Olga looked forward to whatever was going to happen next in her life, whether it was the next church service, her next new grandbaby, or her next trip to Mexico to visit her relatives. She usually brought me a little trinket when she came back from Mexico; a set of enamel bowls, or a straw tote bag, or a little papier mache bird. I wondered if she brought small surprises for all the other people she worked for. Probably so. She loved everybody.

And she had this enormous purse she carried around, that seemed to have everything in it except the kitchen sink -- or maybe that too. One time I was searching all over the house for a screwdriver or a wrench or something to do a small repair. Well, if you've ever had a teenage boy at home, you understand why the tools weren't put back where they belonged. Finally, Olga said, "Oh here, why don't you just use mine," whereupon she dug down into the depths of her bottomless bag and came up with a pair of pliers. That bag could have served as a lethal weapon if she'd ever needed one.

was lucky enough to inherit Delia (better known as "Lala") from Olga, and she's just as sweet as her mom. The Asebedos moved to Lubbock awhile back, so Delia drives all the way back to Friona once or twice each week to take care of "her people." You don't see that kind of loyalty much anymore.

At her funeral, some letters were read aloud to the congregation. They had been written to Olga by some of the people she worked for, expressing their appreciation, love and concern during her last days when she was very ill. Her boundless energy finally gave out and the sunshine is gone from the little brown house on Woodland Street.

The Farm Bureau says that a bill to end unilateral sanctions on food and medicine has been introduced in the U.S. Senate, which passed a similar bill last year. However, the measure died in the House when the leadership did not allow a vote on it.

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Cotton News (from Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.)

Waiting is never easy when the bottomline is going to be affected. Unfortunatly, cotton ginenrs and prodcuers across the nation are having to do just that as they wait for finalization of the 1999 Cottonseed Assistance Program.

Once the rules are completed, and the final figures determined, payments estimated at some \$11-12 per ton will be made available through the first handler of the seed.

In one way the wait could turn out to be in the best interest of payment recipients. The longer it takes for the program to be finalized the better the chances that additional money could be targeted to the program.

Already the total amount earmarked for cottonseed assistance has been reduced to fund a Step 2 program for ELS cotton. The longer it takes to make the rules and initiate the program means less dollars that may be needed for the ELS Step 2 program. That could mean more dollars in the pot for the cottonseed program.

The government's Office of Management and Budget is currently in the process of reviewing the program and the proposed regulations that will govern its operation. As soon as that process is complete the Farm Service Agency can start moving toward implementation in the country.

Early projections that the payments could be made by the end of May remain the best estimate of when the program will begin.

Immunization Clinics Are Set In May

Immunization clinics offering vaccines that give your children protection against several childhood diseases are scheduled in the area for May.

Protection will be against polio, diphtheria, lockjaw (tetanus), whooping cough (pertussis), measles, rubella, mumps, HIB (Haemophilus Influenzae Type B) and varicella (chickenpox). Pneumococcal vaccine is available.

The vaccinations are available at the WIC Office. 607 Main Street in Friona, Friday, May 19 from 10 a.m.-12 noon and 1-3:45 p.m.

Vaccinations will also be administered at the Emergency Medical Services (EMS) Office, 109 East Third Street in Bovina, Monday, May 8 from 10 a.m.-3 p.m.

Insurance Reform Bill has slowed some over the past few days as information is passed between congressional staff members working on the legislation and the Congressional Budget Office.

The work is tedious and requires up-to-date cost estimates on virtually every point. The result has been slow and steady progress towards getting a draft conference report that can be worked on by the members of the Conference Committee

The best case scenario puts the first face-to-face meeting between conferees at least a week away and maybe as much as two weeks down the road. Updated information and additional details about how the legislation is shaping up will be released as they become available.

The 2000 cotton season is already under way in other parts of Texas and the High Plains is readying for a busy planting season.

As the season progresses producers, crop consultants, extension agents and the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation share concerns over potential secondary pest problems.

Three eradication zones on the High Plains are poised to start season-long action against cotton's primary pest, the boll weevil. Whether treatments to rid fields of boll weevil are made by individual growers or an area-wide eradication program the potential for secondary pest probelms

A secondary pest problem occurs when management of a major or primary pest leads to other normally minor pest insects becoming major pests themselves.

At a meeting in Abilene April 19 the TBWEF Board moved toward an early warning strategy as they authorized an information exchange contract with IPM agents.

Working through Texas Pest Management Association date will be supplied to TBWEF 1-2 times per week during the 2000 growing season. The date will include scouting information from fields in up to 7 IPM units on cotton boll worm, tobacco budworm, beet armyworm, aphid and other cotton pests. Dr. Tom Fuchs, State IPM Coordinator commented in the meeting "This information should be very

Lucille Rockey Submits Her Life Story For Publication

Every month a resident of Prairie Acres Nursing Home submits a story about his/her life's history to be submitted in the home's newsletter, "The Prairie Times," and for printing in this issue. This month we feature Lucille Rockey.

I was born on April 7, 1909 in Woodward, Okla-homa to Emma Wilkinson and Howard Elmore. My father was a farmer and owned threshing machines and my mother was a housewife.



Dear Editor:

If you live in rural Texas and have not received a census form in the mail or at your doorstep, I strongly urge you to contact the U.S. Census Telephone Questionnaire Assistance number at 1-800-471-9424 to make sure you can participate in the census process. Why is this important? Because rural Texans are already outnumbered with 80 per cent of the state's population living in urban areas.

An accurate census count is especially critical with our Legislature undertaking redistricting of congressional and state legislative seats next

It is essential that no one in rural Texas miss this important head count and risk losing representation in Austin and Washington, D.C. due to population growth in urban areas.

While most urban Texans have received and already filled out their census forms, others in rural areas still have yet to receive a form because they get their mail at post office boxes, rural routes, box numbers or general delivery addresses.

According to the census bureau, if you live in certain rural areas, you don't "count" unless an enumerator sees you face-to-face. That may be a surprise to those of us with post office boxes who think we are still hale and hearty.

Many local officials are questioning the practicality of "door-to-door" visits in some areas of the state such as Brewster, Jeff Davis and other border counties, where homes can be few and far


Brewster county officials have been told that enumerators will try to visit residences in the 6,129square-mile county that is almost the size of Israel. Other rural counties are also facing similar instances of a serious undercount with entire communities still not receiving

Clearly, common sense needs to be applied, and the system for canvassing rural areas must be improved when the next census rolls around. Like their urban counterparts, rural residents should be given the option and convenience of filling out a mailed form.
