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## ＂ALlhallow evte．＂

Erief History of The Event－Fun For the boys and Giris．
Friday，October 31，was＂All Hal－ low Eve，＂and the boys and girls of the city had the day in mind for many weeks past．They know that it is a night of mirth and mystery，especially devoted to nischief，fun，incantations，divina－ tions，charms and spells，but very few of them or their edders under－ stand its real significance，or can tell whence it derived its name．
It is many centuries since the Roman church，finding it impo， sible，from the great and constantly increasing multitude of saints，to set apart a separate day for each one，decreed that November 1 should thenceforward be kept as a day in honor of all the saints，and that it should be known as＂All Hallow Mass or All Saints＇day，＂ and that the night of October 31， immediately preceding it，should thereafter be kept as a vigil and be known as＂All Hollow Eve，＂ Chése occasions being still observed in the Catholic，Episcopal and Lutheran churches．

From its first organzation＂Hal－ low Eve＂has been invested with a peculiar mystic character．It is an almost universal superstition that supernatural influences then have unusual power，that devils，witches and fairies are abroad，that all living humanity can be detached from corporal restraint and made to read its own future or to reveal to r．thers what fate may have in store for them．These may，be justly regarded as relics of Pagan times．

In all ages countries＂Hallow Eve＂has been deemed，as it still is， the occasion par excellence for divining the answer to that mo－ mentous question which absorbs so large a share of the thoughts of romantic young men and maidens， ＂who is to marry whom？＂The means employed to gain this much desired information are as quaiat and curious as they are numerous and vared，For this reascn every cl me and every country－almost every district of every country－ has had its own charms and spells paculiar to itself，and they have furnished an almost inexhaustible theme to folk poets and compilers of fulk lore．
Those of Scotland have been most graphically described by that greatest of all poets of the people， Roneit Burns．In his poems of ＂H llow E＇en，＂he has given us a most vivid aecount of more tha＂ half a seore＂of＂Hallow Eve＂ chatms and spells pecular to the fecotland peasantry．

Water，nuts and apples bear a prominent part in the spells ard charms of＂Hallow Eve．＂A quaint old book of charms，puh－ lished in Edinburg in 1690，entitled ＂Old Father Time＇s Bundle of Faggots Newly Bound Up，＂de－ clares that an infallible means of getting a view of your future husband or wife is to go to bed on ＂Hallow Eve＂with a glass of water，in which a small sliver of of wood has been placed，standing on a table by your bedside．In the night you will dream of falling from a bridge into the river and being rescued by your future wife or husband，whom you will see as distinctly as though viewed with waking eyes．The charm is thus alluded to by the English poet Gay： ＂Last Hallow Eve I lonsed my love to see． And tried a spell to call her up to me； With wood and water standiug by ny side，
dreamed a dream and saw my sweet bride，
There can be no question that th observances of＂Holiow Eve＂are derived from those of the old Roman festival of Pomona，when divinations and the consulting of oracles and omens were universally practiced．Lighting bonfires is ons of the most universal of＂Hallow Eve＂usuages，yet the Germanic and Celtic nations were both ac－ customed to kindle them on Octo－ ber 31，centuries before they ever heard of the Christian religion and its vigil of＂All Hallow Eve．＂
It is probable that the boys of those old races indulged，on that date，in the same mischievous practices which now afford so much pleasure to our Albuquerque youngsters，and no doubt the little sons and daughters of the ancient Romans，Germans and Celts car－ minated the municipality（or，in the vuigar，＂painted the town red＂） quite as extensively as the children of Albuquerque，by ringing door bells，running away before they can le answered，beating the pan－ nels of front doors with cabbage heads，mixplacing signs，gates and fences and raising old Nick gener－ al y－Alb que：quy Ciizen．

