## Fourth-Class Postmasters Examination

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an examination to be held at Kerrville, Tex., on Nov. 9, 1918, as a result of which it is expected to make certification to fill a contemplated vacancy in the position of fourth-class postmaster at Harper, Texas, and other vacancies as they may occur at that office, unless it shall be decided in the interest of the service to fill the vacancy by reinstatement. The compensation of the postmaster at this office was \$411 for the last fiscal year.

Applicants must have reached their twenty first birthday on the date of the examination, with exception that in a state where women are declared by statute to be of full age for all purposes at eighteen years, women eighteen years of age on the date of the examination will be admitted.

Applicants must reside within the territory supplied by the post office for which the examination is announced.

The examination is open to all citizens of the United States who can comply with the requirements.

Application blanks, Form 1753, and full information concerning the requirements of the examination can be secured from the Postmaster-Commission, Washington, D. C.

Applications should be properly executed and filed with the Commission at Washington, D. C., at the earliest practicable date.

## CATHOLIC CHURCH NOTES

During the present quarantine there will be no congregational services at 7:35 a. m., but only private devotions at seven o'clock. Every effort will be made to assist in preventing the spread of the Spanish influenza in this community. Father Kemper places his time and services at the disposal of everyone whether a church member or not. Neither of the two schools will be reopened until all danger of infection is over.

The entire faculty of the Guadalupe school went to San Antonio immediately after the quarantine was instituted, in order to render their assistance in the present scarcity of nurses.

The first fatality of the prevalent epidemic occurred on Friday when Roque Acroola succumbed to pneumonia. He contracted the "Three Day Fever" while working for Uncle Sam in Kentucky. In a dying condition he was sent home and survived the long journey only two days. On the day of his death his fourth child was born. Deceased was buried privately in the Mexican cemetery adjoining Col. Wurmund's estate which used to be known as "Sophienburg," but has been re-christened as "Blue Bell."

The famous old "Fredericksburg Road" has also been renamed and now bears the name of "Foch's Highway" in honor of the Generalissimo of the Allies. Next Sunday services will be held in Comfort at 9 o'clock. On this account mass will be read in St. Mary's at 7 a. m., according to sun time. It is to be remembered that the clock is put back one hour on Saturday night, Oct. 26th.

Hallowe'en, being the eve of All Hallow's or All Saints—is a vigil of obligation. The proposed reception for Oct. 31st has again been postponed.

On November 1st, a High Mass will be sung at 7:15 a. m. in St. Mary's and at 8:15 a. m. services will be conducted in the Mexican chapel. Three masses are permitted on All Souls Day, Nov. 2nd. The first two will be in St. Mary's at 6:30 and 7:15 a. m., and the last at Guadalupe at 8:15 a. m. The Founder's Solemn Requiem will be sung at the second mass.

Mrs. Arthur M. set motored to San Antonio on Monday to visit her invalid son Clarence at St. Louis College. She was accompanied by Father Kemper and his sister Angelina, who visited their twin nephews Henry and William Volz.

Rudolph Steinhilber lost two cows last week through influenza; one was a soldier in Tennessee, Hugo Blanchard, and the other was Paul Hebe of Fredericksburg.

Jim Priour, formerly of Notre Dame, contracted the epidemic in San Antonio and was sent home seriously ill on Saturday.

Local Chairman Beitel of the Community Labor Board has furnished as a copy of Federal Director Lewis' urgent call for more munition workers, the length of which precludes its publication in full in this issue, to our readers. Mr. Lewis puts it strongly and squarely up to the non-war workers that there is an imperative demand for their services in the munition works, and calls upon them to patriotically meet the demand. ## LOCAL RED CROSS NEWS

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## Before You Go

Into the hands of every selected man of the new draft it is the purpose of the American Red Cross to put a booklet, entitled as the above caption. Editions of the booklet will be printed by the various divisions for distribution to the Home Service Sections. It can be carried in the vest pocket and contains a carefully grouped list of things which the enlisted man should talk over with his family before he packs his kit for the Great Adventure.

