ELECTION NEWS.

LIGHT VOTE CAST THROUGHOUT THIS DISTRICT.

Latest returns from other counties show that Judge R. B. Green, (Dem.) of San Antonio, was elected State Senator by a majority of about 1000. The total vote of Bexar county was less than 4,500 and of this Judge Green's majority was 1683. Judge Green also carried Bandera county by about 275 majority, giving him aggregate majorities in those counties of approximately 2000 over Judge Julius Real, (Rep.). Judge Green's opponent, Real carried Kerr county by 64 majority, Kendall by 150 and Gillespie by over 700, making his aggregate majorities in those counties approximately 950, giving Green a majority in the district of 1000 to 1100.

J. E. Grinstead (Dem.) was elected Representative from the 98th district without opposition.

C. C. Harris was elected District Attorney, 38th Judicial District, defeating J. A. Eames by a good majority.

James L. Slayden was elected in the 14th Congressional District by a rousing majority.

JUDGE WELCH ASSASSINATED

Shot Through the Heart by a Midnight Assassin at a Hotel in Rio Grande City.

Rio Grande City, Tex., Nov. 6.—District Judge Stanley Welch was assassinated in his bed last night by an unknown person. District Attorney Kleiber occupied an adjoining room and went to awake the Judge about 8 o'clock this morning. He found him stiff and weltering in blood.

The bullet entered over the left nipple and was found in the bed. Death was instantaneous. He roomed in a detached building of two rooms with lumber floor. The windows and doors were open.

Kleiber and neighbors heard a pistol shot about 1 o'clock a. m., but paid no attention to it.

The election has been disorderly. Judge Welch stayed here over election expressly to preserve order and keep peace.

The supposed murderer was run after by officers when the shot was fired, they not knowing at the time what had happened until the body was found this morning about 8 o'clock. No clew.

Complete Election Returns.

The general election passed off quietly in Kerr County. The vote was not quite full, but a very good vote was polled as compared to that cast in neighboring Counties. The chief interest in this County was centered in the Kerrville box, which is always considered the battle grounds in county contests. The day was perfect and everybody was in a good humor and the big biennial session of excitement passed into history with no special occurrence to make it memorable. The election resulted in no change in the Kerr County Commissioners' Court except in its presiding officer, Judge Lee Wallace, who succeeds Judge Julius Real. E. H. Turner was re-elected Justice of the Peace of Precinct No. 1, by a vote of 229 to 69 for T. M. Bradwell. Henry Staudt was elected Constable of Precinct No. 1, by a majority of 117 over both his opponents.

Judge Welch resided at Corpus Christi. He leaves, besides his wife, a grown daughter and five small children.

He was 55 years old and was born and raised in New Orleans. He fought bravely in the Confederate ranks during the Civil War and removed to Corpus Christi, where he became a great friend of Edmond J. Davis and was at Austin during the latter's term of office. During the Davis-Cock contest for control of the capital he was in command of the Davis police. When Davis was ousted he came to San Antonio and was for a time city editor of the Express. In 1879 he retired to Corpus Christi and became the law partner of John McCampbell.

At a Fourth of July celebration he lost his arm by the premature explosion of a cannon. Eight years ago he was elected District Judge to succeed Judge John C. Russell. He had been married three times. He was recognized as one of the ablest, most eloquent and most fearless lawyers of Southwest Texas. He was widely known throughout the State. He and Judge James B. Wells were close personal friends, and his death resulted on account of activity on behalf of the Wells ticket in the present election.

The officers are absolutely with-

out a clue as to his assassins and the mystery is the sole topic of conversation here. The victim was shot in the back and in all probability died without awakening.

The departure of the funeral train Wednesday was witnessed by the entire population of Rio Grande City. The body was accompanied by District Attorney Kleiber and James B. Wells to the former home of deceased at Corpus Christi. The rangers detailed for service on the case are expected to arrive today, when the investigation into the crime will be diligently prosecuted.

Missouri Democratic.
St. Louis, Mo., Nov. 7.—From nearly complete returns from all counties the Democrats have car-

ried the State by a plurality of 7640, electing all candidates on the state ticket and twelve of the congressmen. The Republicans elected congressmen in Kansas City and St. Louis, but lost all the districts in the State, which had been swept into the Republican ranks two years ago.

John N. Garner Elected.

Uvalde, Tex., Nov. 7.—Reports here indicate that John Garner has carried every county in the district except Guadalupe and Zapata. The vote in the district was tight, but the majority is likely to be more than ever before. Congressman Garner is well pleased with the result, considering the hard fight and organized effort made against him by the Republicans.

