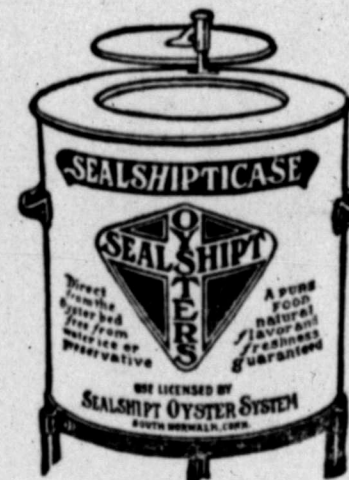

**The Curse of A Nation.**

While Uncle Sam is exerting every energy and spending millions in money to equip and train an adequate army we cannot fail to call attention to the inconsistency and shame of this nation licensing and legalizing a business and allowing it to be set up in the very door of every soldier's camp in our country that is menacing and deteriorating in its every effect upon the young soldiers who are brought under its influence. "Preparedness and Efficiency" is the slogan, yet this government puts in the way of the young men who have patriotically gone to the front the very thing that is recognized the world over as the greatest drawback to both preparedness and efficiency. Many of the boys in the army came from dry States and have tasted their first booze after they had enlisted with Uncle Sam, thus instead of training them for efficient service our government is starting them on the downward road to ruin. These are facts known to thousands of people who have visited the soldier camps within the past few months. The guard houses are full of young men who are debauched and demoralized by drink and the Government which legalizes the saloon and for the paltry license received permits such conditions is not only practicing a gross inconsistency but is guilty of fostering upon this nation the greatest curse that could come upon us.

While the warring nations of the East are taking booze away from their soldiers to make them more efficient Uncle Sam is placing it before his to debauch and demoralize them.

**Uncle Sam, Whiskey Peddler**

The United States Government is now engaged, legally, in helping the booze men violate the State laws. In Georgia, as the Augusta Chronicle points out, newspapers cannot publish whisky advertisements, nor can papers containing such advertisements be brought in from other States. But for one cent the Post Office Department will take into Georgia and deliver to any address on any street (no name required) a twenty-odd page batch of booze literature with order blanks, return envelopes, and all complete. Such printed matter is now being flooded into Georgia by the carload. The express companies operating under the regulations of the Interstate Commerce Commission, deliver the booze packages and are enlarging their warehouses to handle the traffic. The laws of Georgia are thus defied and evaded, the better conditions which her citizens want and have voted for are denied them, and all this is done with the Federal Government acting as a barker for the whisky show. Clark Howell's paper, the Atlanta Constitution, aptly describes the situation as "Federal nullification" and argues with great force that the Louisiana lottery was ended by shutting it out of the mails, and that child labor is now prohibited (in so far as the National Government can do it), by closing the channels of interstate commerce to the articles which it produces. But the United States Government deliberately keeps open for the use of liquor dealers engaged in the violation of State laws these avenues which it has denied the lottery gambler and to the child-labor exploiter. Why? Whisky is as insidious and as menacing as lotteries or child labor, and Uncle Sam is no sort of partner for boozy law-breakers. This wrong should be righted at the coming session of Congress.—Collier's Weekly.

