Just to show that the citizens of this country were not actuated in those times solely by a spirit of patriotic zeal, but by a deep and enduring love of their country, Kerrville and the Hill Country again went over the top last Friday in the Defense Day program and in signing the roster of renewed allegiance to the Constitution of the United States.

Owing to the rain and mud, the parade scheduled for the afternoon was dispensed with, and after a band concert on the St. Charles lawn by the 20th Infantry Band, the meeting adjourned to Legion, where, in the Red city on the northeast. On that day, according to the speaker, every reserve officer in the country was filling out requisition blanks and other papers, which he was to forward into headquarters, and in a sense the citizens who were signing the rosters provided for that purpose were signing a mock volunteer register for service

During the World War 39 per cent of the troops on the active front were from the regular army, but in the next war only 9 per cent of the soldiers would come from the regulars, according to Major Pyle. He fixed this estimate by reason of the small standing army the country is at present maintaining and because of the fact that practically all of the regulars would be used under the Defense Act in drilling new troops. He stated that the regular army at present is nothing but a school to teach teachers.

According to the Major, in the event of the United States being drawn into war, the reserve officers in each community would mobilize available men, fill out requisitions for arms and equipment and have the troops in not otherwise engaged. actual training within twelve hours after war was declared and that they in charge of the course and it is and one-fourth inches; Reagan Counfamiliar sight around the court house would be fully equipped within a short time. would not be necessary.

FIRE-TIME TRAFFIC REGULATIONS LAID DOWN IN CITY ORDINANCE

Increased by Improved Conditions: Violators to Pay for Sins.

Stringent regulations governing traffic during times of fire were laid down in an ordinance passed by the City Commission at its last regular meeting. The new rules, which are similar to San Antonio regulations, are expected to improve traffic conditions and eliminate the confusion and delay to fire apparatus that has here-tofore prevailed when an alarm has been turned in.

The new ordinance, which was passed through the efforts of Fire Chief Eugene Butt, will be enforced to the letter, according to a statement issued by Chief Traffic Officer E. W. West. All violations of its provisions will be actively prosecuted without partiality, he states.

The provisions of the ordinance,

paper, are given in a few words by Fire Chief Butt: Fire engines and apparatus, while being operated as such, have the right of way on all public streets.

TRAFFIC ORDINANCE

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Kerrville:

Section 1. Rule 1. That fire engines and fire apparatus, in all cases while being operated as such, shall have the right of way on all public streets.

Rule 2. On the approach of any fire apparatus, pedestrians shall immediately betake themselves to the sidewalk and all drivers of vehicles shall immediately draw up such vehicles as near as possible to the right hand curb and bring them to a stop, and remain standing until such appa-

Section 3—Penalties






