LINCOLN FOREST ATTRACTS A LARGE NUMBER OF VISITORS

A large number of visitors and campers used the National Forests of the southwestern region in 1933, according to a report of national forest visitors, campers, and transient parties passing through the forests, just completed for the fiscal year 1933, for Arizona and New Mexico.

The number of visitors shows a slight decrease over the previous year, according to Assistant Regional Forester M. M. Cheney, in charge of recreation. As between states, continues Mr. Cheney, Arizona leads with over 1,600,000. New Mexico had 870,000. As to the visitors, such as summer home residents, campers and picnicers, as distinguished from transients passing through, Arizona had 293,000 and New Mexico 139,000. It would naturally be expected that picnicers would be, by far, the most numerous class. In fact, these include almost one-half of the entire number of visitors.

in Dona Ana county reported sometime ago that the removal of a large number of quail from the range east of the Organ mountains would be distinctly advantageous.

The permit issued to Mr. Carlton specifically provides that the quail secured shall be used for brood stock, and that an equal number shall be returned to the Department of Game and Fish in 1935.

No quail have been sold or given away for commercial, or other purposes. The birds covered by the Carlton permit have been loaned to him during a year when there was an abundance of quail.

When the Ligon game farm at Carlsbad was established some years ago on a commercial basis, various kinds of game birds were loaned to Mr. Ligon by the department, including quail, prairie chickens, turkeys, etc.

Mr. Carlton expects to secure through purchase outside of the state, additional quail for brood stock.

Sportsmen need have no fear that the quail loaned to Mr. Carlton will not be returned, as the department will see to it that they are returned at the proper time.

Some have expressed fear that quail will be illegally trapped for commercial purposes in connection with this operation. There is no likelihood of this occurring, as such procedure on the part of any game breeder would subject his permit to cancellation.

The raising of game in a wholly enclosed preserve for commercial purposes is comparable to the raising of trout in private licensed lakes for sale and is a legitimate industry to be encouraged rather than discouraged.

LIVE GAME MAY BE SOLD IF PURPOSE OF PROPAGATION

SANTA FE—There seems to have arisen considerable misunderstanding among sportsmen and others relative to the game farm application of A. A. Carlton of Deming, New Mexico. In order that the public may be advised of the facts, the following resume of the case is given:

The recently amended regulation governing game breeder's permits provides that game animals and game birds may be raised for sale alive for propagating purposes, or for food purposes when processed, preserved or canned. Game birds and game animals so offered for sale must be raised in a preserve wholly enclosed in such a manner as to prohibit any ingress or egress of the kind of birds or animals involved.

In view of present expensive methods of trapping and transplanting quail, the game department is anxious to further all game breeding experiments especially on a large scale which will be of value in the determination of economical methods of quail production for stocking purposes.

FARMERS CAN BORROW MONEY AT 5 1/2 PERCENT

Just as the five newly organized Production Credit Associations in New Mexico were completing their organizations for the issuing of production credit to farmers and livestock men in the state, announcement was received from Governor Wm. I. Myers of the Farm Credit Administration that intermediate credit banks will reduce their interest rates on new loans from three to two and one-half percent.

This lower rate of interest, which became effective March 16, is made possible by the recent sale of intermediate credit bank debentures bearing a low rate of interest. Not only was the rate low, but the issue was heavily oversubscribed.

This is the first time in history that low interest rates in the big money markets have been reflected immediately to farmers throughout all parts of the United States. This nation-wide reflection is made possible through the newly organized production credit associations.

