Bandits Now In Eddy Co. Jail

Bandits Were Identified Yesterday—J. Williamson Passes Crisis And Will Recover Barring Complications.

Decision to divide the eastern New Mexico area of the Boy Scouts of America into seven districts to provide better administration of area activities was made as the principal action at the first meeting of the new area executive board at Roswell Monday.

The summer Boy Scout camp and the expansion program were other features of discussion, and twelve area committee chairmen were appointed at the meeting, presided over by Lt.-Gov. A. W. Hockenull of Clovis, council president, and attended by twelve members. The meeting was followed by a dinner at the Busy Bee grill.

After the report of his personal activities, J. V. Thorson, area scout executive, presented the districting plan which was approved. An organization, similar to that of the entire area council organization, will be set up in each of the seven districts. The district centers will be Roswell, Carlsbad, Lovington, Clovis, Vaughn, Tucumcari and Alamogordo.

The directors agreed every effort should be made to expand the scout program to the rural communities, and it was determined this work should be carried on through the district organizations. H. C. Moorehead of Tatum, summer camp director for several years, was recommended again this year and Mr. Thorson will notify him of his appointment.

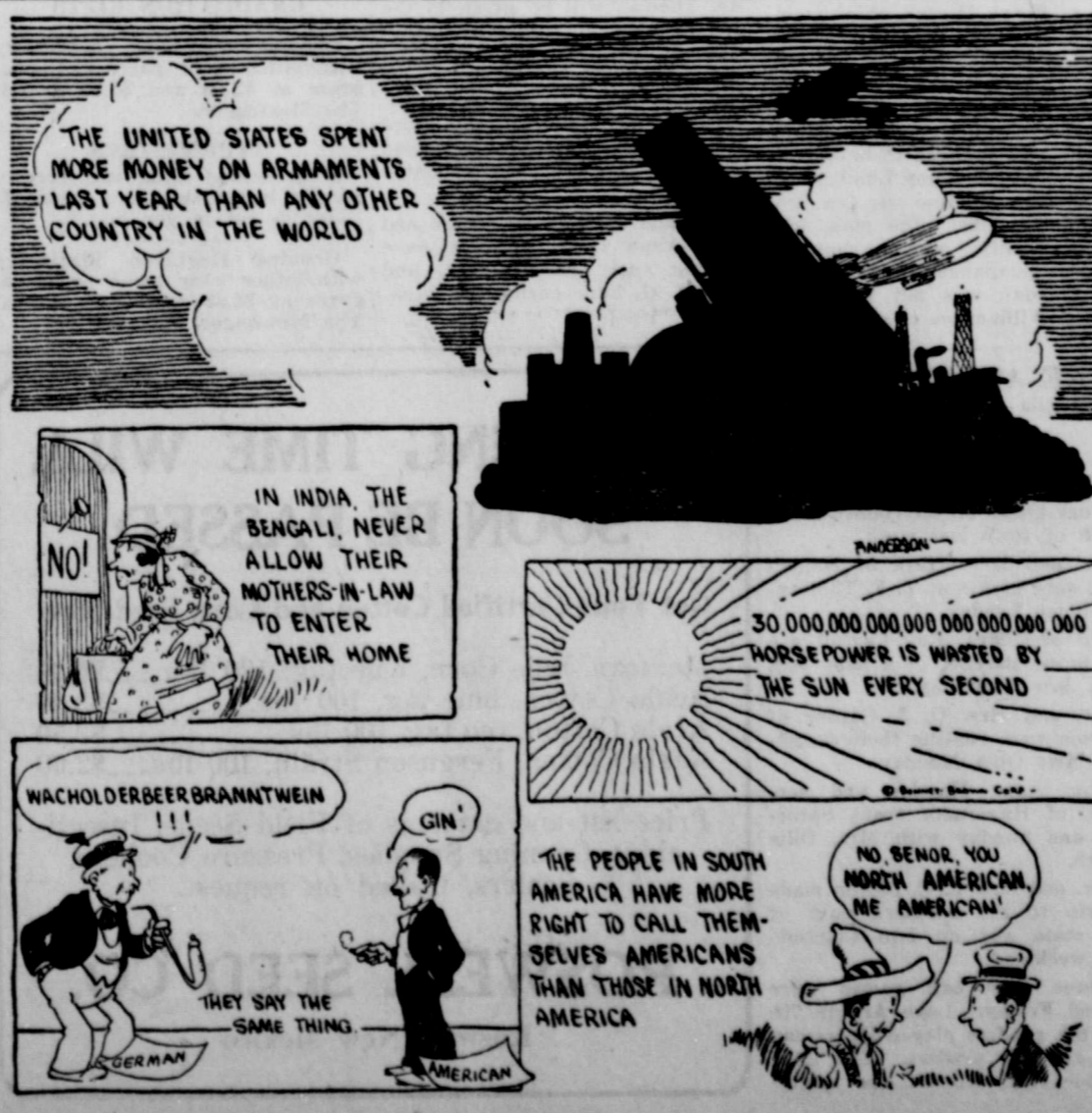

**CATTLE SHIPMENTS**

Cattle shipments from New Mexico in March with figures on the Santa Fe district missing, totaled 20,225, according to Walter Naylor, secretary of the New Mexico Cattle Sanitary board. The cattle sent out of the state in March a year ago numbered 17,299 head.

A large portion of the cattle went to markets at Kansas City, Fort Worth, Los Angeles and Wichita. Some of the cattle went to grazing and feeder lots in Kansas and other points. The shipments by district follow:

Williamson driving. Mr. Spence was seated in the lap of one of the prisoners. Nothing occurred to mark an otherwise tranquil ride until the men reached the curve station about two miles north of town. Mr. Spence observed that the prisoners had become nervous. In an instant one had drawn a double action revolver. Spence shoved his thumb under the hammer of the gun and held it out of the window. It was about this time the other man attempted to pull from his hip pocket an automatic. Spence grabbed the barrel of the automatic and in the struggle that ensued the prisoners overpowered Spence and one whipped a gun around with the command to get out of the car with hands up. Spence obeyed immediately, but Williamson crawled out over one of the men. As Williamson stepped out into the hands of the other man, he was whirled around and as this happened Mr. Spence said he heard two shots. One of the men then hit Williamson over the head twice with a revolver.

