portion. The more the balance is altered, the bigger the need for competent wildlife biologists to try and get things back in some semblance of order again. Per-

haps heavier hunting pressure is desired to compensate for the lack of natural predators. But despite all the work of man, nature still makes her presence felt, quite dramatically at times. Experience has shown

us that there are cycles of wildlife, diminishing populations in years of plenty. Nothing we can do will alter this natural cycle. A drastic die-off of deer in Llano County a couple of years back was a dramatic example of this. It was, simply, nature's



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

To keep a lawn attractive coating may completely overthroughout the summer, proper grow buds and stems. New infecfertilization, watering and mowing are very important. Fertilization should continue

throughout the growing season, says County Agent Pat C. Garner. Nitrogen is the key element in turf growth and should be applied every eight to 10 weeks at the rate of one to two pounds of actual nitrogen per 1,000 square feet. It produces the deep green color that homeowners

Deep watering encourages a deep root system that is capable of utilizing plant nutrients more efficiently and is more resistant to diseases. 
