R. R. CONTRACT SIGNED

MASON COMMITTEE GETS OFFICIALS' SIGNATURE

Say Road Can Be Completed in One Year—No Time Set For Starting Work.

The Mason railroad committee returned last Sunday morning from St. Louis very much encouraged by the fact that their interview with Pres. Winchell, of the Frisco railroad, had resulted in the signing of a contract to extend the Frisco to Mason. The contract calls for right-of-way through Mason county, depot grounds, switch grounds, 200 acres of land near Mason for holding pens and \$40,000 bonus, the Frisco to reach Mason June 30, 1913.

While the contract was signed by the Frisco officials, the Mason committee was not in a position to sign, for while they have met all other conditions, the notes given the committee by the signers of the bonus have all been made payable on January 1st, 1913, which was the time originally named by the Frisco for reaching Mason. The committee now has the task of securing an extension of all these notes until June 30, 1913.

While it is reasonably certain that the extension will be made, yet the committee stated that the contract is optional with the Frisco officials. They set no time to begin work, and they gave no positive assurance that they would build the road. However, they stated that the chances were 100 to 1 that they would build when the Mason people came up with the contract. It is estimated that it will take just about a year to complete the extension, which gives a year's grace for the beginning or completing of the work.

BRADY BANKERS WIN.

Brownwood Team Loses Interesting Game of Ball.

The Brady and Brownwood bankers put up an interesting game of ball on the local diamond last Saturday afternoon, resulting in a score of 10 to 8 in favor of the local team. The game was interesting all the way through, both sides playing good ball. The Brownwood team brought with them a reputation as crack players, consequently it is all the more gratifying to the local boys to have been the victors. Fred Spiller, who was in the box for the locals, pitched a splendid game, and in more than one inning allowed but three batters to face him, striking them out in one, two, three order. Lohn School Loses Election.

The election held in the Lohn school district last Saturday for the purpose of voting on a 20c increase in school tax, resulted in a vote of 38 against and 32 for.

CROP CONDITIONS BETTER.

Government Estimate for This Year Higher Than Last.

The Department of Agriculture estimates, in a report given out Saturday, that the area of cotton planted and yet to be planted this year will be 4.7 per cent greater than last year, which is an acreage of 35,004,000. The condition of the growing crop on May 25th is estimated at 87.8 of a normal crop as compared with 80.2 on the same day last year. 80.9 is the ten year average for that date, so that the present condition is fully 7 per cent above the ten year average.

The acreage in Texas is placed at 10,868,000, which is a five per cent increase over last year. The condition of the Texas crop is 88 per cent of the normal. The Oklahoma acreage is 2,622,000, which is a 16 per cent increase, while the condition is a little worse than the Texas crop, being placed at 87.

Quite a number of citizens who were appointed notaries public were in Brady last Thursday, June 1st, to qualify. County Clerk Yantis has been advised by Judge Newman that appointees have until June 10th in which to qualify, which will give opportunity to those who failed to do so on the 1st.

A SLOGAN FOR BRADY.

WORTH KNOWING

When washing white dress skirts do not wring them, but hang them dripping wet on the line by the belt. The weight of the water prevents any shrinking and keeps the skirt an even length.

After shirt-waists are ironed put them on waist hangers to keep them in shape and hang these on the broom or other stick suspended from two chairs.

White silk should never be hung in the sun, and when it has been rendered yellow by this means it should be washed again and hung in a shady place and in the water should be placed a little turpentine.

Before washing silk stockings, soak in borax water, then wash gently and squeeze out, and after rinsing in several waters hang up to dry.

To remove wine stains sprinkle the spot when the wine is spilled with salt, and you will find that the stain will wash out quickly. Otherwise spread the spots over a bowl and pour on boiling water with force.

It is not generally known that a slice of lemon put into the copper when boiling clothes will make them beautifully white, and take all the stains out of pocket handkerchiefs and children's dresses. Cut the lemon with the rind into slices and let it remain in the boiler till the clothes are ready to come out.

A tablespoonful of turpentine in boiler and in your washing machine will make your clothes much whiter.

Some think they must have the oven sizzling hot when they put bread in to bake, and then they wonder why a thick crust comes on the loaves, while the middle is not at all well baked. The best way is to have the oven just hot enough so that the loaves will take on a nice brown in say, ten or fifteen minutes. Don't be in a hurry to take them out too soon, either. An hour is not too long to bake bread to have it just right.

Needles are small and easily lost, but just secure a small bottle to keep them in and you will not be bothered that way any more.

For five cents you can get a brush that will help wash the vegetables for the table, before cooking. Saves wear and tear on the hands.

When putting away your furs and woollens for the summer, brush them thoroughly and air them, then sprinkle them liberally with black pepper to preserve from the moths. There is no disagreeable odor and the pepper is usually on hand.

To fit a large cork to a small bottle cut two wedge-shaped bits from the narrow end of the cork.

Save your metal roofing by giving it a good coat of paint, and do it before it is too late.

