## Red Cross Column

At an entertainment given for our enlisted boys on last Wednesday evening at Pampell's Hall Company D. First Texas Infantry, under command of Captain Chas. J. Seeber, was presented with the flag of their country, a beautiful hand-embroidered gift from the "Girls of Camp Elbows,"—namely: Misses Marguerite Rummel, Kate Remschel, Bessie Remschel, Kate Hamilton, Gussie May Brown, Josie B. Newman, Elsie Johnston, and Graves Dewees. Mr. T. C. Johnston of Kerrville made the presentation address with these words:

"I have been honored tonight as I never was before in being selected to make a presentation to you from the ladies of Kerrville through the industry of the "Girls of Camp Elbow." That you are justly entitled to the honor and respect of your fellow-citizens goes without saying, for you are volunteers and not conscripts, and there is as much difference between a volunteer and a conscripted man as there is between a voluntary subscription to the Red Cross and the payment of one's taxes.

"It is an easy thing and often a way out of difficulties to enlist in times of peace. And, while to enlist in times of ordinary danger takes courage of a high order, to enlist in the face of the present world war takes extraordinary courage and determination and we are proud that in this and the surrounding counties there are young men who measure up to the standard and we are still prouder that they are nearly all friends and acquaintances of ours.

"The flag which I will have the honor of presenting to you stands first for Liberty, last for Liberty, all the time for Liberty. It guarantees to those who live under its folds absolute freedom in conformity with the laws of a free and enlightened country. When first unfurled it was in the cause of Liberty—freedom from the tyranny of England. Ever since when unfurled over marching hosts of armed men, it has been in the same cause and when it waves in France against the despotism and tyranny of the Kaiser, it will be the greatest cause in which it ever waved over a battlefield. Your forefathers marched under its banner to obtain for themselves and families; others within our own memories saw it wave over them when they successfully rescued a small nation from the cruel rule of Spain, but to you is given the highest honor of all—seeing it wave over a mighty armed host fighting for the freedom of the world.

"That the honor of this flag is in safe keeping we feel sure and while you are facing the dangers of the deep on the way to France, fighting against the terrible agencies of modern warfare in the trenches, be sure there are folks away back in Texas who are constantly thinking of you, who are wishing you luck and hoping for your safe return. When you come back victorious—and we know you want come back any other way—let us hope that we will all be here to meet you and that every one of you will return and be at that happy reunion."

## KERRVILLE

Is the county seat of Kerr County, has a population of about 2500, is situated 70 miles northwesterly from San Antonio, and is the terminus of the Kerrville branch of the S. A. & A. P. railroad. It has two daily trains to and from San Antonio, and daily mail route, carrying passengers in autos, to Ingram, Junction, Rock Springs Harper and other places north and west of Kerrville, and also a daily line to Fredericksburg. From Kerrville to Fredericksburg is 25 miles; to Bandera and Medina City, 25 miles; to Junction 60 miles; Rock Springs 80 miles, Harper 21 miles.

Kerrville has electric lights and a splendid system of water works. The sum of \$20,000 has been spent on the streets and \$10,000 has been spent for road improvements in this precinct.

The elevation at Kerrville is 1250 feet. The Guadalupe river, which heads 30 miles north of Kerrville, runs through the city. On the east side where the city is located, there are high bluffs on the river, and on the west side is a fertile and beautiful valley, and mountains surround the city on the east and west. The Guadalupe valley is occupied by thrifty farmers and ranchmen, and the mountain regions, among which there is considerable valley, creek and arable land, there are large ranches of cattle, horses, sheep and goats, all of which do well in the Kerrville country. The land generally is well wooded, principally with live oak, Spanish oak and cedar, and the range is good, and water excellent.

Our farmers grow wheat, oats and all other small grain, cane and alfalfa, cotton and corn, and fruit and vegetables do well. Kerrville is one of the largest wool markets in the state, and large quantities of wool, mohair, cotton, oats, cattle, etc., are shipped from this point.

The climate of the Kerrville country is unsurpassed. The winters are short and generally mild and invigorating owing to the dryness of the climate and the prevalence of sunshine. The summers are cool and delightful, and the mountain air is pure and bracing. Game abounds in the Kerrville country, and fishing in the Guadalupe, especially north of Kerrville, is good. Kerrville and the adjoining towns are popular resorts for health and recreation.

