The Silver Bill Swindle.

From the St. Louis Republic.

Before Mr. Windom was made Secretary of the Treasury he was a Wall street speculator. The idea of a bill to give the Treasury control of the price of silver bullion, after reducing it from a money metal to a commodity, was his and was suggested by him in his first annual report. Through his influence it was adopted by the Harrison administration and embodied by the Republicans of Congress in the Bullion Purchase bill, which demonetizes silver, provides for the cessation of its coinage and makes it a speculative commodity which can be controlled by the Secretary of the Treasury and his associates.

In anticipation of the passage of the bill, the Wall street speculators formed pools, bought silver at 98 or under, and when the bill passed, sold it to the Treasury at 120. The difference between the market price and the price set by the Secretary of the Treasury, assisted by the legal swindle under which he was acting, was taken out of the Treasury and transferred to the pockets of the speculators. It was not the less a robbery because it was not committed on the highway at the point of a pistol. They do these things better in Wall street when they have the assistance of a Wall street Secretary of the Treasury.

When these Wall street rings have unloaded on the Treasury at 120 in gold, bullion falls until it reaches 109. They can reinvest and unload on the Treasury again the next time the price is advanced. There is no end to the possibilities of this sort of thing. Mr. Windom has induced Congress—a bribed Congress—to order him to purchase 4,500,000 ounces of bullion a month. He cannot buy less under the terms of his swindle. The speculators are always sure of unloading that amount when they have bought low. A nod, a wink, the barest intimation that the price of the next purchase will be advanced in the Treasury two, three, or four cents an ounce, will enable a well organized Wall street ring to buy on the decline, and rake the people's money out of the Treasury by the bushel. Every one of these fluctuations means an opportunity for speculators to get unearned money, and of the total which they thus secure, a very large amount will be direct from the Treasury, where it has been put by high taxes on the people.

The Bullion Purchase bill is a greater swindle than the Credit Mobiler, and the time will come when those who were concerned in the conspiracy to pass it will stand exposed and disgraced swindlers before the people they have robbed.

LOOK TO THE LEGISLATURE.

We trust every Democrat in every Legislative district will be on his guard against all intrigues and devices on the part of Republicans to distract Democratic attention from the Legislative elections. They well understand that there is no possibility of electing Mr. Otero and the apparent activity in his behalf is simply a blind to put Democrats off their guard.

Their real purpose, and only hope now, is to save the Legislature, well knowing that the election of a Democratic Legislature, in addition to the election of Mr. Joseph, would permanently relegate that party to a useless and hopeless minority. Their most dangerous tactics will be trading off county officers for members of the Legislature. That is now the only hope. They are anxious to give votes for county officers in return for votes for the Legislature, and they would probably give two for one if they could thereby effect such combinations. Democrats should force off the ticket any county nominee guilty of the treachery of such trading, and while Democratic nominees for county offices are as a rule incapable of it, the Republicans must be watched at all points.—Headlight.

The election of a Democratic legislature will insure the abrogation of some of the most infamous laws that ever disgraced a statute book.

It has come to a pretty pass, verily, when John H. Riley, the Dona Ana county Republican politician, must say who will and will not be sheriff of Lincoln county. Rebuke him, rebuke him.

Witnesses and jurors who have been compelled to serve, and get their pay in the shape of a warrant or certificate which they have had to discount at a great sacrifice, will remember on election day that the discount was the profit made by the Santa Fe treasury ring in whose interest the appropriation bill was manipulated. No more of this when Richardson and McDonald represent us in the Legislature.

In sending G. A. Richardson to the council from the counties of Lincoln, Chaves and Eddy the citizens of this section will do themselves an honor. He is a progressive and intelligent young democrat, whose record, during a five years' residence in the county of Lincoln, is a guarantee that his voice and vote will at all times be used for the advancement of the interests of the people of the territory, and for the good of the democratic party.

THE LEGISLATIVE CANDIDATES

The Democrats in Convention assembled, nominated G. A. Richardson as their candidate for the council. His nomination has been received with the unanimous approval of the people of Lincoln, Chaves and Eddy counties. Mr. Richardson has no opposition. An effort was made by placing the name of C. B. Eddy, who positively declined. Then Judge Tomlinson was named and he also has withdrawn, being a candidate for County Judge in Eddy county. We can say without fear of contradiction, that republicans as well as democrats are giving Mr. Richardson a cordial and unanimous support in Chaves and Eddy counties. At his own home in Roswell he will receive the entire vote. By some ardent and would-be leaders of the g. o. p. in Lincoln county, Mr. Tomlinson may receive a few votes, in face of the fact that he is not in the field, and has so advised his county friends.

