SOMETHING NEW IN FLOWERS AND PLANTS.

Germany Has Contributed a Rose in Bright Coral Pink-Rubber Plant with Fine Foliage-Proper Method of Grafting.

There is a new variety of the polyantha rose. It originated in Germany and is named the "Aennchen Muller." The color is a bright coral pink.

The novelty about this especial variety of polyantha rose is the fact that its petals curl back longitudinally in a very even and curious way, giving it its name of revoluta.

It grows only a foot and a half to two feet high, and so it is very desirable for bedding out in compact masses, also for forcing in pots. Abroad it is being grown successfully. It keeps in flower from June until late in the autumn.

A New York dealer is the agent for a new rose that originated in faraway Queensland, Australia, which is different from other tea roses. It is the first rose from that land to win a gold medal.

The fine blossoms are borne singly, with strong guard leaves, on the ends of good stalks. The color is crimson at the base, shading to white, with a crimson flush beneath the petals.

If a rubber plant is to be had for foliage, why not select the majestic kind known as Ficus pandurata? This has very different leaves from the common kind. No handsomer green, but in shape somewhat like an oak, or the liriodendron, or tulip poplar.

The leaves are often ten inches wide by 15 inches long. It does not "sprangle," to use an expressive country expression, as the old kind is apt to do. It has a more tree-like effect. Of course the rubber plant which has grown awkwardly or has become too large can be made over into other trees. This is the way: You root the cuttings on the tree, which is an Irish bull. That is to say, instead of cutting the branches and then rooting them in the usual way in sand, another method has to be adopted for this milky juiced plant. A sponge or some sphagnum moss must be tied about the place that is to be severed later. This packing is to be kept wet. Little roots will start out, and when those are sufficiently developed then the branches may be severed and each will make a new tree.

Plants will not grow without food and water. There generally is enough rain to supply their needs, as the roots will go down more deeply in dry weather to secure the needed moisture. If there is a necessity for water, which will be shown by the plant beginning to wilt, it ought to be soaked thoroughly. Mere sprinkling will have to be constant to do any good. Food is an important matter for plants as well as animals. Only three substances have any value as plant food. These are nitrogen, potash and phosphoric acid. If each plant was to get exactly of these what it required it would be an ideal way, but we have to strike a general average on this as on other matters. If thoroughly rotted manure can be had it is the best, but the usual supply is full of weed seeds, which give no end of trouble. Still, if the soil is stiff it should be used to lighten it up, or if sandy to give it substance. The artificial manures are free from seeds and can be had from any responsible dealer. It is much easier to use them, and the results are so favorable that they are meeting popular approval. It is hardly necessary to say that all weeds must be kept out. In dry weather they can be hoed out, and will die, but when the ground is wet it is better to pull them out. The earth ought not to be allowed to become hard, as air is needed for the roots, but when plants are set out it is necessary to firm the soil around them to prevent their being washed out ir the first hard storm.





SPAIN FAR BEHIND NATIONS.

Illiteracy Prevails There to a Most Amazing Extent.

Of the 20,000,000 people inhabiting Spain, only about 35 per cent. can read and write; another two and onehalf per cent. of the population can read without being able to write, but the remaining 62½ per cent. are absolute illiterates. In the south of Spain it is impossible to get a servant who can read and write, and many of the postmen are unable to tell to whom the letters they carry are addressed. They bring a bundle of letters to a house and the owner looks through them and takes those which are (or which he thinks are) addressed to him. The Spanish postmen are not paid by the state; the recipient of the letters have to remunerate them according to the amount of their correspondence, and each letter costs the addressee at least one cent. It is a joke among the easy-going Spaniards that he who treats the postmen best receives the most letters-whether they are intended for him or not.

SHADE FOR THE CANDLE.

Pretty and Novel Affair by No Means Hard to Make.

So many persons find the light from a candle or lamp trying on the eyes that they always insist on shades of some sort.

A pretty and novel affair for a candle may be made of strong wire bent into a rectangular shape, six inches wide at the bottom, with the inner side 12 inches tall and the outer seven and one half. This will give a decided slope to each top.

Make two of these frames and cover them neatly with silk muslin of a very thin liberty silk.

