PROSFEETORGAND GEOLOGISTS
Prospecting forgold is done èi－ ther in a region hitherto improved， or in sectious which contain ：urif－ erous areas for extensions or losit or abandoned leads．There are still tracts in this State which have never been carefully prospected， but where gold may possibly be found．The Los Burros district in Monterey county，is in a range where no one snpposed good mines could ever be discosered ；yet some good mines are being worked there， and it is on the coass range．The relations between the geologist and the practical miner have been very cordial in this eountry．There is a tendency on the part of the geol－ ogist to regard the miner as an em－ pric，while the miner is apt to re－ gard the geologist either as possess－ ing mysterious knowledge or one ignorant altogether of practical mining．

Geological science does not teach that qold is arbitrarily confined to any paricular formation，or to rocks of any special groups；but the experience of practical obser－ vations and the result of scientific investigations show that in various parts of the world the deposit of gold in matrix rocks has been most actively developed during certain geological periods，some very an－ （ient，others comparatively recent， and that alluvial gold can ouly be looked for successfully in forma－ tions resulting from the denuda－ tion of such matrix rocks．Every oid prospector can tell his tale to illustrate how uncertain and appa－ rently erratic is the mode of occur－ rence of gold in both alluvial and quartz．The creek prospected from side to side without result，whi e the rich lead lay concealed under ad－ jacent hill－slopes；the holes bottom－ ed without a color，while a few feet away ounces of gold to the pan rè－ warded subsequent workers ；the promising quartz gravel in well de－ fined lead，wor hless，while an ad－ jacent ledge wash angular detritus near by paid well；the well defined lead barren，while an insignificant vein near by paid largely．All and many more instances are within the experience of most men who worked in goid fieids．
This does notimply there is no law．It simply means we have not mastered the law so far as to be able ts indicate certainly where go＇d will or will not be found with－ in au urea having generally encou： iaging onditions．Every fraguent of go $d$ is in the place where in con－ sequence of the operation of certain ixed laws．The ch mical laws we may know，but have not learned their application as regards the de－
posits of gold in matrix rocks．The mechanical laws are simple enough in themselves，but how their opera－ tion was influenced by past geolog－ ical or physical conditions we can only conjecture．
Hence it can be easily under－ stood that，though the geologist may be able on scientific reason－ ing to indicate generally the areas where gold may or may not be found， he may or may not be able，unless The has had practical experience，to direct the actual search as weil as the practical prospector，who has been taught by numerous failures and successes to look for it in any conceivable position，regardless of any apparent law that may have been formulated from a limited ex－ perience．－Mining and Scientific Press．

## Riches from an old Mine．

When two men can take out $\$ 100,000$ in less than a year from a quartz mine，they are doing a pretty good business．Yet this is what two young men，Messrs． Grant and Appel，have done in the Chipps Flat pocket mine，between Moore＇s Fiat，Nevada County，and Allegheny，Sierra County．And they have no mill，either，simply pounding the rich rock up in a mortar by hand．
This mine was abandoned over twenty years ago，and lay idle until these mên took hold of it．They ran about twenty feet further in the old tunuel and struck it rich．Since then they have made a number of buillion shipments，the last bar weighing 125 piunds．
Should we read of an occurrence of this sort in a distant region，hun－ dreds of men would be anxious to go to a iocality so favored．Yet here it has attracted no special at－ tention．The same may be said of the Bonanza claim，a pocket mine in Tuolumne County，which has yielded very largely of late．In pocket mining there are great chances to be taken，of course，but if the chance is a lucky one， there is great reward for labor． Doubtless many others of the aban－ doned mines in the older districts of the State wiil be worked again in zonrse of time，when people come to a realizing sense of their good fortune in living in a region where there are such golden possi－ bilities．Sierra and Tuolumne are no：the only mountain counties where there are opportunities for energetic and persevering men in quartz mining．－Min．and Sci．Press．

An sccomplished statitician has just completed a series of interes. ting calculations showing the total number of persons employed in all manner of capacities by the United States Goverr ment. The re ults of his calculations show that there are 88,000 employed in all branches of the postal service alone and 62,000 others filling positions in the legislative, judicial and miscellanerus divisions of the goverument, with some 35.000 privates in the army, navy and marine corps and between 12,000 an 15,000 men and boys who gain their levelihood from the government for work directly incident to the increase of the navy and the construction of heary guas, making a grand total of about 200 , 000 persons enrolled in the glorious service of Uncle Sa:m. The num ber who would like to add themselves to this vast army, in the ex perimen of the active politicians, is probably something like six or eight millions more.

