PRES. HOOVER TALKS ON BOY SCOUT IDEAS AND THEIR ACTIVITIES

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Speaking in the full knowledge of parenthood, President Hoover told the nation Monday night that the boy—with his sister—is the most precious possession of the American home and counseled that his leisure time be employed to direct his interests to constructive joy instead of destructive glee.

The chief executive pointed to the boy scout movement as one by which parents in this period of complex civilization might solve the problem of filling the leisure time of their sons. The speech, which he made at a dinner given by the Boy Scouts of America inaugurating a five year expansion program, was broadcast nationally.

President Hoover referred to the organization as one that had opened the portals of adventure for the boy, had taught him the joys of nature, the value of discipline and of unity of effort, and the democracy of play.

The address broke the rigid observance of mourning the president had set for himself out of respect to William Howard Taft and was made by Mr. Hoover after he recalled the love for children for which the late president and chief justice was noted.

The dinner marked the 20th anniversary of the Boy Scouts. At it was launched an appeal for \$10,000,000 to finance the five-year expansion program and to provide a retirement fund for those professionally engaged in scout work.

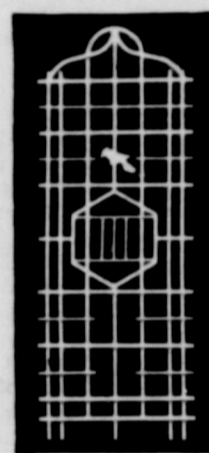

PROBLEMS OF CATTLE INDUSTRY WILL BE DISCUSSED AT MEET

Cattlemen attending the six-annual convention of the New Mexico Cattle Growers' Association at only have an opportunity to talk with other cattlemen from other states but will also meet cattlemen from other states; commission men; men from all state departments with whom they have problems to be discussed; and will be treated to one of the most varied programs given at a convention of livestock men.

B. Denman, livestock member of the federal farm board will give information which will be both interesting and beneficial to the cattlemen relative to the work of the federal farm board.

E. Mollins, secretary of the American National Live Stock Association, a most ardent worker for the interests of the cattlemen, will talk on "The Tariff Fight and What it Means to Us." Mr. Mollins has spent a great deal of his time in Washington working for all legislation of interest to the livestock industry and has come with first hand information as to tariff legislation; etc.

NEW MEXICO PLANS \$18,000,000 PUBLIC WORK

More than \$17,500,000 in public works, including highways and the Middle Rio Grande conservancy district, are planned in New Mexico, said Governor Dillon in a letter to Secretary of Commerce R. P. Lamont Friday.

December 18, the governor sent Secretary Lamont a report on building contemplated in this state to carry out President Hoover's plan to speed up building. Including roads he gave the total as \$6,639,312 at that time.

In Friday's letter the governor lists additional roads and works, bringing the figure up to \$7,761,312. The Middle Rio Grande conservancy district accounts for the remaining \$10,000,000.

AUTO LICENSE UNDER LAST YEARS TOTAL BY 25,000 SAYS REPORT

SANTA FE—License plates sold by the motor vehicle bureau were approximately 25,000 under last year's total at the end of February, when the penalties went on, State Comptroller R. F. Asplund stated Saturday.

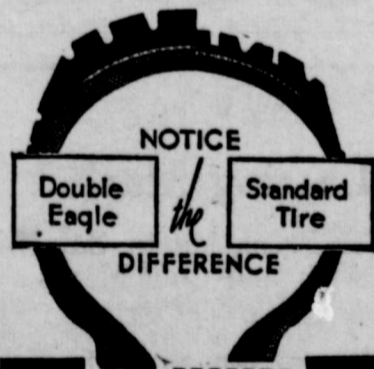
However, the number issued by February 28, was only 400 under the number issued up to that date last year. So if the sale for the remaining months corresponds to the output for the same months of 1929, the 1930 registration will at least equal that of 1929 at the end of the year.

