WILL OPEN MONDAY, JUNE 20

Many Inquiries Are Being Made and Attendance Will Be Unusually Large This Term.

As the time for the opening of the Kerrville Summer Normal draws near interest in the work increases. Letters are coming in daily from all parts of Southwest Texas.

The faculty of the Kerrville Summer Normal this year is beyond question equal to that of any summer normal in the State. In addition to the excellence of the normal, from a technical viewpoint, the ideal climate and the opportunities for outdoor recreation makes a month spent here in the "Hill Country," almost equal to a summer vacation in the Adirondacks. There is admittedly much in the statement that the student can study the maximum of hours with the minimum of fatigue in the "Hill Country." Not only is this true of the normal, and of summer work, but is true in all schools the year around.

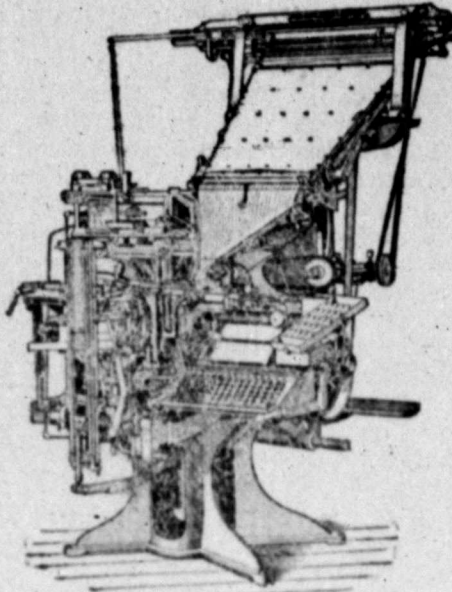
### Notice of Proposed Increase Bank Capital.

### Makes Hill Climbing Record.

Joe Bader, the fat and jolly automobile enthusiast, made a new hill climbing record in his Paterson 30 car. Mr. Bader made the run from Baudera to the Hicks ranch Tuesday. This is one of the roughest pieces of road in this section. On the route the road goes through the famous Sako Pass. No machine had ever been through this pass before. In speaking of the trip Mr. Bader said:

"I have always had great confidence in the Paterson 30, but I was most agreeably surprised at its behavior. I had been told that no machine had ever attempted the Sako Pass, and when I reached it I was sure that was true. I took up a reef in my nerve and drove into an effort in which, not only was I a pioneer, but was attempting something that no manufacturer of autos would claim his car could do. I was greatly pleased when I made the climb without losing one minute of time.

The return trip, coming down this mountain, where the road runs for a quarter of a mile on the verge of a frightful precipice, where several people have lost their lives by vehicles falling over. Just here there is a sharp curve, where the incline is also quite steep, and is the danger point on the downward trip. I do not think it possible for a car with its hind wheels locked to make that curve. The Paterson 30 has a very low gear arrangement by which the wheels turn just enough to keep them from skidding, and so obviated the greatest danger of the pass. This is a notoriously dangerous pass and many thrilling accounts are told of accidents that have occurred here. There is also a joke told that while it is very ridiculous pretty clearly demonstrates the steepness of the pass. It is said that a man started through the pass in a two-wheeled cart and going down he found the hill so steep he was obliged to lock both wheels and hobble the hind feet

### GOOD ROADS ARE PLANNED.

Business Men's Clubs of Towns Between Kerrville and San Antonio Will Make Campaign.

The Kerrville Business Men's Club has begun a "good roads" movement and in a letter to Secretary Carrington of the Chamber of Commerce explains an interesting plan to include in the movement towns between Kerrville and San Antonio.

