**Shooting at a Dance.**  
Nacogdoches, Tex., April 1.—Last night at a negro dance near the little town of Woden, the eastern terminus of the Nacogdoches Southeastern Railroad, Deputy Sheriff Will Alders was shot and it is feared mortally wounded, a white man by the name of Moody, who was assisting the officer, was shot and instantly killed, and a negro, Dave Taylor, was shot and killed. A strange negro who took part in the shooting made his escape. The trouble started at a dance, which was in progress at Taylor's house. The officer asked Moody to go with him and assist in bringing about peace. It is alleged that Taylor when he saw the officers commanded them to leave his place, that he was capable of running things himself. The officers made an attempt to arrest one of the negroes, when Taylor shot Alders and another negro shot Moody. Moody fell dead at the crack of the pistol. Alders drew his pistol at this time and shot Taylor. The wounded officer is shot through the breast and it is said there is no possible chance for his recovery. The sheriff is in that part of the county, which is twelve miles east of this city, hunting the strange negro who escaped.

**DOWIE IS REPUDIATED.**  
Prophet is Turned Down and Voliva Elected in His Place.  
Chicago, Ill., April 1.—At a meeting today of 5,000 adherents of the Christian Catholic Church at Zion City, of which John Alexander Dowie is the founder and first apostle, Dowie's authority was repudiated and Wilbur Glenn Voliva, who for some time has been conducting the affairs of the church, was elected in his stead.  
Mrs. Dowie also repudiated her husband, and their son, Gladstone Dowie, cast his lot with his mother and the new leader, Voliva.  
Most of the officials of the church were present at the meeting, and many of them denounced Dowie as having deceived the people and wasted their money in extravagance. The meeting, however, refused to hold that he had knowingly erred, and John G. Speicher, the former overseer and, hence, second in command, who was recently deposed, peremptorily declared Dowie to be insane. Mrs. Dowie in her address also upheld that declaration.  
Although Dowie's authority in the church has been repudiated, scores of the industries and homes of Zion City stand upon land the titles of which are in his name.  
Wilbur Glenn Voliva, the new leader, was born in Indiana in 1870 and has been in the ministry of the church since 1889. He was ordained an overseer in 1901 and soon afterwards was sent to Australia.

## NEGRO IS KILLED IN WHITE GIRL'S ROOM.

Intruder Was Approaching the Bed When Girl's Father, Who Was Waiting, Discharged Gun, Causing Death.

Fort Worth, Texas, April 2.—At 11:30 o'clock tonight Prof. F. P. Pruitt, who resides near the Polytechnic College, discovered a negro man in his daughter's room. Professor Pruitt opened fire with a shotgun, emptying the contents into the body of the intruder, which resulted in instant death.

Twice before the entrance which resulted fatally the man has entered Miss Pruitt's room. The first was last August, when Miss Pruitt screamed for help and the negro escaped before he could be identified. The man came again about two weeks ago and, since his last intrusion, Professor Pruitt has slept with his shotgun at his side.

Tonight the negro returned and attempted to effect an entrance at one of the upstairs windows. The noise awakened Professor Pruitt and he attempted to get a view of the negro through the window but was unable to do so. Finding the window locked the man slid down a porch post to the ground and entered through a parlor window, which was unlocked. He made his way upstairs and entered the room of Miss Pruitt, starting toward the bed in which she had always slept. Professor Pruitt waited until the man was within a few feet of the bedside and then fired. The entire contents of the weapon were emptied into his body with stunning force, which resulted in instant death.

It was later discovered that the negro has been working for Rev. Mr. Crowland, who lives in the vicinity of Professor Pruitt's residence. The name of the negro, according to the statements of Rev. Crowland, was Jess Jones.

Officers were called to the scene of the tragedy, although it was impossible to locate the coroner. The body was taken to an undertaking establishment, where it will be held pending final disposition.