Briefly, the idea is to bring the purposes, advantages and methods of the Red Cross Home Service to the intimate knowledge of the soldier on the threshold of his army career, so that both he and the members of his family may derive the greatest possible benefit from its operation. The information contained in the booklet is concisely complete with regard to all matters that ordinarily require mutual understandings on the part of relatives temporarily—or perhaps permanently—separated by the war with reference to the assistance the Red Cross may be in the straightening out of possible future difficulties arising from any number of causes. The statements have been approved by the Government bureaus concerned, and the office of Provost Marshal General will distribute a copy of the booklet to each board of instruction throughout the country. The foreword addressed to the selected men, follows:

"You have been selected to serve your country. We who remain behind depend upon your courage and efficiency to help win this war. We owe you a debt of gratitude which we cannot repay, and which you are not worrying about. But you will fight better for knowing that while you are gone your folks at home need lack for nothing in times of emergency and of anxiety, which friendly interest and ample resources can supply. The Red Cross cannot do your place, but one who is left behind in your name can be depended upon to do many things for your family that they can not do for themselves and which you cannot provide for during your absence. We may need only to supply information of some kind. But that will be given promptly and accurately. Whatever it may be that we shall have opportunity to do, we shall gladly do through the Home Service Section of the Red Cross."

Indications, even at this early date, point to a sweeping and almost overwhelming chorus of "Ayes" when the American Red Cross takes its Christmas roll-call of the American public in the week ending December 23. The organization machinery necessary to roll up such a vast Red Cross membership that it will truly be universal has been set up at general headquarters, and it is now running as smoothly as a well-oiled motor, with not a cylinder missing fire. The most important cog in the mechanism, co-ordination of purpose and effort between Red Cross general headquarters at Washington, the nine Red Cross division headquarters and the individual chapters, is being in-

## Good Old Kerr Goes Over the Top

So far as we have been able to learn, the report by the committee with the possible receipt of additional sales at the War Point, Kerr County was over the top in great shape at the Fourth Liberty Loan.

Our quota was \$87,300, our subscriptions right around \$100,000. The First State Bank reports \$8,450, the Chas. Schreiner Bank \$87,500, the Center Point bank in the neighborhood of \$5,000.

Kerr County justly received credit for about \$2,000 from outside sources, or rather from local employees of outside concerns, such as \$1250 from Sap employees, and nearly \$1000 from the Texas Company and Pierce, Farnsey.

Mr. Brown had 10,000 pounds of his Fall clip enroute to Kerrville and was lamenting the fact that his mohair was not included until Mr. Schreiner told him that he was expecting to make another sale right away at a still higher figure.

Mr. Brown keeps well informed regarding mohair in all parts of the world and he acknowledges that he doesn't know how the market is going to go, it may go up to \$1.50 a pound or down to 50 cents a pound.

## Court of Appeals Holds Dry Law Invalid

Austin, Texas, Oct. 23.—The Court of Criminal Appeals in a majority opinion held the state-wide prohibition law unconstitutional. The opinion is by Judge Morrow, who holds that this law is in conflict with the local option feature of the constitution. Judge Prendergast dissented in the opinion.

Attorney General Looney stated today that a motion for rehearing in the state-wide prohibition case would be filed before the Court of Criminal Appeals. "Until that is acted upon the whole matter will remain as it is, I presume," he concluded.

Comptroller Terrell stated that he would issue no licenses for the selling of intoxicating liquors until the motion for rehearing before the Court of Criminal Appeals had been disposed of.

