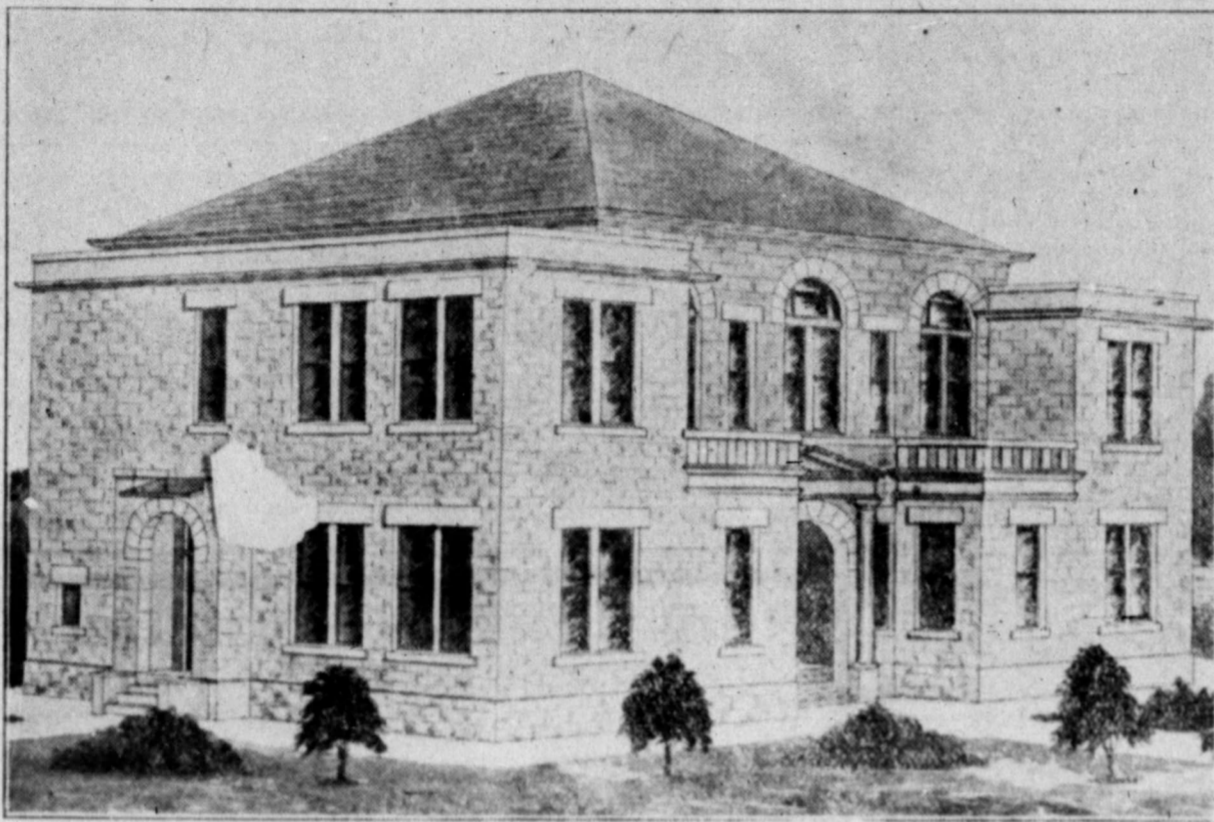

OIL GUSHER AT HENRIETTA

1500 to 1800 Barrels Per Day Is Estimated Flow.

HENRIETTA, Texas, June 4.—Flowing 1500 to 1800 barrel per day, a gusher has been spouting oil within seven miles of Henrietta for three weeks, but was not generally known until today. The gusher is on the property of Charles Taylor, south of the original oil and gas field, and is understood to have been leased to the Texas or Producers company. The fact that the gusher had been brought in became public property yesterday afternoon when a lease covering large tracts adjoining the well, for which a \$12,000 bonus was paid, was filed. Rumors of the great strike have been prevalent for some time, but as the drillers had erected a high wall about the place, nothing definite could be learned until today.

ON TOBOGGAN ARTESIAN WATER FOR KERRVILLE

Wool Market Is Demoralized With Little Prospect of Early Recovery.