### GRAFT RUNNING RIOT.

**Sensation Uncovered in Mississippi—Criminal Mismanagement.**  
Jackson, Miss., March 31.—Startling and appalling charges of graft, drunkenness, brutal treatment of convicts, cruel malfeasance in office, the assassination of a prisoner and a loss of \$40,000 to the State of Mississippi are some of the leading features of the penitentiary committee concerning the management of the Rankin county state farm. The report declares that products of the farm were confiscated without the return of a single cent to the State. The warden is charged with malfeasance in office. The committee found that the whole institution reeked with a piteous account of drunkenness, cruelty and petty forms of graft. It refers to the killing of Crockett as a fiendish murder; and says that after the homicide his dead body remained lying on the ground during a whole day in a storm of rain. One of the officials carried on his excessive drinking to such an extent that he was for several weeks an inmate of the hospital, under treatment for jirium tremens.

### ATE HUMAN FLESH.

Tribes of Chukchis Peninsula Driven to It By Starvation.

St. Petersburg, April 4.—Horrible accounts are reaching here of cannibalism and starvation among tribes inhabiting the frozen arctic plain of the Chukchis peninsula, at the extremity of Asia. Most of the reindeers died of starvation during the winter of 1904-5, leaving the inhabitants without food.

During the last winter whole tribes have died, and members of the Omlnks and Oloiya tribes, when facing starvation, assembled in council and decided that nothing remained but death. They agreed that each head of a family should kill his wife and children and then commit suicide. The tribesmen gathered on a plateau covered with snow and ice and in the darkness of the arctic winter the Spartan decision was executed, not a single member of the two tribes surviving.

More revolting still is the story of what occurred in a family of the Yukahir tribe. A mother and three of her children having died of hunger, the father, surviving daughter and a nephew lived on the remains, and when they were consumed the father murdered the nephew.

A Russian named Dolganoff, who went to the region to buy furs, reported the situation to the authorities at Yakutsk, Siberia. He entered a snow hut of a Yukahir family while the latter were eating the head of a murdered relative.

### MURDERED BY NATIVES.

British Officer Lost His Life in South Africa While Bicycling.

Capetown, April 2.—Reports received from Southern Nigeria give an account of the murder by natives of one of the British officers of the protectorate. It appears that Dr. Stewart, medical officer at Owerri, an out station, was bicycling along the road near the station, and losing his way went on into what was really an unfriendly country. For two or three days no news of his whereabouts could be received, until at last a friendly native came in with the information that Dr. Stewart had been caught by the Ahiras, a powerful race who occupy most of the hinterland. It seems like a strange mingling of civilization, but the reports are to the effect that the man was captured and eaten by cannibals, his wheel being broken and made into trinkets, which were worn by the chiefs at the feast.

## MINUS DIAMOND AND \$700

Illinois Prospector Met New Friend and Was Over-Confiding—Waited While Thief Sped Away.

Houston, Texas, March 31.—Mr. E. L. Hockaday, of Springfield, Ill., who arrived in Houston yesterday on a prospecting tour of the State with his pockets full of money, is now broke in a strange land, and has been forced to wire back home for more money. A warrant has been issued against a former companion of Hockaday's, charging him with theft, and yesterday the officers in New Orleans were wired to be on the lookout for him.

Hockaday met the man in New Orleans. They had never met before, but during the trip to Houston, it is alleged, they became fast friends. Hockaday had \$450 in cash and a draft for \$250 in his pocket, and wore a fine diamond stud valued at \$150. It is alleged that his companion in some manner got possession of the money and gem to take care of, and that the man separated to meet at the Rice hotel at 6 o'clock.

Hockaday was on hand promptly. He waited and waited, but his friend did not appear. At last he became uneasy lest some mishap had befallen him, and notified the officers at the police station. It was then late in the night. The detectives, however, got busy at once and got a trace of Hockaday's friend. They learned that he had a return ticket to New Orleans. An investigation disclosed that he arrived at the depot just about the time the train was leaving for New Orleans, and took passage, and that he was flying swiftly eastward while Hockaday was still waiting at the Rice hotel for him. An affidavit was at once sworn out and the New Orleans officers notified.