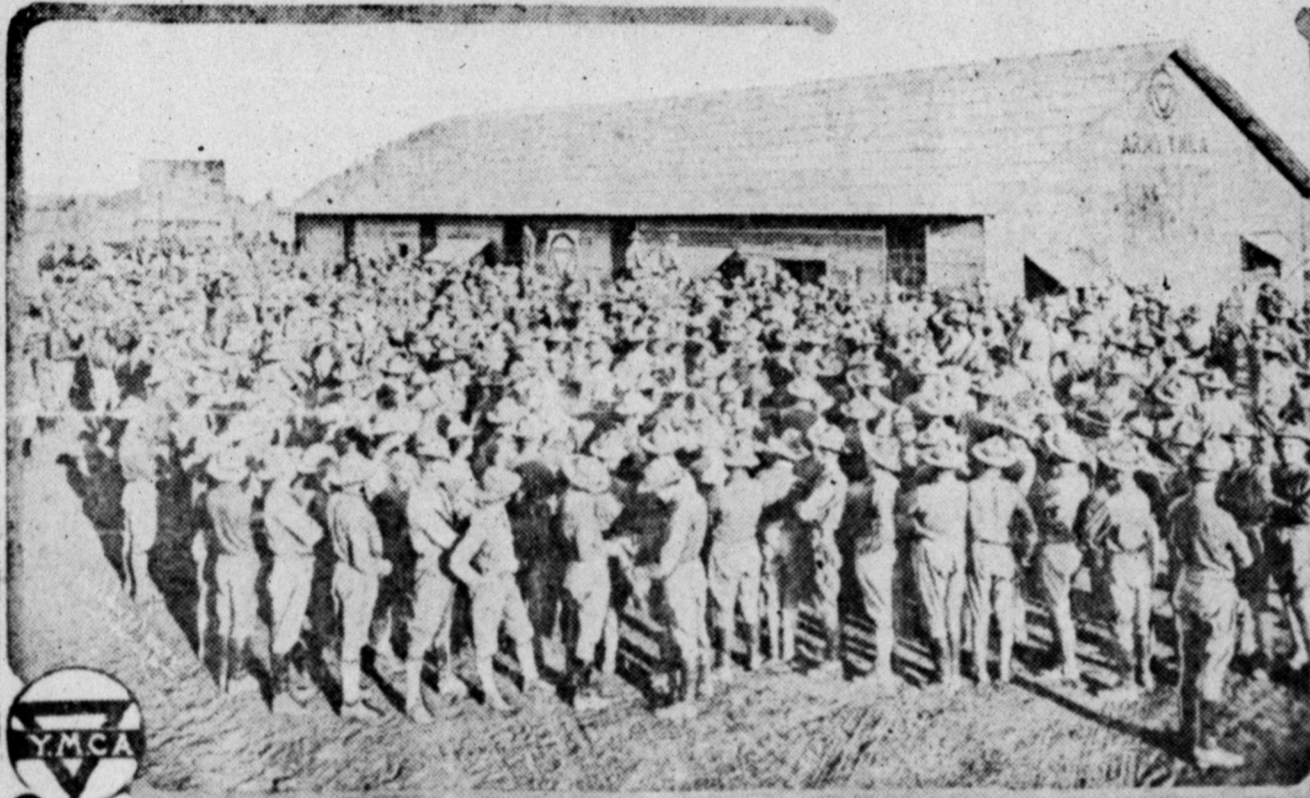

THE ARMY MAN'S BANK



A banking hour in a Y. M. C. A. building of a Southern department camp. The army "Y" is the soldier's financial agent; it takes his savings and deposits them for him in a local city bank; it sells him Thrift stamps; it issues him express money orders, and in certain cases keeps money and valuables for him temporarily in the building. One "Y" man in each building is authorized to act as the agent of the express company to issue money orders to the soldiers. The banking service and the Thrift stamp sales encourage the army man to save his money, and this is made more possible by the free comforts, conveniences and entertainments offered by the Y. M. C. A.

"STANDING ROOM ONLY"



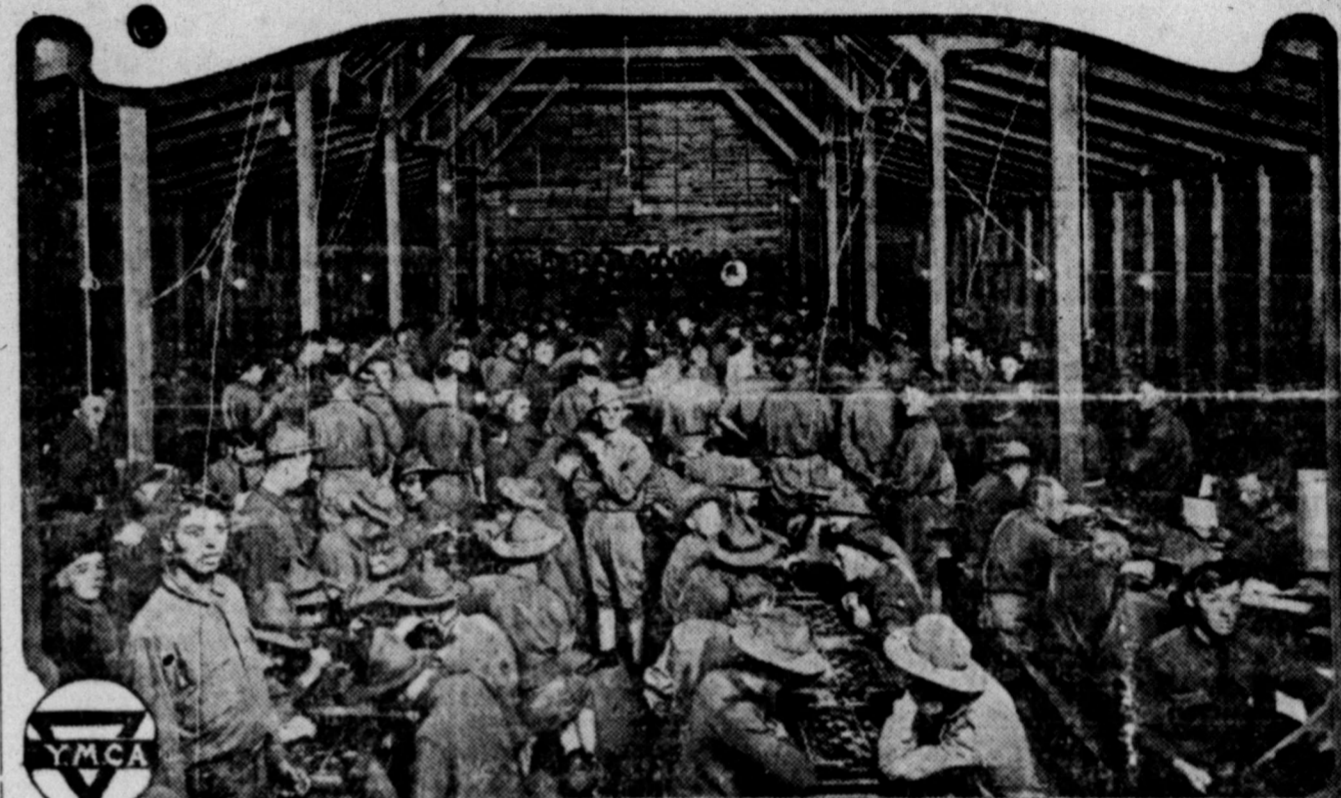
This is simply an overflow crowd at a concert given at a Y. M. C. A. building in Camp MacArthur, Waco, Texas. There is plenty of standing room—outside the building. Apparently good singers and entertainers do not need to fear a slim crowd at their performances before the soldiers. Some of the best musical, dramatic and athletic talent of the country is at the disposal of the army Y. M. C. A. for the benefit of the soldiers. Entertainers who volunteer their services are "booked" by the "Y" secretaries for "circuits" throughout the different camps and several buildings of each. A week's program of an average "Y" building includes at least one of these entertainments, as well as moving pictures, boxing and wrestling contests, an illustrated lecture on a topic of interest to soldiers, and a midweek religious service.