This cover may then be painted or it can be studded in conventional design in sequins. Tie the backs together with bows of narrow ribbon for hinges, and around the top and two shorter sides sew a box-plating of narrow lace.

The candle is, of course, placed between the two leaves when they are opened wide. Extreme care must be taken to observe this precaution, as a fire might easily result from such inflammable materials in close proximity to flame.

KEEPING SHOES IN ORDER.

Ways by Which Best Results Can Be Obtained.

White buckskin should be cleaned with the best pipe clay, which must be dampened before using.

Patent leather shoes should first be wiped dry with a soft cloth before placing them on the shoe tree, then wiped with a soft cloth dipped in warm soapy water.

A little vaseline should be applied from time to time, especially after a wetting. The shine may be restored by rubbing with a piece of soft silk or black velvet.

Leather nowadays is rendered independent of the ill effect of dampness. Shoes can, therefore, generally be washed with tepid water when soiled, a piece of soft linen being dampened and applied all over the shoe.

Spanish Pigs' Feet.

Take eight clean, fresh "trotters;" cut each into four pieces; then boil until nearly done. Take the pigs feet out and lay to one side. Boil in the liquid one pint of tomatoes and one pound of parboiled tripe, cut fine; one small garlic, mashed fine; six potatoes sliced diamond shape, half cupful of rice, half a cupful of Indian curry. When almost done put the pigs' feet back, taking care that they are well covered with the liquid, and let it all boil until the pigs' feet are lone. Be sure not to let the pigs' feet all apart or have the sauce too thin. This is a favorite Spanish recipe.

Beef Tenderloin and Bananas.

Cut beef tenderloin into pieces, two and one-half inches thick, broil and season. Have gravy ready made as follows: One tablespornful of butter, two tablespoonfuls of flour, one cup of milk, one-half teaspoonful of salt, onequarter teaspoonful of pepper, one heaping tablespoonful of horseradish: boil and strain. Fry in two tablespoons of olive oil two large firm bananas cut lengthwise; be careful not to break. Pour one-quarter of a cup of sherry in and baste over bananas. Place two halves over each piece of meat on platter and pour gravy around.

Rhubarb Jelly.

Wash and cook rhubarb until tender, adding enough water to keep from burning. Strain through cheese cloth; add one cup of sugar to every cup of juice; add the juice of one lemon to every quart; boil 20 minutes.

Sardine Sandwiches.

Take one can of sardines put up in oil, mix well with fork, adding enough catsup to make bright red. Mix thoroughly and spread on thin buttered slices of bread. The mixture provides enough for one loaf of bread.



Leslies Found Guilty.

Robert Leslie, Sr., and Robert Leslie, Jr., were found guilty last week in the district court at Alamogordo, on a charge of killing Block cattle, the offence having been committed more than two years ago. At the spring term of court held in this county in 1895, a change of venue was taken to Otero county. This was the third trial, at that place, growing out of the same charge, the first trial resulting in the conviction of the oldest son, two years ago. One year ago the father was tried, and resulted in a hung jury. At this last hearing the father and vounger son were tried jointly with the above result.

It has been reported—though unconfirmed, and at this time unconfirmable—that a sentence of 20 years each was passed by the judge; but this is not credited here, as the term named seems rather exorbitant, and beyond what is usually given in such cases. However, the maximum sentence that may be imposed is five years, and we understand that the joint charge contained seven counts, which would permit of a sentence as reported, and still be far from the limit.

Thomas J. Pridemore, formerly foreman of the Block company, by whom the defendants claimed they were given authority to kill these cattle, was extradited from Mexico, and testified at this last trial. Contrary to the claims of the defense and to many others, Mr. Pridemore, when put on the stand, swore he had never given such authority, and the defense was left without hope.

The jury brought in a recommendation for clemency, and this is another reason for disbelieving the report of a twenty-year sentence.

Territorial Game Laws.

It is unlawful to kill, or in any way injure, any elk, mountain sheep, beaver or ptarmigan. The offense is punishable by a fine of

The 1905 session laws protect antelope, pheasant, bob-white quail and wild pigeon for a period of five years from the passage of the act.

Native or crested quail may be killed with gun only during the months of October, November December and January.

