

Orono, Maine .- A large flint spearhead made of material different from Indian spearheads of this state is arousing renewed interest in the stories of Norse adventures in North America in the Eleventh century. The spearhead, which was found on the beach at Pemaquid several years ago, is now in the possession of Walter B. Smith, who has made extensive studies of Indian remains in this region.

"If Norsemen actually discovered North America at that early date, I believe there is still a possibility of finding proof of it, unless such proof is already destroyed," Mr. Smith concludes.

Layman Sits as Judge in Court of Appents

Trenton, N. J .- Joseph L. Dear of Jersey City shares with George Van Bushkirk of Hackensack the distinction of being the only layman on the bench of the highest court of the state -the only court in which laynen sit. They receive \$40 for each day spent in court.

Although the constitution of 18:4 empowers governors to appoint laymen to any court of the state, they have always been appointed to the Court of Errors and Appeals. This court renders its decisions by ballot rather than by individual opinion, being one of the few courts in the United States which does so. The procedure is a relic of Colonial days, when the court was made up of the governor and his council of county representatives.

The bench of Errors and Appeals today is composed of 16 judges-the chancellor, chief justice, his associate justices and six special judges.

Unearth Greek Towers of 2,400 Years Ago

Sebastopol,-Ruins of eight towers of the ancient Greek period have been discovered in the Heraclean peninsula, near Sebastopol. They are estimated to have been built 2,400 years ago.

Unearthing of the ruins has increased interest in proposed research on the site of the ancient Greek colenies in the Crimea. The soviet government has created a special fund for this work and has invited French and German archeologists to take part in it.

I. Peter Healing the Lame Man (Acts 3:1-10).

1. The place (vv. 1, 2). Peter and John were on their way to the house of worship. This man had been placed at the entrance of the place of worship where he might receive the sympathetic attention of worshipers.

2. The man (v. 2).

This beggar was infirm from his birth. He was now more than forty years old (4:22) and had brought his ailment with him into the world. When he saw Peter and John he asked alms.

8. The method (vv. 3-8). (1) The man's attention gained

(v. 4). Peter and John commanded him to look on them.

(2) Peter commanded him in the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth to rise and walk (v. 6).

(3) Peter took him by the right hand (v. 7),

This was meant to give impetus to his faith-not strength to his ankles. 4. The man's response (v. 8).

Strength came to his feet and ankleones at once. He stood, he walked. he leaped and shouted praises to God.

5. The effect (vv. 9-11). The people were so filled with wonder and amazement that they ran together to behold this wonderful thing. Note

(1) This helpless beggar had to be carried to the temple gate. Men and women out of Christ are so helpless that they need to be brought where the light of God can be applied to them.

(2) Peter taking the man by the hand shows the manner of helping the lost.

11. Peter Witnessing Before the Multitude (2:12-26).

Census Bureau Gives Interesting Statistics.

Washington.-The majority of American farms are owned wholly by the farmers operating them, according to a statement just issued by the Inited States census bureau, from which the first composite picture of the American farm can now be drawn. This average farm, with its 145 acres, is valued at \$7,776, the land exclusive of buildings being worth \$40.85 an acre. 'The farm machinery and implements are worth \$422, and the buildings are valued at \$1,847.

Sixty-one acres are crop land, of which 54 acres are harvested, with 64 acres of pasture. In all, 24 acres are woodland. Thirteen acres are planted in corn, with 11 acres of hay, 8 of wheat and 6 of oats, in addition to other lesser crops, the yield from which includes 56 bushels of white potatoes, 6 bushels of sweet potatoes and more than 18 pounds of tobacco.

Average Orchard. An orchard of 22 apple trees, young and old, produces 24 bushels of apples, and 14 peach trees yield over 8 bushels of peaches. There are 4 pear trees and almost 60 grape vines.

In addition to 3 horses and a mule. this average American farmer has 9 head of cattle, 8 swine, 6 sheep and 64 chickens. He sells 300 dozen eggs year and 36 pounds of wool. Of 1,444 gallons of milk produced, he sells 418 gallons, with 7 gallons of cream, and 166 pounds of butterfat. He also inkes 100 pounds of butter.

On the side of expenditures, Mr. Average Farmer pays \$38 for fertilizer, \$118 for feed, \$26 for lumber, posts and firewood, and his total outlay for hired labor is \$136 a year.

This government report, just completed, gives 6,371,640 farms, with a otal population of 28,981,693. The gures show that one farm in five is portgaged, for an average of more han 40 per cent of its value, the farm ortgages having increased more than 500,000,000 in five years. Over 40 per ent are on unimproved roads. Only ne farm in twelve has a tractor, and nly about one in twenty-five had a radio, according to these 1925 statistles.

Radio Sets Increase.

The number of radio receiving sets s said to have increased greatly over the above figures in the past two venrs, a recent survey by A. Atwater Kent Indicating that the number of adlo sets on farms is now more than .000,000-about one to every six farms. This rapid increase is attributed to the practical value of radio o the farm, in addition to an enhanced amusement and educational value.

