## British Admiral Interviewed

Victoria，B．C．July 18．－The British gun boat War Ship，flag－ ship of the North Pacific squadron， with Rear Anmiral Latham aboard arrived here yesterday，The ad－ miral was interviewed in regard to the suggestive movement of the War Ship to protect Canadain vessels in Behring Sea．The admiral has not yet had any opportunity to com－ plete the perusal of the mass of cor respondance that awaited him here， but stated emphatically that he had as yet received no instructions to send any fleet to the north to pre－ vent the British vessels from seiz－ ure by the American cutters or to retake any that might de seized iu Behrings Sea．He consideres the matter，principally from what he had read of it in the press，as purly one for diplomatic negotiations． He had yet to learn what new phrase had presented itself that would suggest the possibility of the War Ship being repuired to take a hand in the adjustment of the difficulties

S．M．Folsom．president of the Albuquerqne National bank：W P．Metcalf，manager of the Ante－ lope Springs cattle ranch；E．A． Cahoon and R．H．Fry，former clerks in the Albuquerque Nation－ al，left last night for Roswell，N． M．Messrs．Ca＇aoon and Fry go to take charge of the new bank to be started there－the former as cash－ ier and the latter as assistant and bookkeeper．Messrs Folsom and Metcalf are interested in the bank in a financial way．

An expedition of explorers will leave Bisber about August 1st．to be gone two years．They will take the Sierra Madre mountains first and spend much of their time there． After finishing that range they will work up the coast，going to the ex－ tteme north of the coast range be－ fore disbanding．They have with them geologists，ornithologists，and entomologists．There are 78 in the party，and they will travel thor－ oughly equipped fur a thorough ex－ ploration of unknown regions．－ Mach valuable information will re－ sult from this research．－Prospector．

There is quite a strife going on over the location of the court of the new 5th judicial district. Specially are the people of the town of Lincoln making strenuous efforts to secure the curt for their town. Meetings have been held, petitions are being signed and a strong effort is being made to secure influence from promineui men all over the territory for Lincoin. Letters and appeals are being written and work $i s$ going on all the time. It is about fifty-five miles from Ros well to Lincoln and a little less than 140 miles from Eddy to Lincoln. There 2s also an effurt being made to add Socorro to the new 5th judicial district; this latter however seems to meet with a good deal of opposition, as tim Socorro people, if that should be done, desire the court at their town. Ruswel! wants it also, and Eddy is not behind in its desires. The fact of Roswell having the U.S. land ollice is brought up against the claims of that town. The judges of the four districts, as at present constituted, have the selection of the 5th district for the present, and thereafter the legislature can reorganize the district as it sees fit. The situation is an interesting one and has more or less bearing on the political situation in southeastern New Mexico.-New Mexican.

Col. Cromm. Chairman of the Board of Commissioners oí Lincoln county, was in town seveal days this week in the interest of Llncoin as the head of our new judicial district. It being rumored that the people of White Oak would favor Socorro as headquariers of district in the event of the annexing of that eounty to those of Lincoln, Chaves and Eddy. Col. C. is very much gratified to find no foundation for such reports, as the people of White Oaks without reserve express themselves as unqualifiedly in favor of Lincoln as the district seat.

Politically, we learn from Mr. Cronin, thut our present county clerk, Geo. Curry has announced himself as being "out" for the position of assessor, an office Mr. C. thinks Curry is pecuiarly fitted to fill, and owing to his popularity would add considerable strength to the Democratic :i ket.

Relative to the legislative ticket, moment it most. The assumed Cronin is of the opinion that Judge Richardson for the council, andi our townsman, W. C. McDonald for the house would fill the bill, now that J. C. Poe, and judge Hewitt positively decline to stand. Mickey's favoritefor the council was John Y. Hewitt, first and last, and he very much regrets the judge's determination not to enter the race.

He is of the opinion that it would not be at all conducive to the success of the democratic county ticket to place thereon for all the office aspirants for such from the town of Lincoln solely, though there is no doubt in his opinion that the brains of both parties has long since gravitated to the town, and are now hived in the different offices in the court house building thereat.