## County Court

Judge Lee Wallace convened his first term of court under the new law Monday morning and, although the cases on the docket were disposed of in two days, the term will remain open for three weeks. The following business was dispensed with:

State vs. Cleveland Insall, unlawfully carrying a pistol. Defendant failed to appear. Passed.

Three cases in which no arrests have been made were continued.

State vs. C. C. Vann, aggravated assault and battery. Court disqualified on account of relationship. Attorneys agreed on appointment of Judge Will A. Morris as special Judge to try the case at the November term.

State vs. Hubert Davidson, theft under value of \$50. Tried by a jury of six men, found guilty and penalty fixed at a fine of \$50 and costs.

State vs. Jim Crow and Bob Cantwell, hunting on enclosed lands of another. Indictment quashed on motion of County Attorney.

State vs. Sam Thompson, theft of property under value of \$50. Plea of guilty and fined \$1 and costs.

Judge Ben H. Kelly was up from San Antonio Monday. He has been employed in the prosecution of the Chas. Vann assault case pending in the County Court.

## Kerrville Boy Off to France

Has a Narrow Escape

Just as an American transport loaded with our soldier boys enroute to "somewhere in France" was pushing its way out of New York harbor on July 30th it was rammed and put out of commission by a friendly merchant vessel entering the harbor. A letter from Grady Grinstead to his father, J. E. Grinstead, here states that he was aboard this transport and that by a narrow escape the passengers and crew were rescued and taken to port. Grady enlisted at Ft. Sam Houston in the Quartermaster's Corps. His many friends here are glad that he escaped injury and hope that his voyage may be without further disaster.

## Company D. In Camps.

Company D. First Texas Infantry, Captain Charles J. Seeber commanding, was automatically drafted into the United States Army last Sunday, Aug. 5, and immediately went into temporary camps at the Kerrville Fair grounds, awaiting orders to go to the cantonments at Fort Worth, which will likely be about the 15th of this month. This company now has 110 men and new recruits are still coming in. The boys are being given several hours drill every day and are getting down to business.

The government in putting the ban on saloons, dives, houses of ill fame and gambling within five miles of army camps, posts, etc., has thrown an arm of protection around our soldier boys that no other people in the nation can boast of. In times past the soldier life has been looked upon with a marked degree of disgrace because of the immoral influences that have been allowed to surround them, but in this enlightened day, we are glad to observe, the soldier life is regarded as one of honor and achievement. Will the people and the officers see that these laws are enforced in order that they may have the desired effect? The Federal Government has promised it shall be done and we have given our boys into its care. We await the results hopefully and patiently.

While dire disaster is upon this State, and especially this section, on account of the great drouth, crops of all kinds being a complete failure, it seems we are burdened with the heaviest expenses in our history. With the State taxes 60 cents on the valuation, the highest on record, the heavy war taxes, the calls for the Red Cross, and the highest prices ever known for food supplies and clothing, it seems that there must be an awakening among our people upon the question of industry and economy.

The small sized politician may sneer at the "political preacher," but when the government wishes the people enlisted for Food Conservation, for a Red Cross campaign, or for any other phase of National defense, even to the enlistment of men for the Army and Navy, it calls upon the preachers and churches. The preachers respond to every call of patriotism, to every demand of duty to the country. May they not with equal propriety speak for divorcement of the State from evil, for the dissolution of the present unholy partnership between the Government and the saloon?

If anybody doubts that the world is going dry, let him read the returns from Porto Rico, which voted on prohibition last Monday. Nearly 100,000 votes were cast in favor of prohibition, and a little more than 61,000 against it. When Spaniards, Portuguese, Negroes and half-breeds decide that the saloon is too tough for them to tolerate, it's a cinch that real white folks will not put up with it much longer. — Rosebud Times.

Ex Governor Colquitt says he will not run against United States Senator Sheppard next year, but will seek Culberson's place at the expiration of the latter's. It is doubtful if Sheppard has any opposition at all, and if he does, the only question will be the size of Sheppard's majority. — Texas Mesquiter.

