### TELLS OF THE LAST SAD SPASM OF THE THIRTIETH TEXAS LEGISLATURE.

Austin, April 8.—The beginning of the end of the great convention of regulators that will long be remembered in the Lone Star state has come. The 30th legislature will adjourn on Friday, the 12th inst. Now to the initiated the closing of the legislature of a state may possibly appear to be no more than the closing of a morning glory when the noon day sun and the drowsy humming of the bees puts that peculiar flower to sleep, but there is in reality a little more to it than that.

You will bear in mind that there have been more than eight hundred bills introduced in the two bodies of the Texas legislature during the present session. Of all these measures of greater or less merit there have been, so far, about 153 that have really been enacted into law. All the balance of them are there in the various stages of legislation scattered along from the committee rooms to the door of the governors office. Many of them are bills of more or less importance that some aspiring statesman has set his heart upon seeing enacted into a law to which he could point with pride from the hustings of his loved country when he takes the stamp in the next campaign for a job of saving the state.

We have all heard of a "time that tries men's souls," but this is a time that tries men's tempers. All the disappointments, grievances and little petty spites that have been kept down for the sake of policy during the long tiresome session get to be more of a load than the average mortal can bear, and the result is that when the time comes that all realize that nothing more can be had from being politic these things naturally come out and prove the truth of the statement that, after all men are only grown up boys, and some of them not very well grown at that.

At this time there is every indication that an extra session of the legislature will be held. Of course no one but the governor knows about the matter, but everybody who reads the papers knows that there has been practically no attempt at revenue legislation. We also know that nine out of the eighteen planks of the Democratic platform are still just planks, and no effort has been made to nail them permanently in place. Governor Campbell has said that he intended for the legislature to stay here until these loose boards, many of which have become badly warped by the scorching sun of public opinion, should be firmly nailed upon the statutes of the state. Now, if the executive end of the state's law factory insists upon this position it will, as I have heretofore hinted, probably get cooler toward the latter end of the session.

There now seems to be no possibility of the final passage of the appropriations bill at the regular session, however it may be disposed of in a hurried manner in the next two days. Under the rule no legislative business is transacted on the last two days of the session,

except such routine business as considering reports of conference committees, etc. There have been many measures introduced that were a menace to the well being of the state and perhaps some of those that have passed will be of no great benefit to the public weal, but, on the whole, while this legislature has perhaps not added much of value of the laws of the common wealth, it has probably done as little harm as its predecessors of recent years. There are quite a bunch of constitutional amendments to be submitted to the people, which shows a very rational tendency on the part of this body to let the citizens of the state have a shot at shaping her destinies. Many members of both houses of the legislature came here with the idea that Texas was doing mighty well and were content to keep hands off and watch her grow.

The press of the state has taken up the cry a long way in advance for a business men's legislature and it is now very probable that the 31st legislature will have a greater number of conservative business men than have been in any session in the history of the state. The practical following of future business men themselves to the legislature will balance the scales. And though into her early years there came the affliction, through all the years of grief and suffering she wore a smile, bearing it with a Christian fortitude. Even her closest friends never heard a complaint fall from her lips. She was always sacrificing for the happiness of those who were suffering in silence. The angel of Peace came to her for his own. And thus she left a heritage to those who knew her, a beautiful example of a good woman, a good friend, a good wife and a good Christian.

It is hard to part with such a life, but "All that live must die, Passing through nature to eternity," and the sweet consolation, which is the hope of the Christian faith, has come down through the ages that such a life will have its reward on the other shore. To her sorrowing friends and relatives we would say, weep no more, for she is not dead, but "In the best kingdoms meek of joy and love, There entertain her all the saints above, In solemn troops and sweet societies That sing, and singing in their plory move, And wipe the tears forever from her eyes."

### Pastor Had Gun in Pulpit.

Springfield, Ill., April 8.—"If any one tries to interfere with my ministrations or attempts to hinder me during the progress of divine service this morning, I will shoot the daylight out of him. Let us sing the first and third stanzas of 'Let there be peace.'" And then the Rev. J. W. Daugherty, pastor of the negro Baptist church here, whacked his pulpit Bible with a big Colt's 44 revolver.

With the gun close at hand and praying with one eye open that no one might get the drop on him, the reverend Mr. Daugherty went half through with the service before the cops came and got him. He was lugged away, revolver and all.

The gun in the pulpit was due to a fierce church war that has been in progress for some time, and when the preacher showed his armament, a deacon slid quickly out of the door and summoned the police.

While the preaching was in progress there never was a more attentive or considerate audience within that church it is said and the words of the preacher were listened to with that respect which is usually given only to accepted prophets.

At one time or another every member of the congregation congregated in the row has been in jail save the pastor, and his arrest yesterday made the roll complete. He will be tried on a charge of threat to kill.

### Dead Man on Engine Pilot.

SALTILLO, Mex. April 7.—Upon the arrival of the local passenger train of the National Railroad at the station in Saltillo, a dead Mexican was found on the pilot of the engine. No one knew of the presence of the dead man or had seen the body on the pilot, and it is assumed that the man was struck by the train when it was between Saltillo and Ramos Arizpe.

The body was lying on the plate between the boiler head and the drawbar, on which his blanket was hanging.

Investigations into the case will be made by the local authorities.

### HOUNDS TRAILED A WOMAN.

#### A Dramatic Incident in a Territory Murder Case.

The intelligent denial of a clear-eyed, handsome woman, pitted against the mute testimony of a pair of bloodhounds that trailed her, is the situation in a dramatic murder case at Vinita, I. T., in the Chickasaw Nation. The woman is Mrs. Mary E. Brooks, charged with the murder of Dr. John W. Davenport, at Francis, the night of March 16. So far the bloodhounds have won, and Mrs. Brooks is being held under bond to answer to the charge of murder. Dr. Davenport was a brother of James Davenport, formerly mayor of Vinita, now a candidate for congress from the Third Congressional district.

