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FOR SCHOOL PURPOSES.

Mr. Joseph has a bill now before congress for granting public lands to the territory for education- for irrigating purposes, al purposes which, if it becomes a law, will be of vast benefit to the educational interests of New Mexico. As the bill is short, we copy it below in full, to let the people of the territory see what their indefatigable delegate is doing for them:

and 36 in every township in New of land donated by this act for Mexico, and where such sections, specific objects to said territory the or any part thereof, have been sold number of acres therein heretofore or otherwise disposed of by or donated by congress to said terriunder the authority of any act of tory for similar objects. congress, other lands equivalent thereto, in legal sub-divisions of not less than one-quarter section, and as contiguous as may be to the section in lieu of which the same is taken, and hereby granted to the territory of New Mexico for the support of the common schools, such indemnity lands to be selected within said territory in such manner as the secretary of the interior may provide; provided, that the 8th, 16th, 24th and 36th sections embraced in permanent reservations for national purposes shall not, at any time, be subject to the grants nor to the indemnity provisions of this act, nor shall any land embraced in indian, military, or other reservations of any character be subjects to the grants or to the indemnity provisions of this act until the reservation shall have been extinguished and such lands to be restored to, and become a part of, the public domain.

Sec. 2. That 50 per centum of the proceeds of the sales of public lands lying within the territory of New Mexico which shall have been and shall hereafter be sold by the United States, after deducting all the expenses incident to the same, shall be paid to the said territory, to be used as a permanent fund, the interest of which only shall be expended for the support of the common schools within said territory and state.

Sec. 3. That there is hreby granted to the territory of New Mexico from the unappropriated lands within said territory for the following purposes, to-wit: For public buildings for legislative, executive and judicial purposes, one hundred thousand acres; for agricultural college, one hundred and fifty thousand acres; for insane acres; for deaf and dumb asylum, normal school,

thousand acres; for reform school, one hundred thousand acres; for establishing permanent reservoirs hundred thousand acres.

Sec. 4. That all lands granted in quantity or as indemnity by this act shall be selected under the direction of the secretary of the interior from the surveyed and unsurveyed, unreserv-Be it enacted by the senate and ed, and unappropriated public the limits of the said territory of New Mexico. > Sec. 5. That the schools, colleges, and universities provided for in this act shall remain under the exclusive control of said territory as herein provided, and no part of the proceeds arising from the sale or disposal of and lands herein granted for educational purposes shall be used for the support of any sectarian on denominational school, college, or university.

> Sec. 6. That the lands granted for educational purposes by this act shall be sold or leased and the proceeds expended for said purposes for which said lands are granted under the direction of the governor, chief justice, auditor and secretary of said territory.

> Sec. 7. The provision shall be made for the establishment and maintenance of a system of public schools which shall be open to all the children of saidterritory, and free from sectarian control.

A New Empire Among Us.

Ten years ago the population of the United States, as shown by the figures collected by the enumerators of the Government, was 50,-155,443. To-day, according to the most conservative estimates, it reches 65,000.000. The average increase in the decades since 1790, when the first count was made, has been considerably over 30 per cent. It was 35.10 between 1790 and 1800, 36.38 from the latter date to 1810, 33.26 between that time and 1820, 32.51 in 1820—'30, 33.52 in 1830— '40, 35.83 in 1840—'50, 35.11 in 1850-'60, 22.65 in 1860-'70, and 30 .08 in 1870-'80. The low ratio of increase from 1860 to 1870 was due to the civil war, which largely reduced immigration and lessened the birth rate.