The delinquency of 400 at the end of February, as compared with last year's registration is not great in Asplund's opinion, in view of the fact that the penalty was suspended up to March 1, and probably will be made up during the year.

New Life for Old Vegetables

EX-PRESIDENT TAFT DIES AT WASHINGTON HOME SATURDAY P. M.

William Howard Taft, former president and former chief justice, died at his home late Saturday afternoon. He passed peacefully from life, wrapped in a merciful unconsciousness after weeks of illness. A stroke from hardening of the arteries preceded death by a half hour. He was in his seventy-third year. By his own request, he will rest in Arlington cemetery, the citadel of the nation's heroic dead. The funeral services will be held probably on Tuesday, at All Souls' Unitarian church, which he attended. President Hoover was foremost among the many who went sorrowfully to the residence on Wyoming avenue where the only man in history to hold America's two highest offices slept in death. The president announced a thirteen day period of official mourning. At the point of death for many days, suffering hopelessly from a combination of ailments, Mr. Taft had surprised his physicians by the vitality of his last hours. But at 4:45 Saturday afternoon a sudden stroke, while he was alone except for his nurse, heralded the end. Neither Dr. Francis Hagner nor Dr. Clayton were at his bedside when the end came. Doctor Fuller, who was summoned by the nurses when they were unable immediately to reach the attending physicians, pronounced the former chief justice dead. Dr. Clayton arrived approximately 15 minutes later. When the end came unexpectedly, the activity which has surrounded the Taft residence since his return from Asheville, was absent. Only a few cars were in front of the home. Shortly thereafter taxicabs arriving with newspapermen gave notice of the death. First word of the death was sent to the White House, which announced it to the press in the following bulletin: "Former Chief Justice Taft died at 5:15 p. m. today." Highlights in Taft's Career These were the highlights in the life of William Howard Taft: Born at Cincinnati, Ohio, September 15, 1857. Graduated from Yale, June 27, 1878. Appointed judge of superior court at Cincinnati, March 7, 1887. Appointed solicitor general of the United States, February 4, 1890. Named first civil governor of the Philippines, July 4, 1901. Selected as secretary of war in President Roosevelt's cabinet, February 1, 1904. Nominated for president by republican national convention, June 18, 1908. Elected president, November 3, 1908. Inaugurated, March 4, 1909. On November 4, 1912, he was defeated for re-election by Woodrow Wilson. Professor of law, Yale University, 1913 to 1921. Appointed chief justice of the U. S. by President Harding, June 30, 1921. Resigned chief justiceship February 3, 1930. Died, March 8, 1930. Messenger Want Ads pay.

15th DECENNIAL CENSUS OF THE UNITED STATES

By the President of the United States of America A PROCLAMATION WHEREAS, by the Act of Congress approved June 18, 1929, the Fifteenth Decennial Census of the United States is to be taken beginning on the second day of April, nineteen hundred and thirty; and, WHEREAS, a correct enumeration of the population every ten years is required by the Constitution of the United States for the purpose of determining the representation of the several states in the House of Representatives; and, WHEREAS, it is of the utmost importance to the interests of all the people of the United States that this census should be a complete and accurate report of the population and resources of the nation: NOW, THEREFORE, I, Herbert Hoover, President of the United States of America, do hereby declare and make known that, under the law aforesaid, it is the duty of every person to answer all questions on the census schedules apply to him and the family to which he belongs, and to the farm occupied by him or his family, and all other census schedules as required by law, and that any person refusing to do so is subject to penalty. The sole purpose of the census is to secure general statistical information regarding the population and resources of the country, and replies are required from individuals only to permit the compilation of such general statistics. No person can be harmed in any way by furnishing the information required. The census has nothing to do with taxation, with military or jury service, with the compulsion of school attendance, with the regulation of immigration or with the enforcement of any national, state or local law or ordinance. There need be no fear that any disclosure will be made regarding any individual person or his affairs. For the due protection of the rights and interests of the persons furnishing information every employee of the census bureau is prohibited, under heavy penalty, from disclosing any information which may thus come to his knowledge. I therefore earnestly urge upon all persons to answer promptly, completely and accurately all inquiries addressed to them by the enumerators or other employees of the census bureau and thereby to contribute their share toward making this great and necessary public undertaking a success. IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand and caused to be affixed the great seal of the United States. (SEAL) DONE at the City of Washington, this 22nd day of November, in the year of our Lord One Thousand Nine Hundred and Twenty-Nine and of the Independence of the United States the One Hundred and Fifty-Fourth. HERBERT HOOVER.

