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C. of C. Holds Lively Membership Meeting at St. Charles Hotel

Although but about 40 members were in attendance, the June membership meeting of the Chamber of Commerce at the St. Charles Hotel Tuesday night was one of the liveliest of recent months.

Reports of committees followed the delightful salad course, after which the meeting was given over to short talks by various members and several visitors.

City and County Engineer S. K. Mason made an encouraging report on the progress of the highway and sewer work. Mr. Mason stated that with favorable conditions it is believed the south section of Water Street will be put back into use within the next few days.

He reported further that the sewer construction is progressing rapidly and that every effort is being made to keep streets open to traffic and to put them back in their original condition as fast as possible.

Dr. W. P. Dickey remarked that inconveniences contingent upon the highway and sewer work are more easily borne when one stops to think that a constructive work is being done and when completed the conditions will be better than ever before.

Judge Julius Real submitted a report on the barbecue held at Rocksprings last Thursday and said that the highway work from there to the County line is progressing at a good rate. Practically all the obstacles in the way of the work have been overcome and within the next few months a Federal standard highway will reach from Rocksprings to the Kerr County line.

Judge Real also reported that the Medina precinct had recently voted

YOUNG PEOPLE'S CONFERENCE OPENS WESTMINSTER PROGRAM

Large Number of Delegates Arriving From All Over State—Over 300 Registered to Wednesday.

The Westminster Presbyterian Encampment opened for the nineteenth consecutive session Wednesday with a registration of over 300. The Young People's Conference started then and will last until June 26.

The ages of those admitted to this conference are from 16 to 25 years, and those who are with them as leaders and teachers.

Plans for the young people include the organization of Scottish clans in every presbytery, and all over the Synod of Texas the clans are preparing for the encampment.

The Western Texas Presbytery has two clans. The eight churches in San Antonio are known as Bruce Clan, while the churches in the presbytery outside of the city are known as the McGregor Clan. Other clans are McDonald, Dallas; Campbell, Houston; McLean, Austin; McPherson, Brownwood; McDuff, children and intermediates. A silver cup is to be awarded to the clan making the best record.

