Although the Panthers have been winless this year after losing most of last year's fine team and having a few key injuries this year, the Panthers would like nothing better than to try and stop the Bears from a clear championship.

The Panthers will have their backfield back at full strength tonight and are much heavier than the Bears. Fullback John Brinegar was named to the all-district team last year and weighs 180 and is probably the finest fullback Baird has met this year. Their two halfbacks Neal Overstreet and Kenneth Welch weigh 170 and 155. Their line is led by all-district guard David Revels who has been moved to tackle this year. Another tackle Gary Echols weighs 230.

State Okays Closing Of Clyde Depot

The State Railroad Commission has granted permission to the Texas and Pacific Railroad to abandon its depot at Clyde.

The order permits T&P to discontinue its agency and dismantle the depot.

The railroad testified in a hearing before a commissioner examiner three weeks ago that it lost \$892 on the Clyde stop in a year's time. Clyde citizens asked that the action be delayed for 12 to 18 months to see if the opening of a new candy factory would supply the revenue needed to continue the service.

Baird Defeats Jim Ned, 20-8

The Baird Bears utilized the running of Harvey Christison and Ross Odell to virtually annex the District 7-B championship with a 20-8 triumph over Jim Ned before a large crowd here Friday night.

A tough Bear line held the Indians pretty well in check most of the night, but they couldn't stop Jim Ned's Bill Swindle from becoming the leading ground gainer of the game.

Swindle, third leading scorer in the Abilene area, picked up 109 yards rushing and scored the only Jim Ned touchdown on a 24-yard gallop to run his total for the year to 110 points.

The teams fought on close terms during the first half with the Bears taking an 8-0 lead in the first quarter and holding a 14-8 advantage at the intermission. However the Bears completely dominated the last half of play and ran up a wide margin in the game statistics.

Baird still could be tied by Jim Ned for the district title, but it would take a major upset by an extremely weak Gorman team to pull the trick. Even then the Bears still would advance into the playoffs.

The Bears have an 8-1 season record and stand 3-0 in district. Jim Ned is 5-4 for the year and 2-1 in district.

Baird took the opening kickoff and marched to the Jim Ned six before being stopped on fourth down. However the Indians fumbled three plays later with tackle Leonard Payne recovering for Baird on the 15 to set up the first touchdown.

Christison lost four, then circled right end for 14 yards to the five. Odell picked up four and quarterback Terry Joy sneaked over for the score. Christison ran the extra point.

The teams exchanged fumbles as the first quarter ended, and early in the second a seven-yard Jim Ned punt set up the second Baird touchdown.

The Bears took over on the Indian 17 and Christison ripped off eight yards on the first play and two plays later bulled over from the one to make it 14-0. The extra point run was no good.

Jim Ned took the kickoff on its 20 and made its best offensive showing of the night, marching 89 yards in 17 plays for a touchdown. The big plays were a 23-yard pass from Swindle to end Kenneth Windham, and Swindle's 24-yard touchdown run. Swindle went to the right on the run and apparently was stopped at the 10, but slipped away from a pair of tacklers and went down the sideline for the score. J. W. Almond ran the extra point. Baird could run only one play before the half.

Baird quickly led the game away in the third period, going 67 yards in six plays with the aid of a 15 yard penalty. Odell picked up 16 on one scamper and Christison took a pitchout around right end for 21 yards to the eight. Odell got seven and then crashed over from the one for the score. The extra point run was no good and the score stood at 20-8.

Jim Ned failed to make a dent in the Baird defense the rest of the way and the Bears controlled the ball nearly all the time in the scoreless fourth quarter.

Christison led the Bears running attack with 98 yards and Odell picked up 79.

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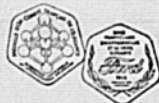

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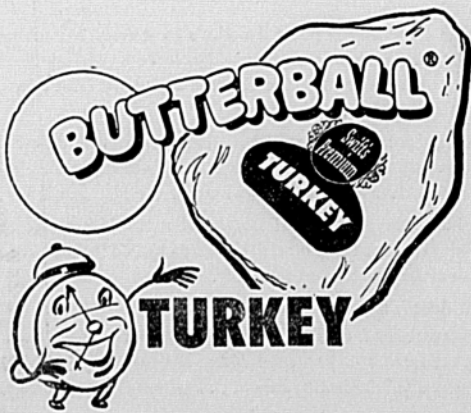

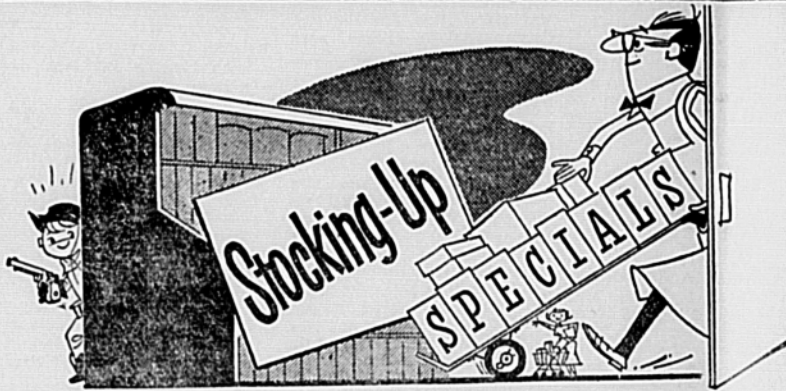
