Thanksgiving Proclamation.

Austin, Tex., Nov. 6.—Governor Lanham today issued the following Thanksgiving proclamation:

Executive Office, Nov. 6, 1905.—I, S. W. T. Lanham, governor of the State of Texas, request the people of the State to observe in every appropriate way Thursday, Nov. 30, 1905, as Thanksgiving Day.

We are each and all dependent upon Almighty God and owe Him our praise and gratitude for the many temporal and spiritual blessings he has bestowed upon us. It becomes us a Christian people to thank Him in our homes and in our respective places of worship for all that He has done for us. We have been blessed "in basket and in store." The health of our people has been graciously preserved. "Goodness and mercy have followed us" and have crowned our efforts in all worthy undertakings. Let us not fail to give our hearty thanks for all the divine favors we have received and devoutly predict that they may continue toward us in the future.

I hereunto sign my name and cause the seal of the State to be hereon impressed at the City of Austin, this sixth day of November, A. D. 1905.

Charged With Piracy.

Houston, Tex., Nov. 6.—Nicholas Jansck, a boatman and fisherman engaged in the handling of fish at Port Lavaca, was arrested on an indictment returned against him by the Federal grand jury, charging him with—together with other parties—plundering the cargo of a ship at high sea.

He was brought to Houston Sunday evening by Deputy United States Marshal J. W. Vann and lodged in the Harris county jail. During the last sitting of the Federal grand jury in Houston an indictment was found against Nicholas Jansck, Clint Walker and Constantine Argo, charging them jointly with committing an act of piracy by plundering the sailing vessel of one Juan Flores on the high seas. Today bonds for all three of the defendants were prepared and submitted to United States Commissioner L. C. Masterson for his approval. The bonds of each in the sum of \$250 were aporoved and the defendants were released from custody during the latter part of the evening.

Fatal Affray at Conroe.

Conroe, Texas, Nov. 6.—At a late hour this evening Walter Montgomery was cut and fatally wounded and Ben Montgomery and

Bob Edwards were slightly wounded. A claim agent of the Santa Fe was in Conroe looking up evidence in a suit brought by Walter Montgomery against that road. His assailant escaped.

To Move County Seat.

Mobile, Ala., Nov. 7.—A posse consisting of 100 heavily armed men, left here early this morning for Bay Minette, where they intend to take by force the court records of the county of Baldwin and carry them to Daphne. Bloodshed is feared when these men reach Bay Minette.

Following the passage of an act of the legislature changing the Baldwin county court house from Daphne to Bay Minette in 1900, an armed body of men from Bay Minette went to Daphne in the middle of the night and took away the entire contents of the court house and jail including fifty prisoners. The men were arrested and the case has been before the supreme court three times. The chancery court in a recent decision gave the county seat to Daphne and Circuit Judge Brown has been attempting to hold court there.

The Bay Minette faction filed a supersedeas bond of \$10,000 taking the case to the supreme court again. Claiming that Judge Brown has no right to hold court at Daphne, Sheriff Armstrong and Court Clerk Vilez have refused for two weeks to attend the court and have been fined daily in sums that now reach a big figure and sentenced to five days' imprisonment in each case.

In the absence of the sheriff a coroner was appointed to take his place and for a week has been attempting to arrest the sheriff and clerk. Tonight matters reached a crisis when 100 men heavily armed and sworn in as deputies by the acting sheriff of Mobile, left on a steamer to proceed to Bay Minette and take back the court house to Daphne. The armed posse left at 2 a. m. and will reach Bay Minette shortly before 3 o'clock. It is feared there will be bloodshed when they attempt to seize the records and take the prisoners from the Bay Minette jail, as a message to this city states that the Bay Minette faction is arming against them.

Killing at Lytle.

Lytle, Tex., Nov. 6.—Pedro Veyegas, a laborer at the Carr coal mines, was shot and killed by Andres Oroasco early this morning.

Oroasco and Veyegas had a difficulty during the night. About six o'clock this morning, as Pedro Veyegas started from his home to the home of his brother, accompanied by Francisco Morales and a brother of Veyegas, they were intercepted by Andres Oroasco, who called to Pedro Veyegas that he wanted him to come there. Veyegas replied that he did not have any business with him. Then Oroasco, according to the witnesses, began to curse and abuse Veyegas, and Veyegas started towards Oroasco when the latter drew his pistol and commenced shooting at Veyegas. Oroasco fired three shots, but only one took effect, which struck Veyegas near the temple. Veyegas fell, but arose and followed his slayer 150 yards, where he fell dead. Veyegas was unarmed, and was well known and thought of in the community.

Will Be a Wreck.