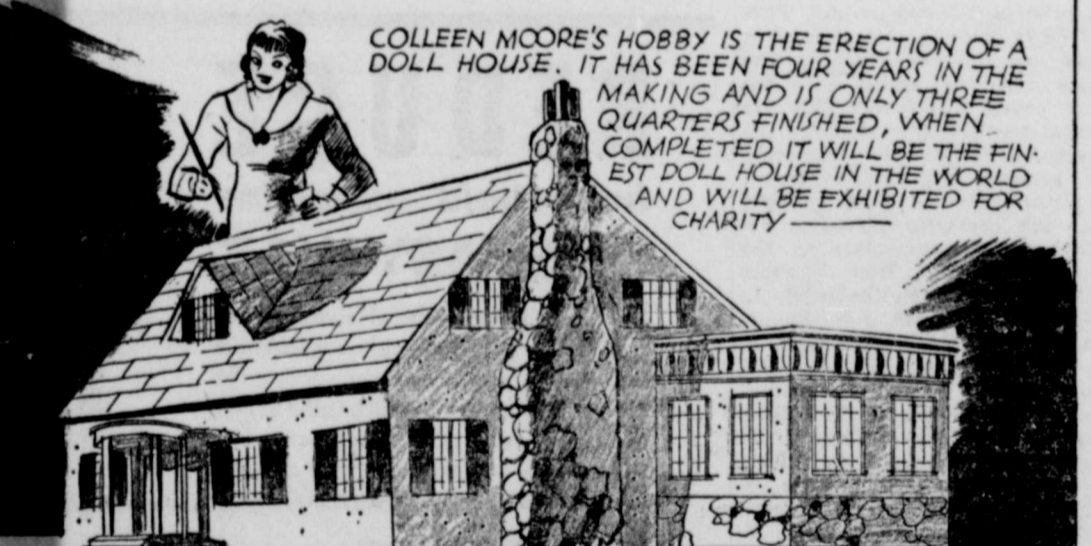

They were naked to the waist and barefooted. Their white trousers gleamed dully in the moonlight.

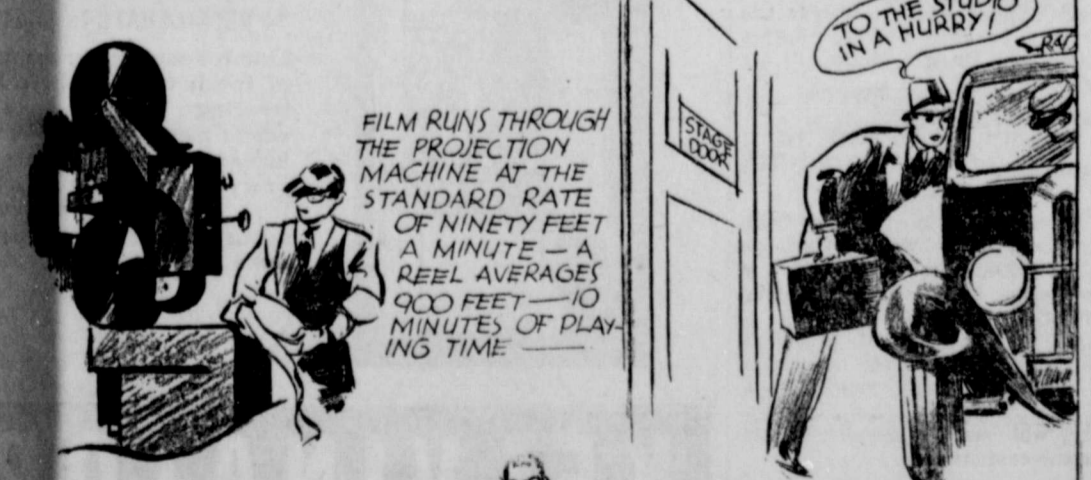

FOURTEEN CAMPS IN STATE

WASHINGTON — The forest service advised Senator Cutting Saturday that fourteen CCC camps will be located in New Mexico forests this summer, in the Carson near El Rito, Gila near Silver City, Lincoln near High Rolls, Santa Fe near Jemez, Santa Fe near Pena Blanca, Billa near Beaverhead, Cibola near Manzano.

Two camps at Santa Fe and Silver City will be located on private land and one at Bandler National monument.

Four state park camps are planned at Santa Fe, Hyde Park, Eastern New Mexico State Park and Bottomless Lake near Roswell.

C. M. Granger, acting forester, told Senator Cutting that a number of camps had to be moved out of New Mexico in order to provide camps during the summer for states farther north where work can be undertaken only during the summer months.

"Decision as to the restoration of some of these camps to present sites next winter will be made when the winter program is prepared next fall," said Granger.

