The dusty clock over the Mis yor＇s head had juss marked 10 when airs．Lane appeared．Sue marked immas the couse of the indignity and began a heated speech．Her para eoogy was $11, t$ cou hed ia legal terms，nor wrether peri ds in mefully rounleil，wat if there was a laure for explesive and vitup ra－ tive Texan－Sax $n$ ，then Nirs．Lane must have been crowned amid a richness of＂xpl tive that shook the d st from the wails，and nearly in de Hi，Honor grow purple with in ult d amazeneat．But Mrs． Lanes tongue went rigiton as mer－ iily as the $\varepsilon$ wish if a buil－whack－ e！＇s whip．
The Mayor finally caught his breath，and $r$ gaini $g$ bis dignity， which had been paral zed by the tovel assaut，cried＂Great heav ths！sop her，shop her！Police－ man place that woman uater ar－ rest！＂
Fulaceman Robertson advanced
to obey the order．He arrived just within an arm＇s length of Mrs． Lane．She had closed her mouth with a wioked snap and her eyes seemed to shoot green fire．Rob－ ertson reached out his hand to take her by the shoulder，when her right arm shot out，straight from the shoulder，and a big，red fist caught the policeman squarely on the nose．Robertson was shot back as if kicked by a dyspeptic mu＇e His nose began to bleed freely， City Attorney Hall took a hand， but Mrs．Lanes invincible right found his jaw aud floored him with such violence that the clock stopped．

A counchl of war was held in the hallway and it was decided to adopt more pacificatory moasures for theiremoval of the virago，This move met with little success，for Mrs Lane was still full of battle． She held the room for more than three long hours，and was only in－ duced by her husband，for whom the routed officers had despatched a messenger．Then she left saying that she had not done so until she was＂good and ready．＂She was satisfled．The dignity of the Lane household had been upheld．． It is probable，however，Mrs．Lane will again soon visit the court， when the occasion will have a far different termination．But she will go down with Gainesville＇s history just the same．．

## WASHINGTON LETTER．

 （From our regular correspondent） Washington，D．C．，March．17，＇90．There is a pretty fair prospect that one of the most notorious brutes in the Navy will receive an installment of his just dues in a few weeks．Cemmander McCalla， of the Enterprise，arrived in Wash－ ington this week，and immediately， to use his own language，＂deman－ ded＂：nvestigation．Inasmuch as the department was only waiting his arrival to order a ecurt of in－ quiry，the＂demand＂was complied with in a surprisingly short time． The court，with Rear Admiral Kim－ berly as presiding officer，meets next Tuesday at the Brooklyn navy yard．Mr．McCalla is a well knuwn local personality．His short squat figare，malicious expression， eye glasses and bald head are well known in Washington．On shore and in the presence of his superior officers he is a cringing cur；at sea he is a mad dog．He is one of those described by Thackery，who are on a ladder and as wiiling to lick the boots of those above them as they are to kick the heads of those beneath them．
His defence，that he has been simply a strict discıplinarian，will not wash．If he was such a strict disciplinarian why did not he place under arrest the lieutenant who re－ fused to cut down with his sword the sailor Waiker？There was a direct act of insubordination．The truth is that McCalla should be only too thankful that he is home aqain：It is surprising that he was not killed on the trip．And if he is not broken，as he so notorious－ ly deserves，he would do well to remain un shore duty，and to give men who have sailed with him a wide berth．Even a crazy man should have a little caution，and not dare fate too often．
A bill increasing the pension of Maj．Gen．G．K．Warren＇s widow was reached in the Senate Wednes－ day and Senator Reagan spoke against it with unusual foree． He said that the wide distinction made in the pension lists between the widows of privates and those of officers is a crying injustice．The widow of the poorly paid private is left with a pension of $\$ 12$ per month．The widow of a general who spent half a lifetime as a high－ paid government servant asks for and receives $\$ 100$ per month．In nine cases out of ten these widows of zenerals are not suffering from poverty as their petitioners say They have snug bank stock and decent houses，but are perfectly willing to accept anything they can pull or haul out of the l＇reasury． The tendency，Mr．Reagan，said was not to a government of the people，for the people and by the people，so much as a government of the classes，for the classes and by the classes．

"We call attention to the fact that a single law firm in one city in Southern Kansas now has the contract for the foreclosure of 1,800 mortgages. This means 1,800 homsteads taansferred from the hands of so many industrious families to the hands of capitalists, either domestic or foreign. The foreclosure of these mortgages is in accordance with a preconceived Purpose to gain possession of their farms and peopie them with a more servile tenantry imported from foreign lands for the especial purpose. Foreclosure and evictions are taking place in very many pats of our State, and we need not go all the way to Eueope to witness scenes of cruelty in maters of this kind."
The letter then goes on to say : The distress of the veople is crying aloud for relief Ther believe that very many of the questions that are receiving the attentiou of Congress are far less urgent than those upon which the safety of their homes and the welfare of their families depend. They believe that the white citizons have some rights as well as the colored citizens of the south. They believe that fallen heroes, both white and black, in past struggles for liberty and the porps uity of our institutions, can afford to wait for one moment until the rights of iiving heroes in the present struggle for Anerican homes receive some recuguition by the men who have been chosen to rep esent them in Congress. Behind these demands are more than 100,000 ballots in the state of Kansas, and the time is coming, and is not far distant, when legislators will heed the voice of their constituents."

 there was no quorum, only thirtysix voting. In a few minutes Mr Ingalls informed the Senate that there were twenty-two Senators in the restaurant, busy laying in supplies. The sergeant-at-arms had notified them to attend, but they had only stopped eaiing long enough to refuse. Mr. Hawley remarked that there were some more Senator's over in the Supreme Court room listening io the Neagle. case, of so much inlerest to lawyers Finally, at 2 o'clock, a quorum was secured, the obnoxious pension bill left on the calendar, and the discussion of the Blair education bill resumed as unfinished business Being now well filled up with the viands and liquids dispensed in the Senate resturant several Sena tors composed themselves to slumber while Mr. Barbour told that both political parties of Virginia favored the bill.The committee to investigate the violation of the sanctity of Senate secret sessions is having a sad time of it. Thus far the newspaper corespondents have refused to reveal their sources of information and the committee have appealed to the Senate for some means to open their lips. Whatever is done whatever strong oath of secrecy is agreed upon, whatever threats are indulged in, thereziwill never be any sperecy in secret sessions. Poor Riddl-berger had a good deal of sense when he so told the Senate, and it is only a pity that he isn't

there now to repeat his statement The last novel proposition is that the press gallery be abolished as a movement of revenge. It makes little difference to corresvondents A few minutes a day is enough in the Senate gallery, and nearly all who do their ofternoon work at the Capitol do it in the House press gallery. If the Senate wants to show spite let it go ahead.
The House bill raising all district judges' salaries to $\$ 4.500$ and all circuit judges' to $\$ 5,000$ has been favorably reported. The Senate bill to give their district judges $\$ 5,000$ and upward passed that body Wednesday. One of these measures, proper.y the latter, sho'ld be enacted. The country should have first-class lawyers on the bench, and to have them must give at least good salaries. To-day the judiciary from the Chief Justice to the district judge is the poorest paid in the world.

A "coal palace," one hundred and fifty feet by three hundred feet and three stories high is to be erected in East. St. Louis. This palace will be a novel structure.
