The El Paso Convention.
The convention was called to order, Sept. 233, at 10 b'clock, a.m.

The following resolutions were unanimously adopted by the Convention:
That this convention confire its labors exclusively to the procuring of the building of a railway from the city of El Paso, Texas, via White Oaks and Las Vegas, N. M., Trmidad and Pueblo, Colo. to a north. ern terminus at the city of Denver, with the understanding that this road shall ke in all respects a line
separate and independent from the separate and independent from the
present existing railway organiza. tions.

That as a preliminary to the work of interestiag capital in the construction of this line of railway, it is deemed expedient that preliminary survey or reconnoisance of the proposed route from White Oaks ria Las Vegas to Trinidad, should immediately he made; that in view of the fact that the city of E1 Paso is prepased to furnish a complete survey and elaborate data of the route from El Paso to White Oaks, the city of El Paso is therefore exemptec frora any part or share in the expence of this survey from White Oaks to. Trimiad, the cost of such survey from White Oaks to Trinidad to be borne by the cities of Denver, Trinidad and Las Vegas, the Maxwell Grant and White Oaks, and that we must cordially invite the eity of Pueblo through the delegation it named to this convention, but which failed to come here, to unite with us in the work of carrying this undertaking to success. We suggest as the basis of assessment of these cities for the cost of the survey, which is roughly estimated at $\$ 10,000$ the following: Denver $\$ 2,000$, Pueblo $\$ 1,500$, Trinidad $\$ 2,100$, Las Vegas $\$ 2,000$, Maxwell Grant $\$ 1,500$ White Oaks $\$ 1,000$, total $\$ 1 \mathrm{G}, 000$ It is also recommended that an adequate corps of engineers be put: $n$ the field to complete the preliminary survey from White Oaks to Triai dad within the term of ninety days from the first day of October.
That this convention be resolvedinto a permanent organization with the exclusive object and purpose of promoing the construction at the tarliest date possible of the line of railway along the route above described.

That when this conventioi shal have been resolved into a permanent organization, as above recommended, there shall be designated an executive committee toconsist of two members each for the cities of Denver, Pueblo, Trinidad, Las Vegas and El Paso, of one member from White Oaks; such committes to be entrusted with the labor of making the above-described survey and with authority to disburse for that purpose suck funds as may be rased, and with further power to treat with such syndicates as the committe may deem advisable, looking to the procuring of the con struction of the road, after such time as the committee is prepared to present complete data of the entire line and has in its possession the final report of the above des cribed survey. It shall be the duty of this committee to make reports to the central organization from time to time, as called upon by the president, and its duties may at any ime be extended or restricted by a majority vote of the central organ $: z$
That the members to compose this executive committee shall consist of such gentieman as are chosen by the respective delegations.
That for the present the office and place of meeting of this committee shall be in the city of Las Vegas, N. M.
That for all meetings of this comantee notice in writing shali be sent by the secretary to all members of the committee, fifteen days in advance of the date for which the meeting is culled.
This committee shall be subject to call at any time it is decided to be necessary by the chairman, concurred in by two other nembers of

## he committes.

That whenever actual construcion shall begin on this railway the work shall begin simultaneously oth at the northern and southern termmus, and shall be carried forward in equal proportions from both ends until the two lines shall meet midway of the route.
That the various delegates here present be requested to state an behalf of their respective cities what each is able and willing to do toward subsidies as may be deemed necessary and as will be adequate to interest capital in the construction of this rad.
Las Vegas named O. L. Houghton and F. A. Manzanares as her members of the executive committee, and White Ouks named John Y. Hewitt. The other delegations asked for further time, which was granted.
Mr. Hewitt and Mr. Watson, of White Oaks, each offered to put up $\$ 2,000$ towards securing the construction of the new road.
Col. Ford, of Trinidad, presented resolutions, thanking the citizens of El Paso for their magnificent hosp'tality, which were adopted.

On motion of W. S. Russeli the convention returne. 1 thanks to Chairman Patterson and Secretary Heman, for the admirable executive abiity and uniform courtesy with whica they had discharged the duties of their offices.
Judge Patterson returned thanks to the acembers of the convention for their close attention to business and uniform courtesy to the chair, after which the convention adjourned snbject to the call of the ex-

He stated that preparations will be made at ance for making a preliminary survey of the route and with proper effort it will soon be built. A general executive committee is to be appointed to take charge of the work, two members of which will be name? by Trinidad It was the geweral sentiment of those present last evening that no better man than Mr. Ford could be selected as one of them, and it is more than probable that he will be asked to accept the position. vote of thanks was tendered Mr Ford for the able manner in whict he had represented Trinidad at the convention.-The Evening Chron icle, Trinidad, Colo., Sept. 26
It is doubtful if any railway enterprise was ever the recipient, at its oricin, of more hearty and substantial encouragement than that which has already greeted the Denver \& El Paso short line.
The liberalty of Mr. M. P. Pels, on behalf of the Maxwell land grant company, has already been mentioned in these columns. Fifteen hundred dollars in cash subseription for the purposes of preliminary survey, rights of way throughout their vast estates, and free ties and bridge timbers, together with the assurance of further practical and, all go to make a princely bequest, worthy of that princely company.
Judge O. D. Barrett, on behaif of himself, Gen, B. F. Butler, and the otker claimants to the Mora grant, to-day, authorized the (1ptic to state that his company would give the proposed road the right of way through their lanis, five them all the timbers and ties necessary for the construction of the road along that right of way, and for ten years after completion would permit to the road the free use of atl the coal necessary to the running of trains through the Mora grant.
Dr. O. G. Cilley, of Boston, Macs., representing the Cruig ranch, in
south rn Cclorado. duplicated the offer of Judge Barrett, should the road extend through his possessions, which lie on the north of Trinidad. Such offers as these sound more like the concessions of some government than like the bequests of private citizens. They show what a hold the proposed line has upen the wishes and determination o the people along the route. It remains now for the claimants to the Las Vegas grant to nave a mas: meeting and donate to the roa: similar rights and rights and prir. ileges.-Optic.
Prof. $\overline{\text { Carrera, of Las Cruces, sur }}$ prised the El Paso convention wit the statement that the gypzul traffic alone from the White Oal district would pay in a short whi' for the cost of construction oi tl proposed railroad. Thè Unite States produces c.unually 100,00 tons of gypsum and import 150,000 tons more, at a cost of $\$ 1,500,000$. The gypsum beds of White Oaks ore peculiar in formation. It is impossible to estimate the amount in sight, but there are millions upon millions of tons there that contain 22 percent. of water.