An automobile trip is proposed for the latter part of June between San Antonio and Kerrville for members of the business men's clubs of Kerrville and San Antonio, and Comfort, Fredericksburg, Center Point, Waring and Boerne if those towns can be interested in the plan. The run will be made leisurely, in picnic fashion, and the party will stop in each of these towns where meetings, advertised beforehand, will be held and speeches made by the committee in behalf of the movement for good county and city roads. Boerne already has a good roads association, and it is intended an organization, perhaps on the order of a Kerrville-Fredericksburg-San Antonio good roads association shall be the result of the trip.

A great deal of enthusiasm has been aroused for the plan in the towns along the proposed route of the trip and nearly \$1000 already has been subscribed in the movement. The good roads committee of the Chamber of Commerce, of which committee H. G. Staecke is chairman, has approved the suggestion of the Kerrville club, and Secretary Carrington has sent letters to the clubs of the several towns included in the plan, giving it the endorsement of this body and asking their co-operation to effect the interurban good roads organization.—San Antonio Express.

In regard to the above matter Secretary A. F. Thigpen received the following letter from Secretary J. B. Carrington of San Antonio:

Dr. A. F. Thigpen, Secretary Business Men's Club, Kerrville, Tex.

Dear Sir—San Antonio is ready and willing to work for a continuous good road from this city to Kerrville. It would make one of the most picturesque automobile tours in the United States.

The stretch between Boerne and Comfort has no one working on it at present. Couldn't you get up a Kerrville to San Antonio committee, make an overland journey from your city to San Antonio, get some of your best speakers to boost the proposition at Center Point and Comfort and on down the line to Boerne? First write to J. A. Arnold, Texas Commercial Secretaries Association, Fort Worth, Texas, get all the information you can about roads and the value of roads, then get hold of some men who are able to apply these principles to your county and to Kendall county.

Our great tourist traffic here in the winter would send you lots of rich people who would spend money in your town. They would be better pleased with San Antonio because of this road. If you organize this overland trip I will try and take it up and help boost the game. This road would be a great thing for all of us. Let's get it. Yours very truly, S. A. ## DISCUSSES PRIMARY

State Chairman A. B. Storey Issues Circular to County Chairmen In Regard to Pledge of

DEMOCRATIC PARTY FEALTY

And the Possible Intention on Part of Certain Texas Voters to Violate Letter and Spirit of Primary Election Law.

Headquarters State Democratic Executive Committee of Texas, San Antonio, Tex., May 10, 1910. To the Chairmen of the County Democratic Executive Committees of Texas:

Dear Sir—Information has reached the headquarters of the State Democratic Executive Committee through letters and other reliable sources of plans being formulated by which the time-honored usages of the party are to be ignored in certain counties, to the extent of permitting Republicans and other alien elements to participate in the general Democratic primary election, to be held on July 23, 1910. We consider it to be our duty to warn all Democrats, particularly the county chairmen and election officers, against countenancing, in any manner, the carrying out of such conspiracy. To permit Republican or other known opponents of the organized Democracy to participate in the actions of the councils of the Democratic party would be in violation of the spirit, if not the letter, of the primary election law of the State and in defiance of the well established custom and usage of the party in Texas. Such violation would be a scandal on the name of Democracy and tend to party demoralization and political debauchery.

You, as county chairmen, are instructed to inform all presiding officers of election in the different counties to use every effort possible to keep Republicans, and others not Democrats, out of the Democratic primaries on July 23. Where there is a reasonable question of a man's Democracy, presiding officers should challenge him, and administer, under oath, the party test, printed at the head of the official ballot. A list should be kept of all such challenged and sworn voters.

It should not be forgotten that the primaries to be held on July 23 are intended, solely and alone, for Democrats, and no person of any other political party or organization should participate therein, or be permitted to participate, if he attempts to do so. Respectfully,

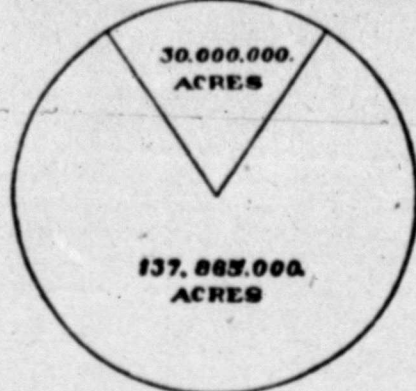

## Idle Lands.

The prosperity of a community depends upon the activity of its property and the people. Improved public highways afford facilities for marketing production, stimulate commercial activity and otherwise encourages agricultural development. To increase agricultural production we must bring under cultivation idle land and increase the yield per acre.