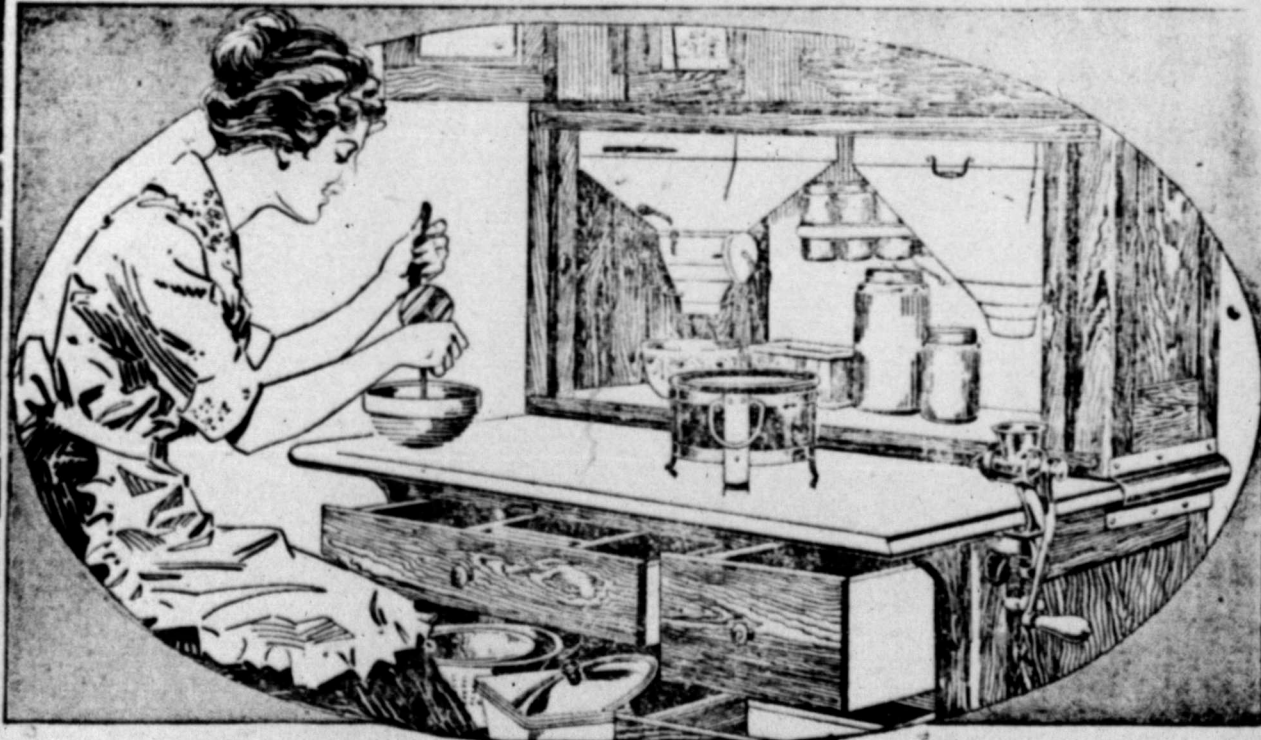

The coat fastens a little to one side. Except for a novel management at the shoulders there is nothing unusual in the manner of construction. Here the back is extended, overlapping the front in rounded and corded edges. The skirt portion is set to the body with a heavy cord. The lining is of old-gold satin, but its color may be left to the discretion of the wearer.

The brief description of the velveteen coat is given in the picture. It is full and straight hanging and its owner may or may not like to add to these entirely correct details a mention of plain bands of silk braid which would not be missed if they were not there.

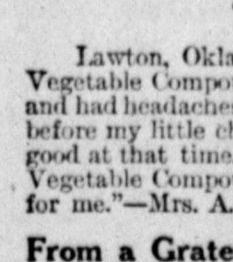

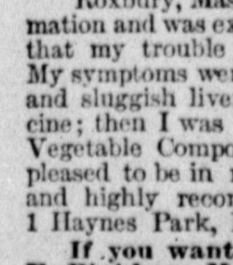

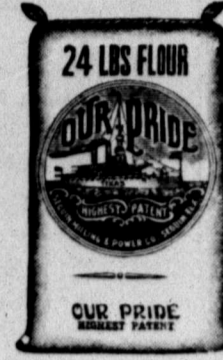

### KERRVILLE

Is the county seat of Kerr County, has a population of about 2500, is situated 20 miles northwesterly from San Antonio, and is the terminus of the Kerrville branch of the S. A. & A. P. railroad. It has two daily trains to and from San Antonio, and daily mail route, carrying passengers in hacks, to Ingram, Junction, Rock Springs Harper and other places north and west of Kerrville, and also a daily line to Fredericksburg. From Kerrville to Fredericksburg is 25 miles; to Bandera and Medina City, 25 miles; to Junction 60 miles; Rocksprings 50 miles, Harper 21 miles.

Kerrville has electric lights and a splendid system of water works. The sum of \$20,000 has been spent on the streets and \$10,000 has been spent for road improvements in this precinct.

The elevation at Kerrville is 1750 feet. The Guadalupe river, which heads 30 miles north of Kerrville, runs through the city. On the east side where the city is located, there are high bluffs on the river, and on the west side is a fertile and beautiful valley, and mountains surround the city on the east and west. The Guadalupe valley is occupied by thrifty farmers and ranchmen, and the mountain regions, among which there is considerable valley, creek and arable land, there are large ranches of cattle, horses, sheep and goats, all of which do well in the Kerrville country. The land generally is well wooded, principally with live oak, Spanish oak and cedar, and the range is good, and water excellent.

Our farmers grow wheat, oats and all other small grain, cane and alfalfa, cotton and corn, and fruit and vegetables do well. Kerrville is one of the largest wool markets in the state, and large quantities of wool, mohair, cotton, oats, cattle, etc., are shipped from this point.

The climate of the Kerrville country is unsurpassed. The winters are short and generally mild and invigorating owing to the dryness of the climate and the prevalence of sunshine. The summers are cool and delightful, and the mountain air is pure and bracing. Game abounds in the Kerrville country, and fishing in the Guadalupe, especially north of Kerrville, is good. Kerrville and the adjoining towns are popular resorts for health and recreation.

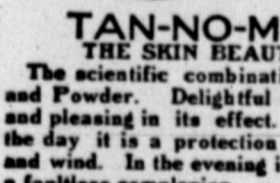
