractive units, set to the rear of the lots, with a covered recreation area built in the center of the front lawn, graces the landscape where occupants may sit and enjoy the assortment of shrubs and oak, pecan and elm trees.

Three different color schemes are carried out in the 10 units. They each consist of a living room, bedroom, bath and kitchen. The living room decor consists of one wall of brick, which adds attractiveness to the soft colors of green applied to the rest of the walls throughout the entire unit. Ample closets are found throughout, including a pantry in the kitchen. The kitchen cabinets are constructed of ash with rich luster of fruitwood stain. The cabinet tops are also in the soft green color formica with double stainless steel sinks. White refrigerator and stove are the only furnishing in each unit.

The bathrooms are built for the safety of the occupant, with bench attachments at the end of the shower area where a person may sit or stand while showering.

The exterior brick is Denton Blend in color with roughout cedar trim. Solar tile separates each unit in front for front porch privacy. Chainlink fence inserted with redwood slats encloses the entire lots behind each assembly of units.

Clothes lines, house numbers, outside storage and T.V. antenna support are among the dozens of conveniences you may have as a resident of this small project, but not the less, one of the most attractive you will ever find.

3 CP Residents Killed In Wreck

Funeral services were held Saturday, Feb. 24, at the First Baptist Church in Cross Plains for Mrs. R. L. (Cleta) Jackson, 33, and her two daughters, Jo Ann 4, and Lavona Louise, 1 yr. The three members of this Cross Plains family were among five persons killed in a head-on collision 13 miles north of San Antonio Feb. 21. Two other persons, James C. Ellis, 47 of Comanche, a passenger in the Jackson auto, and Frank W. Cobb, 44, of Goldthwaite, alone in a pickup truck.

All five persons were dead at the accident scene. Investigating officials reported that the accident occurred as the vehicles approached the crest of a small hill on State Highway 281.

Raymond L. Jackson, husband of Mrs. Jackson, was injured and taken to New Braunfels Hospital, later transferred to Callahan County Hospital in Baird. He was dismissed from the hospital Tuesday.

Services for Mrs. Jackson and her two children were held at 2 p.m. Saturday, with Rev. Clyde Kelley, pastor of the Revival Center, officiating. Burial was in Cross Plains Cemetery.

Taylor To Present Program To Lion's, School About Cancer

Charis P. Taylor, District Executive Director of the American Cancer Society, will present a program on Community Cancer Control at the Baird Lions Club Tuesday, March 6.

Taylor's text will cover the American Cancer Society's total program in depth. He will explain the number of free services offered to cancer patients. He will also comment on the society's dynamic public education program, designed to reach the public and inform them of cancer's seven warning signals.

The other educational material and programs offered and available to the general public, he feels, increases awareness to this disease.

The research efforts of Texas scientists will also be discussed as well as the professional education programs designed to aid physicians and nurses in early selection techniques and treatment of various forms of cancer. This program offers films and other information to hospitals interested in this program. As part of his program, a film, "A Time for Decision," will be shown. This film deals with the newest facts about smoking in relation to lung cancer.

Mr. Taylor will speak to the students at Baird High School Tuesday afternoon, in relation to smoking and cancer.

Dick Vestal, program co-ordinator for the American Cancer Society, has arranged both programs to be held Tuesday.

After the courses are completed, monitoring equipment is received for use in case of national emergency.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN — A rather important corner may have been turned by the State of Texas in providing transportation facilities for its people. This by clarifying where the line between state and federal regulatory power should be drawn.

Texas Aeronautics Commission took the big step when its six members voted to certify Air Southwest Co. of San Antonio as an intrastate airline competing with the large, federally regulated interstate lines.

Air Southwest plans to offer commuter service among Dallas, San Antonio, and Houston using Lockheed Electra prop-jets. It says it can offer service comparable to the large airlines and at rates lower by more than 20 per cent.

Federal-state rub is that the Civil Aeronautics Board licenses interstate carriers and his its service and subsidy balances all worked out, without considering any state-licensed airlines.

So, Air Southwest is going to upset those balances somewhat, by taking from Braniff, Trans-Texas and Continental airlines some of the revenues now received under their charters from the CAB.

CAB did not make its wishes in the matter of Air Southwest's certification known to the Texas Aeronautics Commission. But Braniff, TTA and Continental did. Result was a seven-day hearing before TAC examiners, then another hearing for oral arguments before the commission itself.

Despite TAC's favorable ruling, the fight is far from over.

Opponents to Air Southwest's plan have made it known that they plan to take their case into the courts - as far as it will go.

In the state courts, they will maintain that the TAC's action was not based on "substantial evidence." If they fall there, one attorney said they might go into the federal courts, charging that the TAC certification placed an undue burden on interstate commerce in violation of the U. S. Constitution.

SPECIAL SESSION OUTLOOK—Gov. John Connally revealed a "new official estimate" by State Comptroller Roberts S. Calvert on available General Revenue Funds, indicating that available revenue for operating state government may be some \$50,000,000 higher than the comptroller's October 1967, estimate of \$297,600,000.

Governor Connally says the import of that is "the increase in available revenues will relieve the pressures for as large a tax bill as was originally anticipated" for the special legislative fiscal session. Connally has denied rumors that he will call a special session of the Legislature in March.

"I am hopeful that if the special legislative session this year can be postponed until June," Speaker Ben Barnes said, "the figure will be even less" than the previous estimate of \$115,000,000 in new tax resources necessary to support the state government in the fiscal year which

begins September 1.

