CITY CLEAN-UP CAMPAIGN TO START HERE APRIL 15th

Congressman Omar Burleson Announces For Re-Election

Congressman Omar Burleson has formally announced his candidacy for re-election to Congress subject to the Democratic Primary on May 4 and the General Election in November.

The 17th Congressional District is now composed of 31 Counties, covering approximately 30,000 square miles. Within this area live about 440,000 people.

"The original 12 counties, of which Callahan is one, have really been 'home', and long-time friends and supporters are highly valued," Burleson said. Further commenting he added, "The people whom I have represented all the years I have been in Congress were most understanding two years ago when it was necessary for me to concentrate in campaigning in 12 new counties. Since seven more have now been added, I shall have to make an effort to become better acquainted and makes friends in that new area. I will, however, be calling on by constituents in the older area at the earliest opportunity. I believe that it is incumbent upon a Congressman to know people and that they know him, to have the best representation. This is fundamental to our system."

In his statement Burleson says, "During my tenure of office I have followed two guiding principles: First, to know the views of my constituents and reflect their sentiments to the greatest degree possible in my actions in the Halls of Congress. Second, to inform and advise as closely as I can on those issues which affect our District, our State and our Nation."

Burleson termed his approach to Government as one of "common sense," gained through the years of public service. "I have tried to see that the people's tax money is spent as wisely and as judiciously as you would have spent it had you been in my place," he said. "The record will show that a greater part of the time I have found myself in the minority in opposing the vast spending programs which have been put into effect in recent years. In every Session of the Congress the record will show my votes for expenditures below that recommended by the Executive Department and far less than actually appropriated by the Congress, except in the field of National Defense," Burleson said. He continued, "Without meaning to appear boastful, if the Congress had followed those of us who have voted consistently over the years for fiscal responsibility, our financial affairs would not be in the shape they are today."

"In areas providing for the defense of our Country, I have always supported those things to make and keep our Nation stronger than any other in the world," he said. "I have been discerning in separating those activities which

the Federal Government was not designed to do, from those which are truly its responsibility," he said.

Burleson stated that activities of State and local governments, in accordance with the Constitution, should not be infringing and encroached upon by the Federal Government.

"The Federal Government does have specific missions," he said. He gave as examples the conservation of our natural resources, the defense of the Country and its general welfare.

"At the same time," he said, "the Federal Government can not and should not try to take care of everything from Washington, either foreign or domestic. The Federal Government has grown to colossal proportions and centralized power in Washington has increased," Burleson pointed out. "To this, I am opposed and my record is clear in this respect."

Burleson is among the senior members of the U. S. House of Representatives in point of service. His seniority has carried him to the Chairmanship of the potent House Administration Committee and to the second position to the Chairman on the powerful Foreign Affairs Committee. In addition, Burleson serves on two important Joint Committees formed from senior members of the House and Senate, as Chairman of one and Vice Chairman of the other.

Burleson is a former County Attorney and County Judge of Jones County. He was appointed an FBI Agent, and served in a number of assignments over the U. S. He resigned from the FBI to join the Navy in World War II, and saw duty in both the Atlantic and the Pacific.

Burleson ended his formal announcement by saying, "Although not having opposition in this year's election, it is my hope to visit my constituency as opportunity affords. The Congress being in session at this time and expected to be long after the Primary Election, there will be little time to leave duties in Washington. I expect, however, to get back home at short intervals to do the best I can in seeing my friends and to make new ones."

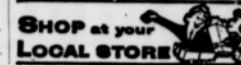
