Held Up and Robbed.

Dallas, Tex., Nov. 26.—The sheriff's posse that went to the Alpha neighborhood late last night to investigate the highway robbery and shooting, returned today without having made any captures. John Lyle, an employe of the Alpha cotton gin, was the victim of the crime. Mr. Lyle told the officers that he had been to Dallas and sold \$185 worth of cotton for his employers and was returning with the money.

When within three miles of Alpha he was stopped by two highwaymen—whether white or black he could not tell—who ordered him to give them his money. Instead, he says, of complying with the demand, he jumped from his wagon and started to run away. The highwaymen fired on him, pursued, overpowered and robbed him, taking the \$185 and some personal effects.

The bullet, apparently from a .38 S&W, passed through the palm of Mr. Lyle's left hand, coming out near where the fingers join the hand, but without breaking any bones. A local physician had dressed the wound when the officers reached Alpha. The search for the highwaymen is being continued by Sheriff Leubert's forces.

Onl. Son of Marshall Field, Chicago's Great Merchant, Dies of Dental Shot.

Chicago, Ill., Nov. 26.—Marshall Field, Jr., died at the hospital at Mercy hospital.

Mr. Field, who was the only son of Marshall Field, the millionaire of this city, was accidentally shot on the night of November 22. He was examining a new revolver which he had purchased, when it was discharged, the bullet striking him in the right side, perforating the liver and spleen and injuring the spinal cord. He was hurried to Mercy hospital where an operation was at once performed, and the bullet removed. The physicians from the first entertained but slight hopes of recovery, although the patient for two days seemed to hold his own. At 9:00 a. m. this morning a decided change for the worse took place and Mr. Field grew rapidly weaker until his death.

Man Jailed on Charge of Robbing Postoffice.

Fort Worth, Tex., Nov. 27.—Ward Rich was jailed here on a double charge of robbing the postoffice and store of Edward Esless at Bedford 6 months ago. The amount of money taken was \$200.

Rich it is alleged, committed a like offense at Paris and was tried and given 2 years. The case comes up in the District Court next week, and will be followed by federal prosecution.

A Faithful Servant.

Sulphur Springs, Tex., Nov. 25. An interesting character met at this conference is the faithful old colored man, Robert Troup, now 79 years of age. According to his statement, he passed through the Confederate war as cook for his master, Mr. Waller Troup, of Columbus, Miss. His master was in the cavalry and in Gen. Price's army. Robert thus makes his statements:

When master and myself started to the war, I promised my mistress that if master got killed I would see that his boy was taken back to her. He also made a similar promise to my wife. I also promised my mistress that no matter what happened I would stand by and faithfully serve him whom I loved like a brother. Towards the close of the war we were captured and I told the Yankees if they took my master they must take me also. I have carried my master's pocketbook, and it often had in it as much as \$1,000 or \$2,000. On the occasion of our capture, I had \$40 in gold, my own money, and I went to the Yankee officer and made a compromise by paying him this \$40 to parole my master and myself. We then went home, and before we were exchanged the war closed.

I have been working for the Methodist people forty-eight years, and have never had any trouble with the white people but I can't get along smoothly with the Yankees.

"All of their humanity is weighted down by the dollar."

"I was the janitor for Bishop Hargrave when he was the pastor at Aberdeen, Miss. I was at Bishop Hoss' church, and I knew in my time all the churches and prominent men of the church in South. For 21 consecutive years I have served as janitor of the North Texas conference, and this session is the first where I have met with the least friction or unpleasantness. Here I find a Yankee as the janitor of the local church, and I can't sorter get along with him, and I am going home and stay rather than cause any bad feelings. I can always get along with Southern gentlemen, but it goes against my raising to associate with Yankees."

Yellow Pine Advances.

New Orleans, La., Nov. 27.—The lumber manufacturers of South Mississippi today gave formal notice of another advance of 50c per 1,000 on yellow pine, in accordance with an agreement in St. Louis.

This is the second advance on yellow pine that has been made since August. No grade of lumber ordinarily used in commerce can now be purchased at less than \$14.50 per 1,000. The price of yellow pine is now twice as much as it was it two years ago.

96 and Still Working.

Berclair, Tex., Nov. 26.—It is a fact not known perhaps beyond the limits of the county that there resides some two miles from this place an aged and respectable man whose checkered life if recorded would prove a volume of interesting reading. Mr. Nathan McDaniel came to Texas from Mississippi some seventy odd years ago, when deer and antelope were as numerous as Hereford cattle are now, and although nearing the century mark of life is a daily visitor to our town riding horseback, hauls his cotton to the gin, supervises the management of his farm, and performs hard manual labor from early morn till dewy eve, and is physically and mentally as strong and nimble as the majority of men of 40 years of age. Considering his age—he is past 96—his vitality is wonderful, and he attributes his longevity and vigor to the non-use of intoxicants, tobacco and coffee.

Cut to Death.

San Saba, Tex., November 26.—In a difficulty at a dance at Tom McCarty's Saturday night Jim Daniels, a young man born and raised in this county, was cut across the breast above the heart to the hollow with a knife in the hands of Aimes Fairchild, who has been in this county this fall picking cotton, but whose home is in Gillespie county. Young Daniels hopped until Tuesday evening about 6 o'clock, when he died from the wound. Fairchild was arrested the night of the cutting by Sheriff Neal, to whom the news came over the telephone shortly after it occurred. Fairchild is here in jail and awaits the death of his victim. It is said Daniels knocked Fairchild down and gave him a pretty severe beating before he could be gotten off, and then after a brief time, came back into the yard and assaulted Fairchild again, and when separated the time he was gone away a while, returned the third time to whip him, but Fairchild was ready with his knife this time and struck him a mortal wound.