W. C. McDonald is the regular nominee of the Democrats for Representative. His nomination has been received with the same manifestations of approval by all classes regardless of political associations. The farmers' have endorsed both Richardson and McDonald unqualifiedly, and the republicans, since Thomas Tillotson positively withdrew, are silently, and in respect to the splendid service McDonald can render his constituency, desire his election, especially in view of the fact of an effort to run one Cruz Gallegos, a man in no particular to be compared to W. C. McDonald, especially as a representative in a legislative body. Mr. McDonald has unfortunately been sick during the latter part of the canvas, but is fast improving and it is hoped by his immediate friends that he may arrive home in time to set at rest some of the ridiculous features the republicans are about: by the advocacy of Cruz Gallegos. To those who may be personal enemies, either of Mr. McDonald or any of the friends of the gentleman, it will not mar their temper in the least, and in the unwarranted and unauthorized appearance of Cruz Gallegos in the field, it will only serve among thinking and reading republicans to make the support of McDonald all the more ardent. Voters compare McDonald and Cruz Gallegos on any score of fitness or character and McDonald will receive nearly every vote in White Oaks and throughout the district. Republicans, Cruz Gallegos is an old democrat who left his party from a mistaken idea that democrats were prosecuting him in a certain cattle suit, which for decency's sake we refrain from publishing details. The respectable element of the republican party utterly repudiate the candidacy

of Cruz Gallegos, and will to a man vote for W. C. McDonald. Were Mr. McDonald at home, no doubt he would object to any mention or effort on the part of his party associates to pay only scornful attention to this effort toward and uncalled for insult to all that in any manner can be called respectable in politics.

We would drop this whole matter right here, but we are reliably informed from Roswell that a fund of \$700 has been raised and contributed toward the effort to elect Cruz Gallegos; with no earthly hope that there is ghost of a chance to beat McDonald, but the leaders say that something must be done to pacify the Mexican element—they hope to assure this element that by this act the g. o. p. are the friends of the Mexican voter. The effort has reacted in a very decided manner. The thinking and immediate friends of Cruz Gallegos, are now fully aware how they are using Gallegos, and propose to resent it by showing these schemers, indignantly, that they will vote for W. C. McDonald. The Mexican citizen has no more honorable friend in Lincoln county than W. C. McDonald.

One more word.—A most malicious and unwarranted lie has been put in circulation, that Messrs. Ulrick, Nowlin, Tillotson and other republicans sold out in the interest of McDonald. We defy any man to produce a scintilla of evidence to prove anything of the character. Such unwarranted libel upon these men will not go unchallenged, and if persisted in will meet with the proper punishment it merits, even after election.

The individuals who expect to gain respect and prominence by the advocacy of Cruz Gallegos as a representative, against W. C. McDonald, will find themselves after election the laughing stock of the whole Territory.

There came near being a tragedy in Deming last week. While the democratic senatorial convention was in session, John Good, a cattleman, was looking for A. B. Fall with the intention of killing him. Mr. Good made many unpleasant remarks concerning Mr. Fall and swore that he would kill him on sight. As soon as Mr. Fall was nominated for the legislature his friends took him to his room where he remained. John Good is said to be very handy with his gun and had the two come together, it is likely that one or the other, or both, would have been killed. If Mr. Fall, "The Faithful Friend of the Mexican Race," as he calls himself, wishes to avoid trouble, he will avoid Grant county during the campaign.—Enterprise.



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Last night before the arrival of the train from Magdalena hundreds of men congregated in front of the Grand Central hotel, many of them bearing torches and transparencies. however, and getting between thirty and forty dollars in cash, they thought they had made enough money for one night's work and at the first opportunity they jumped off the train and fled out on the prairie. They were evidently new hands at the business, as had they so desired they could have made a heavy haul. The subsequent excitement and report entailed a loss of one hour and a half to the train.—El Paso Times, 24th inst.