The article in last weeks Leader signed "Ex-Democrt" tries to be cunning in his criticism of some White Oaks gentlemen who attended the Commissisoners Court from this place. The gentlemen named, one and all are not in the least disturbed, as democrats, they are pursuing the even tenor of their ways, perfectly oblivious to the article written, undoubtally with a view to create dissension. Tho mugwump who is making such an effort will be chagrined to know that the missive has fallen on barren soil. At the proper time the democrats will convene in Lincoln at the convention and place such a ticket in the field as to sweep the county. Our vepublican friends will have ample opportunity to come to the front then and meet defeat like little men. We have yet to learn of a single democrat who has announced himself as opposed to the party. Linccln County democrats to-dar are in full harmony, confident of an over whelming victory

The effort to detach Raventon people from White Oaks by the creation of another precinct, is being vigorously pushed by some over zealous republicans. It matters but little whether they succeed or not as the returns will be as favorable as heretof se for the demceats. The scheme is one so openly fraudalent that the commissioners cannot allow it. The petition contains minors and names of Lincoln residents.
The valient and only Majah M(:Caffrey, left on the Stage Sunday night, to attend the session of the republican, so called league, to be held at Santa Fe. The Majah will endeavor to represent the $G$. O. P. of Lincoln county at this gathering and poise as the invicible leader. We wounder how the younger element of the G. O. P., will consider this manner of representation. By whom was the aforesaid Ma' a'i sent ur was it one of the affairs where no one cared to go and of buts 11
leadership of the older element is openly expressed ${ }^{6}$ and anrounced as unfair. We, as democrats are silent and interested listeners to the criticisms made, and hope that the efforts of the gallant Majah will even redound to his well known ability as a leader of his party, notwithstanding the adverse criticism of a few disgruntled republicans. We can only say, boys, take a back seat as usual, and when asked why you are thus treated continue to poise as martyrs and the willing tool of the men who always appear at the front on dress narade.

The paper known as The Leader and reported as edited by one Majah McCafrey, at White Oaks, contained an article entitled "Amnsing and Sickening," in the issue of July 19rh, which called the attention of its readers to the ignorance and venality of the editors of Democratic papers in New Mexico. The articls starts out by saying, "Some small soul from Wisconsin. Kansas, or Colorado moves into New Mexico and gets hold of a $7 \times 9$ Demu(ratic organ." The talented and circumspeci Majah endeavors to tell how the aforesaid small soul knows nothing, cannot speak the Mexican tongue, does not know who are friends or whe are enemies in the political" arena. and finally ends the article by calling attention to the emihent service and profound knowledge of the aforesaid Majah. To begin with, the writer hereof will acknowledge that he cannot find out and is ignorant of who are friends in the G.O. P., and cannct talk Spanish. We would be pleas. ed to hear the Majah ask for salt or-sugar in Spanish and see the signal failure with which he would meet with. This Leader, so called newspaper, has been the butt of ridicale among the entire press of the territory and its few local subscribers for the past few years, one calling it a "clothes wringer," another "the worst printed paper in the United "States, but all agree that the obituaries, generally taken from the Pbiladelphia Ledger ar. immense, provided they are legible. We will stop right here and ask a gsueral quostion of the people of White Oaks: Does McCaffrey ever ask auy one to write his editorials? if yes, does he or has he ever given proper credit? The individual particularly aimed at in the aforesaid article has contributed from time to time, artıcles published in the so called Leader newspaperone in particular upon statehood and schools in January 1859, which article was taken in part as the text by delegate Joseph in his speech in Februdry 1889, and copied entire in theCongressional Record. When the gallant. Majah was made awars of the prominence and value of the article menioned he swelled up like a great

 great credit for the Leader and his original atiele. At that time the 'small soul', was not so densely ignorant as at presentand his "monkey work" was very acceptable to the Leader. Talk about cheek and gratitude, the Majah certainly has an abundance of one and is entirely devoid of the other.
## The Pretorian Load.

The New York Tribune's estimate of the number of pensioners when the total under the Dependent Pension bill is made up is not toohigh. There will be at least 900,000 of them, and probabiy more than that number. There were 490,000 on the rolls on June 30 of last year, of whom 50,000 were added during the year. The number of claims filed at that ciate reached a total of $1,248,000$, of which 739,000 had been allowed and paid at an expence of $\$ 1,052,218,413,17$, or aver a thousand million dollars. There were still 850,130 clams pending and awaiting action-a number only 50,000 short of the Tribune's estimate of the total. These clams, it must be remembered, were under the disability laws. The Dependent bill imposes no restriction of disability incurred in service. Under it anẏone who presents a record of enlistment can swear himself a pauper pension. So we are to look for a pension roli reaching to or above $1,000,000$.
