The library consisting of about 3,000 volumes. was collected and owned by the Rev. Father Augustine Fischer, once private secretary to Emperor Maximilian. Father Fischer doubtlsssly stood at the head of all bibliographers with respect to Spanish-American, and particularly in the branch of Mexican literature. In the course of his forty years' residence in Mexico he devoted a great deal of time to studying, sifting and collecting everything that could be obtained in the way of prints and manuscripts relative to and coming from our sister republic. During that period he formed four large libraries the last of which is now in Mr. Catron's possession. The other three have long since been sold and scattered over the country, and the one at Santa Fe is the only complete Fischer library in existance in the world. The literary treasures contained in this vast collection of books are valuable beyond a price, and few libraries will equal it in the matter of ancient and modern Spanish law.

In making this purchase Mr. Catron made a sacrifice, but in so doing he is entitled to the highest credit for the perspicacity and energy displayed by him in securing the much-coveted treasure, one that has been sought after by men of nearly all nations. Santa Fe and Mr. Catron may well be proud of having one of the leading libraries in the United States .- New Mexican.