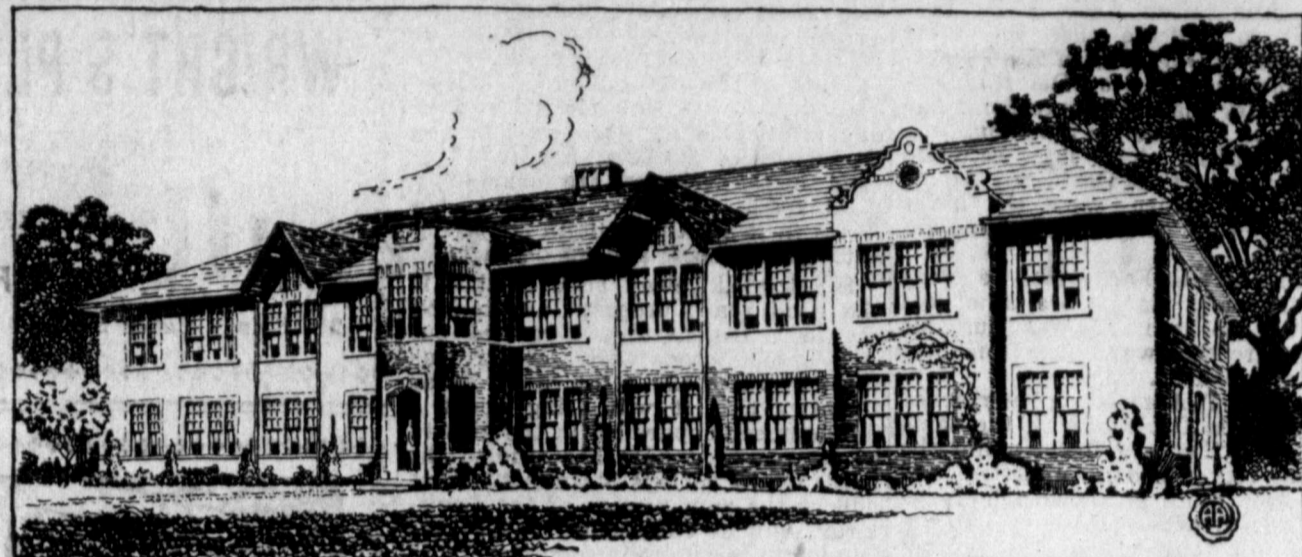

This conference is separated from the other part of the encampment in order that the young people may have the grounds to themselves, creating a definite atmosphere.

The construction work on the new dormitory unit for the Schreiner Institute, shown above, has reached the finishing stage and the building will be ready for occupancy at the beginning of next school term. The walls have a distinctive rich rug appearance, being of interblended red shades of rough texture tapestry brick laid in Flemish bond with wide flush cut white joints. Contrasting with the brick is the cream white stone trim and the divided windows. Above is the dark brown cornice with roof of mingled shades of slate, running from brownish purple to pearl gray. The whole constitutes a charming effect worked out in English type of informal collegiate buildings. The new dormitory sets opposite the first dormitory, the quadrangle being between the two, and at one end of the quadrangle, is the three story Administration and class room building in the same style. The new building will house 60 students in addition to two suites for teachers, and hospital room and other minor rooms. On the first story there is a large lounge, 36 feet long with a large stone fireplace, from which lead double stairs to the second story. There are two bathrooms for the teachers' suites and four groups of shower and toilet facilities for the students.

The biggest crowd of the season witnessed the game with Fredericksburg well represented by supporters.

It was one of the fastest and cleanest games seen on the local diamond this year. The umpiring, handled by two Fredericksburg men, was highly satisfactory and kicking on decisions was conspicuous by its absence.

The crowd seemed to be congenial and bantering between enthusiastic supporters of both teams never reached the stage called "raw hiding." Taken all around it was a model game of baseball and both teams are to be congratulated upon their display of good sportsmanship.

Little Eddie Mueller, premier hurler of Southwest Texas, was in top form and the Giants were unable to solve his dazzling assortment of baffling shots. But three hits were chalked up against the little fellow and he was never in danger of being scored on.

His support was almost perfect. Three errors gave Giants life on base, but none of them proved costly. The domestics were on the war path with the willow and cleaned up ten safeties with only four strike outs getting on the book.

Wilson started things to popping in the first frame when he laced out a hot one to center field that went for three sacks. A salvo of hits followed and Collins gave up the ghost after three runs had crossed the pan, one man put out and the bases still loaded.

Bob Lee, veteran spitballer, relieved him and pulled out of the hole. Collins went back in the second and managed to keep the hits better scattered the rest of the way.

Karger is developing a habit of losing balls and dumped another over the fence Sunday. The circuit clout

came in the seventh and went over the right field fence. It was the fulfillment of a threat made before the game.

Mueller fanned ten Giants, the first time since he has been hurling for the domestics that he has failed to get a dozen or more strike outs in each game.

Dr. E. Galbraith Points Out That Entire Citizenship Is Responsible for Law Enforcement.

Dear Mr. Editor: I will be glad if you will publish this letter, which I feel impelled to write at this time owing to the tragic accident which recently happened to some of our boys and which cannot but cause us all to feel our responsibility for a strong desire to do everything possible to safeguard our boys and girls and free them from the temptations and dangers to which they are daily exposed.

How can this be accomplished? I would say, first, by teaching, and above all, by example in our homes. Let us give up every appearance or form of gambling at our parties and let us serve no intoxicating liquors, these being two kinds of law-breaking that seem to be sadly prevalent in present day society and which are rapidly destroying the morality of our people.

