

Except for free-use licensees. applicable to ten head or less of work and milch stock, there will be collected a fee of five cents per head per month or fraction thereof

District advisors will be elected annually after an election date is qualifications of voters which are the classes one, two and three of licensee qualifications, and the free-use permittees.

Qualified voters may write in the names they wish to vote for and need not be held to vote for those nominated for advisors. A representative of the division of grazing will select three election judges from amongst the qualified voters.

Each elector shall vote for the candidate for the class of livestock owners to which he belongs, regardless of the precinct from which said candidate may be nominated. If the elector runs more than one kind of stock he must choose with which class he will vote.

An elector, if qualified in more than one district, may vote in the different districts.

Nominees for advisors in the various precincts of a grazing district must be electors with dependent commensurate property, or with priority use in running livestock in the precinct or district. More detailed instructions as to elections and tenure of office of those elected will be given when elections are announced and at the time they are held.

Little by The purpose of this, as outlined little, it has encroached upon what many believe to be the jurisdiction of the courts and in a like manner it has taken unto itself powers hitherto supposed to have been exclusively reserved to the executive department of government.

It would seem, then, that if other senate committees had established the precedent, Senator Black could properly use the same methods. The trouble in his case is that he did not stop at limits previous ly set, discreditable as those limits were, but went beyond them.

#### New York's Building Service Strike Ends

COMPROMISE brought to an end the two weeks' strike of building service workers in New York and thousands of elevator operators and other employees returned to their jobs in some 2,400 apartment houses and business structures. The settlement provided for immediate re-employment of all strikers and arbitration of wages and hours, and it was halled as a "great victory" by James J. Bambrick, head of the local union and leader in the strike. Arbitration of minimum wages and maximum hours was begun

under Ferdinand A. Silcox, chief of the United States forestry service. Wages and hours are to be fixed at the end of each of the next three years on the basis of prevailing economic conditions.

In signing a three-year contract with the realty advisory board, representing the employers, union leaders abandoned their demand for a closed or preferential shop. Building operators, in their turn, agreed to reinstate all strikers instead of insisting on the retention of 15 per cent of the replacement workers hired during the strike.







Regulations to be set up and agreed to by each farm owner for the equitable and just use of water, which should provide certain days, and specific hours for irrigation of such unit from the artesian well thereon. The time arranged for the use of water on a unit, to be so fixed as not to interfere with nor lessen the artesian flow in any other artesian well in this major irrigation district. All wells when not in active use for irrigation purposes to be kept constantly capped and shut off

Loans to these farmers and others as provided by the president's executive order could be made to those who apply for such an amount sufficient to purchase the land and equipment desired, belt, of every one square mile of build a modest home for the family, out buildings for stock horses. cows and chickens, and also furand advisability of establishing a nishings for the home and to include the cost of piping water from the well on said unit into the home for domestic use.

By this method these artesian and underground water rights could be equitably adjusted for the beneficial use thereof, by these land owners and also make productive all such lands within this area as these artesian and underground waters in this basin would successfully irrigate.

The vegetables, fruit, and grain products; as well as butter, milk, eggs and fowl production on said land, over and above a good living for the land owner and his family, would provide a supply of necessities for the citizens of the cities and towns in southeastern New Mexico, now shipped and trucked in from adjoining and other states. The cash received from sale of these products would provide a

reserve or sinking fund to finally retire the existing debt on those small farms.







The following plan is suggested for consideration:
