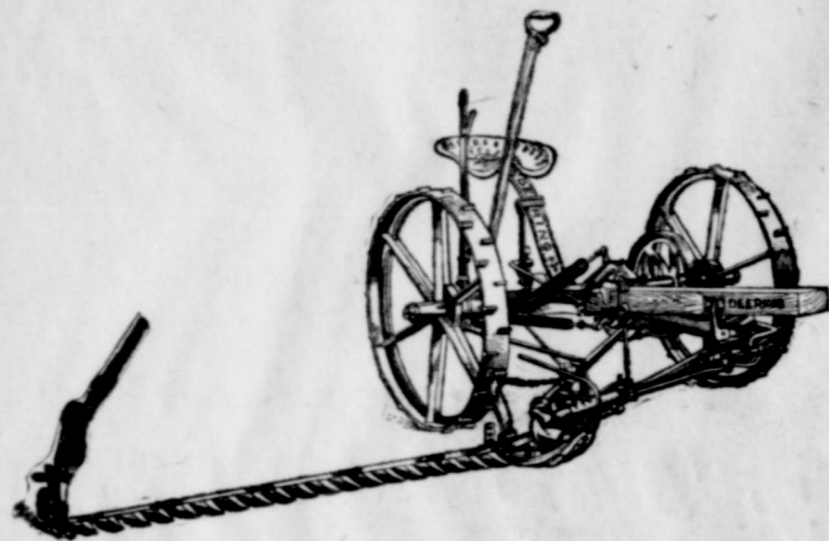

Government Engineer Here.

C. R. Thomas, the government engineer, who will have charge of the building of the roads in Road Precinct No. 1, arrived in the city on yesterday morning's train for the purpose of looking over the situation. In company with the Road committee Mr. Thomas went over the district yesterday afternoon. Mr. Thomas has been engaged in this line of work for the past several years in Texas, having started the work at Abilene, Big Springs, Taylor, and various other points in east and west Texas.

Chairman of Frisco Road Refuses to Give Out Any Information Regarding Early Extension of the Road.

While much significance has been attached to the visit of Pres. B. L. Winchell and Chairman B. F. Yoakum, of the Frisco System, to this section the past week, their plans are an absolute secret as far as the public is concerned. Both officials were enthusiastic over the prospects in this country, but when the matter of an early extension of the Frisco to San Antonio was broached, they sidestepped the question.

We quote the following interview appearing in the Fort Worth Star Telegram:

B. F. Yoakum, chairman of the executive board of the Frisco, and B. L. Winchell, president of the Frisco, spent fifteen minutes in Fort Worth Thursday night, following an inspection trip to Brownwood, Brady and Menard. Both gentlemen displayed a reticence in discussing matters that pertained to further extensions of the system or to railroad legislation in Texas.

"What the Texas legislature could do is worth many millions to the railroad interests, but what they have done is not worth a cent," said President Winchell. "It is gratifying to learn that the Texas legislature adjourned recently without passing any railroad measures because, judging by the past, they would be contrary to railroad progress."

Regarding conditions on the southern branch of the Frisco, both magnates were eloquent. "Copious rains have made crop and range conditions around Brady and Menard better than in a number of years," said Mr. Yoakum. "The people down in that country are co-operating in every way possible with the Frisco and we feel that we will reap rich returns from invading the region."

"When are you going to push on to San Antonio?" he was asked.

"Not a word about that, we positively haven't any plans for extension right now," he returned briefly.

President Winchell travels all the time on inspection trips over the Frisco lines. During 1910 he traveled a distance of more than twice around the world over his lines.

It has been advanced by authorities that Mr. Yoakum's visit to Texas presaged further extensions of the Fort Worth & Rio Grande, but he wouldn't speak of the matter at all.

If there is one thing which Brady needs worse than anything else it is a city park. We make this statement boldly, qualifying the broadness of the assertion by reminding the reader that a park would be just about the easiest thing to secure of the many industries and institutions which we need and want. There are so many beautiful locations at hand, already prepared by Mother Nature herself and supplied with such noble woodland as the hand of man could never supply. These beauty spots can be purchased now at a reasonable price, but in a few more years they cannot be had. The Standard has for more than two years been calling attention to this matter, and once more we wish to "sound the alarm." We really believe this is a matter which the Commercial Club should handle, and we feel sure that if the club would take up the city would soon be the owner of a beautiful plot of ground, which later might be improved as the means might justify.