PLENTY TO DO AND EVERYBODY DOING IT



Every man for himself and devil take the loneliest, is, apparently, the philosophy of Uncle Sam's soldier boys in the great military camps where they are undergoing intensive training for the real thing "over there." Here in a typical scene in an army Y. M. C. A. building an hour or two before the formal entertainment begins. On the stage one of the boys in khaki is leading an informal "sing song." About two score of the fellows are up there with him, and it must be a pretty good song, for it can be seen that about half the crowd in the building is facing the music. But this doesn't disturb the nine or ten checker games, seen in the foreground, in the least, nor does it get the goat of the scores of fellows who are grabbing a few minutes in which to write to the folks at home. The man in the extreme right front of the picture has received a newspaper from "the little old town back there," while the boy seen standing in the very center of the picture plainly admits himself to be either on a "point" or on a "pose"—it's nobody's business which. The Y. M. C. A. huts are the soldiers' clubs, churches, homes and whatever else they want to make them. The principal cantonments of the country contain from ten to twenty large "Y" buildings, to say nothing of the huts overseas and outposts on the Mexican border.

NOT QUITE PERFECT BUT HOPES TO PASS ON HIS DISPOSITION

Camp Travis, San Antonio.—"Be thankful my dear, you have no husband in these perilous times," a San Antonio woman advised the hostess at the Y. W. C. A. Hostess House at Camp Travis. This conclusion was reached after the woman had labored several hours at the Camp untangling family troubles of some of the men and their wives. "But," responded the hostess very gently, "there may be none to have after this war is over." "Why honey, don't worry," consoled the visitor, "you won't have any trouble at all, you can get a cripple." "They have turned down my son, though he is ever so eager to go. And he and I are seeking here to make up for it as much as possible. Now they have called him to come before the Board again, and we are both wishing he could go before some other board; this one knows him too well and has classed him as a 'disability'." "If he goes before them again he feels sure they won't take him. He has a silver plate in his head, a paralyzed cheek and a nearly blind eye. He also has a bad ear, and five ribs have been broken that did not reunite without smoothness. His backbone was hurt so his feet turn out more than they should when he walks." "Still we feel he could go before another board, as he is so good looking and cheerful with it all, he thinks maybe they might not notice it."

THE STOREKEEPER UP TO DATE



Gas masks are indispensable articles near the front. This Y. M. C. A. canteen manager has been forced to don his "muzzle," but he is still holding his position behind the counter. He was later wounded while on duty. Y. M. C. A. men at the front not only see that the boys are furnished refreshments, but they often help in the care of the wounded. Several Red Triangle workers have been wounded by shell and gas, while a number have lost their lives in this service. The "fun just over the 'Y' man's shoulder" reads: "Our Slogan—Best for the Man in the Mud."