The law is the same against allowing minors in pool halls as it is against allowing them in saloons. And the law is the same against games of chance. Some people don't seem to know this or else don't have a very high regard for the law.

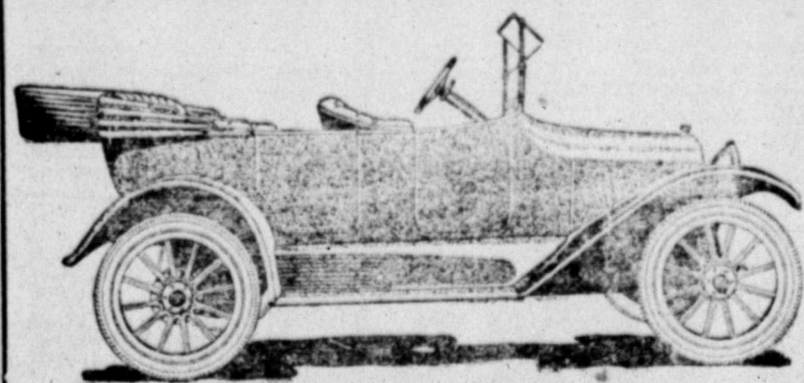

The Government is urging upon the farmers the necessity of planting on unusually large wheat crop for next year. In this section where it seems the range is going to be cut so short by the drouth the necessity for planting a big crop of both wheat and oats is even more urgent in order that the stock may have winter pasturage.

The Presbyterian Encampment which closed its splendid program Sunday night was one of the most successful in its history. It was largely attended and especially by those from a distance. The encampment is one of Kerrville's greatest assets from a moral, social and business standpoint. We wonder if our people fully appreciate this?

The evidence already produced in the trial of the governor at Austin is sufficient to justify his indictment for impeachment. If the legislature fails to indict him, it will be to the disgrace and shame of our great state. The charges so far as they have been taken up have been proven without a single exception and by substantial evidence sufficiently corroborated. The people know the governor is guilty and have known it ever since the former trial when he was convicted and released upon a suspended

sentence, which in fact the verdict amounted to. Some of the members of the House may be so "close" to the governor and may have made such promises and be under such obligations to him as will require them to "stay with" him in the vote to indict. We are anxiously waiting to see who they shall be.

Kerrville as a summer resort is gaining in popularity every year. It is remarkable how many people come here from all sections and even from other states. The cool, delightful climate and pleasant shades on the banks of our beautiful running Guadalupe, make such a lasting impression on the visitors that they are sure to return the next season and bring some one with them.

**VOTE FOR THIS MEASURE.**

The Constitutional Amendment to be voted upon Tuesday, August 21st, is not only a great constructive movement for the future development of the State, but under existing conditions, is the most timely legislation to which the people of Texas could give their support. It provides for the conservation of all Natural Resources of Texas, for the Reclamation of lands subject to overflow, for Irrigation of the lands in those sections in which the average rainfall does not permit the growth of profitable crops and for the Irrigation of all other lands in the State, the productive capacity of which may be increased by irrigation, the storing of storm waters for purposes of power and other beneficial purposes.

The United States Government has long encouraged a national policy in reclaiming lands, particularly in the Western part of our State, by a systematic plan of storing flood waters and using such supplies to irrigate lands that would be wholly unproductive and useless to the country, without water. This policy also contributed to the