I feel confident there is not a thoughtful parent in Kerrville who, realizing the danger to his own and other people's children, would not gladly deny himself these pleasures. Then when we have made our homes law-abiding we will be in a position to demand of our officers that all our laws be strictly enforced and they, knowing we are solidly behind them, will do their duty, for public sentiment is one of the greatest powers in law enforcement.

Our homes, our country, State, Nation and the world need sober, honest, right minded, unselfish citizens at this time if we are not to retrograde. Let us keep in continual remembrance the deep sorrow that has befallen us all together in a loving desire to help and protect those committed to our care. Let none of us forget it until this community is made a place of peace and safety for everyone.

H. P. FAIRMAN CLAIMED BY DEATH SUNDAY AFTER LINGERING ILLNESS

Came Here for Health Seven Years Ago and Was Known as Podger; Body Sent to Old Home.

H. P. Fairman, known as "Podger," passed away at 7:45 Sunday evening at Hillcrest Sanatorium after an illness of several years. Death was caused by heart displacement, which had confined him to his bed for more than a month.

Mr. Fairman was born September 15, 1872, at Antioch, Ill., the son of Mr. and Mrs. G. H. Fairman. For many years he was in the employ of the Bell Telephone Co. in Chicago, St. Louis and in various points in Illinois. It was while in their employ that his health broke down and he was sent to a health resort by that company.

He came to Kerrville in September, 1917, and entered Hillcrest Sanatorium. He had regained strength continuously since coming here, but during the past several months his health again began to go down grade, culminating in his final sickness and death.

During the time he was in Kerrville Mr. Fairman had written for several newspapers and magazines and sold a number of short stories. He was local correspondent for three large Texas dailies during the past several years and helped to gain wide publicity for Kerrville through his news stories in those publications.

He was better known to many people as "A. Podger," under which name he contributed baseball stories and a column of "Abbreviated Fickshun" to The Mountain Sun until more than a year ago.

The deceased numbered his friends here in hosts. He was by nature kind-hearted and performed many helpful deeds for friends and for others who were fighting disease as he had done. His loss is truly felt by all who knew him.

Slayer of Ranger Captured

Benavides fled to Mexico, but was arrested at Matamoros at 2 o'clock this afternoon and will be brought back.

A fight is reported to have started over the collection of money from Benavides. Benavides is said to have run into his house and come back with a shotgun, firing twice, both loads striking Taylor, one in the face and the other in the shoulder. He is then said to have finished Taylor by beating him in the head with the butt of the gun.

Taylor was a former Texas ranger and during the bandit trouble on the border took a prominent part in border warfare. He is 35 years old and is survived by a widow and one son.

The slain man is a cousin of Mr. and Mrs. D. C. C. Taylor of this city.

Plans Perfected for Menard Road

San Antonio Express, June 17th: A. E. Nauwald of Menard, one of a substantial group of men who are making the section northwest of San Antonio one to be reckoned with in figures in the development of the State's resources, brought word to interested San Antonians Monday, of the splendid highway that the citizens of Menard and Kimble Counties are ready to build.

This new road will be the "short cut" from Menard to Junction, and will shorten the distance between the two towns by 10 miles, reducing their connecting highway to 28 miles.

Bonds have already been voted and issued for the building of this highway; engineers are busily engaged in making the surveys preliminary to the actual road construction, which

will surely be under way within 30 days, Mr. Nauwald is convinced.

In addition to this, the county highway from the Mason to the Sutton County lines is being graded and put into perfect condition, and now affords a hard-surface, all-weather highway all the way from San Antonio to San Angelo, via Menard and Eden. This highway connects with the Old Spanish Trail at Sonora. Indeed, a bus line is already in operation over this road, making daily trip from San Antonio to San Angelo, via Junction and Menard.

The "short cut" road to Junction runs through some of the best territory in the two counties, and adapts itself particularly well to road-building. What is of greatest importance to San Antonio is the fact that this 28-mile stretch of fine highway will complete a 250-mile loop with San Antonio at its apex, of splendid, all-weather highway. This loop runs from San Antonio to Boerne, to Kerrville, to Junction, to Menard, to Mason, to Fredericksburg, to Boerne, to San Antonio.