WOMEN'S ARMY TO BUILD MORALE

Happy Idea Meeting Hearty Response Among Patriotic Women.

A new "army" has been born. It is called the "Sunshine Division," and it is made up of women—mostly young women—who are eager to become a part of definite organized effort to help win the war. The soldiers will not bear arms and court death like their sisters among the Russians. Instead, their line of duty will have to do with service that will strengthen morale, and help win the war by promoting life among the American and allied soldiers, rather than death among the enemy—the final result, according to

military authorities, being equally as effective in its relation to victory. The "women soldiers" of the Sunshine Division will enjoy a definiteness of war work which they have not had before unless they have become members of the leading war work agencies, such as the Red Cross. The plan, which had its inception with a group which composed the concert party headed by Miss Wilson, the president's daughter, which gave concerts in all the army camps, suggests a happy and suitable disposal of the available time and talent of patriotic young women not engaged in definite war activity. Interested persons are being referred to Maj. A. P. Oakes, at offices of the United War Work Activities, Dallas, Tex.

INCREASED FORCE WILL BE NEEDED AT CAMP STANLEY

Camp Stanley, Leon Springs, Texas.—With the coming of several hundred members of the Texas Cavalry to Camp Stanley for training before the brigades are called into service, the Hostess House has greatly increased its scope and activities. For some time the number of men stationed here has been decreased to the point where one hostess, Mrs. Zim Lawton, has been able to care for the visitors. The Young Women's Christian Association, through Mrs. H. B. Durkee, director of hostess houses, is prepared to increase the number of hostesses at Camp Stanley as rapidly as they may be needed.

Hundred Secretaries

The Young Women's Christian Association now has one hundred eleven secretaries in France. They have charge of Foyers des Allies, club houses for French girls working in munition plants, of nurses' huts placed at base hospitals, of centers where American women are located, of Hostess Houses and of houses provided for girls of the American Signal Corps.

Waco Woman Goes to France

Miss Marguerite Williamson has been War Secretary for the Y. W. C. A. for nine months at Camp MacArthur, Waco, Texas. The camp was originally planned for Wisconsin men. Since they went to France it has been used as a replacement center. Miss Williamson is now in France.

Colonel Approves Hostess House

"In my opinion the Hostess House is an institution long and greatly needed. I am glad to give it my unqualified and enthusiastic approval," wrote Colonel C. A. Martin, commanding Camp MacArthur, to Mrs. F. J. Bell, in charge of the Hostess House.

Camp Pike Woman is Overseas

Miss Ruth Frances Woodsmall has been appointed War Work Director at Camp Pike, Ark. She is a graduate of the University of Nebraska, having traveled in Europe and the Orient before undertaking that work. She has recently been transferred to Y. W. C. A. work in France.

RUSSIAN RED ARMY IS PATHETIC SIGHT SAYS MISS BOIES

BOLSHEVIKI SOLDIERS STAGE A DEBATE TO DECIDE WHETHER TO OBEY OFFICER

Stockholm, Sweden.—"You ought to see the Red Army," says a Secretary of the Young Women's Christian Association who was compelled to leave Petrograd on account of political developments and came to this city with Miss Elizabeth Boies of Cincinnati, director of association work in Russia.

"It is a pathetic spectacle," the secretary continues. "It is made up of men and boys who want a place to eat and sleep without work. Many of them are mere boys, and all are rather feebly in their fighting; sometimes they will, then again they won't. When the officers give orders, the men hold a consultation; it sounds like a debating society. Then they take a vote on it. If the vote carries they obey, otherwise they calmly refuse, and if the officer is insistent about it, they proceed to elect another officer."

"Russians show two traits that make us love and trust them. One of the most impressive things you see in the country is the evident lack of viciousness in the cities and towns; it can not but be observed by those of us who come from America. The other is their philosophic acceptance of what the fates bring. With my experience, I am utterly unable to conceive of a really excited Russian."

WOMEN ENLIST IN BATTALION OF LIFE

Sunshine Division of Home Service Rivals Battalion of Death in Real War Work.

Russia's Battalion of Death made its women immortal by death-defying action at the front. America's Battalion of Life bids fair to merit immortality by its life and strength giving action in the home trenches, connecting directly with the men who go over the top.

