



JOHN COTTON FAMOUS AMONG CLERGYMEN.

Driven From England, He Sought Ref uge in the New World, Where He Was Received With Honors and Given High Place.

John Cotton, the Puritan clergyman who introduced into New England the edstom of keeping the Sabbath from evening to evening, according to some historians, died December 23, 1652, He was born in Derby, England, December 4, 1585.

John Cotton was minister at Boston, in Lincolnshire, England, when he fled to-Boston, in New England. He had been minister in the Bostop of the old England for more than 20 years, when he found that his theological views were about to get him into trouble. The father of John Cotton was a lawyer named Roland Cotton, John entered Trinity college, Cambridge, when he was only thirteen years old. and he rapidly distinguished himseif for scholarship.

He was brilliant as well as learned. and he enjoyed a great reputation. It was while he was teaching in Emanuel college at Cambridge that he imbibed Puritum views of theology, observes a writer in the Washington Post. He was about twenty-seven years old Boston.

QUALITY OF WHEAT

Bulletin of Colorado Experiment Station Tells Cause of Yellow Berry and Remedy.

(By C. P. GILLETTE, Colorado Agricul tural College, Fort Collins.)

Millers prefer wheat that is hard and flinty, to a wheat that is made up of kernels that are white and starchy in cross-section. Kernels of the latter type are softer and more the coarser cattle cost \$10,25 a 100 easily crushed and are spoken of as pounds. This experiment demonstrates "soft wheat." A considerable reduction in price is often made when this "soft" wheat is offered for sale.

In brief, the cause of "yellow-berry" is a high percentage of potash in the soil in proportion to the available nitrogen. The remedy is to keep the nitrogen content of the soil as high as possible without increasing the potash. This may be done by the addition of nitrates, the rotation of crops in which alfalfa or some other legume is used, and by proper tillage.



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



Sheep are generally considered good feeders, that is to say that they have adaptations for producing gains economically. Sheep are next to hogs in a given quantity of feed. They have the advantage of hogs in that they can convert coarse fodders and hay into gains. They can excel cattle in this respect.

It requires 9 to 11 pounds of dry matter to produce a pound of gain on steers, according to investigations. Sheep on the same feed will make a census crop value in 1899. pound of gain on from 7 to 9 pounds of dry matter.



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

Poultry Notes.

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ERRVILLE, TEXAS

The poultryman and the farmer must depend on pullets for their winter supply of eggs. These should be matured and in good laying condition before the beginning of cold weather to obtain the best results, and must be obtained from chicks hatched in March and April, which have been properly reared. While good stock and carefully selected eggs are all important, hens laying large eggs are preferable, although overly large ones are not desirable.

The size of the egg determines the size of the chick and the size of the egg it will lay, the shape has a pronounced effect on the developing embryo, while color is an inherited characteristic of the breed and effect hatching, therefore, select large eggs, of uniform size and shape, of good texture. Brown eggs hatch from twelve to twenty-four hrs. later than the white, so it is not advisable to mix them. Eggs with shells that are pebbled should be culled and thin shells should be avoided, as they break easily when turned, while evaporation takes place faster and poor hatches result.

Rigid and constant selection of hatching eggs along the above lines will result in uniformly good chicks and a large number of them, and since these characteristics are inherent, a flock will be developed in a few years in which the hens Mr. Moore. will lay uniformly large, well shped, evenly colored eggs of strong shell texture, while culling will reduce to a minimum.