The farm population has further deeased from the above figure, according to a report just issued by the United States Department of Agriculture, estimating the farm population. of January 1, 1927, as 27.892.000-a falling off of more than 1,000,000.

Mrs. Palmer, an attractive woman of twenty-four, was indicted for the slaying of William Stout, well-to-do farmer and father of Arthur Stout with whom Mrs. Palmer lived "with out benefit of clergy," for nearly a year in a little shack in the hills near here. Arthur Stout, thirty-three, now is serving a life term in the Ohio penitentiary for implication in the murder

of his stepmother, Sarah Stout, second wife of William.

The story of the two slavings, as brought to light from the witness stand in Arthur Stout's trial three weeks ago, began in the spring of last year when Arthur brought Mrs. Palmer from Moundsville, W. Va., and settled down on one of his father's farms. The young couple did not marry and countryside gossip about them soon reached the ears of Sarah Stout, Arthur's elderly stepmother.

Her remonstrances proving futile, Sarah had her stepson arrested. Soon after his release from jail last November the stepmother was found slain in her home

Arthur Stout was indicted for the slaying and his trial set for March 21. While he was in jail, his father, William, moved to the home of his son, Mrs. Palmer acting as housekeeper. Then on March 9 the father, who was to be the chief witness against his son, disappeared. Two days later his body was found in a well on the farm.

Mrs. Palmer, taken into custody, confessed beating Stout to death with a piece of cordwood and throwing his body into the well, but later retracted the confession and was held for trial April 25.

According to testimony in Arthur's trial, Mrs. Palmer also was implicated in the murder of Sarah Stout. The state's chief witness, a young son of Arthur's by a former marriage, told how his father and Mrs. Palmer had planned the murder and how he (the boy) and Mrs. Palmer had gone to the William Stout home, beaten the woman into unconsciousness and then attempted to burn the body.


Moscow will be brought within 33 hours of London by day and night ervices, and it will be possible to reach Constantinople in 70 hours.

Government to Blast Island Off Port Map

San Pedro, Calif.-A big chunk of rock-ribbed clay sticking up in the outer harbor here, known on land as Dead Man's island and on the sea as a menace to navigation, is to be blown off San Pedro's port map with government dynamite.

The island for a long time has been garnished near its 50foot peak with a decrepit hotel sign and fringed around with millions of seagulls and an occasional seal. It will give way to a channel-widening process to be undertaken by the government this summer.

Songs sung to the accompaniment of the spinning wheel or beside the fish nets will be selected by famous Canadian singers while a series of recitals will be given by prominent grand opera stars. The French choirs of St. Dominique of Quebec will also be heard.

The quaint old melodies which will e heard were sung by the followers of Champlain, Nicolet, La Salle, Marquette and other explorers and have been handed down from generation to generation in various parts of the continent where French songs are still ung.

Secretary Kellogg Retains Negro Messenger, Aged 72

Washington. - Edward Augustine Savoy, the seventy-two-year-old colored messenger to the secretary of state, known to generations of officials and to sightseers at the secretary's door, where he has been stationel for 58 years, was retained by Secretary Kellogg for two more years, preventing his forced retirement from the service for age.

He was appointed by Secretary Hamilton Fish in 1869 and has foraken his post only once, when he accompanied the peace commissioners as messenger in 1898 during the deliberations which ended the war with Spain.

After attaining the rank of chief messenger he was rated as a \$1,200. a-year clerk by order of President Wilson, on the recommendation of Secretary Bryan. This was increased to \$1,400 by Bainbridge Colby and to \$1,-500 by Secretary Hughes.

RARE ROMAN COINS FOUND IN EGYPT

Twenty-Four Issues Lopresented in Find.

Alexandria, Egypt.-A hoard of 60 gold coins of the Roman empire, minted in the Second century, has been discovered by the University of Michigan expedition.

According to Prof. Francis W. Kelsey, the coins had been laid away in small linen bag, which was found with them. Their fresh appearance and the absence of traces of wear indicate that they were either withlrawn from circulation immediately after they left the mint or were seected with extraordinary care.

Twenty-four separate issues of coins re represented. The earliest dates rom the latter part of the reign of he Emperor Hadrian, after he had aceived the Latin title corresponding ith "Father of His Country," in 128 A. D. The rest were minted in the reign of Antoninus Plus, and 39 coins have the portrait of this emperor. None is later than the year 159 A. D. Six coins have the portrait of the young Marcus Aurelius, before he became emperor. On the reverse of one of these the marriage of Marcus Au-

relius is symbolized. He is represented as joining hands with the younger Faustina, in the presence of a divinity. Fourteen coins have portraits of

the two Faustinas. Seven bear the head of the elder Faustina, wife of the Emperor Antoninus Plus. They were minted after her death in 141 A. D., when she was already revered as a divinity. The other seven have the portrait of the younger Faustina and were minted within a few years after her marriage to Marcus Aure-

Not one of the 24 issues is represented in the great national collection of ancient coins in the Museum of Alexandria. The government, therefore, will retain a part of the hoard or that collection.