A new kind of women's army has come into being. It is called the "Sunshine Division." It started under unusual circumstances. Margaret Woodrow Wilson, the president's daughter, known for her patriotic war service; her aide, Major Oakes, and a small group of friends, including Miss Marguerite Brown of Atlanta, Ga., daughter of one of the leading industrialists, and a relative of the president, were discussing women's part in the war and the importance of enlisting the effort, and talent, and activity of every woman in the country. The need of organization and direction of that time and talent not already devoted to definite war work was recognized, and out of the discussion came plans for conserving the patriotic effort of every patriotic woman, and more especially the young women of the country. The "army" to be recruited was designated the "Sunshine Division." Its scope of service is limited only by the ability of the enlisted women to serve, and there is no woman ineligible for service except she who is already doing her utmost to help win the war. Participants are Misses A. P. Oakes, now stationed at United War Work headquarters, Dallas, Tex.

Miss Armes Returns From France

Irene Armes, 22 State, Boston, secretary of the Young Women's Christian Association in Paris and a member of the Executive Committee of the Allied Women on War Service, has returned to the United States to resume her duties.

Half Million Girls in League

More than a half million girls have joined the Patriotic League, an organization of the Young Women's Christian Association, formed for the benefit of girls affected by war conditions.

The Y. W. C. A. Centers for American Women in France

Hostess Houses and houses for girls of the Signal Corps now number twelve.

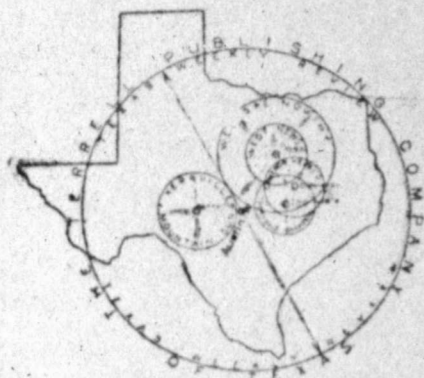

vertising rates, and otherwise exhibiting sound business judgment. When potatoes, bacon or calico cost the merchant more, he sells them for more. The same principle must be applied to the newspaper business if the newspaper is to survive."

Forty-four members of the Students' Army Training Corps of the University of Texas have been sent to officers' training camps. Four of the men were sent to Camp Hancock, Augusta, Ga., the remainder to Camp McArthur, Waco.

Thirty-nine newly commissioned second lieutenants have recently arrived at Camp Mabry to assist in training the young men at the school of Automobile Mechanics which the University of Texas is conducting for the Government. These officers came from 26 universities and three military academies in fourteen states.

#### One Way to Help Your Government

As a measure of economy Postmasters are directed to encourage the public to use stamps of the highest denomination suited to the amount of postage required on all mail. For example a 3-cent stamp instead of three one-cent stamps should be affixed to letters needing three-cent postage; and a ten-cent stamp instead of five two-cent stamps should be attached to parcels requiring ten-cent postage.

Special attention is directed to people who will use 2 one-cent stamps instead of 1 two-cent stamp on post cards. In cases where the Government card has but one cent on it the use of a one-cent stamp is unavoidable, however very soon all one-cent cards will be exhausted.

By the use of large denominations a very large saving will result in the quantity of paper used, the transportation, labor in cancelling and affixing so many stamps. It is dangerous to lick stamps; keep them out of your mouth.

Ladies are especially requested to give this attention as it is noticed by postoffice employees that the women use more one-cent stamps than men on the theory that green stamps are prettier.