The postal employes comprise in addition in addition tu the clerks in the Post Office D partment, all mail contractors, mail messengers, elerks in the railway mal service, postmasters, with their assistants and letter carriers. In the milita ry and naval hist proper only the names of officers are gievn, white the privates are nat counted. There are 26,000 of them in the army, 8,250 in the navy, and 2,000 in the marine corps. = The civil service branch incledes, berides the post office people, all employes suborlidinate to the executive departmente, the officials of Congress, all the secondary and indepondent buraus, the Governmant Printing Offce, the Smithsonian institution and National Moseum, sill the Ladian agencies, mints, custom houses, all the benevolent and phianthropic insti utions in Washington, and the goverament of the Di trict of Columbia. Taking the etatstif cian'x extimate of the average salary received by all the governments servants, not counting the privates in the army, navy and marine corps, the annual payroll aggreEte not less than $\$ 165,000,000$. Assuming that out of the 85,000 ,000 inhabitants of the U. S. at least twenty-six milions are grown up persons, men and womea, there would seem to be only oue office holder in every circle of 157 grown persons, and one office holder in every collection of $333 \mathrm{~m} \cdot \mathrm{n}$, women and children-Phila delphia Press.

ALGER AND HARRISON.
M. Russell A. Alger, of Michigan probably represents republican principles and tendencies more tully than anyone else in public life. He is a millionnaire, brigadier and a Pratorian. This combination of qualifications is rare even in the republican party, and it is natural that Mr. Alger should conclude that he is better entitled to the presidency than the present incumbent, or than any one else in the party. This view is not shared by Mr. Harrison, nor is there any evidence that any very large number of unpurchased republicans are enthusiastically in favor of nominating Mr. Alger out of abstract ad miration for his money. It is tolerable sertain that the next republican nornimee will be a brigadier, bnt brigadiers are still so - plentiful that Mr. Alger's claims on that score are liable to be offset. He has a certain element strength as the "commander" the G. A. R., and if ail the politicians in that society demand his nomination in earnest there is little doubt that it would follow. The chauces are all against the probability of such a demand. It was openly stated in the discussion preceding his election for "Grand Commander" that "his wealth would enable him to represent the organization properly"-a sugges1 tion which leaves little to be said of the amount of effection feit towards him or of the use to which he is being put. The managers of the G. A. R. are shrewd politicians. They need Alger to a certain extent, but they need a candidate for the Pres-idency who can be elected, and they are not likely to conclude that Mr . Alger aniswers that requirement.

He can obtain no little amusement from his candidacy, however he has the Harrison administration at a cruel disadvantage. He can use the G. A. R. to force it into a policy of unlimited pensions with the certainty that to comply with or to refuse the G. A. R. demands will be equally fatal to Mr . Harrison's hopes of a second term.
It is not probable that either Harrison or Alger will head the next republican ticket, but that is no reason they should refrain from eutertaining and instructing each other and the country.-St Louis Eepublic.

El Paso is making another effort to get the White Oaks road built. It is too late. The Santa Fe Company is on its feet again and will not allow any road to get into Lincoln county ahead of them. When the Santa Fe builds, it will be from Socorro or Carthage, and in either case socorro will be the junction.Advertiser.

Santa Fe company make a bona fide start, they have our best wishes and will await their movements with the hope that the road from Carthage to White Oaks will be commenced at once.

## JUDGE BRASTOL DEAD,

Hon. Warren Brisiol died at his home in Deming, N. M., on the 12th inat. Juuge Bristol was appointed a member of the Bench of New Mexico in 1872. He came here from Minnesota, but is a native of New York, and was at the time of his death 70 years old.

Senator Reagan's bill for the restration of silver, which is endorsby Senators Stewart and Beck, provides that any person may u'eposit at any mint or assay office of the United States either gold or silver bullion in quantities of not less than five ounces of gold or 80 ounces of silver and receive con or coin certificates therefor at the rate of one dollar for 25 8-10 grains, troy, of standard gold and 412 1-2 grains, of standard silver. "Hereafter no United States note shall be issued of a denomination less $\$ 10$ nor more than $\$ 500$, and the denominations higher than $\$ 50$ shall not exceed in value one-fourth of: the total amout sutstanding at any time.'