Potterv 1,500 Years Old Is Discovered

Washington .-- The fragments of a unique piece of prehistoric Indian pottery, collected by Dr. R. S. Lipsmb from Towaoc near Mesa Verde, Colo., have been received at the Smithonian institution. The decoration on the inside base of the bowl tells a story similar to the Orpheus legend of Greek mythology

According to Dr. J. Walter Fewkes, chief of the bureau of American ethnology, this decoration has been unknown hitherto in Indian pettery. The howl is one of the few found which represents an event of any kind. It s classed as black-and-white ware, the oldest kind of Indian pottery extant, and may date back some 1,500 years.

The decoration pictures two human figures, surrounded by a number of birds of all shapes and sizes. One of the men holds a pipe or flute to his lips with which he is calling the birds, while the other holds a bow and arrow in readiness to shoot the birds. "The legend behind this picture," said Doctor Fewkes, "is the same as that us flute cer hind the fan the Hopi Indians, which takes place every August. It concerns the cultus hero of the Flute clan, who went to the underworld and by the aid of his flute attracted to him all the animals, bringing them to the surface of the earth for the benefit of the clan."

Shows Increase Abroad Washington .- Use of the special delivery mail service, in operation with 28 countries by reciprocal arrangenent, has become extensive.

Many business men, however, instead of using a 20-cent special delivery stamp, as required by the regulations, stick the 10-cent stamp intended for domestic use on their important letters and thereby lose not only the advantage of expeditious delivery they were seeking, but the cost of the stamp as well, for such letters are treated abroad as ordinary mail. The 10-cent stamp habit has been particularly prevalent among senders of mail to Cuba, where the 20-cent service is especially useful. The prinipal American mail leaves Key West daily at 8 a. m. and arrives at Havana at 4 p. m. With the proper stamp on it a letter can be delivered the same day, and a reply dispatched in time to start on its way to the United States at 9:30 the next day.

Selection of Hatching

Eggs Quite Important Even where care has been used in selecting breeders the eggs from the breeding pen should also be chosen carefully. Uniformity in size, shape and color of eggs is desirable and careful selection for these features has some effect on the eggs the pullets will lay next fall and winter.

Size is an important matter in the market value of eggs and although in this state it is not always considered or evident, nevertheless it is true that most eggs before they reach the consumer are subject to grading. There is a relation between the size of the egg and that of the chick hatched from that egg. A good-sized but not abnormally large egg should be selected.

Shape is also an important consideration and those eggs that are exceptionally long, blunted or short are objectionable as well as any lopsided ones or those showing ridges in the shell.

Whole Milk Found Best

Protein Feed for Chicks Milk has been found to be a good preventive of white diarrhea; both sweet and sour being equally effective.

An experiment was carried on in Wisconsin comparing whole milk with other forms of protein feeds. They raised chicks to six months of age on whole milk alone. These chicks grew faster than the others getting skim milk, buttermilk or other protein feeds. While it is not practical to feed whole milk to chicks this way, It showed that whole milk comes very near being a complete ration. None of the forms of meat proteins such as tankage, meat scraps or fishmeal were found to be equal to skim milk protein. They are u-ually better, however, than the vege able proteins.

DIRECTIONS FOR SETTING A FOWL

In setting a hen the first thing is to make the nest. A box should be so arranged that the front can be closed and the hen shut onto the nest. The nesting material may be of fine hay or straw. There should be a sufficient quantity to fill the corners. Make the nest nearly flat, a little lower in the center.

See that the hen has been broody and stays on her nest two or three days before she is given her new nest and always move her at night. Put her carefully on the nest. For the first 24 hours close the front of the box. After a day or two, according to the disposition which she shows on the nest, remove the nest eggs and give her from eleven to thirteen eggs, according to the season of the year.

After the first 24 hours see that the hen leaves the nest at least once a day for food and water. Whole corn makes the best feed. Keep a dust box in the pen. Keep grit and fresh water before them at all times.

Set several hens at a time if pos sible, as the eggs can be tested about the seventh day. Remove the eggs that do not show a good germ. Take the eggs from one hen and replace these and start her on fresh eggs.

Always give the hen a dusting with some good lice powder before placing the eggs under her, and sprinkle a good quantity in the nest material. Give her a dusting again in ten days and also another dusting a few days before the hatch is due .- E. J. Peterson, North Dakota Agricultural college.

Cleanliness Essential

in Growing Chickens Next to proper feeding there is nothing so essential in growing chicks to vigorous, profitable layers and breeders as cleanliness. Be sure the feed is of the highest quality and not moldy, dusty or damp.

If wet mashes are fed, care should be taken not to feed leftovers as a wet mash will soon sour or mold. Mix only enough for one feeding at a time and if there is any left, feed it either to the mature fowls at once or give it to the hogs. Be sure the troughs or boards that the wet mash is fed on are kept clean. No matter how sour or moldy the mash may be, the chicks will eat it if they are hungry enough and bowel trouble will be the inevitable result.

The litter should never be allowed to become damp as nothing will cause brooder pneumonia quicker. When the chicks are first put in the brooder house or under the hover, an inch and a half of litter will be enough, but as they get old enough to really scratch, the depth of the litter will have to be increased to seven or eight inches.