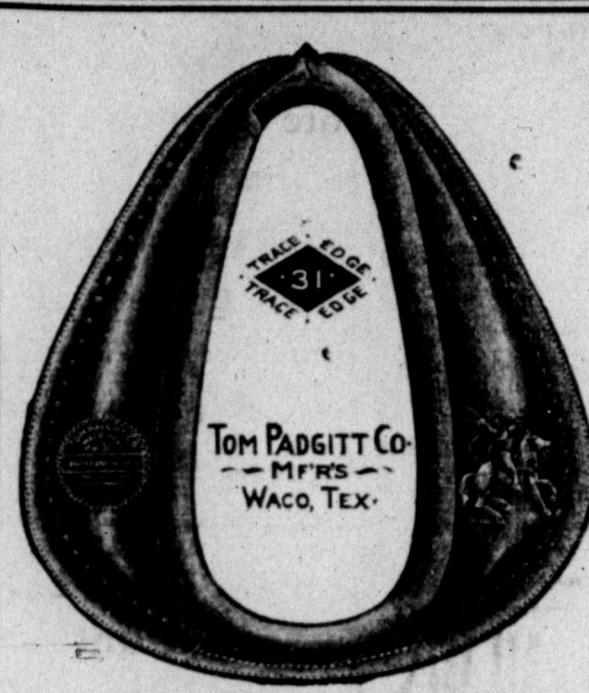

HOOKED ON A "PERSONAL."

New York Husband Seeks Separation and Wife Seeks Enduring Alimony

J. Edward Camp and his wife, who now lives in West Ninety-Six Street, appeared yesterday before Supreme Court, Justice Bischoff in counter suits for separation and filed a bundle of affidavits telling the story of their marital troubles from the opposite point of view.

Camp, whose wife asserts that he has income of \$10,000 a year, saw this "personal" in a newspaper in December, 1904:

"Cultured, attractive widow (39), means, social position, desires meeting matrimonially inclined gentleman of wealth and refinement: triflers ignored. S. W. 56.

He answered and meetings led to the woman who yesterday had him up as defendant in her application for separation, "reasonable" alimony and counsel fees. Camp's answer includes a counter claim for separation.

Camp says he believed at first the advertiser's statements that she was 39, had stocks and no debts and a high social position. But after marriage, Camp asserts, he found out that he had been sadly deceived. She was at least 45 years old," he complains, "and was incumbered with numerous debts, which I was obliged to pay.

Camp represented to her that he was manager for a shirt manufacturing house at 83 Franklin Street at a salary of \$8000 to \$10,000 a year. At first everything went swimmingly, she says, but later Camp cut down her allowance to almost nothing and began to treat her cruelly, so that she lost all her previous good looks and good health. When she complained he threatened to get a "yellow journal" divorce.—New York Sun.

Penalty Severe on Negro Soldiers.

The unprecedented action on the part of President Roosevelt in discharging without honor the companies of negro soldiers, 250 men, is the sole topic of discussion in army circles here, although it is with bated breath. The punishment is something awful for a soldier, especially one who has devoted his entire life to the service. There is some difference between being "discharged without honor" and "being dishonorably discharged." In the former case the soldiers get all pay coming to them and all clothing allowances. In the latter case they would get nothing, so the sentence was not as severe as it might have been.

The 25th infantry is a very old military organization, having been recruited soon after the civil war. There were a number of men who would have soon reached the age limit and retired and could have lived in comfort the rest of life on their half pay. The fact that their life time of good service will avail them nothing is where the greatest hardship comes in to those who are innocent of any knowledge of these who participated in the Brownsville outrages.

The general opinion here is that President Roosevelt will also prefer charges and order the court martial of the officers who were in command of the negro soldiers at the time. This is considered especially probable in the case of Major Penrose. The negro soldiers who are at Fort Sam Houston are still permitted all the liberties of other soldiers. The officers think there is no likelihood of

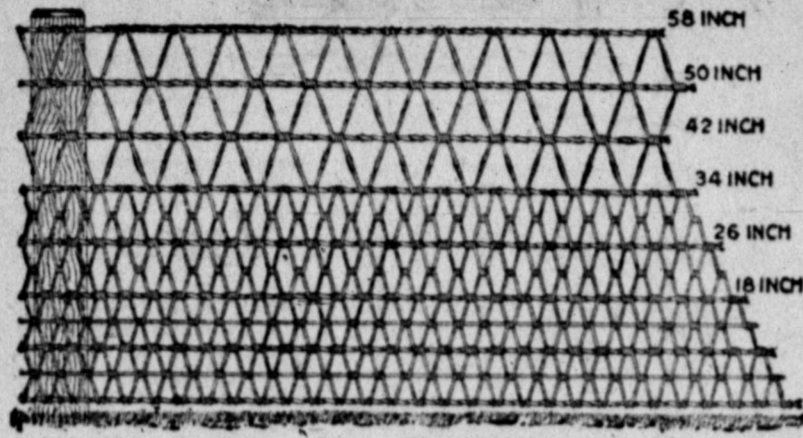