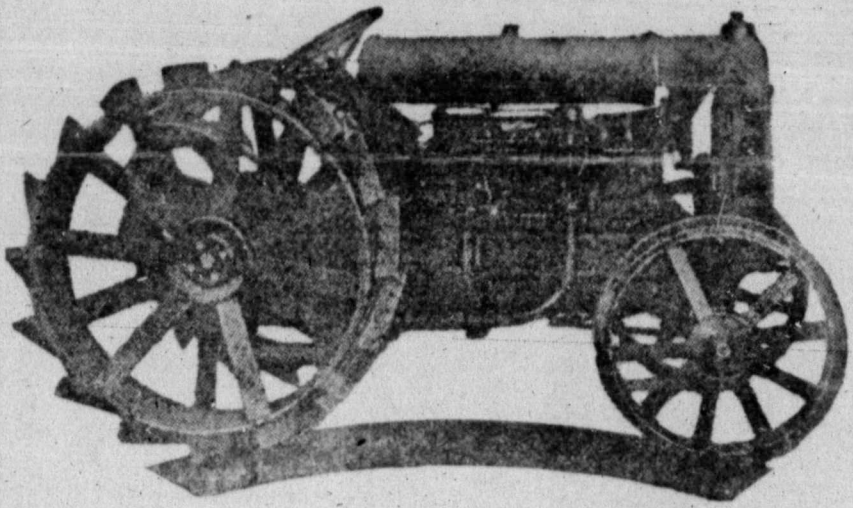

**TEXAS-MEXICAN IS PROUDEST OF HER HUSBAND'S COUNTRY**

WIFE OF U. S. SOLDIER DE-CLARES WOMEN ENJOY MORE FREEDOM NORTH OF RIO GRANDE

Wealthy Mexican women coming to Texas regard themselves as sojourners in a foreign land; those not so fortunately situated in money matters view with consternation and indignation any suggestion that they return to conditions from which they have found a haven in the United States, according to a teacher of the International Institute at San Antonio.

Both types of women are represented in an English class conducted by the institute under the shadow of the Alamo. Quite casually the teacher recently asked how many of the women had voted. One of the aristocratic ladies with dignity and surpassing grace explained in polite terms that they were only sojourning here for a while and intended to return to Mexico and did not intend to become naturalized.

Thereupon Mrs. Jones, a Texas-Mexican, who had known the pangs of poverty and had seen something of the degradation not infrequently falling to some of her countrywomen, triumphantly rose to her feet. Filled with pride that she is "American" because she had married a Texas man, she declaimed, "Soy Texana!" Then she launched into a speech detailing the misery and poor estate of women in Mexico compared with the exquisite bliss of the "Texana," the freedom and honor in which women are held in this land of the free.



This is not, therefore, a war of science: it is a fight in which science, as expressed through chemistry and engineering, is being used to the utmost power of human ingenuity, aided by every influence which the devil himself can put into effect to enable Germany to make more frightful its hell-devised and hell-begotten plan of murder.

We have been compelled to meet German science with greater science. We have been forced to find a way to master its work in the air, on the land and under the sea; and the science of Americans and our Allies will yet prove as far superior to the science of Germany in its campaign of murder as American honor exceeds the black dishonor of Germany.

As every telegraphic click across the Atlantic brings a new toll of death and suffering, our hearts should be steeled to an unbending and unbendable determination that Germany and the German people shall pay to the utmost extent of human power the penalty of their crimes, not only because they deserve punishment as the blackest criminals in history, but in order that civilization may be safeguarded for the future.

Every word of peace spoken in America or in the countries of our Allies is uttered by some one who is a pro-German at heart, whatever may be the disguise under which he seeks, clothed in the livery of Heaven, to do the devil's work.

False to the teachings of God Himself, false to the history of all humanity, false to every man who has died and to every man who has been wounded on the battlefields in defense of civilization, false to the honor of womanhood and the safety of childhood, false to human liberty now and forever, is every man or woman who utters one word suggestive of peace without punishment.

False is every man who even for one moment thinks that an unbeaten, unrepentant, unpunished Germany would not for all the centuries to come be a blot upon civilization and an everlasting disgrace to those who profess to believe in that righteous wrath which every honest-hearted man and woman should have as we contemplate the boundless woe and unvoicable sorrow with which Germany has filled the world, merely that its people might become the murderers, the outragers, the looters of all mankind for personal and national aggrandizement. It would seem that even Almighty God would to such spineless moral degenerates or cowards as those who favor peace without punishment say, "Because you are neither hot nor cold I will spew you out of my mouth."

Paris, France.—The Kaiser's moustache, the "Clown Quince's" spurs and the German helmets American boys have promised to send to the "only girl" are yet to be gotten, but while he is in Paris the average soldier is planning to send her some thing pretty, something "chic" from the famous shops of the city. But they have found buying feminine finery in Paris a job for which their military training sadly failed to prepare them.

"Gosh," exclaimed a perspiring and perplexed boy as he emerged from the embarrassing uncertainties of a French dressmaker's shop. "This is no man's job! Me for a woman!" and remembering his fellow country women at Hated Potrograd, the Young Women's Christian Association's Hostess House in Paris, to tell his troubles to a smiling secretary.

The hostess laughed and promised to get him "some of those or fluffy things a girl likes, you know." When the boy received an enthusiastic letter from home praising his wonderful taste, he knew he had chosen wisely, and congratulated himself that in the exigency of writing he had failed to say how he came to make the selection. He did not tell "her" about it, but he did let his chums in on the secret.

Numberless men now come to the Blue Triangle women and say "get the right thing for the girl," and dismiss the matter from their minds. When they get back home they have planned to explain that their taste was inspired by the absent one "over here", but they will breathe a sigh of relief when they remember how the Blue Triangle "never tells" the secrets it receives in confidence.

