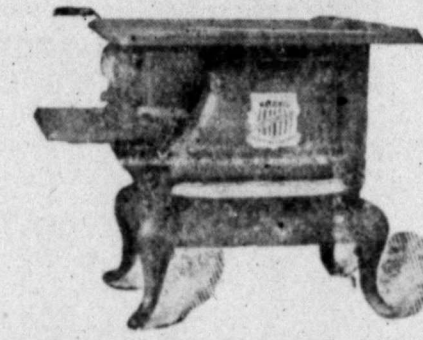
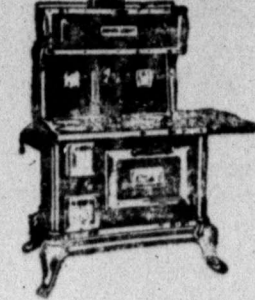

The letter was signed by R. C. Duff, chairman of the meeting, of Houston, and it was virtually an apology for the action of the Texas Legislature.

The meeting was an open rally called to formulate a plan to effect the

election of S. Bailey, the executive committee this afternoon and judging by the enthusiasm evidenced by the candidates supporters the plan bids fair to succeed.

The meeting was held with cheers which recurred after resolution was read and accepted by those who came to Dallas to consecrate themselves to the task of electing Bailey next governor of Texas.

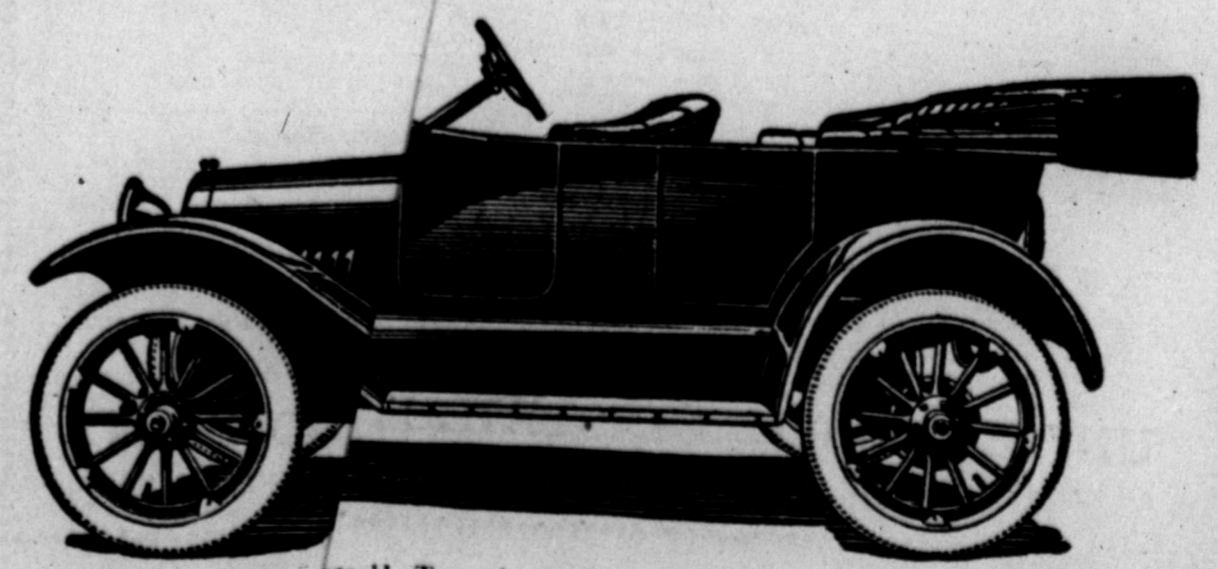
