Married.

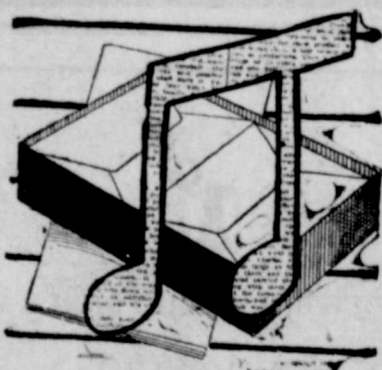

SURVEYORS IN THE FIELD

LOCATING ENGINEER, ARRIVED WEDNESDAY.

Establish Camp About Four Miles South of Town—Will Survey Through Voca.

Mr. J. W. Stewart, locating engineer of the Frisco, arrived in the city Wednesday, and work upon the line of survey to Mason began yesterday. Mr. Stewart, accompanied by the surveying crew, left town in the morning, pitching camp near the railroad tank at the Frisco trap, four miles south of town. Several others will join the crew in the next few days, and about eighteen men will be engaged in the work of making the survey.

While it is expected that the old line of survey will be followed, Mr. Stewart will spend the next few days in the Voca community looking over the ground and it is probable that a line will be surveyed through to Voca to ascertain if the grade will be such as to warrant establishing the route in this direction.

Ordinance Passed Providing Fine of from \$1.00 to \$25.00. Benches May be Returned.

HALF INCH RAIN FALLS

BRADY GETS GOOD SHOW-ER YESTERDAY.

Good Rains Also Reported all the Way to Menard—Voca Also Gets Wetting.

After the torrid heat of the past few days, the refreshing shower that fell for more than half an hour yesterday was more than a welcome relief. Beginning about 3:00 o'clock, the rain fell in sheets for a short while, the government gauge registering .45 inch of precipitation, and water standing on the streets and square. Like all the other rains during the past thirty days, however, the rain was only partial. East of Brady the rain began falling in the East Sweden community about five miles out and coming this way. Beyond this the rain was only streaked. At Rochelle it just laid the dust.

The rain from here to Menard seems to have been uniformly good and about the same, if not a little better than at Brady.

Down toward Voca and as far as Mason a good rainfall is reported also, but beyond the river they had no rain.

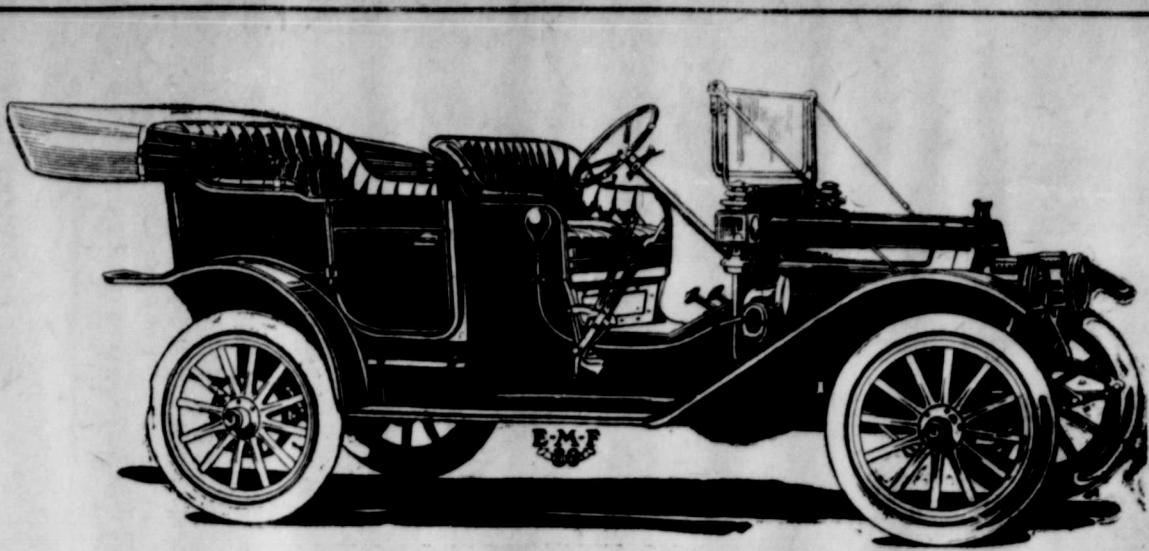

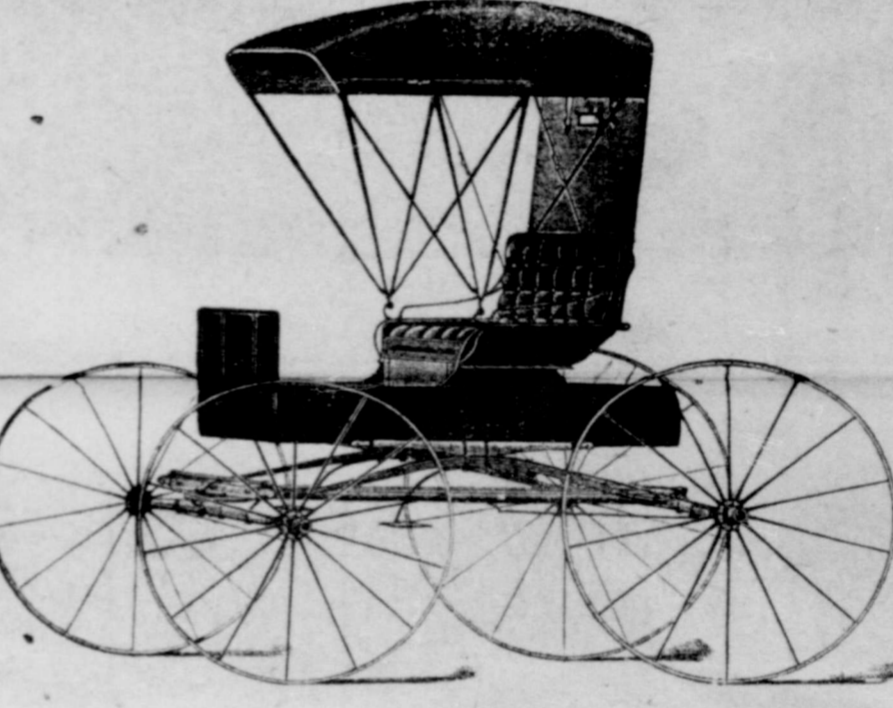