QUOTATIONS OFF 6 TO 8 CENTS

Buyers Are Afraid and Commission Men Are Holding Vast Quantities of the Product in Storage.

Not for several years has the wool market been in such a demoralized condition as it is at present. Various reasons are given for this unfortunate condition of affairs. In fact there are about as many reasons given as there are men expressing opinions.

Whatever may be the cause of the slump in wool the fact remains indisputable that it did slump. The market is now off 6 to 8 cents per pound from what it was this time last year, and worst of all, it is still slumping.

Capt. Charles Schreiner, the veteran commission man, in discussing the matter said:

"We are making no effort to sell the spring clip. The market has gone to the bad and is still sliding. Commission men, factors and spindle people are all up in the air. The market has been unsteady for some time and the disastrous slump in recent weeks has put everybody to guessing. Whatever the result the producers of this section may rest assured that we are watching the market and will take care of the interests of our customers in the best manner possible."

When asked for an opinion as to the reason the wool market had gone on such a woody jag of uncertainty, Captain Schreiner said:

"There are almost as many reasons given as there are men discussing the problem, but the feasible thing, I think, is that during the past winter the prevailing high cost of living caused the poor and middle classes, who are the great consumers, to do without all woolen articles without which they could possibly get along. All woolen manufacturers are overstocked on fabrics and spindle buyers are not in the market, except for small quantities of certain grades of wool. There is nothing in prospect that will lower the cost of food products, people must eat and woolen weavers are afraid that another winter of short buying of woolen fabrics will overstock them still worse, and so we have stagnation in the wool market. This, at least, appears to me as the reasonable solution of the

Capt. Charles Schreiner Is Now Sinking Second Well to Furnish the City With Water.

ABSOLUTELY PURE AND SOFT

Is Report on Analysis of Water from Present Well and Companion Well Will Be Sunk to the Same Stratum.

Critics and jealous people to the contrary, notwithstanding, Kerrville has always had city water that is in every respect far above the average. After a few more weeks this town will have pure artesian water in the city water mains. Sometime ago it was stated in these columns that Captain Schreiner had struck an abundance of fine, pure water in the deep well he had just completed. When the well was finished a powerful pump was put on it and 125 gallons per minute were taken from it for twenty-four hours without lowering the water perceptibly.

This well is 650 feet deep and the water is from the second artesian stratum. The old artesian stratum is at a depth of about 350 feet and the flow is inexhaustible, but the water is not wholly free from chemical impurities. In putting down this well all was securely cased off until the lower, or 650-foot stratum was reached. At that depth the water rose to within twenty feet of the surface and the test was made as above stated.

In addition to the test for quantity the Kerrville Waterworks Company had the water critically analyzed and it was found to be chemically pure.

Another well, twelve feet distant from the first one, is now being put

down. When the second well is finished an excavation will be made 12x22 feet down to the water level and the excavation floored and walled with concrete. The giant pump will be set on the floor of this excavation at the water level and will drive the pure artesian water into the great storage reservoir at the rate of 500 to 400 gallons per minute unceasingly. The pipe leading from the wells to the reservoir is already on the ground and will be laid soon.

A representative of one of the largest manufacturers of pumping machinery in the world will arrive from New York today to take the levels, look over the situation and figure out dimensions for the giant twin pumps that will perform this great service for Kerrville. The pump will be made to special order and the work will be rushed with all possible dispatch.

The old power plant will be held as a reserve supply in case of accidents to machinery or other emergencies.

CONFERENCE HONORS BRUMBY

Texas Heads Organization Which Studies Tubercular Situation.
ST. LOUIS, Mo., June 8.—Dr. Wm. Brumby of Dallas was elected president of the Southern conference on tuberculosis, organized here today by delegates from twelve Southwestern States. Oklahoma City was selected as the probable place for the next annual convention.

A donation of \$900 to the Missouri society by the Anheuser-Busch Brewing Association of St. Louis was announced at the conference. One of the principal purposes of the new Southwestern Association is to devise a system for caring for the influx of consumptives from the North into the Southwestern States.

The association's promoters announced they did not propose to discourage the immigration of consumptives.

RAILROAD BONUS IS RAISED.

Beeville Will Now Get Land Needed for Terminals.

