The following is an extract from a letter from A．Greene，an old－time resident of White Oaks，and now residing in Sonora，Cal．We have no doubt that it will be of interest to many of our readers，For which we are indebted to the courtesy of J．B．Slack，to whom it was written：

Sonora，Cal．，July 1，1890． Dear Friend：
I presume that by this time you think ne all have forgotten you，but not so，we often think of you and White Oaks．Times are dull here， but we have plenty of vegetables and fruit and mort everything we want to eat，but it is hard to get ahead in money matters，not much mining going on，in fact none ex－ cept quartz，to speak of．The coun－ try is all taken up in ranches and men can not mino like they used to．You would not know the coun－ thy if you were here again．

I will tell you what I can about Tommy Hawkins；I have been trying to find out all I could or $s$ would have written you sooner． About the time of his death，he and I had made arrangements to go prospecting．He was to go out three or fur miles from town to get a burro to pack our provisions－ he left town early in the morning and as he did nat return，I waited a week and as I could hear nothing from him I went and got the burro and went prspecting in the moun＇ns alone，supposing that ne had chang． ed his mind and gone somewhere else．I was gone quite a while in the mountains and when I got back he had been found，it had been a little over three weeks trom the time he left．He was found close to town in an incline tunnel prob－ ably 20 or 30 feet underground－ he could easily walk down though the tunnel was low．He was as far back in the tunnel as he could get， lying with his feet closeto the face of the tunnel lying partly on his side and back，his gun partly un－ der his shoulder and his shoes off， his hat lying three or four feot from
his head．From all appearances he had just laid down and stretch－ out．As to his effeets I can find nothing except what he had on him and his blankets．He had $\$ 9.00$ and a specimen worth about $\$ 9.00$ und his gun with him．His grip－ sack，I can＇t find out anything about and he ought to have had more mony unless he had sent it home to his people．If you can find out where his people live let me know and who I can write to． Perhaps Dr Paden or Jim Brent，or Charlev Bull would know．
This leaves us in tolerable good health and hope it will find you well．We extend our best regards to all our old friends in White Oaks． Fraternally Yours， A．Greenb．