One of the men said "Kick her off," (meaning the car) as he climbed in still holding a gun on Spence. Officer Williamson arose and Mr. Spence inquired if he were shot. Williamson said no. T. J. Stagner happened along at this time and Mr. Williamson caught the running board of the Stagner car. Spence told the men to go ahead as he wanted to run back and get some papers he had dropped. When the Stagner car neared the Artesia hotel Mr. Stagner observed blood on the shirt of Williamson and threw his arm around the officer to support him. Williamson got off the running board at the Artesia hotel and inquired for officers to follow the fleeing men. J. K. Wallington is said to have told Williamson that he did not need an officer, he needed a doctor and Williamson was immediately taken to the office of Dr. Hoover. An examination revealed that Williamson had been shot twice, once below the heart, near the pit of the stomach and once above the heart. Neither bullet passed thru the body. The lower wound ranged downward and was later located in the leg.

Confusion followed when news of the shooting was circulated over Artesia. One report said the men went south while a posse was being organized the would be bandits sped toward Hope, cutting phone connections both east and northwest of Hope, the latter line, however proved to be a party line. It was only a short time after word of the shooting reached Roswell that a searching party of a number of cars were pursuing the bandits. Several cars traveled the Roswell-YO road while others came by Artesia. One Roswell car containing four men with all kinds of fire arms including a machine gun, took the trail within about an hour after the bandits left Artesia. The two men headed for Pinon, going thru the Weed country. They deserted the Plymouth coupe of Williamson's about ten miles north of Pinon and walked to the House ranch, about six miles northwest of Pinon and informed Justice of Peace House that they were in

trouble "with the law" and wanted rest. House is said to have informed the men that he had only one bed, but that since he was watching his herd of goats he would give up his bed and stay in the goat camp the remainder of the night. The justice then went to the home of a friend and asked him to return with him and try to persuade the men to give up. This friend refused to do so and before House had gone farther Sheriff John Peck and members of the posse arrived. The sheriff's force learned that the men wanted were in the House residence, probably asleep. Officers dispatched a man back to Pinon, which had been established as headquarters, for reinforcements. By 8:30 o'clock Tuesday morning fifteen men had arrived on the scene and had trained their guns on the house, including a machine gun. Two shots were fired in the air to wake the men up with the response "What's going on here?" The bandits were told to come out one at a time with hands up. After a brief pause one man appeared at the door with his hands up clad only in underclothes. The other followed shortly.