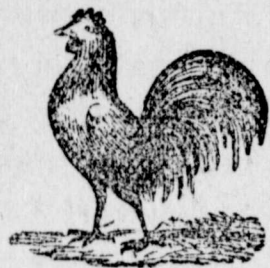

D. W. Roberts was nominated by the democratic convention over two staunch men and democrats. The convention that nominated him was fully attended, and no nomination of that convention was received with more enthusiasm than that of Capt. Roberts. A short time after the democratic convention, the republicans met at Lincoln and by a good majority endorsed Capt. Roberts, without the least solicitation on the part of Capt. The chairman of the republican county committee, nor any other authorized authority has announced Mr. Thornton as a party candidate. One week ago we stated in the columns of the INTERPRETER that no less a leader than Jimmy Do-

lan, was instrumental in bringing out Mr. Thornton; which statement Mr. Dolan has in a card to the Leader and another to the Independent denied by charging the assertion as a lie. The INTERPRETER's informant is a gentleman of unquestioned veracity and a resident of Lincoln and knows whereof he makes the charge. We are pleased to see Mr. Dolan assume the character of injured innocence, and hope he will stand by the endorsement of Capt. Roberts, which he so energetically advocated in the republican county convention, where he was a delegate. The INTERPRETER does not desire to do Mr. Dolan an injustice, but notwithstanding his denial, we are ready when called upon, in a gentlemanly manner to substantiate the statement we made in our last issue, and we will not retract one word—our information is reliable and trustworthy. Mr. Dolan can take the proper and manly course to find out whether the INTERPRETER has told a malicious lie or not. For the present au revoir!

The voters of Lincoln county are singularly fortunate in having a man of the experience in the Probate Clerk's office which W. J. Talliaferro as the present and efficient deputy possesses. Almost superhuman efforts are being used to elect his opponent, Geo. Sena, a popular Mexican citizen, who, compared with Talliaferro, his most ardent republican friend does not claim for Sena any of the essential attributes to make even an ordinary clerk, while Talliaferro has proved a painstaking, courteous, and one of the best clerks in the territory; his books are models of neatness and correctness. The candidature of Mr. Saunders is the only fear the democrats have and the hope of the republicans. Our democratic friends in the Alliance will not do themselves or Mr. Saunders any good by contributing to the election of Mr. Se-

NEW MEXICO JUDICIARY.

Arrival of Associate Justice Freeman—Something of his Official Career—New Districts.

Judge A. A. Freeman, lately appointed associate justice of the supreme court of New Mexico, arrived in the city last night. In company with Judge Seeds he called upon Secretary Thomas early this morning and took the oath of office, and during the day he was called upon by the territorial officials, attorneys and citizens generally, all of whom were at once impressed with his bearing as a gentleman of learning, his cordial, frank manner. The new judge is a man of fine personal address; probably 50 years of age, yet well preserved, and among his characteristics are decisiveness and quickness of action, both in gesture and speech. There is no doubt about his making friends quickly among the people of New Mexico. En route to Santa Fe Judge Freeman stopped off between trains at Las Vegas and had a conference with Chief Justice O'Brien, and to-day he is fortunate in meeting here Judge John R. McFie.

As to the district to which he will be assigned nothing definite can yet be announced, as it has been decided that all the supreme court justices will meet in conference at Las Vegas, on November 7th, or a day or two earlier, for the purpose of considering the present arrangement of districts, making some changes, possibly, and agreeing upon assignments.

Judge Freeman is a native of Tennessee. There he served three terms in the state legislature and in 1872 was a candidate for governor on the Republican ticket against John C. Brown, Democrat. During Gen. Grant's administration as president he served as American consul at Prague, Bohemia, and later, from 1877 to 1885, he held the responsible position of attorney general of the postoffice department of the government at Washington. During the last few years he has made his home at Washington, being associated in the practice of law with ex-Congressman Money, of Miss. As indicating the esteem in which he is held in his native state the NEW MEXICAN quotes the following from the Chattanooga Evening Post:

"The President yesterday nominated A. A. Freeman, of Tennessee, as an associate justice of the supreme court of New Mexico. Judge Freeman formerly lived at Brownsville, but for the past eight or ten years has resided in Washington. He was assistant attorney general of the postoffice department when Judge Key was postmaster general, and since his retirement from office he has practiced law in Washington in connection with ex-

Congressman Money, of Mississippi. He is an able lawyer and an upright man."

The State's Democrat of Brownsville:

"Hon. A. A. Freeman, once an able member of the Brownsville bar, but who for ten years or more has practiced law in Washington city, has been appointed associate justice of the supreme court of New Mexico by President Harrison. Col. Freeman is admirably fitted by reason of his ability for the position. He is an extreme and bitter partisan, but we do not believe he will allow his political or party bias and prejudices to follow him on the bench.

Judge Freeman leaves to-day to assume the duties of the responsible position to which he has been appointed, and will be followed by the good wishes of a host of friends, Democrats and Republicans."