Deer with horns may be killed with gun only from October 15 to November 30. This is an act passed by the last legislature, and it willed that the deer season has been placed 30 days later than under the old law.

Turtle doves may be killed from July 15 to May 1, the closed season being two and one-half months.

Wild turkey, mountain grouse, or prarie chicken may be killed with gun only during the mouths of October, November and December of each year.

The minimum fine for violation of any of these provisions is fifty dollars.

PEOPLE TALKED ABOUT

ATHLETE IN CHARGE



George W. Woodruff, who has been named by President Roosevelt as acting secretary of the interior during the absence of Secretary Garfield, is one of the best-known authorities on outdoor games in the country, an all around athlete with a number of splendid records to his credit and developed the Pennsylvania university and Carlisle Indian football elevens.

His was the unusual record of having been for his entire four years a member of the footbell eleven, the track and field teams and the varsity crew. He captained the crew of 1889.

After finishing his classical course at Yale, Mr. Woodruff went to the University of Pennsylvania to study law, and it was here that he made his reputation as one of the foremost football


tacticians of his day.

When Mr. Woodruff left college a fighter was wanted in the forest service as law officer, and Mr. Woodruff got the appointment, becoming chief aid to Gifford Pinchot, the government forester. He did yeoman service in organizing the national forest reserve policy, and his industry and ability especially commended itself to the president, who soon discovered that the energetic, restless, planning, hustling attorney was a man of much his own mold

The acting secretary of the interior is about the same age as Mr. Roosevelt and is not unlike the president in appearance. The shape of the faces, with the prominent teeth, the mustache and the expression of restless energy are not unlike.

Mr. Woodruff is one of five assistants to the attorney general, and is connected with the department of justice, though his assignment is to give advice to the department of the interior in matters where legal points are raised.

GOTHAM CITY CHAMBERLAIN



James J. Martin, the newly-appointed city chamberlain of New York, who is expected to join Mayor McClellan in his fight to oust Charles F. Murphy from the leadership of Tammany Hall, is one of the most powerful district leaders in the metropolis. He is pointed out as the "last of the old school of politicians," and he says he is proud of the distinction. The notion that the successful politician of the present day is the man who can shake hands, smile sweetly and promise without either fulfilling or offending is scorned by Mr. Martin.

"Politicians should stick more to the truth," says he. "I did it, and I know that it pays. Now and then it creates a little friction for a short time, but it disappears. You can never hold the

support of a man to whom you lie, nor can you keep as your friend a man to whom you make promises that you do not keep. My policy always was to tell a man straight off whether I could do a thing or not. If I said I would, I did, and I got along all right."

Mr. Martin was born in Ireland and came to this country a babe in arms. At the age of 11 years he went to work as an office boy for a lawyer. In 1862, in company with several other boys, he ran away from home and enlisted in the Ninth New York volunteers. He served on the field for a year and then was made head of the clerical force with Gen. Dix. He continued in this office until the end of the war.

JAPAN'S FOREMOST DIPLOMAT



Viscount Hayashi, minister of foreign affairs in the Japanese cabinet, who recently went to Seoul, the Korean capital, in the interests of his country, which is hopeful that the emperor will abdicate the throne as requested by the premier, is a man much feared by those who would have the present government continue. After the emperor had refused to relinquish his power Japan lost no time in sending Hayashi to the scene and the news of his arrival spread dismay about the palace.

The circumstances leading up to the selection of Hayashi for the important office he now holds are interesting. Marquis Saionji, the prime minister, in reorganizing his cabinet, gave the portfolio of foreign affairs to Takaaki Kato, formerly

minister to England. After holding the office only a few days Mr. Kato suddenly resigned, it is said, for reasons never made public. Thereupon Ambassador Hayashi, then at the court of St. James, received an unexpected call to return to Japan and he was placed in the cabinet.

Viscount Hayashi is only 57 years of age, having been born in 1850 in Sakura, a little town near Tokio. His father was a prominent scholar and physician and the son was given a careful education in law and languages. His ability was early recognized and while yet very young he was sent to England to familiarize himself with Anglo-Saxon civilization. In 1891 he was appointed vice minister and began his diplomatic life. As soon as the war with China was over he was sent as minister to China and his success at this post was brilliant. His chief achievement was the commercial treaty between China and Japan which was negotiated and signed by him in 1896. It was he, too, who signed the final revision of the British alliance treaty. He was created viscount for bringing about this treaty.