Of all the spectacles arranged for the entertainment of the visitors to the San Antonio International Fair, none has aroused more interest in the public mind than the collision between two big passenger locomotives each weighing 80 tons. It is a spectacle that is going to cost the San Antonio Fair association at least \$10,000 for one minute of entertainment. The promoters of the collision have guaranteed to eliminate all responsibility and to further safeguard the public the smash-up of the engines will take place in the middle of the race-track inclosure, the public being at least a thousand feet away from the place where the engines will meet.

This is one of the exciting things the people of San Antonio have arranged for their fair. Another is the daily flight of an air-ship, costing \$400 for each flight. These are two expensive features, and besides there is the Igorrote village of seventy-five inhabitants. In this village the people of Texas can personally meet and shake hands with their "fellow citizens" of the far-away Philippines. When these Igorrotes made their appearance at St. Louis and made a demand for dog meat to be included in their daily diet the organizations devoted to the prevention of cruelty to animals in the Mound City received a severe jolt. However, when it was explained that canine flesh was essential to the good health of the Igorrotes the objections were brushed aside and the little brown men had their regulation diet.

These are some of the interesting features of the San Antonio Fair which with the passing of years has steadily expanded and in the parlance of the circus fraternity is better and greater than ever before. These are an unsurpassed line of exhibits in all departments and the international aspect of the fair is thoroughly preserved in the large and varied exhibit Mexico is sending. That republic will also be represented by one of its finest fifty-five piece military bands which plays morning and afternoon concerts throughout the exposition.

The racing feature of the fair in which the daily purses run up to \$1,000, is well looked after, for more than three hundred horses will go in the San Antonio meeting. The usual midway attractions will be numerous, some forty already having been assigned space in the section of the ground given over to the midway. Nightly the thrilling spectacle, "Siege of Port Arthur," will be seen.

Killed and Cremated in Menard.

Menardville, Tex., Nov. 5.—George W. Livingston, who recently came to this county, was killed about midnight, November 2, in his camp near Hext, a small place in this county.

Livingston was alone in his camp at the time. He was stabbed in the left side, the blade reaching his heart. He was also stabbed several times in the right side, several ribs being cut.

A cot in the camp was then saturated with oil and the body laid upon the bedding. Wood was piled upon and around the cot and its ghastly burden, and the torch applied.

Friday morning the charred remains were found. The legs and head had been burned from the trunk and the abdomen consumed by the flames. The head showed that Livingston had also received a severe blow on the forehead.

Ennis Stark, a merchant of Hext, stands charged with the killing, but has been released upon \$500 bond.

West Texas Road Charter.

Austin, Texas, Nov. 8.—The charter of the West Texas Northern Railway Company was filed today in the Secretary of State's office. The company has a capital stock of \$500,000 and its general offices are to be located at Big Springs. Its purpose is to build a railroad from Kerrville to Amarillo, a distance of 450 miles. It will pass through Kerr, Kimble, Mason, Menard, Concho, Tom Green, Coke, Sterling, Glasscock, Howard, Dawson, Martin, Lynn, Lubbock, Hale, Swisher, Randall, Potter.

All For the Sake of Love.

New York, Nov. 8.—After following a woman across the continent in a vain attempt to persuade her to marry him, only to see her board a steamer for Europe, Wolter Herlich, an elderly man supposed to be from Lindsay, Cal., committed suicide tonight in a hotel in Hoboken. When Mrs. A. Tilloch, a comely German widow, arrived in Hoboken from Bremen October 19, she told the people of the hotel where she stopped that she was on her way to Lindsay, Cal., to marry a man to whom she was engaged.

On Sunday she returned and said she was on her way back to her home in Germany. The same day Herlich also arrived at the hotel. He was suffering from consumption, for which reason it was understood Mrs. Tilloch had refused to marry him. Yesterday the widow sailed for Bremen and tonight Herlich was found dead, having taken poison.

England's Newest Island.

Aves island, in the West Indies, has been annexed to the British empire. It is rarely visited and little known. Its total length is three-quarters of a mile, and as it rises only about twelve or fourteen feet above the sea, it is not noticeable, even by day, until closely approached.

Gift from a Stranger.

Mrs. C. Durga, of Bethel, Vt., has received \$20,000 by the will of Alfred Burte, of Liverpool, England, almost a total stranger. A few years ago, while Mr. Burte was visiting in Bethel, Mrs. Durga did some writing for him and would take no pay. She had not heard from him since.

Woman to Rule.

Woman's condition today is not only very much better than it ever has been, in point of healthful and happy environment and individual consideration, but it is shown by statistics, both national and municipal, that woman's environment apparently is better than man's. This conclusion may be reached as a result of the study of the figures that show that men in the United States are dying faster than the women.

In the century just passed, woman's condition underwent a tremendous change. Partly through the efforts of the splendid leaders of her own sex, and partly through the better understanding by man of the relative rights and obligations of the sexes, woman has acquired ever-increasing power, until today, if she does not enjoy the suffrage, she exercises a tremendous influence over those who do. There are not wanting observers of the growth of woman's power, through the development which has been permitted to her, who say that the twentieth century will see an even greater change in her relations to society. Mrs. George W. Noble has said that "the private home is the public hope," and woman today enjoys supremacy in the home such as perhaps she never enjoyed.