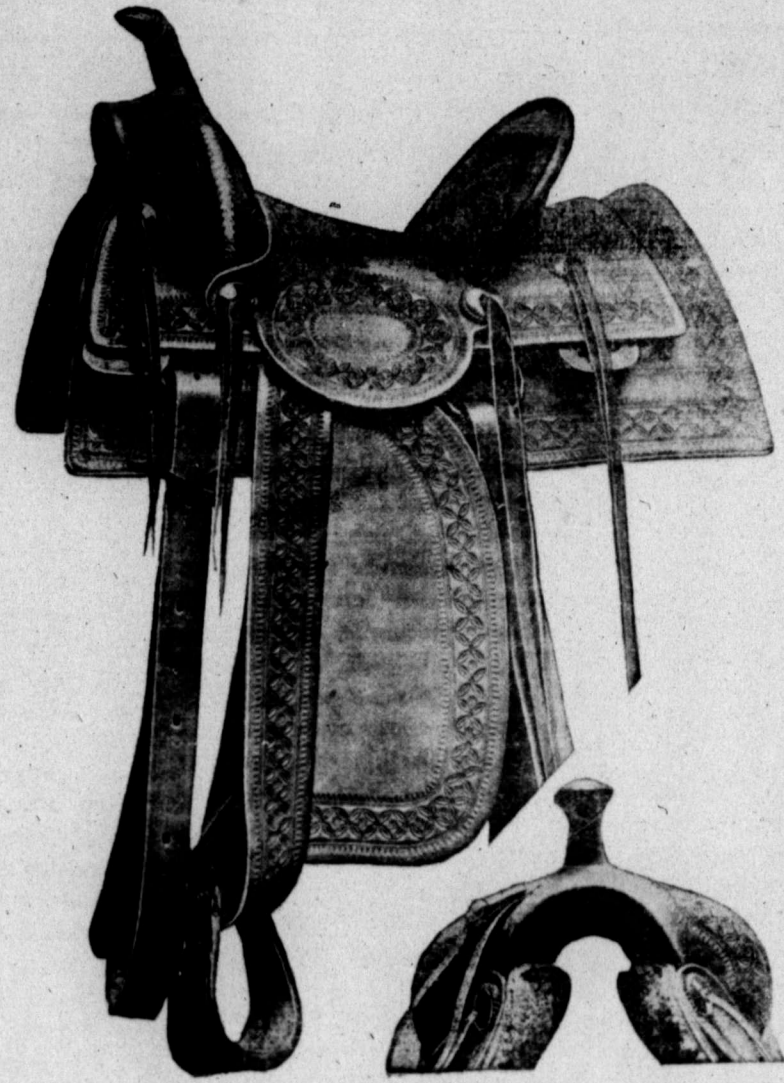
prevention of storm waters in such semi-arid sections from periodically damaging the valley lands of other sections subject to being overflowed.

Texas has both a Reclamation problem in the vast acreage embraced in our river watershed, and an Irrigation problem in the great acreage of the State capable of being made productive on a paying basis only through the use of water stored or procured for irrigation purposes. Up to this time Texas has had no public policy that would combine its problems of irrigation of semi-arid land and reclamation of overflowed lands in a comprehensive, progressive movement. The Amendment to the Constitution to be voted on Tuesday, August 21, is intended to enable the Legislature to provide for the creation of Districts in any part of the State—either large or small, to deal with the problem of conserving the water supply of the State in such a way that it will both develop the agricultural production in one section by irrigation and increase similar productions in other sections by preventing overflows.

It is the most businesslike piece of legislation undertaken since the Constitution was written, and if the Amendment is adopted, the benefits that will be made possible will be felt in every part of the State and by all classes of our citizens. It deserves the active support of every voter.

### Catholic Church Notes

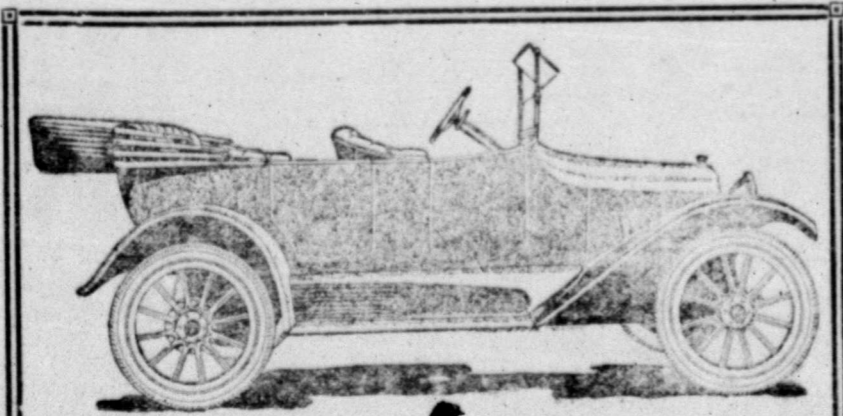
