

FARM

FEEDS FOR HOG PRODUCTION

Best Information on Efficient Forage and Grain Crops Given by Experiment Station.

The best information on the feeds available in the farmers' locality can be readily and accurately given by his state experiment station. Pigs make the best use of concentrates. These can be fed in a self-feeder and can be supplemented by various slaughterhouse, bakery, or table by-products, etc. A by-product to be economical should be fairly concentrated, should be moderate in price per 100 pounds of nutrients, and should be fresh and free from taint.

During the winter, leguminous hays fed in addition to the concentrate help reduce the cost of production in the summer, pasture crops such as rape, alfalfa, bur clover, crimson clover, rye, etc., make very economical and efficient supplements for hog feeding.

In practically every farming district in the United States cheap and efficient forage and grain crops are available for hog production. These should be diligently studied by the farmer, with the aid of the state and federal forces, and used in the most profitable manner.

ATTENTION TO WORK HORSES

Animal Should Be Fed Right to Secure Greatest Amount of Labor From Them.

To secure the greatest amount of work from the horse requires that it be fed right. There is a big difference plow tractor is 420 acres. in the feeding of horses and cattle. The horse's stomach holds only a few gallons, while a cow's paunch has a capacity of over a barrel, which means that the horse must be fed more concentrated food. It also takes more energy to digest roughage than grain.

Hog Is Not Cheap Animal and Is Well Worth Taking Care of-Crowding Is Not Profitable.


The average hog that goes to market these days returns very close to \$25, It is not a cheap animal. It is worth taking care of on the way, for the dead ones don't return any "twentyfive." They are a dead loss, literally. It is the very heavy ones that are most apt to be overcome by heat, overcrowding, etc. At this time of year the farmers are getting rid largely of old brood sows, cuiling the breeding stock. But the money these old roughs bring is as good as any. good enough to pay for careful shipping. Crowding to economize room is not profitable when a toll of dead ones is paid. GOOD GRIT SUPPLY IS MOST ESSENTIAL

Not Only Keeps Fowls in Good State of Health, but Decreases Feed Bill.

When grit is not supplied some of the grain is not reduced sufficiently to make it available for assimilation, and it passes through the body as waste. The supplying of grit regularly then is real economy not only in keeping the fowls in a good state of health, but in the saving of food.

Many farmer's supply their hens no grit, they believe that hens on range will find all that is needed. Some soils contain very little grit, and where the hens have ranged over a field for, perhaps, 10 or 20 years, the natural supply of grit may have become entirely exhausted. Unless one is certain that the range supplies an adequate quantity of grit, 'It will pay cause no objectionable odors nor ex- to buy the commercial article and keep it before the hens all the time.

EVEN PERIODS FOR MILKING

Cows Thus Milked Gave More Milk in Evening Than in Morning-Effect of Phosphates.

An English experiment station has definitely determined that the total quantity of milk is not influenced by equal or unequal periods of milking. but that the fat percentage is materially altered by the length of time between morning and evening milkings. Cows milked at even periods gave more milk in the evening than in the morning. The evening's milk was slightly the poorer in quality.

In an experiment to determine the effected of feeding phosphates directly to cows, precipitated bone phosphate was fed at the rate of one ounce per

day. No appreciable effect was obtained either on the quantity or quality of the milk produced. Apparently this material had no effect on the stimulation of the nervous system; if anything, it had a depressing effect. The weight of cows receiving the precipitated bone ash showed a slight increase.

Experiments showed no advantage in milking three times a day was compared with twice a day.

Cows fed palm-nut cake did not increase in weight as did those fed cotton cake, but they showed a looser skin with a glossier look. The palmfat in the milk.



When the scar forms around the milk orifice, it contracts the opening and prevents the milk from leaking.

Rack for Sunning Cans.





COVERING FOR GRAPEVINES

In Colder Sections of Country Artificial Protection Should Be Given in Winter.

In the colder sections of the country, wherever varieties not hardy enough as withstand severe winters are grown, grapevines should be artistically protected. Under such circumstances the vines should be pruned as soon as they become dormant. The system of pruning should be such as to easily admit of laying down the stalk and canes for next senson's fruit production. The next step is to cover these parts with littier, leaves, or earth in such a way as to protect them from severe or repeated freezing and thawing and to leave them covered until just before the season for growth the following

There are several species of grapes, each adapted to particular sections of the country, and each responds best to a particular method of culture, pruning and training.

