PLATFORM OF JUDGE GREEN

WHO IS THE DEMOCRATIC CANDIDATE FOR STATE SENATOR.

Judge Robert B. Green, Democratic candidate for State Senator in this District, in his speech accepting the nomination before the convention held in this city on August 24th, fully discussed the platform upon which he is making the race.

He advocates a fair and equitable system of taxation which will furnish the necessary revenue to administer the government economically and maintain it upon a upon a cash basis.

He advocates a system of juvenile courts, designed to protect and reform juvenile offenders.

He believes that short-term convicts should be employed upon public roads, and that prisoners confined pending trial not charged with heinous or grave crimes, should be permitted to work upon county roads, if they so desire, allowing them the time they work on the county roads as a part of their term in case of conviction, or giving them a reasonable compensation for their work if they are acquitted, in order that they may not be turned into the world beggars, if declared innocent of the charges on which they are tried. He believes that such a system would tend to speedily procure good roads throughout the State of Texas.

He believes that a greater part of the public revenue should be devoted to the maintenance and betterment of our public schools, to the end that we may secure nine months school terms and graded schools throughout the State of Texas.

He advocates a revision of the Terrell election law, which will remove the burdensome and complicated features and at the same time maintain the purity of the ballot.

He advocates better care for our insane, to the end that they may be properly cared for in our asylums and in no event confined in our jails.

His views on the liquor question were fully expressed in his speech accepting the nomination for State Senator as follows:

"I am opposed to State prohibition and to the submission of such an issue. I am opposed to a uniform license. Malt liquors should not be taxed as high as alcoholic liquors. The lighter drinks should be taxed less than the strong drinks. A man who desires to engage solely in the sale of malt liquors should not by necessity of law be compelled to sell strong alcoholic drinks.

"Gambling houses, policy shops, variety theaters and dance halls where women are allowed to conduct themselves in a lewd or lascivious or indecent manner or where the vagrant, vicious and criminal class are allowed to congregate and hatch crime, should be suppressed. Disreputable places and dives that serve as pitfalls for

young girls and children should not be allowed.

"Opposition is not so much to liquor itself as it is to the manner in which a few saloons are run. A saloon run in a reputable, orderly and lawful way does not create opposition. Opposition to the liquor interests has been caused by some men conducting in connection with their saloons gambling hells and brothels. Eliminate gambling and prostitution from the saloon business and you will never hear any prohibition talk at all. Those who sincerely stand for the suppression of these evils are the best and only practical anti-prohibitionists.

"Those of us who oppose prohibition have a right to demand that these evils be stamped out so as not to endanger the enactment of sumptuary laws.

"The saloon men who run their places in a lawful and reputable and orderly manner are entitled to have these evils suppressed so as not to jeopardize and bring into disrepute their business. The public too often fails to locate the fault against the guilty individual but simply charges it against the saloon business.

"All citizens have a right to demand the suppression of these evils because of their inherent wrong and vice and so that the prohibition question can be put to rest forever and they not be forever and continually confronted with this agitation.

"Those who have studied this question and watch the state of public opinion on this matter agree that the trouble lies in the existence of these evils in a few saloons and places where liquors sold and they all agree that the proper solution of this question is the absolute, complete and entire elimination of these evils from the liquor interests.

"To this end the saloon men have nationally, in the State and in their local communities frequently met and firmly determined and resolved that these evils shall cease and they are entitled in their pursuit of a licensed and legal business to have the officers suppress these evils.

"The brewers and wholesale liquor dealers have likewise determined that these evils shall cease and to that end they have in our own state contributed thousands of dollars annually for the employment of special officers, detectives and attorneys to suppress these evils.

"These institutions are large tax payers and they are entitled to have the law enforced in regard to these matters without being required to spend other large sums to enforce laws, the violation of which endanger and injure their business.

"I have stood for the enforcement of these laws. I have actually enforced them and in doing so I have had the active and hearty co-operation of the brewers and best saloon men in my county. Let us all join in demanding and in requiring our officials to enforce the laws and put at rest forever this bitterest of all contentions the prohibition question."

Judge Green has suppressed gambling and dives in San Antonio and Bexar County, and in so doing earned the enmity of the lawless element in that county, which constitutes his main opposition there.

Judge Green has been County Judge of Bexar County for the past six years, and his honest and efficient administration of the affairs of Bexar County have won the admiration of all good citizens of Bexar County, and the ability displayed by him in the performance of his duties of this office should be sufficient assurance to the people of this Senatorial District that they will be ably represented in the State Senate of Texas if he is elected.

Reminded of Other School Days and Other Games.

Now I guess no one will read this who don't know more about "field day" than I do, but for fear some fellow might want me to just blurt out the undecorated facts in the case, I will just say that "Field Day," according to my impression is about a half day of playing so hard that it would break the average boy's heart if you called it work.