He also told of some of the methods used by Chambers of Commerce in North Texas in advertising their sections and extending trade territories.

Mr. Christian, who is in charge of the singing at the revival being conducted at the Baptist Church, favored the gathering with two vocal solos that were received with applause.

TEXAN, 96, CUTTING FOURTH SET OF TEETH

ORIGINAL O. S. T. ROUTE SAN ANTONIO TO EL PASO IS BEST

Junction Eagle, June 13th: Occasional complaints have been made to the Highway Department of the San Antonio Chamber of Commerce, regarding the road west of Junction, and this department has been kind enough to pass their information on to us here. The Highway Department under W. H. Furlong, has been very kindly disposed toward Junction, and the road

from San Antonio to El Paso, which passes this way, but they depend to a large extent on information furnished them by parties living along the routes, or by parties traveling over the roads.

One of these complaints recently came to Emil A. Loeffler of the Junction Hardware Co., who has for a long time furnished the San Antonio Chamber of Commerce with information at frequent intervals as to the condition of the roads out this way. The information conveyed here seemed to indicate that the route over another Old Spanish Trail marking, going by way of Del Rio, was much better than the route from San Antonio to El Paso via Junction.

Mr. Loeffler has just returned from a trip to Fort Davis and Alpine and on his return, came the lower route in order to get first hand information.

On the way to Fort Davis he drove over the road via Sonora, Sheffield and Fort Stockton. He was thus able to compare the two routes from personal observation.

The O. S. T. Association has marked the route via Del Rio, with the same road signs that are used along the original route through Junction, and this lower route is known simply as the O. S. T. with nothing to indicate that it is a tourist loop, or a secondary marked route as has been represented to the people along the original O. S. T. by the Association officials.

Mr. Loeffler states that the road to Del Rio is good and there is some good road for a distance beyond this city, but that with a few exceptions, the route, after crossing the Pecos River, is a mere trail and in many places is exceptionally rough even in dry weather. While the road west through Sonora, Sheffield and Fort Stockton is not a graded highway, a great deal of work has been done on this section of the O. S. T. and by actual comparison, the original O. S. T. from Junction west is a much better road than the one from Del Rio west.

Mr. Loeffler stopped for a short time at the little town of Langtry, made famous as the home of Judge Roy Bean, "The Law West of the Pecos." The old Roy Bean saloon is still standing and still bears the name of this widely known Justice of the Peace, who pronounced all kinds of sentences from fining a dead man for being found dead with a pistol on, to giving a life term in the penitentiary.

RIDGEWAY ANNOUNCES FOR STATE SENATOR

T. H. Ridgeway has announced his candidacy for re-election to the office of State Senator for the 26th Senatorial District, composed of the Counties of Bexar, Kendall, Kerr and Bandera. The term of office of a State Senator is four years, but on account of the re-districting bill enacted by the 37th Legislature which became effective in 1924, an entirely new Senate must be elected this year making it necessary for Senator Ridgeway to run again, although he has only served two years.

Senator Ridgeway is a native of Tennessee, but was raised on a farm in the State of Missouri. He moved to Houston, after becoming of age where he taught school two years during which time he studied law and was admitted to the bar. He moved to San Antonio 22 years ago, where since that time he has been actively engaged in the practice of law.

Senator Ridgeway was City Attorney of the City of San Antonio during the administration of Mayor O. B. Black. While he was City Attorney he was elected to the office of State Senator.

Senator Ridgeway served upon practically all of the important Senate Committees, and as a member of the Finance Committee he took a stand for strict economy in the administration of the affairs of the State and succeeded in eliminating or reducing a number of unnecessary appropriations. Under the Constitution all revenue measures must originate in the House of Representatives. About one hundred and fifty separate and distinct taxation measures were introduced in the House during the 38th Legislature thirty-nine of which

passed and reached the Senate. Most of these bills were killed in the State Affairs Committee, upon which Senator Ridgeway served. Senator Ridgeway worked with the State Affairs Committee and materially aided in working out a few simple taxation measures that are taking care of the deficit, the appropriations made and the needs of the State, the burdens of which are not being felt by the masses of the people.