Both men denied any connection with the shooting of Deputy Sheriff Williamson near Artesia Monday and said they knew nothing of the Williamson car. A short time later a thirty-eight calibre revolver of Williamson's was found under the bed pillow. Two other revolvers were found in the bed occupied by the men. The Williamson car was located carefully concealed and the men returned to Roswell about 6:30 Tuesday afternoon and placed in the Chaves county jail. They were identified as Buz Tarrant and Gene Walker.

A man said to have been identified as Frank Hutton, third member of the trio of robbers was arrested at Carlsbad on Monday night by Sheriff McDonald as he was pulled from a freight. The man had in his possession several articles believed to have been stolen from the Kemp Lumber Co., at Elda, including a few old time dollar bills. The man, who had evidently parted company with his companions earlier in the day Monday was not implicated in the Williamson shooting.

CUTTING WANTS FISH HATCHERY FUNDS

SANTA FE—United States Senator Bronson Cutting telegraphed State Game Warden Elliott Barker Saturday that he will use his efforts to prevent, if possible, any reduction in the appropriation for the Dexter fish hatchery which might prevent its operation. The federal hatchery is now being completed at a cost of \$50,000. Nearly one million trout eggs have been taken from Eagle Nest lake, G. W. Waggoner, in charge of the federal hatchery there, has reported to the state game department. He believes five million are available if needed. Federal plans call for enlargement of the Eagle Nest open air hatchery and the building of a home for the caretaker.

able for this work. Other records have been freely furnished and the area quite thoroughly inspected in company with county agents and others familiar with the lands and well problems and with other problems of the area. The people of New Mexico and of this area in particular are to be congratulated in having obtained court decisions, enabling laws and formation of a conservancy district with broad and reasonable but necessary authority making it possible for the first time to conserve and control the valuable ground water and artesian sources of water supply for its orderly and safe development. No where else to our knowledge has this been accomplished to such full degree. Large wastes of the water supply have occurred in the past and much has been accomplished in cutting down these wastes, to the extent that there is now evidence that lowering of the artesian head has about ceased. The composite curve of artesian head has been flattened out and this within the last five years of somewhat subnormal rainfall and therefrom probably a subnormal replenishment to the artesian beds. The conservancy district has been formed and all conditions point to its functioning as intended under the law. We believe that the conservancy district board is composed of men who realize the necessity of thoroughly understanding and working out of all problems as they arise. One of the vital matters at this time is the working out of a safe and economic means of plugging old wells which leak and thus waste artesian supplies. Some twelve or fifteen wells have been plugged by funds available from state appropriations. While this plugging has apparently been successful there is some difference of opinion as to whether this plugging is of a permanent character. The state engineer in co-operation with the district has recently closed a contract for plugging three wells by a contracting firm as a test of developing the economic feasibility of plugging large numbers of old abandoned and leaky artesian wells. The certain control and holding of the present artesian head may well depend on what is developed from this experiment.

TRICKS of MAGIC EXPLAINED by Will Lindhorst

TELLING THE TIME WITH A QUARTER, A STRING AND A GLASS



Tie a string around a quarter and hold the quarter suspended over and slightly inside a glass. Grasp the string between the index finger and the thumb, and place it directly over the pulse of the thumb. Hold your hand perfectly rigid, and the quarter will begin to swing to and fro like a pendulum. The arc made by the swinging quarter will slowly increase in width until the quarter strikes the side of the glass, and it will strike the number of times closest to the hour of the day. If the time should be twenty minutes past one, the quarter will strike the glass once, and should the time be quarter of two, the quarter will strike twice. It is necessary to hold the string over the pulse of the thumb, as this is the motivating force controlling the movements of the quarter.