THE receipts of the Brady post-office show that at this time there is only a matter of \$2000 lacking for the fiscal year to bring the sum total up to the necessary point allowing the establishment of free city delivery. The fiscal year ends June 30th, so there can be no doubt but that Brady will be entitled to free delivery after the report is made. However, the postal receipts being sufficient will not alone give us this greatly desired privilege at the hands of Uncle Sam. Other requirements are stipulated—requirements which Brady as a city has been neglecting this long time. We refer to better sidewalks, the proper naming of streets and the correct numbering of the houses. Our Uncle Samuel will not ask his mail carriers to deliver mail in a town where there are few or no sidewalks, and where the carrier would have to use the hobo's chalk marks to designate his route. Brady is lacking in these qualifications, and we must get busy at once if we are to be ready for free delivery by the time it is ready for us. Let the proper authorities take notice and start something.

Three good men were elected aldermen: Tuesday, and three more good men were defeated. The Standard is but voicing the opinion of the public generally when we say that we were well pleased with the result and would have been just as well pleased had the other three gentlemen received majorities. Six better citizens could not have been picked from whom to make a selection, and the city's interests would have been equally safe in the hands of any combination of the six which the voters might have picked.—Brady Standard.

That is the right spirit to manifest. It is unselfish and patriotic. San Antonio is now in the midst of a campaign. So far there has been little acrimony, but when election day draws nigh the factions are liable to become ardently excited. Voters should calmly decide for themselves which set of officers they prefer and vote for them. Let your neighbor vote as he pleases

and when the result is made known accept the situation and work for a cleaner and better city. Both sides make elaborate promises. Which one will carry out even a portion of the anti-election pledges?—San Antonio Express.

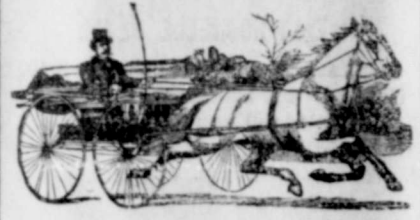

Small Kansas Towns Own Waterworks.

According to the best reports obtainable, Kansas has more cities and towns owning their own public utilities than any other state, says a Topeka special dispatch to the Chicago Tribune. The statistics are rather vague, but none has been found which disputes this. There are 137 towns and cities of Kansas, of all classes, that have water systems, and of this number 118 own and operate their own plants, leaving only 19 cities of the state that have private plants. In addition to owning their waterworks more than 40 Kansas towns own their own electric light plants and furnish not only water but light for public and private purposes. In seven of the 19 towns which have private plants supplying water, the question of municipal ownership is being agitated, and before the year is up it is certain that at least three of these cities will acquire their waterworks systems, either by purchase of the old plant or the building of a new one, in competition with the private plant. The municipal waterworks system became a necessity in Kansas. Many of the towns and cities are small, cities of the second and third class, ranging in population from 1,500 to 15,000.—Fire & Water Engineering, Apr. 5-11.