### Head Blown Off.

Belton, Texas, March 31.—J. A. Melvin, a substantial and well-to-do farmer, living near Sulphur Springs, while out hunting, killed himself by the accidental discharge of his gun in going through a wire fence. He left home at 10 o'clock and not returning search was made for him, and at sundown his body was found with one side of his head blown off.

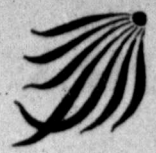

#### TILLMAN'S PLATFORM.

Senator Tillman has sent an address for publication in South Carolina relating to his candidacy for re-election. It is written in characteristic language and deals with the dispensary, or liquor question, which promises to be the main issue in the democratic primary next fall. The senator points out that he believes as strongly as ever in the dispensary system and serves notice that he will conduct his campaign, for re-election along that line and will call to account such of his opponents in the legislature as refused to amend the law so as to prevent future scandals in the purchase of whisky from the state.

#### SPECIAL SESSION ADJOURNS.

The special session of the legislature came to an end Monday night. The anti-blanket primary faction won the fight. The members of the House who made a long and unsuccessful contest for legislation which was not submitted in the Governor's call did not give in until the Senate had passed the decree that it was either accept the Senate bill correcting the general election law or nothing. Rather than permit the law to stand uncorrected the blanket primary advocates finally decided to recede from its position and the bill was carried by 102 ayes to 7 nays.

#### UNSCREW THE TICK.

The common wood tick has been with us since "a time to which the memory of man runneth not back." Almost everybody knows something about the general disposition of the tick, but so common are these insects that but little really scientific investigation of their peculiar physical construction and their habits and mode of operation has been made. Recent careful investigation of this pest has revealed the fact that the sharp head is a tiny screw having threads on it the same as an ordinary wood screw. It has been found that this is the reason that so often in removing a tick from the flesh, the head of the insect pulls off and results often a serious sore. To avoid this the tick may be taken firmly between the finger and thumb and turned to the left as any other screw would be, when it can be removed without pain. This hard "bill" of the tick with its infinitesimal threads is of the consistency of horn, and ranges in size from the neurologically small point of the seed tick to that of the larger ticks which is easily discernible with the naked eye. A movement is now on foot to form a stock company for the purpose of growing ticks to supply screws for making watches and other intricate machinery.