Barnes said recent revisions in revenue estimates mean that if the Legislature had passed a two-year tax bill in 1967, instead of waiting for a special session, Texas taxpayers would have been taxed about \$60,000,000 more than necessary.

L.B.J. CONTRACT AWARDED—A contract for construction of 16,673 feet of high gameproof fencing at Lyndon B. Johnson State Park in Gillespie County has been awarded to Jasper Moore of Ingram. Moore was lowest among five bidders with a project price of \$19,717.

Parks and Wildlife Department said the fencing project was designed more to keep exhibition animals in L.B.J. State Park than to keep visitors out. But it will enclose a large portion of the park and separate it from Ranch Road 1 and the L.B.J. Ranch, known as The Texas White House.

PARK DEVELOPMENT ASSURED—Parks & Wildlife Commission Chairman Will Odom announced a \$54,000 Federal matching grant to develop outdoor recreation facilities at Goose Island State Park, north of Rockport.

With state matching, this will finance a \$108,000 development project including restrooms, tent camping units, trailer camping, shelters, roads, parking areas and utilities. The park, acquired in 1935, is the home of a 2,000 year old live oak tree, Chairman Odom noted.

Former Bexar County Judge Charles Grace was named statewide chairman of Don Yarborough's campaign for governor.

Dr. Lee Wilborn, assistant commissioner of education for instruction, will join Texas Bankers Association March 1 as education director.

Gladys McNutt, formerly of Comanche, will handle news and information for Barnes' campaign for lieutenant governor.

Mrs. Roland Boyd of McKinney is Texas chairman for 1968 campaign conference for Democratic women to be held in Washington May 19-21.

High court agreed a South Houston Gardens man is entitled to \$14,000 damages for harm to his house and peace of mind caused by low-flying planes after William P. Hobby runways were extended to near edge of his property.

Transfer of four square miles from Rosenthal to Lorena school district is invalid without Falls County school board approval, Supreme Court concluded, upholding Court of Civil Appeals.

State Banking Board's award of a charter to American Bank of Commerce in Grapevine now has Supreme Court approval.

Third Court of Civil Appeals backed up a district court order that a charter should have been granted to Mission Savings and Loan Association in northeast Bexar County.

Court of Criminal Appeals affirmed death penalty assessed Kenneth Allen McDuff who was accused of killing three teenagers.

Residency requirement in state aid to families of dependent needy children act is under attack in a new federal court suit.

POVERTY PROGRAM SHIFTING—Texas War on Poverty program seems to be heading for a shift in control to the cities and counties under new federal legislation. New law will give local governments the option of taking over programs, effective February 1, 1969.

Cities and counties would have three alternatives: designate an existing community action agency; or designate themselves or some other public or private agency to operate the poverty program; or leave the decision of who is to run the program up to State poverty program officials.

Change in control may also mean a change in the funding formula for the poverty program. Regional GEO Administrator Fred D. Baldwin said there is a "strong possibility" that next year's federal appropriations will come to the states without federal strings on how the money should be used.

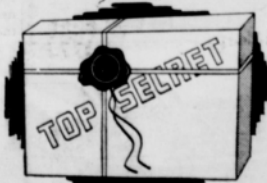

Allotment Transfer Applications Must Be Completed By April 1

PEANUT - Peanut producers desiring to sell, lease or transfer peanut acreage should immediately request the County Committee to establish a normal yield for the farm. The yield established determines the acreage transferred to and from a farm. For the first time persons owning farms without a peanut allotment may purchase acreage to be assigned to their farm permanently. Downward adjustments in the acreage bought will be made if the farm is placed under irrigation during the next five years. All applications for transfers must be completed by April 1, 1968.

The attention of producers who do not intend to plant their peanut acreage this year is directed to the fact that the final date to lease or sell is April 1, and the final date to release is April 4, 1968. This is only three days between the final date to lease or sell or release. Producers not completing a lease or sale of their acreage should release them by the final date.

COTTON - The sign-up of cotton producers desiring to participate in the 1968 program is now under way and will continue through March 15, 1968. The final date to release unwanted cotton acreage that may be reapportioned to other farms in the county is March 8, 1968. Therefore, producers who do not intend to plant their acreage should release by not later than March 8, 1968.

WHEAT AND FEED GRAIN - Intentions to participate in the 1968 wheat and feed grain programs are now being accepted and will continue to be through March 15, 1968. Producers must sign an intention to participate to be eligible for program benefits.

CERTIFICATION OF CROP AND DIVERTED ACREAGE - Aerial photocopies of producers' farms are now available in the county office. Wheat, cotton and feed grain producers are given a photo of their farm at the time they sign up in this year's program. They also receive an explanation of how the producers will certify as to their crop or diverted acreage. At a later date, meetings will be held to further explain the certification program to peanut producers and other interested personnel. Peanut producers may also secure a photocopy of their farm(s) at this time if

they so desire.

The acreage figures entered on the photocopies will be the acreage used for this year. If at a later date, it is established that the acreage so entered is incorrect, it will be corrected for use in future years.

County office personnel will assist you in anyway possible to determine acreage for part of fields or terraces, based on your measurements. However, in no instance can any acreage determined by personnel in the County Office be guaranteed, unless it is on the photocopy of the farm at the time it is issued.

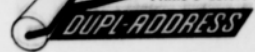
