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## CLEVELAND HAPPY.

The Ex-President Expresses his Opinion on the Result of Tuesday's Election.

It Shows that the Peopie could not Be Deluded to Their Ruin.

New York, Nov. 5.-To an Ass. ociated Press reporter who a ked an expression of his opinion on the result of yesterday's election, ex President Cleveland said to day ; "I am delighted. I challenge the right of any man in the country to rejoice more heartily than I over the result. My gratification is that of an American, proudgof his fellowcountrymen, who though led away for a time by party prejudice and by blind contidence in cunning and selfish leaders could not be deluded o their ruin.
"They have demonstrated that dealing with them it is not safe to calculate they are stupid or heedless of the welfare of their country. The necessity of tariff reform with its consequent reduction in cost in living and the duty of the democratic party to advocate t has been fully demonstrated by the action of the people yesterday. Therr decision was deliberately madeand it is all the more signifficant because they have vuted upon their reason and judgment and because they have proved that corruption is powerless as against their conviction. Of course there is nothing for the democratic party to do but to push on the battie at times and at all piaces, on the lines which they have laid down, that is to insist upon a wise adjustment of tariff taxation to the reasonable needs of the govermment as opposed to the plau which entiches the favored class at the expense of the the masses of the people.
"Our party made an honest and earnest fiight. It has planted? i self upon the disinterested and unselfish devotion to the interests of the people. Its absolute unity and harmony upon the question of tariff reform shows its quick recognition of true democratic princi pies sad its enthusiasm in the cause which involves the fopular w fare. Everywhere sur people have done magnificently and the harvest they have gathered has een nobly earned.'
In answer to a query as to his views on the op ration of the ballot reform law, Cleveland said: " think there should be no more opp iifon to the principles of ballot chorm. The evidence of its usefulmess and benefic to the popie I regara as conclusive."

## The Poliey of watehiag others.

Obviously the best to do when one is in doubt at anything at a dinner party is to watch others. ## Curlous freaks of steel.

The finest grades of razors are so delicate that even the famous Damascus sword blader cannot equal them in texture. It is not generally known that the grain of a Sweedish razor is so that its general direction is charged after a short
service. When you buy a fine razor the grain rnis from the upper end of the outer point in a diagonal direction toward the handle. Constant strapping will twist the steel until the grain appears to be set straight up and down. Subsequent use will drag the grain outward from the edge, so that after steady use for several months the fibre of steel occupies a position exact[y the reverse of that which it did on the day of purchase. The process also tffects the temper of the blade, and when the grain sets from the lower outer point towards the back, you have a razor which cannot be kept in condition, even by the most scientific barbers. But here is another curious freak: Leave the razor alone for a month or two, and when you take it up you find that the grain has assumed its firs; position. This operation can be repeated until the steel is worn through to the back.

Young Thurman on Cleveland.
Còumbus, O., Nov. 8.-Allan W. Thurman, son of Judge Thurman in whose honor a banquet is to be given Nov. 13, addressed a jollification meeting at Hamilton, Butler county, the home of Governor Campbell, this evening and gave the credit of the recent victory to ex-President Cleveland, and at the same time paid the following handsome tribute: "Yet this was the issue, plain and simple, brought about by the McKiniey bill and to the man, Grover Cleveland, three years ago boldly and fearlessly attacked this whole system. More than to any other do we owe this victory. Never for oae moment, amidst all the abuse that was heaped upon him, did he falter or his courage fail. Beleiving in the truth and justice of his position; believing that the government had no right to take money from the pockets of the people solely for the benefit of a particular class, he continued year after year when others hesitated to battle for the right and now, when all are eager to join in the fray, certain of this fact, that he dared to lead when scarcely anyone dared to follow, shows the metal
he is made of, and I belige that the whole people will see to it and only he, shall be again chosen as their leader in 1892. If ever man spoke the truth surely he did when he said, a few days ago: "No one has a greater right to rejoice than I."