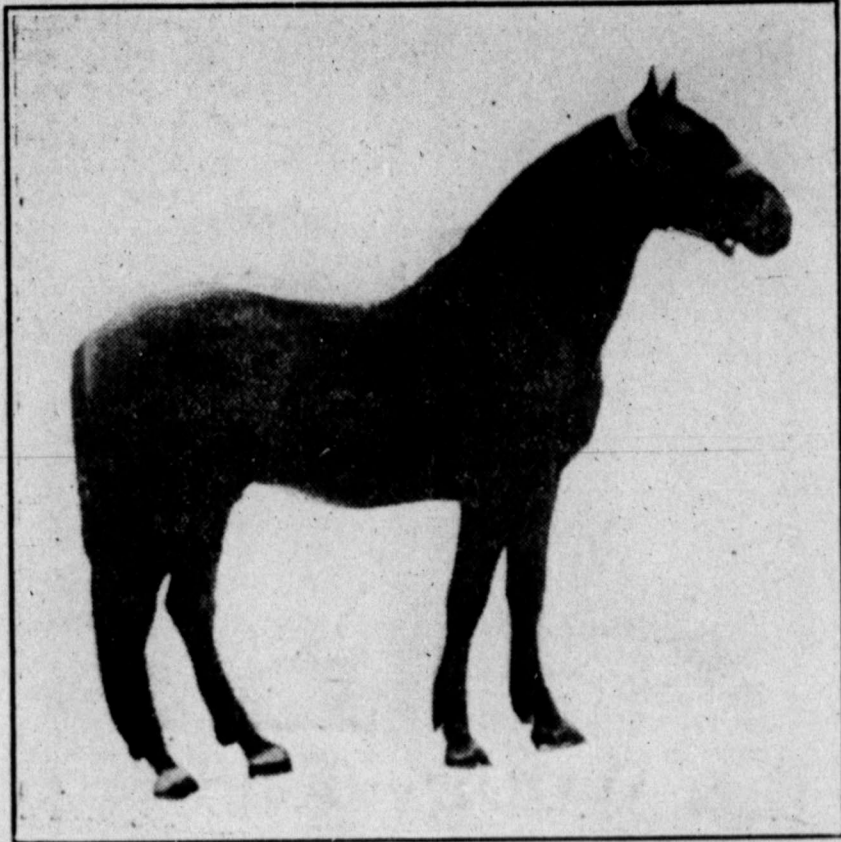

## TEXAS NEWS NOTES. AROUND THE WORLD.

Good rains are reported in many parts of the State.

A Shetland pony colt was foaled at Rule last week only twenty-three inches high.

The majority of the senate investigating committee made a report exonerating Robbins and Stephens.

Bud Ham shot and killed John Brown at Alvord Saturday. On a previous occasion Brown had wounded Ham.

The receipts of the State treasury from the sale and lease of public lands for the month of March were \$227,214.81.

Affidavit has been filed charging Bank Cashier Lang of West with embezzlement. He was lost track of at Houston.

The public buildings bill will carry \$20,000,000. Houston gets \$250,000 and the present post-office and site.

Two hundred bales of cotton were burned at Hico Sunday, supposed to have been fired by sparks from a passing engine.

New Yorkers have made a proposition to Austin to rebuild the dam for \$4,000,000, same to be paid in forty annual installments.

The senate and house adopted the resolution commending the attitude of the Texas congressmen on the National quarantine bill.

Tom Young, a white man, was hanged at Georgetown March 30th in the presence of 5,000 people. Albert Johnson, a negro, was hanged at Waxahachie.

Jack Wilson, who played right field on last year's Austin baseball team, has signed with Fort Worth this season for the same position, and will be the Panthers' playing captain.

Clarence M. Stark, a wealthy Missourian, who had been in San Antonio about three months, mysteriously disappeared last Sunday night while visiting Hot Wells with his wife.

United States Marshal Hanson, of Houston, and Frank Dodson, of St. Paul, have purchased El Canaya ranch, 80 miles above Tampico, Mexico, consisting of 30,000 acres, the consideration being \$200,000.

Another Smith county boy was bitten by a mad dog Monday, and his father, George Verner, carried him to the Pasteur institute at Austin. J. W. Denton and daughter and Rosalee Gandy, bitten ten days before, are still taking the Pasteur treatment.

The suspension in the anthracite mines will affect 175,000 men.

Of 17,000 men now employed on the Panama canal about 1500 are Americans.

Theodore Price's statistician, touring the cotton belt, says cotton is backward and labor scarce.

The miners and operators in joint conference reached a disagreement, which will throw 500,000 men out of employment.

Secretary Hester reports the movement of cotton for the week at 137,327 bales, a decrease of 103,000 under last year same week.

Judge Truly is a candidate for governor of Mississippi. He can sign his name "Yours Truly," and not be guilty of deceit or false pretense.

By a vote of 202 to 26 the House on Tuesday passed the National quarantine bill, placing the control of all quarantine stations, grounds and anchorages under the Secretary of the Treasury.

Exports from the United States to Mexico during 1905 of lumber, rough and finished, and of manufactures of wood of various sorts amounted in value to \$4,357,000 in United States currency, the highest figure ever reached in this trade.