Q&A.

Bellevue, Nov. 25.—I. A. Lindshaw, express messenger to the American Express Company, stated tonight that the life of a white man was spared today by the quick work of Engineer Griff. At a point one-half mile this side of Belcher, train No. 3 was coming down the road, and was making good time. An engineer discovered a man lying with his head on the rail. The air was applied, and when the train was brought to a stop, the pilot was only a few feet from the head of the man. The man had to be removed from the track. He appeared to be about 35 years old and held a lot of money in one hand.

Driver Killed in Runaway.

Mason, Tex., Nov. 25.—A sad accident occurred here yesterday. While W. T. Larimore was hauling hay to town, on coming down a hill the horses became frightened and ran into a tree. Mr. Larimore was thrown from the load right under their feet and was kicked and trampled almost to death before he could be extricated. He was taken home, but only lived a short time. He came here from Llano county about a year ago to make his home with his son, W. H. Larimore. He met with this fatal accident on his fifty-ninth birthday.

White Man Cleared Car of All the Negroes.

San Antonio, Texas, Nov. 27.—A little race war took place last night on a car at the Sap terminal for the fair trains. The car was crowded with people, and there was a noisy room for a man to find a foothold on the car. A number of negro men and women were standing at the back of the car and they did considerable grumbling because the white people were not made to give up the last three seats to them.

They were informed that it was impossible to do so, as the crowd was great. One negro woman leaned heavily on the shoulder of a white woman near her. The latter objected and the negro woman replied by slapping her in the face and then sitting down in her lap. The lady signalled to her husband, who was standing on the back platform, and he at once forced his way to where his wife was sitting and pushed the negro woman away. The negro woman then struck him and a free for all fight began, in which the white man was knocked down.

Several negro men then jumped on the prostrated man and commenced kicking him. He struggled to his feet, and in a few minutes had knocked down five negroes. At this juncture a policeman tried to climb through the window of the car, but was thrown to the ground.

One of the negroes drew a knife and attempted to slash the white man, but succeeded instead in nearly severing the finger of a small boy, who was on the car. No one volunteered to help the white man but he finally succeeded in clearing the car of the negroes.

Fought Over Sweetheart.

Atlanta, Ga., Nov. 26.—Dr. O. T. Kenyon, of Dawson, Ga., shot and killed R. E. Dickerson in a quarrel over a young lady here Saturday night and was himself wounded. He was today removed from the hospital to a local hotel. His attending physician, Dr. T. Longino, stated tonight that Dr. Kenyon would recover, as the wound was not necessarily serious.

It is said that just before the shooting Dickerson was seen to swallow enough laudanum to kill

a man and with suicidal intent. Dr. Kenyon will be tried in police court on the charge of discharging firearms within the city limits.

Dr. R. B. Martin, North Louisiana Physician, Victim of Tragedy.

Shreveport, La., Nov. 27.—Dr. R. B. Martin was shot and killed by a negro named Andrew Patterson, near Belcher, about 20 miles North of Shreveport, late this afternoon. Dr. Martin went to the negro's house, accompanied by his son to see Patterson about the payment of a bill. A dispute arose and Dr. Martin left his buggy and started toward the negro, who ran into the house and returned with a shotgun, emptying both barrels at Dr. Martin, killing him instantly. Young Martin fired at Patterson with a single action revolver, but without effect. Two possees are searching the woods for the negro and a lynching is feared.

Died Rather Than Live With Her Husband.

Texarkana, Tex., Nov. 27.—Mrs. Clara Evans, residing on Dukey Ave., killed herself at the home of a brother-in-law this morning by cutting her throat with a razor. She parted from her husband three years ago, and had lately agreed to a reconciliation.

Her husband wanted her to join him in Little Rock, Ark., but she changed her mind last night, saying she would rather die than live with him again, despite the fact that she loved him devotedly. She leaves three small children.

Suit Case Murder.

Boston, Mass., Nov. 27.—Louis W. Crawford and William E. Howard, alias Hunt, pleaded guilty today to charges of being accessories after the fact to the death of Susanna Geary, the victim of the Winthrop suit case tragedy. They will be sentenced later.

Dr. Percy D. McLeod, who had pleaded not guilty to a charge of being an accessory to the crime, was placed on trial. A jury was immediately obtained. The indictment charges McLeod with having been an accessory to the act of performing the illegal operation which resulted in Miss Geary's death, and also with being an accessory to the concealment of the crime.

New Road for San Angelo.

San Angelo, Tex., Nov. 26.—W. J. Miller, a representative of the West Texas & Northern railroad, a company recently chartered, has arrived in this city for the purpose of making application to San Angelo citizens concerning the building of a line of this road through this city, the proposed line starting from Amarillo and going through Big Springs, Sterling City, San Angelo and terminating at Kerrville. The president of this new company is E. P. Speers, a well-known railroad constructor and financier, and the company is receiving substantial backing from Col. C. C. Slaughter of Dallas.

The proposition made the San Angelo Business Club and the city in general was that the right of way through Tom Green county, including depot grounds in San Angelo and a bonus of \$60,000 be given the West Texas & Northern railroad for running said railroad through San Angelo at the end of two years, or, that instead of giving the right of way, Tom Green citizens take \$100,000 stock in the railroad company.

Whether or not this proposition will be taken up by San Angelo will be decided at a special meeting of the Business Club to be held Tuesday night, November 28.

Big Springs has been asked for a donation similar to that of San Angelo, and Sterling City for \$10,000.

The Easy Boss.

A dispute has arisen as to the origin of the title "Easy Boss," as applied to Senator Platt. The phrase was originated by Senator Platt, and was first published in the New York Evening Sun in January, 1895.