President's Proclamation.
Washington, Nov. 8.-The following is the proclamation by the President of the United States: A proclamation, By the grace and favor of the Almighty God the people of the nation have been led to the closing days of the passing year, which has been full of the blessings of peace and the comforts of plenty. Bountiful compensation has come to us for the work of our minds and of our hands in every department of human industry. Now, therefore, I, Benjamin Harrison, president of the United States of America, do hereby appoint Thursday the 27 th day of the present month of November to be observed as a day of prayer and of thanksgiving, and I do invite the people upon that day to cease from their labors, to meet in their accustomed houses of worship and to join in rendering gratitude and praise to our benificent creator for the rich blessings he has granted us as a nation, and invoking the continuance of his protection and grace for the future. I commend to my fellow-citizens the privilege of ${ }_{c}$, remembering the poor, the homeless and the sorrowful. Let us endeavor to merit the promised recompense of charity and the gracious acceptance of our praise. In testimeny whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed.
Done at the city of Warhington, this 8th day of November in tho year of our Lord 1890 and of the seal of independence of the United States the one hundred and fifteenth. (Signed,)

## AFTER THE BATTLE.

From The Albuquerque Damocrat.
A view of the field after the recent political battle in New Mexico produces the ghost of the republican party in this territory. The democrats without money and no federal or territorial officials to draw upon for assistance to defray the expenses for printing, carcied ten of the fourteen counties in the territory, giving Hon. Antoniv Joseph about 1,000 vates more than he received over the same opponent two years ago. Beg:nning with Grant county the democrats elected every man on their ticket but sheriff who slipped in by only 34 majority. Latest advices from Lincrln, Chaves and Eddy counties, indicate that the democrats were victorioul in all clecting the legislative ticket by about 800 majority. The tight in Dona Ana was very clobe and will require an official count to decide which parly carried the day. Two yearsago the republicans elected their ticket in Dona Ana by majorities too large to mention. So considering the democrats were in the soup in Dona Ana to start on, they did very well to save a ladle when the campaign closed. Socorro Co. was earried by the republicans by the shameful majority of 400 , completely disorganizing the party in that county, with little hope of recovering lost ground. But this year the gallant democrats of Socorro county went into the field with the best tivket ever nominated in the county. The boys started out with the determination to ${ }^{0}$ win, and scored a magnificent vietory for Joseph and the whole county ticket from top to bottom, not leaving a republican sign boa:d in the county to guide their steps. It was a sweeping condemnation of political desperadoes in Socorro county.

Now we come to Valencia. It went republican of course. The democrats in this county are quite numerous, but like the republicans on rainy days in New York elec-tions-they don't turn out, besides Valencia county this year had new tin ballot bexes which attracted an extra number of ballots on the repubiican side, the democratic ballots being so small in number that it wasn's worth while to count them. Moving a little farther north we reach Santa Fe county. Hare is where is located a fine lot of republicans as ever scuttled a ship or cut a throat. About half a dozen of these fellows who live off the fat of the land at the expense of the people by corruption, intrigue and high handed robbery of the people's rights. These filchers of public funds would not be allowed to live in any state in the union except within the walls of the penitentiary. Not one of them produces a dollar or adds a cent to the wealth of the territory. In short they are a vampire upon the people and a disgrace to New Mexico. In the face of all the odds against the democracy in Santa Fe county, who are the tried and true friends of the people, the entire democratic ticket was elected. But of all the surprises that were in store for the republican party the county of San Miguel was a paralyzer. For many years that county has been controled by the political parasites who make their headquarters of operation in the capital of the territory. The repubiican ticket of San Miguel county which met with just defeat was under absolute control of the land ring of Santa Fe. They owned and controlled the republican leaders of San Miguel. But the "rings" promises, threats and money spent for the purpose of securing county control and robbing the people of their homes, did them no good. The people were united in the fight for the right and won the battle by an overwhelming majority for the entire ticket, Joseph receiving 1500 majority. The effect of this victory will be great and lasting. Democracy scores a triumph in San Miguel county, but the whole territory will reap a benefit. Another election in New Mexico will squelch Catron, Frost and Otero so effectually that the people will forever after have relief from legalized robberies of the people by republican legislatures. Colfax and Mora counties came to the front with democratic majorities, notwithstanding the fact that about $\$ 5,000$ was putinto those counties by republican looters of the territorial treasury.