HOW SWINE ARE AFFECTED BY EXTREMES OF WEATHER. The hog appears to have more sense than many humans when it comes to a question of coming in out of the rain, and as a result the losses from pneumonia and swine influenza are sometimes severe. The common practice of letting pigs run wild and giving them little or no protection, under the impression that they don't mind the cold, is decidedly adverse to a prosperous year for the raiser. The lack of hair makes the pig susceptible to cold and sudden changes in temperature, and particularly is this so when it is allowed to lie on wet ground. The symptoms of the two diseases are somewhat similar to those of hog cholera, and have led to an erroneous belief many times that cholera was responsible for deaths that might have been prevented with a little shelter during bad weather. F. NICHOLSON WILL EXPLORE THE FOUR CORNER COUNTRY SOON

Exploration of the "Four Corners" section, the only place in the country where the corners of four states come together, will be begun by Frank Nicholson when he has completed his work in Carlsbad cavern, he said Monday morning. Nicholson went to Santa Fe Sunday and conferred with Governor R. C. Dillon on his plans. Nicholson said that large areas of this section are unknown to white men. He plans to spend three months there, and to take in this "back country" of the Navajos the first motion picture in which real, and not stage Indians will do all the acting. The picture will be what he described as a "feature epic" and will be titled "Navajo." "I have had in my head for some time the idea of taking this picture in the Four Corners country," Nicholson said. "The picture should create a great deal of interest, and I still have many details to work out in preparation for it. It has not yet decided whether to begin work north of Gallup or northwest of Shiprock. It is a difficult country, but the governor knows quite a bit about it, and he made some valuable suggestions. In fact the governor was the only one we could find who knew of some of the features on which we have been doing considerable research work. The picture will be produced in conjunction with our cavern expedition picture." Nicholson expects to complete his work in the cavern in six weeks to two months.

GALLUP--State Land Commissioner Austin D. Crile received bids for only nine of the 20 oil leases which are subject to preference rights at the monthly auction of leases at his office Monday afternoon. 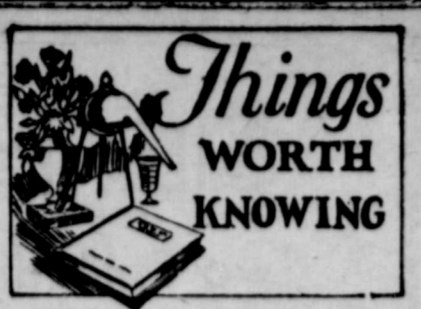