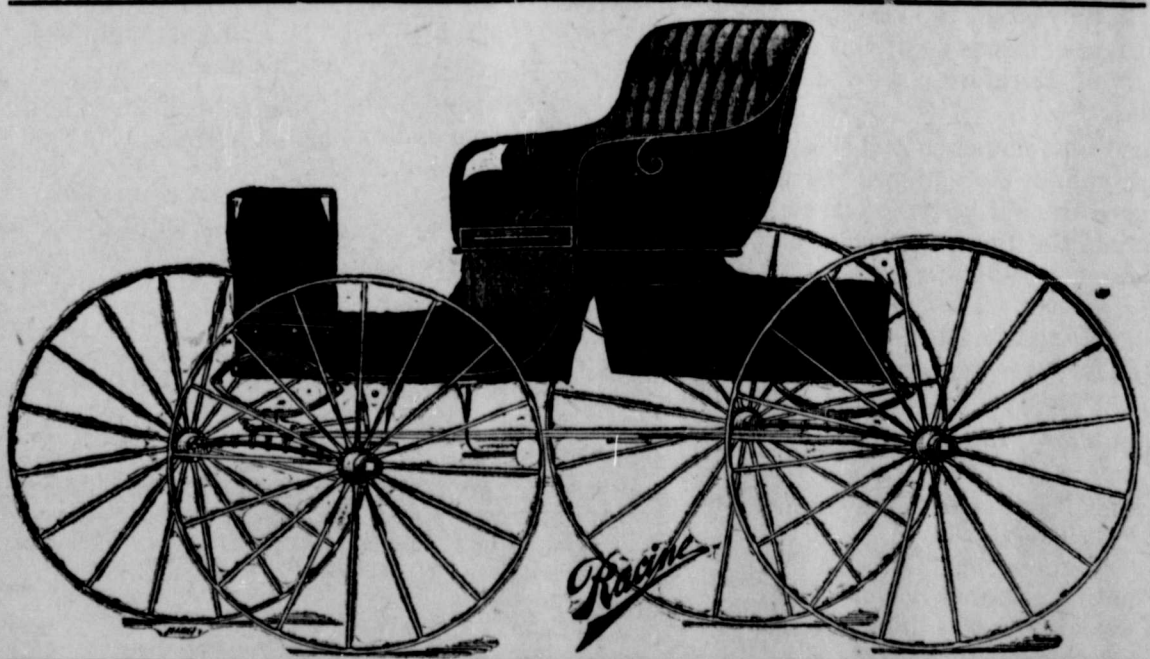

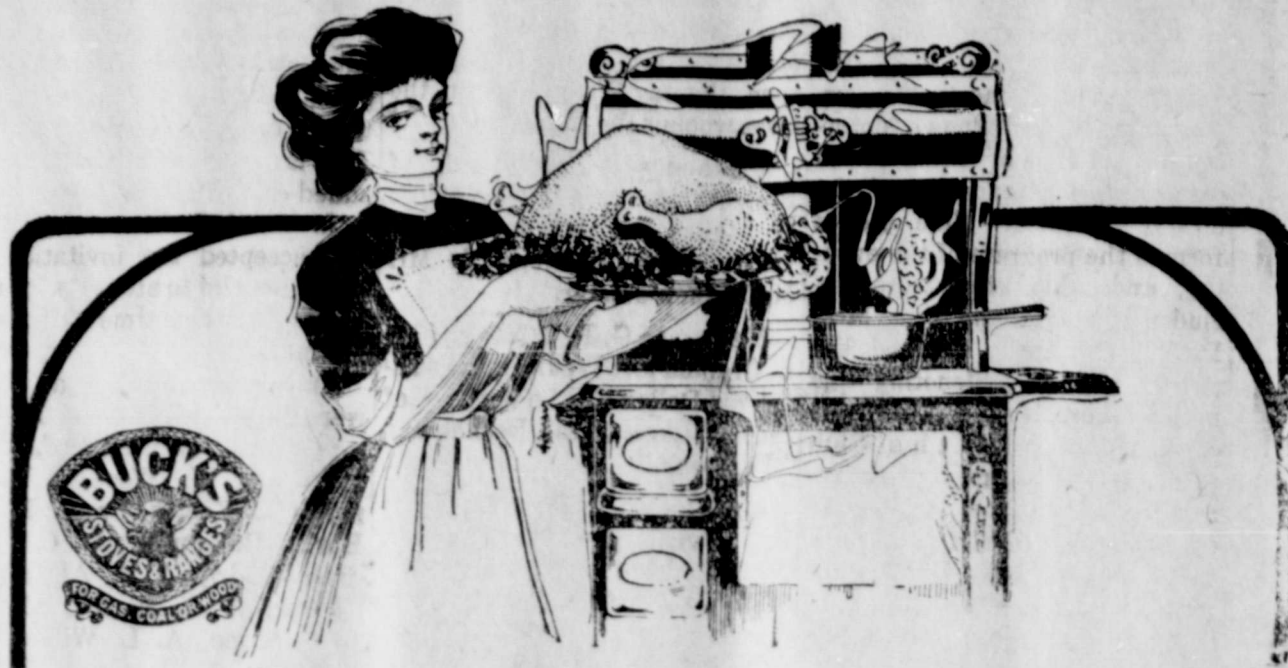