I am not going to try to tell all the things it is good for, but just a few. In the first place it is a fine thing to create school pride in the hearts of the pupils. branch, because I dropped my slate there one day and broke a piece off the corner, and another time I lost a blue law in the grass at the same place. So on we go, following the old land marks, across the creek on a little old wobbling foot bridge, up a steep hill, on through a pasture. Here we emerge from a grove of trees and stand for a moment looking about us and you say "are you sure this is the place?" Yes, see the big walnut tree that stood near the corner of the school house, yonder is the crab apple thicket and the spring branch. Look over this way, see the big stump? That used to be the great wild cherry tree that the boldest rascal among us was afraid to climb to the top of. Don't you remember, that used to always be one base when we played black-man and prisoner's base. They cut the tree down and sawed it up when cherry became a valuable timber for furniture makers. But yonder stands the old crooked burr oak where Kate fell and broke her arm. Oh, you remember Kate don't you, and you remember the day when she overheard you use some bad language and came to you and told you that no gentleman should say such things—you remember how you felt after school that day when she ignored you and walked along with some other girls and wouldn't let you carry her slate and basket to where the roads forked, as usual. And how on your lonely way home after you passed the parting of the ways, you made a vow that you would be a man. Of course you do, and a thousand other things. As we stand silently by contemplating the trees and bushes about the old school ground, while the autumn sun burnishes the leaves with bright and glorious color, you do not speak for a long time, thirty or forty years have elapsed, since you were there. The old log house with its weather-boarded gables and three windows in each side, is gone into history. The old stove with its pile of bricks under the back end, in lieu of the legs that were broken when two big boys over-turned the stove in a scuffle is gone. The school master is not standing at the window to rap on the glass with a pencil to call you into books, because he had no bell. But in your mind you can hear the lusty voices of a bunch of early comers. The boys playing "three-cornered cat" and the little girls playing "ring around the roses." The children come trooping in from every direction, the teacher raps on the window, and there is a scuffling of feet while the bright-faced boys and girls get to their seats, then all is still, and a squirrel sitting on the old Burr Oak where Kate broke her arm sets up a chattering and you wake from the reverie and say, "where are they now?" as if but a

moment had elapsed since you saw them, and I answer, "they are scattered far and fled," but the old school spirit still lives in our hearts. You and I old friend have been bound in the insouuble bond of friendship, since the day right on this spot you did a wrong and and when called upon stood up before the school, with flaming face, and confessed it like a man, while I got whipped soundly in body but not broken in spirit, by a big coward, because I called him down for taunting a little orphan girl about her ragged shoes. Right then we learned to measure men and women by the standard of real worth, and it made us friends for life and has made thousands of other staunch friends. You ask what is this hallowed feeling that comes over us as we stand here? It is the school spirit. It is our reverence for our second mother, the old place where we went to school, where they made men and women of us and our school mates by developing every bit of good there was in us. In thousands of school houses about the country today they are making men and women. Some where two boys are being trained to take our places when I shall lay down the pencil and you shall let your mantle of ermine fall upon some younger man who has become wise in the law. They will be able to do the work and do it well, because they are getting better training. The teacher has got more to do it with. More books, better methods and newer ideas of education and they have a "Field Day." I say, hurrah for field day. All work and no play makes Jack a dull boy. It ought to be mixed, and field day is a fine way to mix it.

They had field day when I was a boy. I was not certain of it when I began writing, but I know it now. The girls didn't play basket ball, but they played base. The only thing we knew about a pig skin was when mother peeled the hide off a boiled ham at the back kitchen door Saturday evening, so we didn't play foot ball, but we played town ball and ball pen. Oh, yes, we had field day I know now and I am glad of it; and I am glad the boys and girls have it now and it is better than it used to be. When ever there's a field day I'm going and if the boys want to pull off their hats and throw them in the air and yell when the flag runs up the pole. Let them do it, and I will join them. But ho, here, it's getting dark and I will miss my supper and probably cause some other old fellow to miss his, reading about old times, and then say that fellow-Bowles is a long winded rascal, must have practiced at hare and hounds when he was a boy. So with good wishes for all the boys and girls in Texas and a warm place in my heart for field day I yield the pen.

ELECTION MATTERS.

The general election will be held on Tuesday, November 6, 1906. The new method of voting is not generally understood. At Kerrville the vote will be heavy and it will require steady voting all day for one set of officers to handle the election. Every one who possibly can should vote as early in the day as possible, in order that none may be deprived of the privilege of voting.

Of course the method of voting is new to voters, but a little study of the following will make the matter easy:

The latter part of Section 53 of the Terrell election law says in substance, "When a voter desires to vote a straight ticket he shall run a pencil or pen through all other tickets on the ballot, making a distinct marked line through such tickets as he does not intend to vote. If he desires to vote a mixed ticket he shall run a pencil through the names of candidates on his ticket, for whom he does not wish to vote, and writing the name of candidates for whom he desires to vote in the blank column."

If, however, the name of the man you want to vote for is on the ticket in another column you simply leave that name not scratched. A blank form of the official ballot is posted in the office of the county clerk for public inspection and every voter who does not fully understand the process of voting should go there and acquaint himself with it.

AS OFTEN stated heretofore the Sun is never violently and unfairly partisan. Of course we are supporting the Democratic nominees, as we should properly be expected to, but not otherwise than on political principle. An effort has been made, however, not by Judge Green's opponent, but by a certain element in Bexar county, to circulate a report that Judge Green has allowed gambling to be resumed in San Antonio since his campaign for State Senator opened. In fairness to Judge Real, we state that we will not believe that he has countenanced such a statement. In fairness to Judge Green we state upon good authority that when he returned from Bandera county and was told that some gambling houses had reopened in San Antonio during his absence, he said: "I believe my fight on gambling hells and brothels is right. If it was right two months ago it is right today, and whether I am elected or defeated I shall do my official duty, as I see it, by telling the grand jury all I know, and I will see that they are closed if proof is sufficient." In this matter Judge Green showed true manliness and is entitled to due credit. Those who vote against him should do so on principle and not on account of wrong impressions. Judge Real is a citizen of Kerr county and is entitled to our respect and esteem, and without questioning or consulting him, we have no hesitancy in stating that he had no part in circulating such reports and is not in sympathy with such unjust political methods.