## FRENCH MUNITION WORKERS ANXIOUS TO LEARN ENGLISH

Washington, D. C.—Needs of women engaged in industrial work of the nation, the work which must progress in order for the Army to play its part, manufacture of munitions and war supplies, are met by the Young Women's Christian Association, just as the needs of the men in the army itself are met by the Y. M. C. A. and other like organizations.

In munitions centers in France foyers, clubs for women, are maintained for the women workers, at the request of the French Minister of War. In America, at the twenty-two government munition plants, and the hundred or so privately owned plants, like provisions have been made for keeping up the "morale," the working efficiency of the women, by caring for their recreation, eating and housing.

One of the striking features of the work in French munition plants is the large number of women who visit the foyers at night for the purpose of studying English. The demand for teachers of this subject is always in excess of the supply. The same is true in but a lesser degree in stenography; scores of French girls are studying it with a view of being available for clerical work with the American Expeditionary forces in France.

### French Movies are Coming

Paris, France.—Movies of the women visiting Foyers—des Allies, at Lyon and St. Etienne, have been taken by the French government, and will be sent to America. They show munition workers enjoying the hospitality of the American Young Women's Christian Association, which originated the Foyers, or clubs, for the working women in those cities.

### Munition Workers Have Foyers

Nine foyers, club rooms with recreation, rest and dining accommodations, have been provided for French women working in munitions factories by the Young Women's Christian Association. Three of the clubs are at Lyon, two at St. Etienne and one at Bruges. The others are at points which the censor does not now permit to be named.

### Mrs. Dean Opens Foyers

Mrs. Thyra Barton Dean, of Chicago, who has been opening foyers for French girls at "A French port" has been joined by Miss Ethel Scribner, of Cherokee, Ia., who will be in charge of the Signal Corps group, Miss Mary H. Post, of San Jose, Cal., has arrived at the same port to establish a Y. W. C. A. hostess house for American women in France, including those arriving and those at the port waiting to return to the United States.

### Signal Corps Girls in N. Y.

American Signal Corps girls, whatever be their embarkation point, are concentrated in New York. They are quartered on the top floor of the Y. W. C. A. Training school, at 125 East 52nd Street until they receive orders to embark.

### Hostess Houses for Negroes

Hostess houses for negro women, who wish to visit their relatives and friends in the service, are now maintained at the camps where negro troops are stationed in the United States. In some instances there are regular houses, planned and conducted just as those for white troops are handled. In other camps quarters have been difficult to secure and smaller houses have been taken for the use of women acting as hostesses for the visiting negro women.

### HAS A BIG JOB

G. S. Bilheimer of Denver, Colo., has been appointed Southern department campaign director for the next big drive for funds to continue the war work being done by the Red Triangle forces in the army camps of the United States and overseas, army Y. M. C. A., the Y. W. C. A., the War Camp Community Service, the Salvation Army, the National Catholic War Council, the American Library Association and the Jewish Welfare Board.

Mr. Bilheimer is one of the foremost men in the Y. M. C. A. movement. He is a member of the International committee of the organization, a member of the National War Council and a master organizer and executive. He successfully directed the last army Y. M. C. A. drive for the Southern Department, comprised of Texas, Arkansas, Oklahoma, Louisiana, Arizona and New Mexico, and was unanimously chosen for the larger responsibility of the approaching campaign, during which the country will be called upon to support the Y. M. C. A. and other important war work agencies.

Mr. Bilheimer will be located at Dallas during the campaign period. He will have an able corps of assistants and specialists on his staff to carry out the various activities connected with a campaign of the magnitude of the forthcoming financial drive.

Mr. Bilheimer was chosen to direct the entire United War Work campaign for funds to finance the work of the seven war work agencies because of his successful experience and his unusual ability. His selection came direct from the New York headquarters of the consolidated campaign, with the solid approval of the people of the six Southern states who are under his leadership. To finance their part of the \$175,000,000 which the nation will expend on its contribution between November 11 and '18.

**U. S. Builds Women Dormitories**  
Government dormitories are being built in Washington for women near the Union Station, according to plans provided by the War Work Council of the Young Women's Christian Association. It is designed to house the transients among the 50,000 women clerks in Washington doing war work.

**Care For American Women**  
The Blue Triangle maintains two Hostess Houses for American women at Tours, France. One is for the Signal Corps girls; the other for American women there attached to other enterprises. The Young Women's Christian Association also maintains a club for nurses and a foyer for French girls.
