MENACE TO WILD LIFE

St. Louis 'has gotta quit kickin' the Mississippi river around," so about 13,000,000 sportsmen of our United States are singing, according to the American Game Association. They claim that the aquatic life of Old Father Mississippi is seriously threatened from the 600 tons of garbage dumped daily into the river by St. Louis, and several other hundred towns and cities. They also argue that surely Memphis, Cairo and New Orleans will eventually sing, "Old Man River Keep Away From My Door," this last from a sense of sanitation, and some rather strong gaseous odors which will be created from the abovenamed sewerage system.

From the sportmen's standpoint the garbage reduces the oxygen contents of the river, which is already depleted by sewage, to the extent of destroying fish for nearly two hundred miles below St. Louis, and also destroys aquatic foods, which feeds millions of wildfowl, that use the river as a flyway all over the states.
