Building Designed Especially for Line of Work Will Assist Materially in Handling Products.

After being under construction for several months the new home of the American Creamery has been completed and the creamery moved into same this week. Most of the machinery in the plant was installed new and nesday, so that this morning the plant is in full operation in their new

The building, on Water Street between the Weston and Lee Mason & Son garages, is a fireproof structure throughout. Dimensions of the structlre are 40x60 feet, with the front 18 feet divided into two rooms, one for office work and the other for a sales room.

The building is constructed of brick, with cement floors throughout. The interior of the factory has walls of snowy whiteness, being coated with a white enamel that gives all the brilliance of the famous barreled sunlight and that also will withstand the frequent washings it will undergo in keeping the creamery clean and sanitary.

An unloading platform has been constructed on the right hand side of the building with inside platform the owners.

After milk has been poured into the receiving tank all handling of same trifugal pump to the clarifiers and pasteurizers on a raised floor adjoining, where the milk is cleaned and pasteurized thoroughly. From here it is run by gravity to the bottling department beneath the pasteurizing platform, where the automatic bottling machine is installed or, in the

EXHAUSTIVE PECAN STUDY Chas. Mosel Has 41 Bearing Trees in Orchard at Home - Experiment-

ing With Nuts for 33 Years.

RESIDENT OF CITY MAKES

A visit to the residence of Chas. Mosel on Washington Street will demonstrate to even the casual observer that it is not necessary to have a large acreage of ground to successfully grow pecans, for on the plot surround-ing his residence Mr. Mosel has 41 bearing pecan trees, besides practically every kind of fruit known to this section of the State.

Mr. Mosel has been a student of the pecan for 33 years, as it was that long ago that he planted his first nutbearing trees, or rather planted the seed, for his first start was made by planting nuts sent him by his father from Gillespie County. He started out by planting ten seeds around the base of each of several chinaberry trees in his front yard, practically all of which grew. When the shade trees were ready to be removed Mr. Mosel dug up the seedling pecans, leaving but one in a place and replanted the others.

Some of the pecans he grafted with buds obtained from trees of the larger varieties; some he left to bear fruit Ottinger, 50x200 feet in Survey 116, s native seedlings.

With the exception of three years when he was away from here Mr. Mosel has been experimenting with to O. L. Brady, lot 708, block 101, pecans. Nearly every summer he has Richards Addition; \$3,765. planted a few trees and has grafted and budded the stock with practically every known variety of pecans. He has experimented with growing trees in the shade, semi-shade and bright

sunlight; with irrigation and without any water other than that supplied from natural sources. As a consequence of his studies and experiments. Kerrville; Chas. Leinweber, Hunt; Mr. Mosel talks intelligently on pecans and their culture. During the entire time he has been

raising pecans Mr. Mosel states that he has never had a crop failure of the nuts, although the trees bear heavier some years than others. Mosel states that nuts from this tree



The refrigerating system is one of two games scheduled for this week end, both of which should be humcreamery, and has been constructed at no little cost. > In fact the creamery has a complete ice plant in operation at all times. All that is necessary to turn out about five tons of ice every 24 hours is to place the cans of water in the brine tank. However, they do not plan on making ice but will use instead, the cold brine running through the pipes in the refrigerating room and also through the pasteurizers when the op-

mediately adjoining the creamery building for the purpose of supplying hot water and steam for pasteurizing and for washing and sterilizing processes. This is all the steam will be used for, as all machinery throughout the plant is motor driven.

McCreary & Schott are the contractors who constructed the plant and the design of the interior is the result of experience of J. F. Mittanck, in charge of the mechanical part of the creamery, and of Mr. McCreary, who is one of the most practical construction engineers in the country. The finished product is one in which all


