Lambs are usually most profitable if made ready for market when they are about 4 or 5 months old and weigh from 65 to 75 pounds.

Dont' let livestock pasture alfalfa too closely, as the grazing down of the crowns often kills the plants. Of all livestock, hogs are least injurious to alfalfa.

In the work season the farm horse should eat only at regular intervals. He needs concentrates to supply the energy for hard work. Feed large amounts of roughages only in periods of rest. Excessive feeding of hay is wasteful; it is expensive, reduces the horse's efficiency, and may cause respiratory troubles.

Close observance of the United States Weather Bureau reports helps in planning haying operations and lessens the chance of injury. Damage to hay resulting from poorly built stacks, uncovered piles of bales, hauling and loading during storms, and baling rain-damp hay can be minimized by forethought and good management.

It is poor policy for farmers who market their alfalfa to put two or more cuttings on the same stack. Each cutting should be stacked separately in order to provide hay of uniform class and grade when baling it. If more than one cutting is put in a stack, differences in leafiness, color, grass mixtures, or stem texture may cause variations in grade.

These hot-weather suggestions for shipping hogs are offered by the U. S. Bureau of Animal Industry. Haul or drive your hogs to the shipping point in time for them to get rested and cool before loading. Allow only a light grain feeding before shipping-heavy feed means more body heat generated. See that the car is clean, bedded with sand, and that the bedding and interior are wet down before loading, which should be done not more than an hour beforehand. Avoid exciting, beating, or bruising the animals. In warm weather not more than 16,000 pounds should be shipped in a standard 36 foot car. Have the cars drenched at every possible point immediately after the train stops. If possible hang ice bags from the car roof.

How Stammering Can Be Induced by "Coddling"

Efforts to explain the reason of the prevalence of stammering have never been really satisfactory. There are many theories. It is a fact that It is more generally encountered among the males, the proportion being about three to one. In a class of stammering children in Chicago it has been observed that among the boys there is a great preponderance of "only boys." These youngsters apparently have too much attention, and too much protection constantly focused on them from babyhood. Such excessive care defeats its own ends and makes the small boy self-conscious, shy and uncomfortable in his relations with other children. His feeling of maladjustment frequent ly shows itself in his speech. The infrequency of stammering among women is largely due to the prevalence of speech training in girls' schools. These conclusions are the result of observations of the principal of a large city

How Helium Is Produced

The isolation of belium in the pure state is a matter of some difficulty. To begin with, some mineral containing the gas, like clevelte or uraninite, Is finely powdered and heated with diluted sulphuric acid, the air being excluded and the expelled gas being collected over mercury. The gas-mostly hell um, but containing also nitrogen and other atmospheric constituents - is next transferred into an evacuated vessel partly filled with a mass of charcoal and cooled from the outside with liquid air; the charcoal gradual ly absorbs everything except the helium and part of the neon, and if the process is repeated several times, nothing but pure helium remains behind

The term "Old Harry" to designate origin in a curious mistake of the translators of the King James version of the Bible. In Leviticus 17, verse 7 occurs the Hebrew word "seirim." The literal translation is "bairy ones." The verse reads "and they shall no more offer their sacrifices unto devils." The earlyday term for the devil, "Old Hairy," was finally corrupted into "Old Harry." -Capper's Weekly.

WIDE-SPREAD THRIFT BEST FOR STABILIZING BUSINESS

By S. W. Straus, President American Society for Thrift.

It is quite apparent that the tide of popular thrift in America is steadily rising. Reports show a constant gain in savings bank deposits. Less money is being spent on needles extravagance, less expensive forms of luxuries are gaining in popularity; greater labor efficiency has developed; a more cautious and conservative attitude is being shown in the matter of investments. The blue sky promoter and the get-rich-quick sale to the highest and best bidder, type of financier are not having it at two o'clock p. m., on Tuesday, as easy now as during the last four or five years. There is a growing tendency to eliminate all forms of waste. People generally are striving to make every dollar go as far as possible and utilize every day to the best advantage.

There is, of course, nothing unusual in these manifestations. During periods of depressed business and unemployment there has always been an increase in thrift. To a great degree it represents necessary econom-

It is indeed an eloquent tribute to the value of thrift as a means of bringing about economic readjustments. As popular savings grow and as day by day economies and personal efficiency becomes more widespread, there will gradually develop an era of increasing prosperity.

Fundamentally prosperous conditions can only exist on the solid foundation of popular thrift. Inflation, unsound activities, popular over spending and over extended credit may brings the semblance of prosperity at times but these conditions cannot last and must inevitably be followed by a cycle of deflation and a let-down in business.