## News About Xew Mexico Judge．

Special dispatch to the Globe Democrat，
Washington，D．C．，October 26. Judge A．A．Freeman，who was re－ cently appointed associate justico of the supreme court of New Mex－ ico，has got into hot water．＂A A．Freeman，of Tennessee，＂was the way the nomination read when sent to the Senate．But Judge Freeman has really been practicing law in Washington fur several years．His home has been across the Potemac，in Virginia，long orough fur him to become interest－ ed in the polities of the Alexandia district．Thas is the distrre．rep－
resented in congress by W. H. F. Lee, son of Gerr. Robert E. Lee. Gen. Lee's renomination was seeured at the expense of considerable dissatisfaction in his own party The republicans saw an opportunity to smash the machine by quietly supporting an independent democrat, Mrr. Frank Hare, of Alexandria, and accerdingly adjourned their conventton at Manassas without a nomination. Several repub licaus of the district did not approve of the program. They is sued an address demanding that a straight-out republican nomination be made which would, of course be directly in line with Gen. Lee's interests. Strangely encugh, Judge freeman, notwithstanding his appointment and confirmation to the Few Mexico judgeship, came forward as the leader of the straight out faction. At the boftom of the address Judge Freeman's name led all the other signers. To nominate a republican was to insure Gen. Loe's election, but Judge Freeman insited that it must be dona. He is now in New Mexico or on his way there. Maj. Hine, the chairman of the republican convention which decided to make no nomination, but to add in splitting the democratic vote, has written a tart reply to Judge Free man. In the course of it he says: "It has always been considered of questionable propriety for members of the judiciary to take any active part in political contests. Is it not even more so for the gentleman from Tennesse, serving in New Mexico, to attempt to nullify the action of a Virginia convention?"

## HEMRY J, SHLAER DEAG.

Henry J. Miller, aged 87 years, died at his room in the Cromwell blow last night about 1 o'clock from typhoid fever, after an illness of a few weeks.

Mr. Miller was born in Wayne county, New York, where now resides his mother, who is 79 years old, and a number of relatives and life-long friends. A few weeks ago E. S. McPherson, room-mate of the deceased, wrote to his mother, informing her of her son's illness. In her answer she used the following words: "If Henry dies I have nothing more to live for." A telegram has been sent to a relative, residing near the old mother, telling him to break the news as gently as possible to her. Mr. Miller has a brother-1n-law, Mr. Dunning, in business at Concordia, Kan., and he has been informed by telegram of the death.

Henry J. Miller started for the west in the spring of 1880, and in the fall of that year established himself in the general mercantile business at White Oaks, Lincoln county, the style of the firm being Dunning \& Miller-he haviug charge of the business, Mr. Dunnong remaining in Kansas. For
seven years he did a thriving busines, but desiring to see California, he sold out and left for Pasadena, where for about a jear and a half he conducted a cigar store. This was during the boous in southern Californa, but on its decline he disposed of his stock at a good margin and returned to White Oaks. In May, 1889, he came to Albuquerque in company wit'A E. S. McPherson and A. Guittard, and with the latter bought out the business of M. C. Zirhut, on Copper avenue. It did not prove a profitable undertaking and after several months the firm closed, Mr. Guittard returning to White Oaks with his wife, but Mr. Miller remained here and had charge of the carriage repository of J. Korber \& Cu., up to his death.