The cork in a bottle of cement or glue is apt to stick and break when opened the second time. To prevent this grease it lightly when first taken out.

Wash bread boards and mixing bowls, or anything in which flour is used, in clear, cold water using a small scrubbing brush.

GOOD ROADS CARRIES

VOTERS IN ROAD PRECINCT WANT BETTER ROADS

Result of Election Better Than 5 to 2 for Issuance of \$75,000.00 Road Bonds.

Unless the unexpected occurs, and the Attorney General's department fails to approve the issue, Road Precinct No. 1 will expend \$75,000 in road improvements. By a vote of 220 to 85 the citizens of the district voiced their approval of the issuance. The election was quiet, yet considerable interest was manifested throughout, and to those who worked so earnestly for the bonds, both at this election and the first one, the outcome is most gratifying.

The ratio of the vote was just about half of that of the first election due to various causes, and the total vote, 305, was considerably less than the first election at which time there were 294 votes for, and 60 votes against the bonds, a total of 354. This was due to the fact that the road district was cut down so as to include only the Brady voting box.

The Commissioners court will meet on Wednesday, June 14th, at which time they will canvass the election returns.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

A wholesome breakfast dish may be made from wheat fresh from the granary. Soak it over night and cook it all day on the back of the range. This makes a food unequalled as to nutriment, and a great favorite with all who have been served with it. A bowl of this wheat, served with rich milk, makes a good breakfast for a growing child.

Potato soup: Boil a quart of potatoes and an onion until thoroughly cooked. Pour off the water. Add a piece of butter the size of an egg, and beat the whole well with a fork or wooden spoon. Heat a quart of milk and pour over this mixture. Salt and pepper to taste. Keep it hot on back of stove until served, but do not allow it to boil after the milk has been added.

The right way to poach eggs: Have a saucepan of water boiling hot, but not actually bubbling. Break the eggs, one at a time, into a saucer and slide them into place in the water. Draw the pan aside where they can not boil, and baste them till they are covered with a thin veil of white. Have ready slices of bread toasted, buttered and cut in pieces the size of the eggs and arranged on a hot platter. As each egg is lifted out on a skimmer, trim off the ragged edges and slide it on the toast.

Sponge cake made in this way will keep fresh and moist longer than the old-fashioned kind: To seven eggs take half a pound of flour and three-quarters of a pound of sugar and the juice and grated rind of a lemon. Pour over the sugar a half-cupful of boiling water and let it boil. Beat whites and yolks of eggs together, and when sugar is boiled to a clear syrup, pour it over them, beating the whole until it is thick and light. Stir in the flour lightly and add the lemon last of all. Bake in a slow oven. If properly made it will be wonderfully light and delicate.—From Farm Journal.

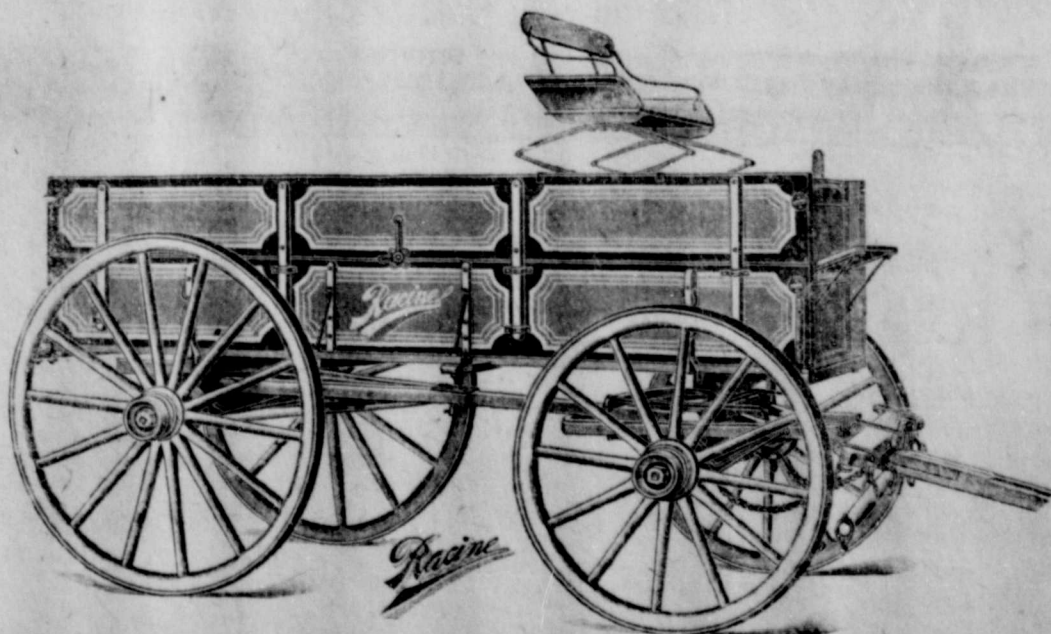
