





In spring of 1935 I purchased some Dixie Rose cotton seed from Mr. W. S. Galloway of Vernon, Texas. Mr. Galloway and his son are breeders of Dixie Rose cotton. Mr. Galloway guaranteed that this followed about the pigs which were cotton seed would produce twice as much cotton per acre as any other kept in the Ireland parlors. cotton by which I would plant it and give it the same attention. 
