Plans of a Koad Which Pleases Jay Gould．
While Jay Gould sojourned in Dallas，土e was approached by Mr． O．L．Houghton，of Las Vegas，N M．，with the plans for a railroad from such an unexpected source that he was willing to examine them，and of such a valuable nature that he called in his engineers to advise him

With these plans Mr．Houghton went to Dallas to meet Mr．Gould， He called on the magnate and was granted an audience of half an hour．He unfolded his plans which contemplated a line southeasterly from Cerillos to Aransas pass．As far as the representative of the ex－ press could learn，the road makes as nearly a straight line as possi－ ble，Draw a straight line from Los Cerrillos，N．M，to Aransas pass and it will be found that San Antonio is on it．

Mr．Gould informed Mr．Hough－ ton that he would consider the mat－ ter．The next day he sent for the gentleman and talked to him again about the plans．Mir．Houghton went away rejoiced，but he was joy－ fully surprised when on the third day the great railroader again sent
for hi：n．This time two engineers were present and went over the plans with Mr．Houghton．They evidently thought favorably of the matter，for upon their report Mr ． Gould took the plans home with him and Mr．Houghton expects to hear something in the near future． Two eonsiderations must have prompted Mr．Gould＇s interest．In the first place he believes in deep water at Aransas pass and intends to ke there when the ships come In the second place he sees the val－ ue of coal，not only for his Texas roads，but at the station of Aransas pass．Such a road as is contem－ plated would not only reach the coal at Cerrillos，but would skirt the vast coal beds around White Oaks，N．M．，near the Texas border －San Antonio（Texas）Express．

 hadows receded back and up into the mountains, the decoration for dedicatory services of the new Congregational Church, was completed by placing a large number of blooming house-plants, on and around the pulpit and windows, which in addition to the evergreen wreaths that had already been artistically arranged upon the walls, added to the attractiveness of the house to be set apart for the worship of God.At the opening of the services, as the notes of the organ were born upon the balmy air of that beautiful Sabbath morning, the large congregation joined heartliy in singing the Doxology. Rev. A. M. Pipes, of Deming, N. M., invoked divine blessing on the services of the day. Rev. S. W. Thomas, of the M. E. Church of this place, then read the first scripture lesson, and a second lesson was read by the Rev. Mr. Pipes. Rev. E. Lyman Hood, supt. of Home Missionary Society, preached the dadicatory sermon; Dr. N. W. Lane, the pastor, offered the dedicatiory prayer, which was followed by the dedicatory service proper. The Tiustees of the churs and the building committee made a report oi their labors, showing that the new church was to be built under contract with P. C. Bell. That he was, to receive $\$ 350$, in money and the parsonage, belonging to the church, which was valued at $\$ 1,000$. That Mr. Bell, failed to fulfill his contract and the trustees were obliged to pay $\$ 1$, 850. Twelve hundred of which had been paid and the balance was provided for and wo:ld be paid soon.
The failure of Mr. Bell to complete his contract, leaves the parsonage in the possession of the church, thus giving it a good stone chureh, $30 \times 50$ feet and a six room adobe parsonage. Both are situated on well located lots, almost in the heart of town. All of this property has been secured since the early spring of 1887, when the parsonage was built, and the lot on which the church now stands. was purchased.
Much of the financial success of this Church is due to the Ladies who have labored so faithfully, to build up in this community a building that would be sacred to the cause of Christ's kingdom-we doubt. not the happy conclusion of the services last Sabbath, amply repaid them and all others who aided in its erection. The furnishing. of the house is not completed, bui. will be soon.

## CATRON'S PURCHASE

Some time during February last Hon. T. B. Catron began negotiatIng fot the purchase of an immense library in the City of Mexico, and having suceeeded recently in closing the trade, has now in his possession one of the largest and most costly collect.ons of books in this pertion of the country.
The library consisting of about 3,000 volumes. was collected and owned by the Rev. Father Augustine Fischer, once private secretary to Emperor Maximilian. Father Fischer doubtlsssly stood at the head of all bibliographers with respect to Spanish-American, and partic'larly in the branch of Mexican literature. In the course of his forty years' residence in Mexico he devoted a great deal of time to studying, sifting and collecting everything that could be obtaned in the way of prints and manuscripts relative to and coming from our sister republic. During that period he formed four large libraries the last of which is now in Mr. Catrou's possession. The other three have long since been sold and scattered over the country, and the one at Santa Fe is the only complete Fischer library in existance in the world. The literary treasures contained in this vast collection of books are valuable beyond a price, and fow libraries will equal it in the matter of ancient and modern Spanish law.
In tmaking this purchase Mr. Catron made a sacrifice, but in so doing he is entitled to the highest credst for the perspicacity and energy displayed by him in securing the much-coveted treasure, one that has been sought after by men of nearly all nations. Santa Fe and Mr. Catron may well he proud of having one of the leading libraries in the United States.-New Mexican.