NEWLY SET PLANTS.

Convenient Frame for Their Protection From Sun.

Newly transplanted plants always demand more or less protection from the blighting effects of too much sun and wind. It is best achieved by making a shelter such as is shown in the cut.

Two ten-foot poles and two three-foot pieces of any convenient thickness for the crosspieces, with four 14-inch weatherstrips for the legs, constitute the frame. In the middle of it two hooks should be inserted on each side, and upon these the covering fastened, which can thus be adjusted very quickly. The covering may consist of burlaps or any kind of rough sacking.

Being so simple and economical to make, it is advisable to have enough frames to protect the number of tender plants that are set out in a garden at one time, says Farm and Home. They possess other advantages than sheltering the young things from the

direct rays of the sun. They allow slow evaporation, and so keep newly watered ground moist for hours, whereas if exposed to the sun and wind it would soon become dry and caked. On windy days it is necessary to let the sacking down on the windward side of the shelter. In case of frost the protection that they afford is of inestimable value.

CLEAN CREAMERIES.

There Are a Few of Them But Many Are Dirty.

Some time ago I had the pleasure of taking a trip to visit a number of creameries in the county in which I live. As a result of that visit I came to the conclusion that there are many very dirty creameries and also many very clean ones. I could but wish that the people that buy the butter and buttermilk from the two kinds of creameries knew the difference between them, says a writer in Farmers' Review. If they did I am sure that the dirty creameries would all shut their doors and go out of business, while the other creameries would have all the business. If we could get a publicity of that kind it would be a powerful lever for lifting up the quality of our butter and other dairy products.

The dirty creameries were, wide open to the flies and dust. Old milk and dirt were spattered all over the floor. The churns smelled strong, and some of the utensils smelled as if they had not been thoroughly washed out for a long time. The clean creameries had cement floors, and the doors and windows were all screened. The untensils all smelled as clean as if bran new. It is a pleasure to think of eating butter coming from such creameries.


Improving.

We used to be thought that the cow which could give a pound of butter fat per day was an excellent animal. Last year, however, there were no less than 20 cows which averaged nearly two pounds of butter fat for every one of the 365 days.

A TRANSPLANTING DEVICE.

It Will Do the Work Rapidly and Well.

Bend a piece of tin or steel metal in form of a tube open along the side. A baking powder can, with bottom off and end seam unsoldered, will do for large plants. Thrust it into the soil, around the plant, press together to

hold the inclosed soil, and the plant and earth can be readily lifted and transferred to the pot or prepared hole in the garden. Loosen the pressure on the tube and it may be readily withdrawn, leaving plant and roots very slightly disturbed.

POINTS FOR FRUIT GROWERS.

The time put into the work of beautifying the country home is profitably spent.

Every shade tree properly placed on the farmstead adds to the value of the farm, and it adds to the beauty of the farm home.

If the horticulturist can find a way of keeping blight from pear trees, as they now appear likely to do, the markets will be filled with pears of high quality.

Water spouts on old trees should not always be removed. Often the tree needs some of them to help elaborate new material for wood building.

The soil of the orchard needs management just as surely as does the soil of the field in which vegetables are growing. It needs to be kept supplied with the elements of plant food.

Growth of Spruce Forests.

Some measurements made in the forests of Sweden showed that the trees were making a growth of a little less than two per cent a year. This is a good growth for a tree to make after it has attained a good size, but is rather small while the tree is small. It is evident that the young trees must make a much faster growth than this. The report summarized does not tell us how large the trees in the measured forests were at that time, which is a very important factor in the figuring of percentages.

Work the Soil.


Depth and fertility being obtained, there are several other things to be considered in gardening. The soil must be worked frequently, beginning as soon after the sowing of the seeds as the young plants can be seen and saved. The frequent working of the soil not only continues it in good condition for the growing crop, but keeps ahead of the weeds.

Grape Diseases.

Four principal diseases attack the grape. They are, the black rot, the downy mildew, and anthracnose. The remedy for all is the same—spraying every two weeks with Bordeaux mixture from the time the buds swell in the spring till the grapes begin to ripen.