The Bankhead bill was revised again in the senate yesterday and a tax of 75% of values was put into it on that excess of the allotted bales to each grower, and the original feature as proposed by Senator Bankhead to collect the tax when the cotton is ginned was returned to the bill.

Having already apparently been fully discounted or even more than discounted, the market has come off each time anything was done with this legislation.

We anticipate a gradually sinking market for some time until the actual results of control measures are tested both in the cotton fields and at court.

40,000 Postal Employees Exempt Exemption of about 40,000 postal workers from Postmaster General Farley's furlough order requiring workers in the field service to be furloughed without pay for four days during the remainder of the fiscal year was announced Monday by the post-office department.

The exemption applies to assistant postmasters at third-class postoffices, and clerks at third-class postoffices or to job cleaners receiving less than \$720 a year.

Industrial Activity Increases WASHINGTON—New increases in industrial activity, factory employment and payrolls were reported Monday by the federal reserve board.

Steel, automobiles and textiles were named especially in the monthly review of business and financial conditions for February and early March.

A billion dollar increase in deposits of member banks also was noted. Wholesale commodity prices, the board said, showed little change in recent weeks.

Home Loans in State Pass Million and Half ALBUQUERQUE—Home loans in New Mexico made by the federal home loan corporation totaled \$1,520,789.40 for a total of 665 loans, E. C. Robertson, state manager said. This is an average of a little less than \$2,300 a loan.

Committees Named SANTA FE—Committees Monday were named to draft a state chamber of commerce law and to raise funds for a New Mexico exhibit at the Century of Progress. The meeting, called by the governor, was slimly attended, only seven towns being represented. The governor said heavy snows in the east side of the state prevented a greater attendance.

Representatives were here from Albuquerque, Taos, Raton, Clovis, Portales, Capitan and Santa Fe. The committee to draft a state chamber of commerce bill was composed of F. C. Cheatham, chairman, of Taos; Claude Simpson, of Roswell; T. W. Conway of Las Vegas; J. C. Larkin of Raton; G. S. Hoover of Capitan; L. N. Kremer of Albuquerque and John Dehuff of Santa Fe.

The committee to raise funds for the New Mexico exhibit at the Century of Progress was composed of Coe Howard of Portales; L. N. Kremer of Albuquerque; C. E. Mauldin of Clovis; Harry Shuart and W. B. Hicks, both of Santa Fe.

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HEALTH COLUMN

Menstruation That the "monthly" period comes usually every 28 days is regarded by some authorities as showing a remaining influence of the tides upon the function of our mysterious bodies. It is supposed that this influence dates from the far, far distant past when life was translated from water to land and our remote biological ancestors lived a tidal life upon the shore. If this is true it is rather remarkable that menstruation only occurs in the female of the human species and of a few man-like monkeys. For menstruation is not to be confused with the period of "heat" in other mammals. That is something quite different and occurs at a different state in the reproductive cycle.

Menstruation is a consequence of the very special preparations that are made in the human uterus for the care and nourishment of the fertilized human egg. Every month these preparations are made anew and discarded whenever they are not needed. Many primitive races hold superstitious beliefs thinking that the menstrual blood is derived from a wound inflicted by some supernatural creature or that it indicates possession by an evil spirit. The belief that a menstruating woman is unclean so frankly expressed in Masalic law is common to many people. When we reflect on the fear and taboos associated with this normal function in the minds of savages it is easy to understand how even the young American, unprepared for the

No one could estimate near what figure would be involved if the several pay had to be restored.

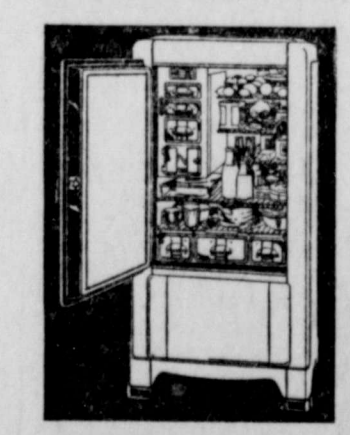