The development of the woman's club has shown the possibilities that await woman's profitable use of her leisure. It is within her power to be far more thoroughly informed than the average busy man on all important matters of civic interest, and this fuller and clearer information she can employ in directing, even if she does not exercise, the suffrage.

Woman always has had her share of influence, but modern conditions, which the statistics argue insure to her longer life than man, give her also a greater opportunity to make the most of her intellectual and spiritual powers, and thus enable her to become the real ruler of the world.

Great English Layman.

Charles Lindley Wood, second Viscount Halifax, will visit this country next fall. Lord Halifax is about the most widely known layman in the Church of England, being regarded as head of the advanced party in that church. It is expected that during his stay in America he will lecture to the clergy and laity of the Episcopal church. It was Lord Halifax who some years ago went to Rome and had an interview with Pope Leo in the interest of union between the churches of England and Rome.

Which First, Man or Woman?
 It has never been much of a moot point with theologians and metaphysicians whether the man or the woman, the male principle or the female principle, went first in the order of creation. Ward, has very cleverly demonstrated that the female must have gone before man—that the male, indeed, is but a differentiated female, and that from the original female the male has been called into being. First Eve, then Adam, was the order, according to the Ward school.

Now arises Jacques Loeb, the biological wizard of Chicago and California, whose experiments are the talk of the world. Loeb has artificially fertilized the egg of the sea urchin. He has not artificially made the egg. For the production of that the female sea urchin is necessary. But he dispenses with the male, by treating the eggs with acetic, propionic, butyric or valeric acid, mixed with sea water. Professor Loeb develops life in them, exactly duplicating the natural processes in the progress of the egg. His larvae, it is said, cannot be distinguished from larvae produced from natural fertilized eggs.

A demonstration of this sort, supposing it really to be made, must prove that the female principle, as the indispensable foundation of life, the sine qua non of existence, must go ahead of the male principle, the presence of which has something to do with the reluctance of many men of science to accept Professor Loeb's experiments as conclusive. In this situation it seems to devolve upon the women's clubs to come to the rescue of the professor's science credit with their powerful influence.

Librarian Walther writes enthusiastically of the Kerrville Sunshine Library for the Houston Chronicle. Following is the communication:

Sir: I would like to tell the readers of your Sunshine page something of the Kerrville Sunshine Library, which may, perhaps interest them, and with the hope that they may profit by our experience and that Sunshine libraries may spring up in many of our small Texas towns.

Less than a year ago Mrs. Cynthia Westover Alden, whom we all cannot love and praise enough, wrote us that if ten responsible citizens would promise to take care of books sent, she would see that they were forthcoming without cost to us.

This we gladly agreed to do, and today we have close to 800 volumes.

How did we do it in so short a time, you ask? Let me whisper the secret—just American hustle, backed by sympathetic Sunshiners from every State in the Union.

After the books began to come in, and by the way Mrs. Alden will see to that, we raised enough money among our citizens to buy sectional bookcases, a large library table and chairs, pictures for the walls (one of Mrs. Alden hung in the best light), newspapers and magazines for the table, and Sunshine stationery for our correspondence.

Our library is part of a business house, centrally located, size of our room 12x24, walls prettily papered, lace curtains on the windows, furnished with electric lights, all given us, rent free, and open from 7 a. m. to 9 p. m. every day of the year.

We have no salaried officers to pay; every one connected with the society works in the interest of the institution, a labor of love.

Boxes of books come prepaid, and our local expressman delivers them at our door free of charge.

What little money we need for stamps and stationery we meet by a nominal charge of fifty cents a year for the privilege of taking out

books, and there is always money in the treasury.

When more bookcases will be needed our generous citizens will supply the ways and means.

We loan out books to a large membership, and give away hundreds of magazines and are doing a work which is inestimable in the value of its influence for good and increased knowledge.

Our visitors all agree that we have an unusually fine library for so small a town, and we are all proud of it and of Mrs. Alden, whose influence and energy have made our library possible.

Now, this success for Kerrville can be duplicated in any other town equally as well if you only want the library bad enough, but one cannot sit down listlessly and wait for the books to come in. Mrs. Alden will start you, but you must do the rest and do it all the time.

Every book that comes to us, if we know the donor, we write them a letter of thanks, not a hasty, formal letter, but an appreciative one. And that reminds me, I want to ask every one who sends us a book to be sure and write their address on the outside wrapper. We wish to thank you. Do not have any false modesty about this; let us know who you are.

We are going to get a library of 2,000 books, so says Mrs. Alden, and she knows.

If this letter will serve to arouse the interest and enthusiasm of the people of a few places like Kerrville, Texas, to go and do likewise, it will not have been written in vain.