Average Wooden House

Rots in a Few Years Although the average American

wooden house is attacked by decay within a few years and is usually rot ted to worthlessness with two genera tions, there is no reason why it could not be preserved for two, three or more centuries, says Prof. Emanuel Fritz, wood technologist of the Uni versity of California.

Carelessness, and not the perishable quality of wood itself, is to blame for the costly decay of the average frame dwelling, asserts the expert, writing in Good Housekeeping Magazine. De cay is evidence that the wood is hold moisture content of more than 20 per cent.

Cheap, careless construction provemore expensive in time than the care and added expense necessary to make a house waterproof, he points out The factors which usually bring about decay and which can easily be elim inated are: Poorly fitted joints, shin gles, and door and window sills which permit water to enter and remain in the cracks; failure to insulate all parts of the house from the moisture of the ground with a masonry founda tion of at least six inches; failure to ventilate the space between ground and floors where heat and moisture quickly develop the decaying fungi and failure to see that no mounds of earth or rubbish are left under the house to convey moisture to the parts of the building which they touch.

Cement Plaster Makes

Garage Walls Fireproof Ideal garages are, of course, fire proof. Many useful methods of build ing garages at moderate cost have been developed. Cement plaster is an

excellent material for such use. One of the best systems for building fireproof where cement plaster is used is by means of expanded metal lathing in which is incorporated, every few inches, a steel rib to act as a stiffener. Such a wall requires but few steel uprights to which metal

fabric is fixed, so it is exceedingly

economical to use on walls and roof. In building such a garage, it is only necessary to provide a concrete floor on cinders directly on the ground. sidewalk fashion. CULL THE LOAFERS FROM YOUR FLOCKS

Now is the time to begin culling the loafers from flocks as fast as they show up. Don't expect the good hens to pay the feed bills of the star boarders and still return a profit at the present prices of eggs, says E. E. Anderson, of the New Mexico Agricultural College.

Many of the star boarders can probably be recognized upon sight. By going thru the flock and axamining each one carefully, many can be taken from the flock before the characteristics that brand a cull clearly show up. When a hen goes out of production, her comb usually shrivels up. First her beak and later her legs turn yellow (provided she is of a breed naturally having yellow legs). She will probably begin a slow moult and in the course of time, will appear in a shiny new set of feathers. Her hard-working sister, however, will continue her labors until fall, in last year's shabby looking coat, worn and frayed by continuous performance in the

Can you imagine a boarding house where many of the boarders stayed on and one by one either stopped paying for their meals entirely or else paid at irregular intervals only part of what was due? In a short time the landlady would discover that it was taking all the profits from those who were faithful in their payments to meet the board bill of those who did not pay. How long could a boarding house be successfully operated under such a sys-

Are all your hens paying regularly for their keep? It is is very common at this time of year for many hens to stop laying entirely, or lay only at very infrequent intervals. The poor layers will drop out of production one by one all summer. The really profitable hens will keep faithfully at work until fall. Then they will go thru a quick moult and be back into production as soon as those that stopped earlier in the



SANTA FE-New Mexico gained approximately 54,000 population in the past ten years to put the 1930 census at close to 415,000, according to a state table compiled by the Associated Press from the reports of New Mexico's five census districts.

With all counties reported except McKinley county the 1930 census totaled 398,413 in contrast with the 1920 government census total of 360,350. McKinley county's 1920 census was 13,731.

Apportionment of the state current school fund, to be made next month will be based on the census figures by Montoya and State School Auditor Carls D. Comstock, State Treas-Emerson Watts has not yet certified the amount available.

Bernalillo county scored the greatest gain, on the face of the census report, 1059, with Santa Fe county showing the second largest, a gain of 666.



It is an indirect method of expressing the will of the people of the various states, through electors chosen by the people of the states There is no mention in the Constitu tion of "for the people by the people," The number of Presidential electors at lotted to a state is the same as that state's total representation in both houses of congress; this in turn is partly dependent on the population of the state. New York state has the most, 45; next is Pennsylvania, 38 Illinois, 29; Ohio, 24; Texas, 20; Massachusetts and Missouri, each 18; Indiana and Michigan, each 15; Georgia and New Jersey, each 14; California Iowa, Kentucky, Wisconsin, each 13 Alabama, Minnesota, North Carolina Tennessee, Virginia, each 12; Kansas Louisiana, Mississippi, Oklahoma, each 10; Arkansas, South Carolina, each 9; Maryland, Nebraska, West Virginia each 8; Connecticut, Washington, each 7; Colorado, Florida, Maine, each 6; North Dakota, Oregon, Rhode Island.