Things WORTH KNOWING
 A poultry house for sitting hens should be secluded, slightly darkened, and separated from the houses for layers and breeders. Place the nests so that the hens won't have to fly or jump into them.
 Cowpeas for hay are better if grown with other crops than alone. The sorghums (sorghos and kafirs), Sudan grass, Johnson grass, soybeans, and millet are suitable. Sorghos or kafirs, when grown with cowpeas make a good hay or silage. This mixture cures more easily than cowpeas alone, makes a well-balanced ration, and is relished by all kinds of livestock.
 If the dairyman buys all his feed, hires all his labor, and disposes of the milk at current wholesale prices he will make little if any money. If he buys all his feed and does all his own work he may make day wages. To make the greatest profit raise most or all the feed and market it through the dairy cow at a price at least equal to what the same feed would cost on the market.
 Poultrymen always used to cool the eggs hatching in an incubator by taking them out for a short time each day. It has been found that this practice is unnecessary, says the U. S. Department of Agriculture, except when the temperature of the incubator has been running too high. To decide whether to cool eggs or not, notice the size of the air cell, which should gradually increase in size. If the development is too rapid, cool the eggs until they feel slightly cool to the touch.
 It's a good idea to make a small outdoor seedbed, with specially prepared soil, in a corner of the farm garden, to start the plants. They will be more stocky if started here and later transplanted. A good soil mixture for the seedbed is one part of well rotted manure, two parts of good garden loam or rotted sods, and one part of sharp, fine sand. The addition of leaf mold or peat makes the soil better. Mix the materials well and sift the soil.
 The farm horse is less likely to get sore shoulders if it gets special care in early spring until the muscles harden and the winter hair sheds. Clean the shoulders carefully after the day's work and before harnessing in the morning. After removing the harness, wash the shoulders with warm water and castile soap, and rinse with cold salt water. Keep this up for two or three weeks. It is worth while to spend a little time on the horse in the field. Rinse the collar and clean the sweat, dirt, and dead hair from the shoulders and collar. Whenever possible, lift the collar forward and let the horse's shoulders cool off.
 The most profitable pig is the one that never stops growing till it goes to market. Pigs are less likely to be fed irregularly and to lose weight if they and the sows are fed in self-feeders where several days' or even a week's supply of feed may be stored. At the U. S. Department of Agriculture experiment farm in Maryland sows and pigs on self-feeders have proved more thrifty than those that were hand fed. In tests comparing the two methods of feeding, No. 2 yellow corn, commercial gray middlings of good quality, and 60 per cent tankage were the chief feeds. The pigs ate when they pleased and as much as they pleased. The outstanding results of the tests were that in the self-fed lots the feed cost per 100 pounds of gain was materially less and the sows and pigs were in better condition at weaning time.

