Tax-payers Hold Mass Meeting and Appeal to Attorney Gen'l for Justice

TELEGRAPH TO WICKERSHAM

The citizens of Carizozo met in mass meeting at Real's Hall last 65.00Monday evening to protest against the action recently taken in the district court granting an injunction restraining the Commissioners from continuing the building of the Court house and jail at Carrizozo. Session Laws of the Territory of New Mexico, Council Bill No. 86, 1909, the citizens of Lincoln County, presented a petition to the OTHER COMMITTEES ARE BUSY Board of County Commissioners of Lincoln County, on July 5th. 1909 asking that an election be held on the question of the removal of the county seat from the town of Lincoln to the town of Carrizozo.

The law required over fifty per cent of the legal voters of the county to said petition. The petition which was presented to the Board of County Commissioners, contained 1,186 names out of a possible 1,600 voters. On the presentation of this petition the Board of County Commissioners ordered an election to be held on August 17, 1909, which said election was duly held and resulted in the following vote; Carrizozo 900 votes, Lincoln 613 votes. Showing majority in favor of Carrizozo for county seat.

Shortly after the election was held and the will of the people expressed at the poll, some of the property owners at the town of Lincoln commenced suit to prevent the removal of the county seat from their city; the hearing was held before Judge A- W. Cooley, at Alamogordo, N. M., and after hearing the arguments in the case, the demurrer filed by the citizens of Carrizozo was sustained by him in all points and the injunction dissolved.

A Few days later during the temporary absence of the Judge of this District who was holding court at Las Cruces, which is in the Third Judicial District, because of the absence of the Judge of that District. Las Cruces being only a few hours by rail from Santa Fe. Notwithstanding the accessibility of the presiding Judge of this District, the attorney for the complainants went before Judge John R. McFie, at Santa Fe, who had formerly considered himself disqualified to sit in this case when it came before the Supreme Court of the Territory, but who now issued an injunc tion against the Board of County Commissioners of Lincoln County restraining the m from paying out further funds on the Court House and Jail under course of construction at Carrizozo until the hearing on the quo warranto could be had.

The granting of this injunction, we are informed by this week where they had been a number of eminent, disinterested attorneys of the hunting. Territory, is uncalled for, unjust and illegal.

We would like to emphasize the fact here that in the issuance of this injunction, advantage was taken of the absence of the Presiding Judge of this District.

Further, we call your attention to a pamphlet issued in January, 1910, addressed to the President and Senate of the United States and styled, "The Lawyers of the First District of the Territory of New Mexico invite your attention to the reasons herein given why John R. McFie should not be appointed and confirmed as Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of New Mexico, and Presiding Judge of the First District of said Territory," wherein the Bar of his own District are practically unanimous against his confirmation.

The situation in fact being that Thomas B. Catron, the attorney for the plaintiffs in this county seat case, was practically the only member of the Bar in his District who favored the confirmation of the said Judge and who, we are reliably informed, spent a lengthy period of time in the city of Washington, D. C., imploring the Senate Committee on Judiciary to confirm the nomination of John R. McFie.

In view of the above statements, which are borne well this week as a representative out by the records we would respectfully request that you would restrain Judge John R McFie from any further interference in the local affairs of this District, for the reasons set forth above; which action, if persisted in, will result in a heavy expense on the taxpayers of the county and continue to keep alive the spirit of resentment that has been aroused in different sections of the county.

We, representing the taxpayers, who pay more than three fourths of the taxes of the county, therefore respectfully request that a Special Agent be sent to examine into the situation and determine the relative merits in the case to the end that justice may be done and quietude and peace may be restored to the citizens of said County of Lincoln.

The above memorial is forwarded in accordance with a telegram sent October 17th, 1910, by authority of a mass meeting regularly called for the purpose of considering this question in which a great majority of the people are vitally interested in having settled immediately with the express will of the people and the decisions of the Courts of the Territory.

The foregoing memorial was signed by over 150 representative citizens of Carrizozo and forwarded to the Attorney General. Copies are also now being circulated in Oscuro, Ancho, Corona, Jicarilla, White Oaks, Nogal and on the Bonito and will follow to the department of Justice. The people of the west end of the county are indigent and their feelings are at fever heat at the injustice of an injunction without bond being granted in the case.



FOR DINNER OR LUNCHEON

Proper Arrangement of the Table and Order of Seating and Serving Guests.