We have in Texas 167,865,000 acres of land. Of this area there are 2,118,000 acres of water surface. All our land is susceptible to a high degree of cultivation except the city area and a small portion of our land which is mountainous. We now have less than 30,000,000 acres of land under cultivation, leaving 137,000,000 acres of land that has never been plowed. Idle land is of course no value to a community, and to increase our prosperity we must put activity into our vacant lands. The following cut illustrates the relative proportions of our cultivated and uncultivated areas:



Texas Land Comparison.

There are 109 counties that have less than 10 per cent of their land under cultivation. There are 43 counties that have a larger uncultivated area than the total area of the State of Rhode Island. The uncultivated area of Texas, says the Commercial Secretaries' Association, exceeds the total area of the thirteen original colonies, excepting Georgia and North Carolina. We need 3,000,000 farmers to develop our agricultural resources, and no country on the globe affords the opportunities to the homeseeker that Texas now offers. The land agent is an important factor in the development of agriculture. There are 190 people moving to Texas daily, and remain here permanently and of this number probably half of them go on the farm.



People Coming to Texas.

At the present rate of agricultural immigration it will take 400 years to secure a sufficient number of farmers to bring under cultivation our idle lands. We must get farmers from other States and countries more rapidly, and the improvement of our public highways will influence the homeseeker by making farm life attractive

**DAVIDSON FOR SUBMISSION**

**PEOPLE HAVE A RIGHT TO RULE, HE TELLS GARLAND CROWD.**

**Constitutional Prohibition Through an Amendment, He Further Tells Inquisitor, Is the Remedy. Will Not Compromise.**

GARLAND, Tex., May 31.—Arrangement of statutory prohibition formed about the only variation in the speech of R. V. Davidson here this afternoon from other speeches which he has delivered in different parts of the State. There was the same review of his own record as Attorney General, a suggestion of his attitude toward the industrial development of Texas and appreciation of the introduction of the issue of prohibition into this campaign. Using practically the identical words with which he discussed the Bailey question at Ennis last night he referred to that matter again today.

About 150 persons assembled in the show tent near the square. He was introduced by Curtis Hancock, Dallas manager for the candidate.

Mr. Davidson had not ventured anything on the matter of statutory prohibition until some one in the audience asked him what his opinion of Mr. Johnson's issue was. He then went into a fuller discussion of the constitutionality of that proposition than he has done in any of his previous utterances.

"Under the present Constitution prohibition is with the people and not with the Legislature," said he. "The people have reserved to themselves the right to determine this matter, and while a majority of the counties may adopt prohibition through local option it is always up to the people to say whether there shall be prohibition or not."

"Then, what is the remedy?" queried a voice from the audience. "Constitutional prohibition through an amendment," Mr. Davidson replied, "and if I were a prohibitionist and interested in the adoption of prohibition I would not compromise my opinion on constitutional prohibition for Jack-knives and pin-hooks."

"Are you for submission?" came a voice from the crowd.

"Yes, sir," was the reply. "I am for submission because it is right, and the people have a right to rule."

The candidate returned to Dallas on the special on which he came out. He will go to Farmersville tomorrow.

HE ANNOUNCES HIS CANDIDACY FOR THE STATE SENATE.

His Dictated Statement Contains No Mention of Commission Government, but Promises to Heed Wishes of Majority.