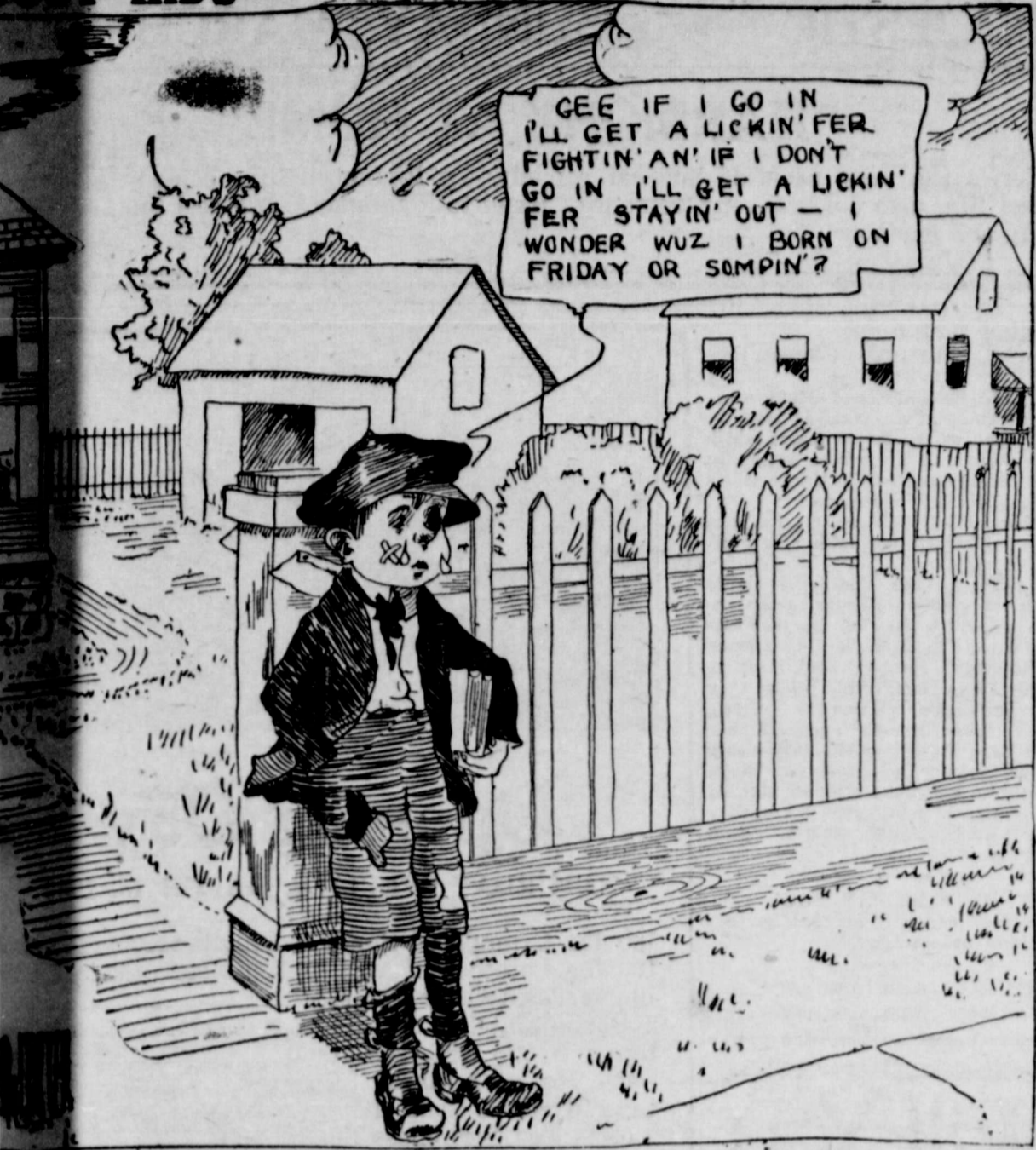

PRES. HOOVER TALKS ON BOY SCOUT IDEAS AND THEIR ACTIVITIES

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Speaking in the full knowledge of parenthood, President Hoover told the nation Monday night that the boy—with his sister—is the most precious possession of the American home and counselled that his leisure time be employed to direct his interests to constructive joy instead of destructive glee.

The chief executive pointed to the boy scout movement as one by which parents in this period of complex civilization might solve the problem of filling the leisure time of their sons. The speech, which he made at a dinner given by the Boy Scouts of America inaugurating a five year expansion program, was broadcast nationally.

President Hoover referred to the organization as one that had opened the portals of adventure for the boy, had taught him the joys of nature, the value of discipline and of unity of effort, and the democracy of play.

The address broke the rigid observance of mourning the president had set for himself out of respect to William Howard Taft and was made by Mr. Hoover after he recalled the love for children for which the late president and chief justice was noted.

The dinner marked the 20th anniversary of the Boy Scouts. At it was launched an appeal for \$10,000,000 to finance the five-year expansion program and to provide a retirement fund for those professionally engaged in scout work.

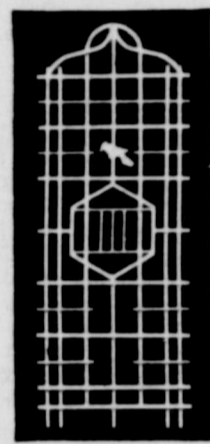

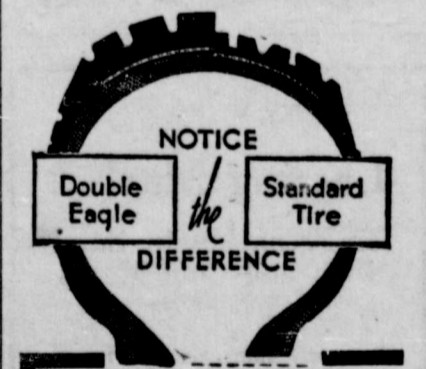