Senator Ridgeway believes that the two most essential things to the growth and progress of this State are good schools and good roads. The parents of the one million three hundred thousand school children in Texas are demanding good schools and the owners of the seven hundred thousand motor vehicles are demanding good roads. Senator Ridgeway believes in going the limit in supplying both good schools and good roads.

Senator Ridgeway believes that if the good roads program adopted by the 38th Legislature is carried out and good roads are constructed through all of the South West Texas Counties that it will bring about a development unparalleled in the growth of any country. He has studied the needs of the various State institutions and at the next session of the Legislature will be enabled to render good service to the State in connection with legislation and appropriations concerning these institutions. Senator Ridgeway was a strong supporter of the bill that came before the last Legislature designed to equalize taxes among the various counties of this State. This bill failed by three votes in the Senate. Senator Ridgeway believes that this bill can be passed at the next session of the Legislature. Under the present system a large number of the north and east Texas counties are drawing back from the State for the support of their schools large sums of money in excess of the amount they pay to the State in taxes.

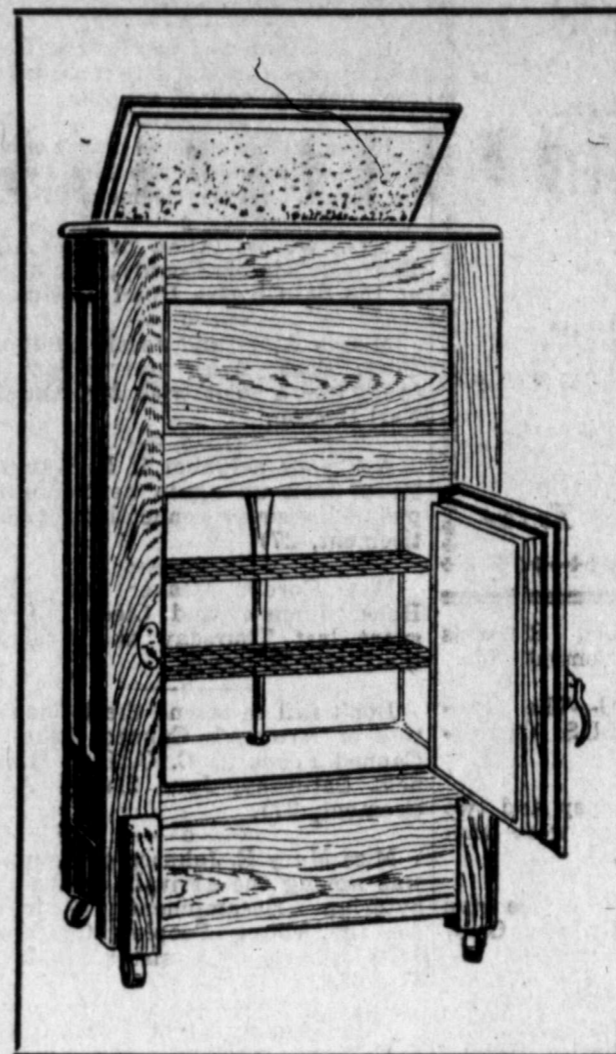
San Antonio Express: Angora goats play a unique role in American thought and economy. They grow by millions in our country, yet the very existence of the breed is unknown to many. The goats are sent to market by tens of thousands every year, yet no menu card ever lists Angora chops or Angora roast. Fabric made of their lustrous hair is worn and admired from coast to coast, yet only a few identify it or know its source. Asia Minor is the original home of the Angora. The matchless fabrics of the Orient first served to impress the world with the excellent character of mohair. South Africa and the United States have since become the second and third important centers, respectively, of mohair production. For nearly 40 years and edict of the Sultan of Turkey has forbidden the exportation of Angora goats. For 15 years the South African States have laid prohibitive restrictions on exports of stock. In the presence of this apparent handicap American breeders have evolved Angora goats second to none in vigor, uniformity, weight of fleece, and character of hair. Far from his native land, strange striking and interesting in appearance, unique in his enjoyment and utilization of what would be waste forage and browse, the Angora goat has no peer in such respects among the profitable animals of our country. By choice a dweller of desert and brush land, clothed in the fine raiment he gave to monarchs of old, the Angora has "conquered by enduring."