Set a plate for each person. At the right of the plate place an oyster fork, soup spoon and knife in the order of use, the first one used furthest from the plate. At the left of the plate lay the forks in order of use, the first one used furthest from the plate. Let the tines of the forks and bowls of the spoons be turned upward and the cutting edges of the knives be turned toward the plate. Place the napkin upon the plate or at the left of the forks or folded once above the plate. Set glass for water above the knife. If wine glasses are to be used set the glass for water above the plate and near the center of the cover (space occupied by plate and accessories) and set the wine glasses to the right in a half circle, the first one to be used placed furthest toward the right and nearest the hand.

The salad knife and fork are supplied for a salad to be served as a separate course. These are placed according to the place of the salad in the menu or just before the salad is passed. Spoons or knives and forks are usually supplied for the sweet course-after table has been cleared for this course-spoons and knives at the right of the plate and forks at the left. If forks only are called for, place these at the right.

When serving the dessert-if eight plates or plates with finger bowls, are to be set before the guests and the dessert is to be brought in afterward, set the plates before the silver. If the dessert is to be brought in on individual plates, set silver in place, then bring on the food.

Three important things to remem-

No. 1-Food should always be set down before the guests from the right. No. 2-When a dish is presented from which a guest is to help himself, it should be passed to his left.

No. 3-When a course is finished remove the plates from the left.

Meats are served by the host and hostess from the table or by attendants from side table and pantry.

Colorado.

MISSOURI'S 2-CENT RATE

NOW BEFORE SUPREME COURT AS TO VALIDITY; ALSO FREIGHT LAWS.

AFFECTS EVERY STATE

FEDERAL COURTS' JURISDICTION OVER STATES, AND RAILROADS' JUST REMUNERATION.

Washington. — Stubbornly contesting every point, attorneys for the state of Missouri and the railroads therein began argument before the Supreme Court as to the validity of the 2-cent passenger rate, and maximum freight rate laws of commonwealth.

It is claimed by counsel that the issues in controversy will affect railway legislation in nearly every state of the Union. The case includes questions of jurisdiction of federal courts over state legislation and the proper basis of arriving at the remuneration guaranteed the railroads under the federal constitution.

The Federal Circuit Court held the laws were unremunerative and enjoined their enforcement.

The arguments were opened by Frank Hagerman for the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy. He maintained that the valuation of the property devoted to intrastate business as distinguished from interstate business was in the same ratio that earnings from the carriage of intrastate freight and passengers bore to the earnings from interstate business in the state. He argued that it costs more to carry on local than interstate business.

President James McCrea of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company urged the necessity of the proposed increases on account of the increased expenses in wages incurred by the Vegas in 1894, after a term as super- pense for railroad fare of \$12.50, as case of the Pennsylvania and the increased cost of maintenance of serv-

of the Pennsylvania through a long the New Mexico base line. period of years had been distributed either through a reduction in rates, increases in wages and amounts paid for material, or by reinvestments in the property not capitalized.

He expressed the belief that a property of the magnitude of the Pennsylvania railroad rendering a service satisfactory to its patrons and "deriving, as it did derive in 1909, net earnings to the amount of only 5.01 per cent. of the amount actually invested in the property," was entitled to fair consideration by the people, and he could not understand how rates that secured such results could be regarded as too high.

The hearing was conducted before the full commission, Chairman Martin A. Knapp presiding.

At the opening of the hearing Francis I. Goaten, general counsel of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, said the expenses of the eastern lines, through increases in wages and cost of supplies, recently had been increased approximately \$34,000,000 a year.

President McCrea of the Pennsylvania stated that in the last ten or twelve years the company's lines east of Pittsburg had expended \$262,000,-000 on improvements.

WHY NEW ORLEANS

CITY IS LOGICAL POINT FOR WORLD'S PANAMA EXPOSITION.

Its Geographical Position and Many Other Considerations Mark It as Most Suitable Spot for Dedication of Great Work.

Public sentiment has decided that the completion of the Panama Canal in 1915 shall be celebrated with a great International Exposition in which all the nations of the world may participate; and the question of where this Exposition is to be held will be settled by Congress at its approaching session.

New Orleans and San Francisco are contesting for the honor of holding this Exposition, and both cities have guaranteed immense sums of money as an evidence of their ability to finance so great an enterprise.

An Exposition worthy of the term "World's Fair," such as New Orleans proposes to build, will be a great educational movement. Its success as such, however, will depend entirely upon the percentage of our population who can secure its educational advantages, this in turn, depends upon its location, as the time in traveling to and from the Exposition, and the cost in railroad and Pullman fares, are the most important factors.