USE CHEESE OFTEN IN LOW COST DIET

Cheese — American Cheddar cheese, Cheddar cheese or plain American cheese as it is commonly known—is another of the good food bargains now on the market, according to the bureau of home economics, U. A pound and a quarter of Cheddar cheese contains fully as much protein, calcium and phosphorus as a gallon of whole milk, and has also fat and some of the vitamin values of whole milk.

of the basin. A large part of the area of former abandonment of wells has occurred in such areas. The total number of wells drilled in the conservancy district is about 1500—of this number 726 are now abandoned. A map is being attached hereto showing the conservancy district and the various drainage districts and other areas referred to.

The result is that under present conditions there are only relatively small and scattered areas that could possibly offer any measure of acceptability for land bank loans and even in such cases there are questions of procedure in appraising or in setting up of particular types of loans to be worked out that would safeguard the same against heavy depreciation of well casings and or pump equipment. This does not appear possible until a much larger per cent of the well developed farming sections of the valley can qualify by removing the recent adverse conditions such as final adjudication of water under the Pecos river adjudication definite settlement of financial liabilities under drainage districts to which reference has been made.

It is therefore recommended that consideration of opening the Roswell artesian area as a field for land bank loans be deferred until more favorable conditions are brought about at which time further study of the results of well plugging, Pecos river adjudication and other material progress such as refinancing of drainage districts may be more conclusively carried out.

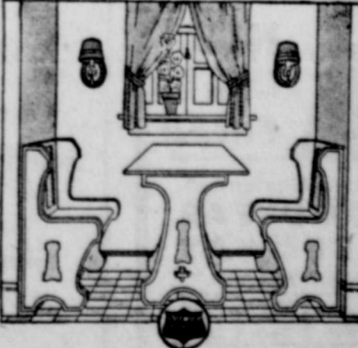

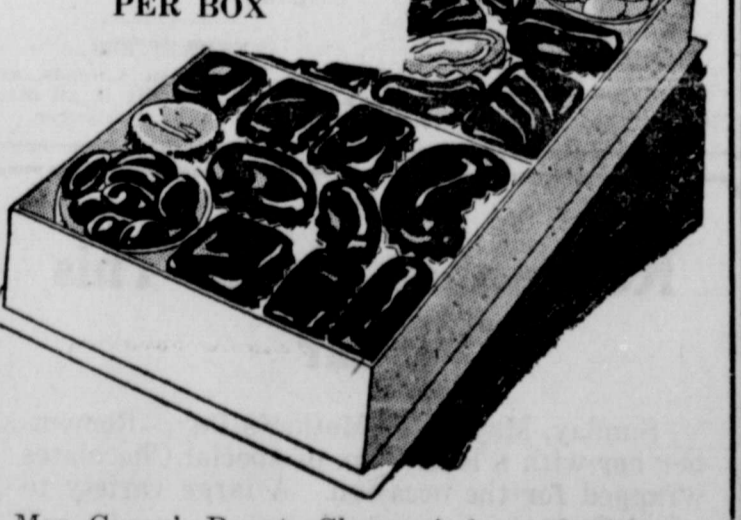

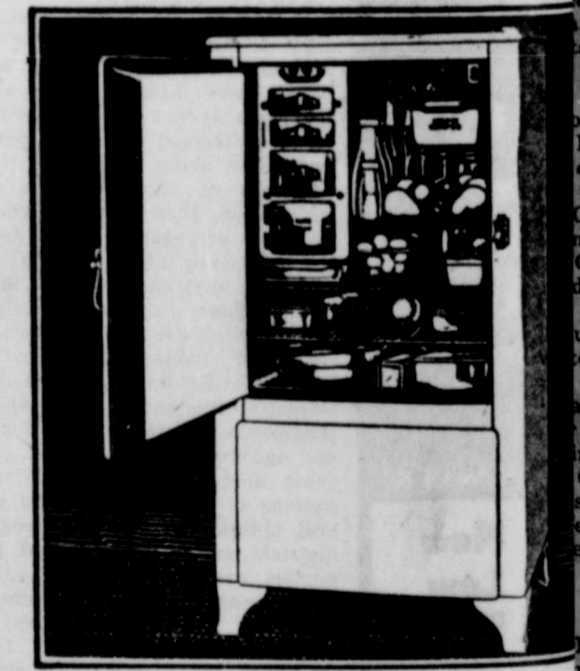