Beeville Picayune: Are you sold on the Chamber of Commerce idea that no begging on the streets or house to house peddling, or advertising schemes and the like should be permitted in Beeville until the person and proposition can be investigated by a committee? If found worthy of the Chamber of Commerce will endorse it. If the business men and housewives will get behind this proposition it will mean the saving of thousands of dollars to the town annually. And it won't be long until beggars and solicitors will be giving the town the go-by. of dissipation and lawlessness it will soon die.

Most people to whom I have talked on the subject say that they have grown tired of jazz music, and they will not go to entertainments if they know the music is to be of that kind. These people are not musical high-brows either; they are just plain people with simple tastes who have been over-fed on the noisy, discordant, senseless airs that have characterized our music of the past few years. They know little about Wagner or Beethoven. Still, they are not especially anxious to return to the old-fashioned old masters, but they do want something better than modern "rag-time jazz."

One evidence of the musical reaction under way is the growing popularity of singing conventions and community singing, where the songs of twenty or fifty years ago are the most popular, and at which thousands of human voices are blended in the sweet old-time melodies. It is not what all men gather in one county and spend two or three days in such song-fests, and those who do become reunions of those who delight in the association of those of like tastes. "Jazz" is tabooed in both song and conduct at such reunions. These gatherings give hope for the early return of sanity in American music.

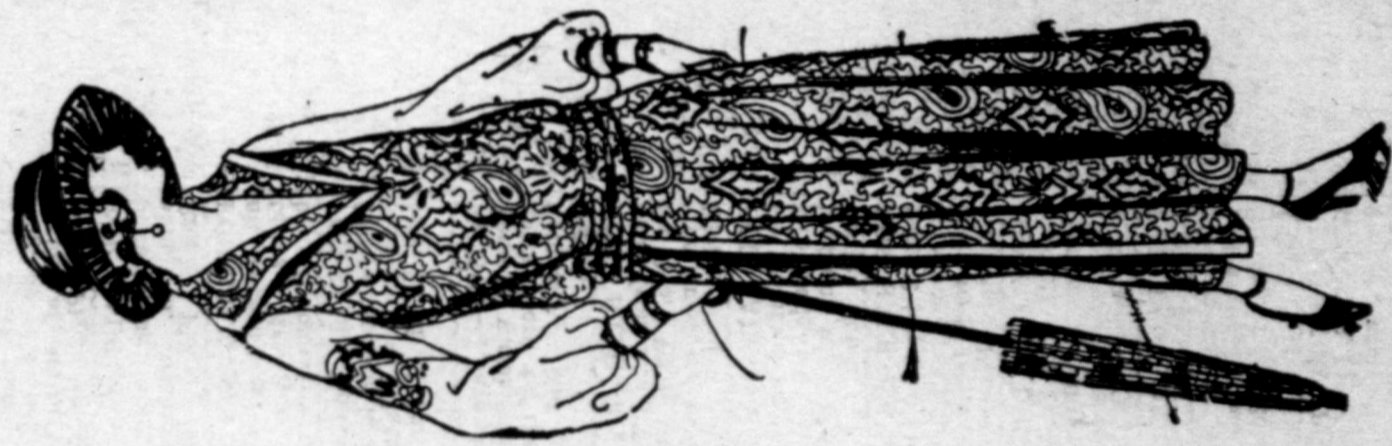
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
