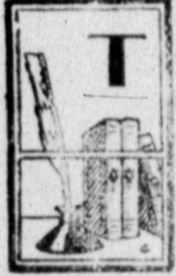

TRADE'S DAYS AND FAIRS.

The average reader, perhaps, has never given much thought to when Trade's Day first became a custom among civilized people. Just when business gatherings were first called "Trade's Day" meetings is not known. The same kind of business was known ten centuries, or more, ago, but the occasions were called fairs. Originally the only contests at these fairs were trials of strength or skill, later prizes were offered for the best animals, and from that grew expositions. Fairs probably originated with the Arabians and other Nomadic peoples, who at stated intervals met at the various towns of importance for the purpose of exchanging wares. This was especially true upon the occasion of great religious festivals, and at one time the word fair was held to mean a religious festival, but was really a "Trade's Day" set at the time of the pilgrimages to Mecca, and later to gatherings of Christian people, because a vast concourse of people would be assembled upon such occasions, and trade would be better. Among the towns in Europe where fairs became famous in Ancient times, Nijni-Novgorod, Russia, Leipzig and Frankfurt-on-the-Main, the former capital of Germany, are among the greatest. Perhaps the first place where a fair was ever held by English speaking people was at the village of Fal-Kirk, Scotland, about the tenth century. Every child in the land, almost, remembers Fal-Kirk, because it is the place made famous by the battle of Fal-Kirk, where Sir William Wallace fought so nobly at the head of the Scots against Edward II of England, but was defeated by overwhelling numbers. That battle occurred 610 ago, on the 22nd day of last July. Long before that time Fal-Kirk had her fairs, where the "gude wife" came from the hielan's with her muckle yarn to exchange it with the sassouch (English) trader for wares from the South. The same streets that so long ago heard the wild "pibroch" of the Scottish bag pipes calling the clans to battle, under the dauntless Wallace. The same rocky roads over which the Scots under Prince Charles Edward marched to victory at the battle of Fal Kirk, January 17, 1746, have throughout all these years witnessed the gay throngs going to and from the Fal-Kirk fairs. The fairs of that Scotland town have long been famous, and the Fal-Kirk trysts or trade meetings, are a great occasion in that part of Scotland to-day.
So we have abundant authority

for Trade's Day, whether it be called fair, tryst, market or trade's day, it is all the same, and it is a good thing.

We can all remember reading in Mother Goose, that
"Simple Simon
Met a pleman
Going to the fair."

Brumby, State Health Officer, returned this morning from Dallas where he has been on business regarding the tuberculosis exhibit that is being displayed there during the fair. Dr. Brumby says that the exhibit is a center of great attraction the crowd having been so large Saturday as to interfere with the work of the demonstrator who accompanies the exhibit. The phonographic lectures, however, were kept in continuous activity and taught the listeners a great deal about the purpose of exhibit. As soon as the exhibit completes its stand at Dallas, it will go to Houston, thence, possibly, to Shreveport. The tour of the state will probably begin at San Antonio if the proper arrangements can be made. Dr. L. B. Bibb, secretary of the Texas Anti Tuberculosis Association, under whose auspices the tour will be made, received a letter today from H. S. Rhu of San Angelo, requesting that the exhibit come there. Mr. Rhu also promises 100 members to the association from that community.

Dr. Brumby came back to Austin wearing on his watch fob the \$200 medal presented to him by the Texas delegation to the International Congress of Tuberculosis. The medal is a thing of beauty, made of heavy gold with a Roman finish, the obverse showing the spirit of science conquering the tuberculosis demon, the reverse revealing an appropriate inscription. The presentation of the medal was made at Dallas.

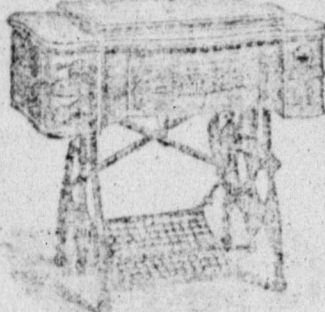