He was taken ill on the 25 th of last September, and was constantly confined to his room. About a werk ago his attending physician, Dr. Pearce, reported him getting along finely, but it seems he fook a relapse from, which he began sinking rapidly, dying at the hour mentioned above.
He was quite a fleshy gentleman and ebjoyed perfect health until his present sickness, which is attributed to the drmking of the water now being used in the city. Mr. McPherson has been off and on with the deceased for nine years, and states that he had the most agreeable disposition of any man he ever knew-possessing a gen erons, whole-souled hcart. He made many friends here, who will be pained to read the obituary of his death.
The body has been taken in charge by Undertaker Strong, and while no answer has been heard from his relatives it is likely his remains will be shipped east for burial.
Mr. Dunning, brother-in-law of J. 1I. Miller, deceased, arrived yesterday afternoon and will take the remaitis east with him on the $11 ; 25$ train to-day. The sensation of the hour in Washington, in which even poli ics are eclipsed, is the first appearnce as an adrocate of ex. President Cleveland in the Supreme Court of the United States. The audience benches in this legal fog-bank are usually empty, but the announced argument, of Mr. Cleveland filled
them as hoy have not beea illed
since the days when Webster laid down the law. Perhaps this illustration is inapt, as there is no consparison between the men. Mr. Cleveland is nothing of an orator. He simply talks, but his talk is full of sense. His argument, therefore, while devoid of rhetorical figures, und anything but declam:tory, proved a strong one, consise,he sp ike but half as long as his associate-logieal, and with every evidence of careful thought and precision of statement, both as to fact and law. Incidentally, it might be added, he should bave proved a success as a supreme court lawyer, as his eighty minutes talk pays him fifty thousand dollars if it convinces the sleepy old monks who tell us what's in this free and hlessed country. After Mr. Oleveland got though the old and brilliant lawyers who make the suprence court their particular stamping , ground gathered about him with hearty congratulations; among the first of whom were Mr. Bayard, his secretary of state, and Mr. Garland, his attorney general. Another member of his cabinet, Sustice Lamar, occupied a seat in the bench, and smiled his acknowledgements. Two members of the tribunal he addressed were of his owneselection. Chicf Ju-tice Fuller and Justice Lamar, who with Jults Fields, of Cahforaia, make the only three democrats on the bench. The Republicans have five with one racancy caused by Judge Miller's death, and which will be filled by Harrison, thus making two thirds of the court republican.

## White Oaks, N. M. <br> Oct. 31, 1830

We, the committee duly appointed by the authorities of the Congregational Church do herehy make the following prelimnary report:
We came to White Oaks to investigate, impartially, rumurs and reports, which had and were seriously affecting the , work of the Congregational Church and School. We extended an invitation to all who had facts bearing upon tho issues before us, to present them.We are greatful for the kindiess with uhich we were received and the clearness and willingness with which the testimony was given.we have tak n down, in writing, a large quantity of evidence, have called on many of the citizens, have heard all siles, followed all clues, interviewed all persons whese names were in any way mentioned, and with justice to all rought to trace each rumor to its source. As a result, we find trouble of iong standing in the community, intense feeling and bitter animosithes, which have been exceedingly paiufal and unpleasant, not only to those most concerned but to the citizens generally. These conditions have serions:y crippled all religious and educational work, and if continued, with the present decreas:ng population of the town, would in time render work with benevolent fuads of the Congregational Church inexpedient and well nigh impossible.
As a comulitee of the Church we did not come to erther investigate or vindicate the character of men and wormen not members of the Church of Christ. Rumors which charge citizens of this town with the gravest and most a.trocious of crimes, viz; the destruction of nord character, we have followed thl we have found their sources. But in every single case of rumor or report affectmg the christian characier and ministerial standing of the pastor of this church, or the purity and worth of other members of this church, we have been unable, after the most dil igent and penetrating inquiry, from a large number of witnesses, to tind proof of the accusations by any absolute, act We find a cordial support by the community of the work carried on by the Congregational denomination ia the church and school in this place and that the present membership is united and zealous to do the wurk of Christ.
The evidence taken is on filo in Abuquerque. The final and full report will fullow in due time.

## Gladntone on the Mekinley Bint,

London, Oct. 29th.-Uladstone arrived in Dundes to-day, and was presented with the freedom of the city. He made an address in which he referred to the comnerce of the city which he said was threatened by the adoption of the new American tariff. He woukd not, however, he said, bring a railing accusation against the people of the United States. Protection, although in might inflict incidental collateral blows on other countries, it did far great-r mischief to the country which adopted such policy. Gladstone then proceeded to contrast the decrease in the tariff in England with an increase in the United States. He said he found comfort for England in the fact that it was not true that any tariff adopted by any government on eart' coula interefere seriously with Great Britian. The first effect of the McKinley bill would be to raise the satandard of prices in the United States. This meant a diminisbed power of exportation; this again which while we were damnified in one of our twenty markets we derived the benefit on the other ninteen, from the dimin inhed power of the merchants of the United States to compete with British merchants in any of them; thrs being due to the augmentation of prices in the United States and increased restraints under which merchants of the later country have to work. He advised manufacturers to allow America to find out for herself the evil effecis that will follow the adoption of the high tariff.