Dr. Davenport was shot through the head with a revolver and killed. He was untying his team at the time. It is believed that he had been to call on Mrs. Brooks just before he was killed. He had been going to see her for more than a year.

Two bloodhounds were taken to the spot. They took the trail and ran directly to where Mrs. Brooks lived, entered the house, tore at the bed and passed on to the kitchen. From the house the dogs took a trail and went to a neighbor's house, where Mrs. Brooks was visiting. She was arrested on this evidence.

The question of the reliability of bloodhounds is clearly at stake. The woman denies that she saw Dr. Davenport after he left the house and that she knows absolutely nothing about his death. There were tracks from the spot towards Mrs. Brooks' home and the tracks were those of a woman. But there were other tracks also, and they crossed the trail the hounds took several times.

Chased by Six Captains Off Amagansett, He Dived to Be Safe.

Amagansett, L. I. April 7.—The antics and depredations of Indians in olden times round and about Amagansett were tame in comparison with the excitement here Friday when at 10 o'clock in the morning the Edwards brothers sighted another monster whale coming up the coast.

Fifteen minutes later the five brothers all whalers of reputation, and Capt. Geo. Smith, were chasing the whopper in separate boats. With six men in each boat they set out. The whale kept going a forty-mile pace, making furious spurts every three or four hundred yards. But about three miles off Napeague beach he disappeared beneath the surface and the boats returned.

Ten minutes after the whale was sighted a flag was run up at the Amagansett Life Saving Station, the big bell in the public school tower began to ring, as did every telephone in the village. Ten minutes later the procession began. Men, women and children flocked to the beach, vehicles of all kinds were pressed into service and in less than an hour at least 500 were watching the race.

Both Captain Josh and Gabe are confident that the whale will return, and they'll get him. He was larger than the whale captured last month, whose skeleton is being prepared for exhibition in New York.

"The tail of this fellow," said Capt. Gabe Edwards, "was at least thirty feet long. He belongs to the sperm variety and if he comes round here a-spoutin' you can bet he won't get away if we have a half a shot at him.

### WHY BRIAR WOOD IS SCARCE.

Worshippers of "My Lady Nicotine" who are thinking of replenishing their pipe rack, will do well not to tarry, for we hear that the price of the briar root is to be raised by 20 per cent., and this almost immediately. The news was confirmed by J. S. Weingott, a New York tobacconist.

"The increase in the price of goods," explained Mr. Weingott, "is chiefly due to the advance in the price of labor and the recent strikes that took place on the continent, especially at St. Cloud, in France, which is the center of the trade in cheap briar root pipes. Briar, as it is known, or to give it its correct name, 'bruyere,' comes chiefly from Italy and from Corsica, and the late earthquakes, and volcanic eruptions have ruined hundreds of acres of plantations in the Campania and other parts of central and southern Italy. Hence the scarcity of the wood at the present time, and, as an inevitable consequence, the coming increase in price."

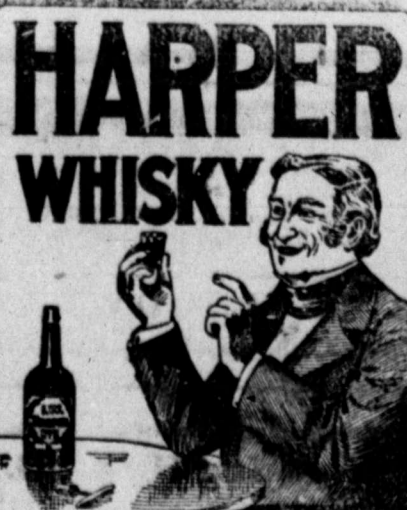

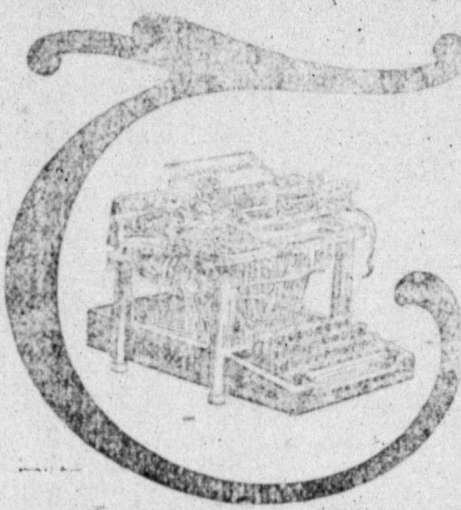

### AN ORDINANCE.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Kerrville, Texas. SECTION 1. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to keep any hogs or pigs penned or confined within the following prescribed limits in the city of Kerrville, Texas, to-wit:

Beginning at Pecan street on the Guadalupe river, thence up Town creek in line with Paschal street to Barnett street, thence down Barnett St. to intersect College St. thence down College street to First street, thence down First street to Ross street, thence down Ross street to B street, thence down B street to intersect A street, thence down A street to a point on the Guadalupe river.

SEC. 2. Any person or persons violating this section shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be subject to a fine of not less than Five (\$5.00) dollars nor more than Twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars.

SEC. 3. The owner or keeper of such hogs or pigs in said limits, who shall fail or refuse to remove or dispose of the same after notice to do so by the City Marshal, shall be deemed guilty of a separate offense for each day said hogs or pigs are kept confined in said limits after such notice has been given he shall be subject to a further fine of One (\$1.00) dollar.
