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

Surly this is possimism, this despair of virtue and goodness and of the obliga tions of duty, the rankest and most faithless. And with such a temper nothing can be more essentially inconsistent than the training and acquirements of the scholar. For he knows, as indeed the most superficial student of history may know the power of ideas in the hearts

#### British Admiral Interviewed

Victoria, B. C. July 18.-The British gun boat War Ship, flagship of the North Pacific squadron, with Rear Anmiral Latham aboard urrived here yesterday, The admiral was interviewed in regard to the suggestive movement of the War Ship to protect Canadain vessels in Behring Sea. The admiral has not yet had any opportunity to complete the perusal of the mass of correspondance that awaited him here, but stated emphatically that he had as yet received no instructions to send any fleet to the north to prevent the British vessels from seizure by the American cutters or to retake any that might de seized iu Behrings Sea. He consideres the matter, principally from what he had read of it in the press, as purly one for diplomatic negotiations. #### The New Fifth District.

There is quite a strife going on over the location of the court of the new 5th judicial district. Specially are the people of the town of Lincoln making strenuous efforts to secure the court for their town. Meetings have been held, petitions are being signed and a strong effort is being made to secure influence from promineut men all over the territory for Lincoln. Letters and appeals are being written and work is going on all the time. It is about fifty-five miles from Roswell to Lincoln and a little less than 140 miles from Eddy to Lincoln. There is also an effort being made to add Socorro to the new 5th judicial district; this latter however seems to meet with a good deal of opposition, as the Socorro people, if that should be done, desire the court at their town. Roswell wants it also, . and Eddy is not behind in its desires. The fact of Roswell having the U.S. land office is brought up against the claims of that town. The judges of the four districts, as at present constituted, have the selection of the 5th district for the present, and thereafter the legislature can reorganize the district as it sees fit. The situation is an interesting one and has more or less bearing on the political situation in southeastern New Mexico.-New Mexican.

#### The Pretorian Load.

The New York Tribune's estimate of the number of pensioners when the total under the Dependent Pension bill is made up is not too high. There will be at least 900,000 of them, and probably more than that number. There were 490,000 on the rolls on June 30 of last year, of whom 50,000 were added during the year. The number of claims filed at that date reached a total of 1,248,000, of which 739,-000 had been allowed and paid at an expence of \$1,052,218,413,17, or over a thousand million dollars. There were still 850,130 claims pending and awaiting action—a number only 50,000 short of the Tribune's estimate of the total. These claims, it must be remembered, were under the disability laws. The Dependent bill imposes no restriction of disability incurred in service. Under it anyone who presswear himself a pauper pension.