The vine normally produces its fruiton shoots of the current senson's growth, which in turn grow from buds developed the previous season. All pruning must, therefore, be based on this characteristic of the plant. After eletermining the system of pruning best suited to the conditions, species, and variety the vine should be so handled, during its early life, as to develop a general framework of the type de-

YOUNG APPLE TREES INJURED

Buffalo Tree Hopper Causes Much Damage by Cutting Slits in Twigs in Which to Lay Eggs.

By S. A. BEACH, Iowa Agricultural Ex-

The Buffalo Tree Hopper is a small bug of bright grass-green color. It feeds upon all kinds of succulent plants, especially, such as are found growing beneath trees in orchards or groves. It damages young apple trees by cutting slits in the twigs and smaller branches in which it lays its eggs. These slits are so made that an oval piece of bark is cut free from the wood. Where these scars are numerous the whole branch may be-

come bark-bound, stunted and warped out of shape. The harm is greatest in young trees. One of them badly attacked even for a single year becomes bark-bound and stunted, so that it Oft-Repeated Remark Never never recovers. The fact that the young nymphs must find tender vegetation at comparatively short distance from the tree in which they are hatched makes it possible to starve them out by folthe nursery or orchard during the summer months,

SHEEP VALUABLE ON **EVERY SMALL FARM**

Animals Grow Into Marketable Products at Early Age—Cost Little for Feed.

(By DR. R. H. WILLIAMS, Animal Hus-bandman, University of Arizona Agricul-tural Experiment Station.)

Every farmer should keep a small flock of sheep. They cost little for feed, for they act as weed scavengers, and grow into marketable products at an early age. There are also many waste places on farms which may be utilized for sheep production. COW DESERVES REST Another advantage of sheep is that they require little labor. They come as near solving the "hired help prof lem" as any other kind of mixed farming. Lambs milk the ewes at some what regular intervals and they separate the milk and store away the product without the use of cans or refrigeration. When a farmer sees a bulge on his side of the market, the kind-hearted and industrious lambs are asked to trot to market carrying all the milk and worry with them. It is like finding money, for the sheep have paid their way in wool, fertilizer, and in the destruction of weeds.

Select sows from good-sized litters. The sow that carries good length and depth of body generally proves the most prolific. Quality should not be overlooked, but in the search for quality, do not sacrifice substance, nor select delicate animals. Uniformity in a herd of sows is very important. A uniform bunch stored. of sows will produce a more uniform and sell better on the market.

Sow's Business. Sows are not kept for the purpose to a point where they can be fed. With is evenly scattered over the land.

this in view, the sow should be so fed and managed as to enable her to do her work to the very best advantage.

A sow should remain in the herd as long as useful. A good, steady sow, with well developed tents can usually be depended upon to repeat the performance. If the sow is properly handled and fails to fulfill her duties, the sow has no business on the farm, and the quicker she is found out and disposed of the better. Feeding is a matter of the most importance, for the brood sow as she needs the right kind of feed for three important purposes; For the maintenance of her own body; for the growth of her own body; for the development of the fetal pigs.

AND AMPLE FEEDING

Recommendation of Dairy Department of the New Jersey Experiment Station.

The dairying department of the New Jersey agricultural experiment station recommends that the dairy farmer should remember to give his cows a rest of six weeks or more before they freshen this fall. Some cows may maintain a good flow of milk right up to calving time, and in such cases the dairyman hesitates to dry them off for a rest period of several weeks. This should be done, however, and the cow well fed so that she will be in good flesh when she freshens. The work of producing a heavy yield of milk for ten months or a year is a severe drain upon the cow's strength and vitality, and a period of rest should be given her to recuperate and prepare for another lactation period. If she finishes her milking period quite thin in flesh she should be given a longer dry period and more liberally might produce during the dry period kept on the farm that will so surely will be made up several times over by an increased yield during the followconsumed and care given as the brood ing lactation period. 


