Brady is situated just right to be the main division point between Ft. Worth and San Antonio, and with repair shops and round house located here it would mean a great deal to us. THIS MAN MAKES CORN

Waldrip Farmer Knows How to Plant, Cultivate and Make Good Corn. Also a Diversitier.

E. B. Kennedy, of Waldrip, came in last week with his last three bales of last season's cot ton which he sold at 11 cents. Mr. Kennedy reports having made 29 bales last year off of 45 Three of these bales sold at 11c, 15 at 9c, and the balance at 8 1-2c, making quite a profitable year's record. Besides his cotton he threshed over 300 bushels of oats off of four acres and sold it at 60c. This was about half his oat crop, the balance being saved for his own use. He also had 40 acres in corn, gathering 800 bushels of GOOD corn therefrom, all of which he saved for his own use. He has corn enough left over for another year and is safe on that score if he fails to make a bushel

Mr. Kennedy says that during the 11 years he has farmed in McCulloch county he has failed out twice to make a good corn crop. He plants and cultivates his corn in a different manner from the plan usually followed here, and says it is all in the method of cultivation, provided there is any season whatever. He plows deep and beds his corn land, planting in the water furrow and putting the seed in the ground as deep as possible. His first cultivation is with a harrow, serve the moisture in the ground and when it rains the corn gets the full benefit instead of the middle of the rows. He has always made enough corn to do nim with the exception of two years when the drouth was too strong for him. Mr. Kennedy says that if this plan is followed he is sure the talk about McCul. 