J. Wesley Ankius, pastor of Faith Tabernacle, Philadelphia, is held in \$2,000 bail for the action of the grand jury as an accessory to the fact in the death of Grace Bates, a child who died of typhoid fever. Ankius is a "faith curist."

All the coal mines of Kansas, Missouri, Arkansas, Indian Territory and Oklahoma are idle, the miners having struck for the payment of the scale of 1903. These mines employ 25,000 men. It is expected that numerous operators will sign the scale soon.

The House Committee on Immigration has agreed to report a bill making restrictive amendments to the immigration laws. The measure, it is understood, will establish educational tests and more strict physical examinations as well as certain age qualifications.

Tables compiled from government reports show that the automobile has not produced as yet even the beginnings of a horseless age. In 1904 there were 17,057,702 horses in the United States, as against 14,213,837 in 1890. The export price averaged \$308.99 last year, as against \$174.50 in 1802.

## CZAR SENDING TROTTER HERE.

[Texas Stockman Journal.]

Dr. T. L. Armstrong of Indianapolis, who is temporarily stationed at Fort Worth by the United States government, is in receipt of advices that there is to be a mare sent from Russia to Indianapolis to be bred to Sydney Dillon, the sire of Lou Dillon, the champion trotter of the world. Sydney Dillon is owned by Sterling R. Heit, a friend of Dr. Armstrong.

The cost of sending the mare from Russia to Indianapolis and returning her to Europe will be \$2,000. Lou Dillon, of which Sydney Dillon is the sire, trots a mile in 1:58 and it is with the hope of getting such a colt that the Russian is going to so great an expense.

Dr. Armstrong is a horse enthusiast himself. He established the Indianapolis Horse Exchange years ago, and is the owner of Jipse Queen, an animal he has brought to Texas to take part in some matinee trotting races. He states that there is a great future in Texas for standard bred horses.

"Texas is already beginning to buy a few high grade trotting horses and I expect to see more of these horses sold here every year," said Dr. Armstrong. "There is no climate anywhere in the United States which is better adapted to breeding fine horses and to developing them than Texas, and it is only a question of securing the proper breeds.

"Some idea of what the Texas farmers can do by getting high bred stock can be obtained," said Dr. Armstrong, "when I tell you that there was a filly sold at Indianapolis last week for \$5,000 was raised on a farm by a man who worked his horses and only had a few of them. Of course this is an exceptional instance, but there are hundreds of horses being marketed every week in Indianapolis for \$250 and upward that are raised with as little expense as is incurred in raising ponies which sell for \$40 and \$50.

Dan Patch, the champion pacer of the world, was also raised in the state of Indiana by a small farmer and breeder. He was sold by the original owner for \$20,000 and was subsequently sold for \$60,000. Since then an offer of \$130,000 has been refused for him. He paces a mile in 1:55 1/2.

Dr. Armstrong says that the trotting horses are now supplanting the draft horses for farm work, because they stand the heat better and get around faster. He is an enthusiast upon the trotters and paces and thinks that the Texas farmers could reap great profits by breeding their horses to the best blooded animals to be found.

### Dislocated Neck Restored.

El Paso, Texas, April 2.—Mrs. Stormy Jordan, of Marshall, Texas, fell from bed and dislocated the fifth cervical vertebrae, and, with her neck virtually broken, walked around for several days before the nature of the accident was discovered. Doctors got it back into place and she will live. Had the bone moved a fraction of an inch more, the spinal cord would have been broken and she would have died instantly. Doctors say her escape was miraculous, and the accident one of the rarest in medical history.

### IS THERE MONEY IN POULTRY AND EGGS?

According to the report of the United States Commissioner of Agriculture, we find the following information:

The United States now produces \$500,000,000 worth of poultry and poultry products annually.

New York State alone consumes \$48,000,000 worth of poultry and eggs annually.

The egg industry is worth \$150,000,000 each year than all the dairy products of the nation.

The poultry industry is more generally pursued than any other, and the poultry products are more than any other single crop.