BEEVILLE, Tex., June 9.—The committee appointed to solicit subscriptions to the bonus fund for the proposed Beeville & Eagle Pass Railroad, made a report at a meeting of citizens here this morning.

The \$40,000 cash bonus required by the promoters has been raised, with a surplus to spare, but not quite sufficient to make purchase of the land needed for terminals. A tract of seventeen acres of land has been accepted by the promoters as suitable for terminal purposes and a committee was appointed at the meeting this morning to take the necessary steps toward securing it. It is thought that the required amount necessary to close the contract will be secured right away and that a formal contract with the promoters of the road will be closed.

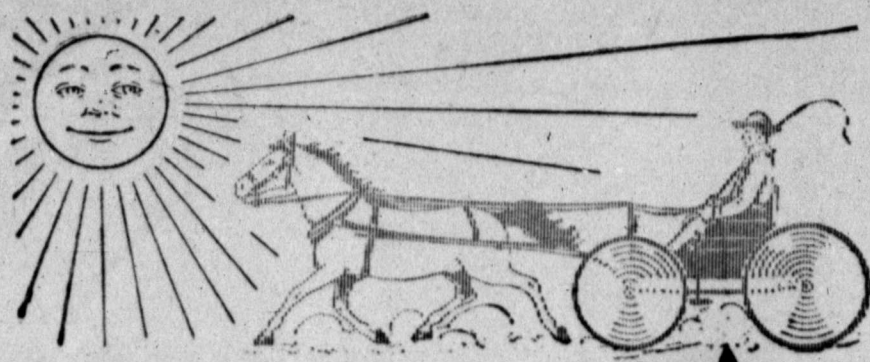

TEXAS AUTHOR SUCCUMBS.

He Began His Career on The Houston Post and Rose Rapidly.

NEW YORK, June 5.—William S. Porter, known best under his pen name of O. Henry, as the writer of short stories, died at the Polytechnic hospital today. He underwent an operation last Friday and never rallied.

The nature of his ailment was not made known. Mrs. Porter, who had been in South Carolina, was summoned by telegraph, but did not arrive until after her husband's death.

Mr. Porter was born in Texas forty-six years ago and began his journalistic career on the Houston Post. Before that he had been cowboy sheepherder and druggist, and an extensive traveler. The general public knew little of his private life, for he shunned interviewers and was content to be known merely through his writings as O. Henry.

His breezy paragraphs, penned in Texas, first drew attention to the young writer several years ago. Then he launched forth with "Sunday stories" for a New York paper and was quickly recognized as a writer of ability. Magazine stories followed and his fame was assured. It was only two years ago, however, that any but his closest friends knew his real name. Then he reluctantly consented to have his photograph printed with a brief biography.

He had been in poor health for some time, but it was not thought his illness was serious. He died with friends Wednesday and seemed in his usual spirits. Friday night he was taken ill and removed to a hospital.

A minor operation was performed and up to within an hour of his death today it was thought he would recover. Derangement of both liver and kidneys, however, proved more deep seated than had been thought and he sank rapidly.

THE KLONDIKE RUSH

Greatest Stampede since Thirteen Years Ago.

IDITAROD CITY, Alaska, via Kaltago, Alaska, June 5.—Three hundred and fifty prospectors, the first party of stampedees to reach the new Iditarod gold fields, arrived here from Fairbanks yesterday after a three weeks' trip down the Yukon River.

All agree that the stampede will be the greatest since the famous rush to the Klondike thirteen years ago, but many old-time gold seekers are pessimistic over the prospects for getting sudden wealth from the gravel along the banks of the Iditarod and Innokar rivers.

A number of prospectors who will arrive here during the early summer. Conservative estimates place the at 5,000. Many now on the ground say the summer camp will not support more than a thousand miners, and that large numbers of the late comers are doomed to disappointment. They say only seven miles of pay dirt have been located and that none is extraordinary.

It is believed that at least half of those in the main camp, Iditarod City, will turn back to the Kuskowill, where they expect to locate a camp fifty miles across the Divide.

At present Iditarod City is but a small camp, consisting of a few cabins. No wharf has been built and freight is being dumped on the ground. During the present high waters steamboats from Fairbanks are able to reach here, but later it will be impossible for any but the smallest steamers to get above the mouth of the Iditarod.