Carlos Bee, Democrat, former District Attorney of this district, prior to his departure Wednesday forenoon for Washington, dictated to his stenographer a statement for the press in which he announces himself a candidate for the State Senate from the Twenty-fourth District, in opposition to Senator Julius Real, Republican, a candidate for re-election.

Mr. Bee ignores the subject of a commission form of government for San Antonio in his brief statement. He declared that, if elected, he will follow the specific instructions of his senatorial constituency first, and heed the will of the people of the State at large as a secondary consideration. He maintains that prohibition ought not to be an issue in the campaign. The statement given the press follows:

"As I am leaving today for Washington City for a few weeks on a business trip, I desire to announce that I have determined to be a candidate for the Democratic nomination for State Senator from the Twenty-fourth District, and have filed my application with the district chairman. Upon my return I will make a canvass of the district and present fully my views upon public questions. I believe a majority of the people have a right to dictate the course of their representatives. Prohibition ought not to be an issue in this state, for the local option laws and the present liquor law have eliminated whatever supposed necessity might have arisen.

"The Senator for Texas in the United States Senate is first a representative of Texas and then of the country at large. Similarly the Senator from the Twenty-fourth Senatorial District is first the representative of his district and then of the State at large. The voters of this district by a vote of nearly five to

### CHARGE IS AGAIN DENIED

#### DAVIDSON TAKES UP BAILEY'S LETTER IN ADDRESS.

In Doing So, He Aims an Attack at Cone Johnson—His Speech Is Heard By a Good Sized Crowd.

ENNIS, Tex., May 30.—In the presence of about 550 voters of Ennis, R. V. Davidson, candidate for Governor, spoke for about an hour and thirty minutes tonight in the interest of his candidacy. Mr. Davidson was met by a committee of local citizens. The speaking took place in the city hall. Quite a number of women were in the audience.

With reference to the Bailey matter he said: "Bailey in a recent letter charged that Cone Johnson and myself had tried to destroy him by infamous slanders and that he (Bailey) possessed personal knowledge that we had spread falsehoods about him and that we would greatly abuse the office of Governor should either of us be chosen to that high position and that to defeat us for Governor he would, if Poindexter was eliminated by the Anti-Saloon League, take stump for Colquitt.

"In my San Antonio and Austin speeches I denied that I have ever slandered or told or circulated a falsehood about or concerning Bailey. I do not know that Johnson is guilty of what Bailey charges. He does not deny the charges. It may be that he thinks that in his orations to the people as a candidate for delegate to the Democratic convention such charges, if made as to him, were denied.

"Maybe so, but Johnson is now face to face with a new or an old charge, which Bailey says unfits Johnson for a high office which he now seeks, therefore Johnson, if for no other reason, should have and it was his duty to show the people that the charges are not true and that he is not morally disqualified from being Governor, because, if what Bailey now says about John-

son be true, he is not fit for that position.

"Johnson and myself are both before the people for Governor and will grossly abuse the powers of the high office. Therefore, the people should know, and want to know, if these charges of Bailey are true. Our candidacy is now before them, and our fitness or unfitness is the question now before the people.

"I am now a free man and am not going to plead State demand nor the statute of limitation to these charges. The people want to know the truth about them, especially as the man charged with slander is now before them for Governor. I will not attempt to advise Mr. Johnson as to his course when his personal honor is so seriously involved, but I know mine. I will say that if Mr. Bailey's charges are true, then neither of us are qualified for Governor.

"Therefore, as for myself, these charges do not come too late to be barred by limitation, but I have demanded, and again demand, of Bailey to state the slander or falsehood which he says I am guilty of in uttering and circulating, and let the people in this country pass upon my guilt or innocence.

"Colquitt may crawl in his own cowardice and fawn at the feet of Bailey to get votes; Johnson may stand mute and motionless while Bailey charges and continues to charge him with uttering and circulating slanders and falsehoods about him, but henceforth I ask no quarter and will give none."