The egg crop last season was \$52,000,000 more than the wheat crop; \$105,000,000 more than the swine crop; \$30,000,000 more than the cotton crop; also \$112,000,000 more than we spent for schools, and three times as much as all interest paid on mortgages during the year; and yet there are people who look upon the poultry business as "small potatoes."

The Armour Packing Co. have 57 poultry houses and farms scattered through the country, and are now fattening and killing more than 10,000 chickens a day; and W. J. Murray, manager of their poultry and egg department, says they will be killing 200,000 a day within two years.

The retail price of an ordinary dressed fowl is about 16 2-3c per pound; an average hen dressed weighs 2 3-4 pounds; the hen fed 21 days with a cramming machine will dress 6 pounds, and is sold at 24c per pound, making her bring \$1.40 instead of 40c, and it takes 15c to 18c worth of food to put the additional weight on her.

Does it pay to raise hens? Ask Mr. Chas. W. Armour, the head of the Kansas City department.

Does it pay to raise eggs when you can sell them as yard eggs the year round at 25c per dozen? Let's see: It takes about 1 bushel of ground mixed grain, mixed with 3 gallons of separated or skimmed milk to feed 365 hens for one day; this feed will cost about 60c, and the hens will lay about 144 eggs, and at 25c per dozen brings \$3.00. Separated butter milk is usually worth about 20c per 100 pounds at the creameries, or 3 gallons for 5c. A good average hen will lay about 500 eggs in her life time. She can then be fattened and sold for enough to buy three young unfattened laying hens; so you see it is easy to keep up the laying stock by selling off the old hens.

Lavaca county shipped \$140,000 worth of poultry products last year. One firm in Yoakum shipped 22

solid cars of eggs during the egg season last year. Cuero shipped 17 cars of dressed turkeys last season. One merchant in little old Yorktown last season bought and sold 20,000 live turkeys, 8,000 chickens and 1,138 cases of eggs. San Antonio consumes about 110 car loads of eggs in one year. A car of eggs is 400 cases, or 12,000 dozen.

There is also money in storing eggs.

### JAPONICA FLASHES.

We are having cloudy threatening weather this week, but no rain of any account has fallen yet. Small grain is promising, but it begins to need rain. The earliest corn planted is ready to be plowed.

A crowd of patrons and friends of Japonica school assembled last Friday to witness the closing exercises of the same. The pupils of the school acquitted themselves with credit, and there is general satisfaction over the way the school has been conducted.

Miss Nichol's school on South Fork also closed on the 30th ult. On Tuesday night following Miss Nichol and her pupils gave an exhibition which we learn was quite a success.

Sam Banta of South Fork visited North Fork Monday. Like Saul of old he was hunting his father's run-a-way mule. Mr. Banta was not so fortunate as to meet a real prophet to tell him where he would find the mule, nevertheless he got the animal.

Morris Brothers have been buying cattle on the river this week.

Ed Sublett and family are paying a farewell visit to relatives and friends on the river before departing to California, where they expect to make their future home.

Mr. and Mrs. Alva Joy were visitors at ye scribe's on Sunday.

The Christian people had services at Uncle Dick Joy's on Sunday. R. V. Small of Kerrville conducting the same.

### THE CIVIC LEAGUE.

When I received an invitation from the Ladies' Club to meet with them at Pampell's Opera House to organize a Civic League, for the purpose of co-operating with the city authorities in the work of better sanitation, etc., I felt that common courtesy demanded that I do so, and I went. I understood that something like a hundred invitations had been sent out, and I expected find quite a good crowd present. In this I was disappointed. Including members of the Ladies' Club there may have been fifty persons there. Perfecting a temporary organization, the meeting adjourned. Notice of a second meeting was given through THE MOUNTAIN SUN, and at that meeting the number present was but very little if any larger.

Now, what is the matter? Do the people of Kerrville consider the sanitary condition of the city so good that it is not necessary for them to do anything, or that the organizing of a Civic League, composed of the good women of the Ladies' Club and others interested is not the proper way to secure the desired results?

No one doubts for a moment but what the city authorities will do their whole duty, but is it possible for them to do as much alone as they will be enabled to do with a live, zealous, active organization co-operating with them, and a strong, educated public sentiment to encourage them?

From what I have seen and heard on the streets, I was led to believe that the sanitary conditions in the city could be improved. In fact, there appeared to be a rather strong demand for a sanitary crusade in Kerrville—so strong that the State health officer had been requested to visit the city and assist the local authorities.

If this is true, why this indifference? Do the people of the city expect the authorities to do everything? Do they consider themselves free from any responsibility in the matter?

If there are sources of infection in the city causing disease, will it not be well to seek them out, and, as far as possible, get rid of them? If there is nothing of that kind will it not be well to prove the fact, and put a stop to the apparently prevailing belief? It would appear to be a very necessary and praiseworthy movement.

The first object of the Civic League, I am informed, is to do what they can to promote the health of the people of the city. This appears to me a very commendable purpose. In promoting the health of the people they will incidentally contribute to their prosperity and happiness. Surely no one can object to that. Then why not help? Why not join these good ladies in their noble work?

There is no desire nor intention to stir up any excitement. A sincere, deliberate purpose to do what they can to make Kerrville a model city in the way of health, good streets and sidewalks and attractive homes, appears to be the impelling motive. A calm, cool, serious desire to confer benefit actuates them. Then why not encourage them? I am fully satisfied of the unselfishness of those who inaugurated this movement, and I give them my humble tribute of praise.

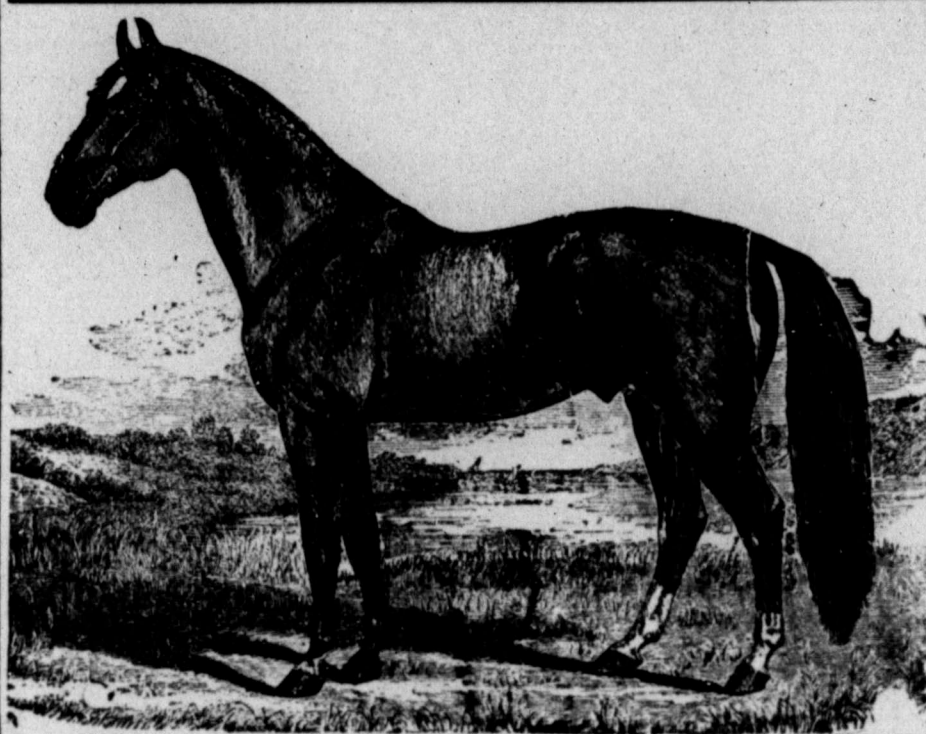
